A Message From the Board

To our Central Vermont Career Center Communities

I am pleased to be writing my first letter to you as Chair of the Central Vermont Career Center School District (CVCCSD). It has been a highly successful year for the Center, and your faith in - and support of - our efforts has made it possible.

I honestly don't know where to begin this letter. Do I tell you about the record turnout at Open House, filled with students and parents wanting to learn more about our programs and the record number of applications we have already received for next fall? Do I start by noting we regularly get dozens of applicants for 16 seats in many of our more popular programs? Or do I jump into how timely and important career-focused education is right now, for the current and future success of our state? Perhaps I should just start at the beginning.

CVCCSD was born last year when voters in our 18 sending towns approved — by a significant margin — our transition from the Barre Unified Union School District to a standalone career and technical center district. What that transition did, first and foremost, was open up seats at the table for representatives from each of our member towns. For the first time, every member town now has a voice in what programs we offer; in setting our budget; and in our day-to-day operations. You are no longer sending your students to a host district – the district belongs to you.

At CVCC, we are training students to become the next generation of mechanics, graphic designers, chefs, plumbers, contractors, hairstylists, EMTs, nurses, and much more. These are high-demand, well-paying careers. Just as important, we are giving them the opportunity to find those rewarding careers right here in Vermont. Many go on to earn college or graduate degrees before returning to the communities that raised them, while others enter their chosen careers directly. Regardless of the paths they choose, CVCC students see the real possibilities beyond what they're learning. Each day they acquire new skills that bring them closer to the career or degree programs they can't wait to embark on. In the past, career and technical education has often been an afterthought, we are seeing more and more that it is a critical part of a high quality PreK-12 education — especially in the middle and high school grades.

There are no town lines or boundaries at CVCCSD. We all make up the Central Vermont Career Center School District. And that's important because it impacts how our annual budget is approved. While our district is technically a new entity, our budget is still embedded in each town's annual school district spending just as it has been in the past. In other words, we are seeking your continued support for the expenses you have been providing for years. The only difference is that you now have a direct voice in setting our annual budget.

It is a privilege to serve as Chair of the CVCCSD Board, and I am humbled and excited by what — with your support — we are building for our young people. I can't think of a better way to increase students' interest and success in learning; to build, support, and maintain our Vermont infrastructure; and to provide our young people with well-paying careers right here at home than a CVCC education. I hope you will support your local school budget on Town Meeting Day, and in so doing, your Career Center.

A Message From the Director

What an exciting year to transition to an independent Career and Technical Education School District. As a 2nd year Director and 1st year Superintendent, I am incredibly grateful to be working at the Central Vermont Career Center. Every day I have the privilege of walking into programs and seeing students engaged and excited about their learning. I have truly not had a more rewarding experience than these two years at CVCC!

We kicked off the school year at CVCC on August 30th with 220 students in 13 programs and Coop after our final round of acceptances on August 29th. In addition, we opened with two new programs: **Emergency Services 2** (Advanced EMT), taught in collaboration with Vermont Technical College's (VTC) paramedic program, and **Design & Fabrication** (Including Stone Trades) located at the Vermont Granite Museum. In addition, due to staffing needs, we developed a collaboration with Vermont Heating and Ventilation (VHV) allowing our Plumbing program to move forward.

CVCC staff took part in goal setting work with the Southern Regional Education Board (SREB) and we look forward to working with them in March as part of our Curriculum and Instruction Review (CIR). CVCC staff teams have set and have been working diligently on the following goals:

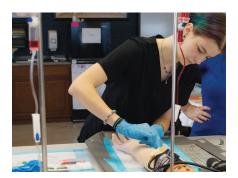
- CVCC Career Pathways Team Goal: Collect and analyze data regarding program viability and needs for CVCC by February 1, 2023.

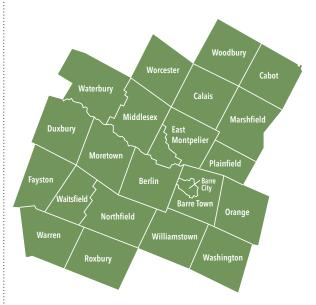

Automotive Technology

Shift your career into 5th gear with Automotive Technology! Whether you love trucks, cars, ATVs or snow-machines, it all starts with understanding the automotive service industry. Get direct experience with power and hand tools, plus learn welding skills. Dive into



steering and suspension, brake systems, electronics and engine performance, and prepare for General Service Technician Training. Learn proper repair and maintenance procedures to service automobiles and light trucks—a green light to success!

Baking & Culinary Arts

The folding of a croissant, the lattice work of a pie—your hands will transform sugar, butter and flour into awe-inspiring creations in Baking Arts. From sourcing ingredients to artistically presenting them on a plate, Culinary Arts will teach



you classical recipes, methods and techniques, as well as new trends in food preparation. In lecture and lab, learn foundational principles, methods/preparations, plus customer service skills, culinary math, and workplace skills. As you get an overview of different parts of the hospitality industry, you'll learn about their distinguishing characteristics and trends. Graduate on track for success!

Building Trades

Do you wonder how structures are made? In Building Trades you'll learn residential and commercial skills from the ground up while earning the NCCER credentials. Along the way, you'll learn the principles



and skills of general carpentry. A real foundation for your future career!

Cosmetology I & II

Cosmetology prepares you to put your artistic skills to work making people look and feel their best. Learn all you need for the Vermont State Board of Cosmetology license exam—hair cutting and coloring, chemical texturizing, waxing, skin care, nail services, and makeup application—in the CVCC in-house salon.



Design & Fabrication

CVCC, in partnership with the Vermont Granite Museum, has established a unique program introducing students to the traditional methods of stone sculpting and contemporary methods in design and fabrication. While studying at the Vermont Granite Museum, students create using various



materials in both 2D and 3D forms. Designs are generated by hand and with computer software, including 3D scanning

and printing technologies, casting, molding, and carving a variety of materials types. Students are introduced to the lettering, design, and fabrication of memorial and monumental art and introduced to advanced manufacturing methods including CNC and CAD/CAM processes.

Digital Media Arts I & II

These programs are the home of creativity and collaborative project-based learning. Enhance your vision of the world

in our photography unit where you can master cameras and manipulation software. Learn new ways of communicating and work with community partners during our graphic design unit. Or bring your movie ideas to life in DMA II during our filmmaking unit where you gain access to



advanced industry-standard camera equipment and learn to master editing software. Through photography, graphics, film, music, web design, and animation our students master creativity for the entire world of media possibilities.

Electrical Technology

Imagine having the skills to wire a house, bringing power to it for the first time! In the Electrical Technology program, you'll learn everything you need to prepare for a career as an electrician, including a registered apprenticeship: install, connect, test, and maintain electrical systems. Learn residential and commercial skills and earn NCCER credentials—power your future!



Emergency Services

Would you know what to do in an emergency? Our program prepares you to handle many types of emergencies and become fully prepared to enter the Emergency Services workforce or enter into



post-secondary education and training.

The second year option, EMS 2, introduces the theory and application of concepts related to the Advanced Emergency Medical Technician (AEMT) profession. The focus is to provide basic and limited advanced emergency medical care and transportation for critical and emergent patients who access the emergency medical system. Skills include extending the knowledge of the EMT to a more complex breadth and depth, intravenous access and fluid therapy, medication administration, blind insertion airway devices, and the advanced assessment and management of various medical illnesses and traumatic injuries, and follows the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration's (NHTSA's) Emergency Medical Services Education Standards.

Exploratory Technology

Our Exploratory Technology program is just that: a wonderful way to gain foundational skills and explore career pathways and the many opportunities available in this 9th- and 10th-grade educational experience. You'll balance your time honing your academic skills



and shadowing each of the Career Center's programs, really giving you an up-close look at what the classes and instructors are like. While you're at it, you'll develop critical thinking, reasoning, and problem-solving skills, and personal finance—skills that you can use for the rest of your life!

Medical Professions

Health care jobs are predicted to be the largest and fastest growing career sector. In this program you'll learn human biology, the science of nutrition, basic clinical assessment skills, vital signs, blood glucose monitoring, medical terminology, phlebotomy,



professionalism skills, first aid and CPR, electronic health record training and basic suturing. You will complete the National Healthcare Association (NHA) Certified Clinical Medical Assisting (CCMA) and Certified Phlebotomy Technician (CPT) training programs and have the opportunity to sit the CCMA and CPT licensing exams. You'll also explore a variety of the medical professions through job shadowing—what they are, what they do, and what training they require.

Natural Resources & Sustainability

The Natural Resources and Sustainability Program prepares students for careers in environmental science, farming, forestry and conservation. We get outside and off-campus to work in the field and solve real world problems.



Plumbing & Heating

Want a career that's really heating up? The Plumbing & Heating program prepares you for entry-level jobs, including a registered apprenticeship, by helping you gain basic knowledge of plumbing



and hydronic heating systems, as well as earning NCCER credentials. The job opportunity outlook for both fields is strong, meaning graduates of this program are in high demand.

School Climate Student Survey / March 2022

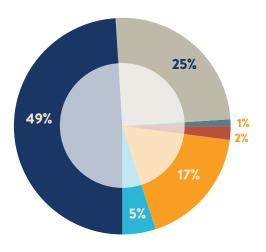

CVCC 6-Month Student Graduation Follow Up

Each year, CVCC attempts to determine the career status of our program participants who graduated from high school six months earlier. Based on that information, we calculate the percentage of respondents who are engaged in some type of post-secondary (i.e., after high school) education, are employed, are in the military, or are unemployed.

The following chart reflects the results for the class of 2022.

Cooperative Education Program

The Cooperative Education Program (Co-op) is a 2nd year option for students, who have completed a program at CVCC. Co-op extends academic and technical training beyond the classroom by providing opportunities for students to apply their learning in a workplace setting. Students will be immersed in Work-Based Learning opportunities up to four days a week, and attend sessions at CVCC one day a week.

The Co-op program is a collaboration between the Central Vermont Career Center and area employers and is designed to offer paid or unpaid career-related experiences that build on and expand a student's skills. Whether the goal is to develop self-confidence, employability skills or advanced job placement, the Cooperative Education career-based curriculum encourages students to put their education to work.

Students in the Plumbing and Heating program and Electrical Technology program have the opportunity to be a part of the Vermont Registered Apprenticeship program, and take the level 2 apprenticeship test.

Career Work Experience (CWE) is a career exploration experience in an occupational field related to students' academic and career goals. Students spend short periods of time in a particular job or industry. These unpaid placements allow for career exploration and provide in-depth knowledge of the day-to-day activities and skills needed to perform a job successfully.

Adult Education Program 2022

The Central Vermont Career Center Adult Education program works to increase the skill level and employability of community members through earning industry-recognized credentials and certifications.

The Adult Education program continues to offer multiple sessions of the Licence Nursing Assistant (LNA) class throughout the 2021-2022 school year, with 25 students enrolled throughout the year. We also have CPR and/or First Aid classes available for the community to earn these American Heart Association certificates. Other programming is currently being explored as well.

Dual Enrollment and Fast Forward College Credits and Industry-Recognized Credentials (IRCs)

Through the Dual Enrollment/Fast Forward program students can get credit for college courses they pass while attending certain programs at CVCC.

Fast Forward is for Vermont students attending a Technical Center who have not yet graduated from high school and who are enrolled in a partner technical center program. Running Start is New Hampshire's version of the Vermont Fast Forward option for college credit providing students attending a Technical Center who have not yet graduated from high school and who are enrolled in a partner technical center program. The courses are taught at the Technical Center, and classes are scheduled during the regular school day so there is no disruption to their high school routine. When not earning College Credits, students may be earning Industry Recognized Credentials.

At the Central Vermont Career Center in the 2021-2022 school year, the following Dual Enrollment/Fast Forward courses and Industry-Recognized Credentials were offered:

Automotive:

Tier 2 IRCs: Certified Lube Technician & Maintenance & Light Repair Certification. Added Subaru University credentials in Spring 2022.

Baking and Culinary Arts:

♦ A total of 24 college credits were earned.

Food Service Sanitation/CULA 120W:

For 2022-2023 in Baking and Culinary Arts/Food Service Sanitation/CULA 120W 92.3% or 12 out of 13 students received Dual Enrollment/Running Start credits through White Mountain Community College (part of the New Hampshire Community College System).

A total of 24 college credits were earned.

For 2021-2022 in DMA I/Intro to Digital Photography I/ART-1310-VC02, 73.3% or 11 out of 15 students received 3 Dual Enrollment/Fast Forward credits through CCV.

A total of 33 college credits were earned.

Emergency Services:

For 2021-2022 in Emergency Services/Emergency Medical Technician: EMS-1011, 75% or 6 of 8 students received Dual Enrollment/Fast Forward credits through Vermont Technical College. A total of 30 college credits were earned.

For 2022-2023 our EMS Level 2 students will be enrolled in EMS 1111 Principles & Practices of Paramedicine I, and EMS 1121 Principles & Practices of Paramedicine II.

12 college credits were earned for each semester.

Tier 2 IRCs: EMT-B, will be adding paramedic licensure.

Medical Professions:

For 2021-2022 students had the opportunity to take 6 Fast Forward Credits; Introduction to Healthcare (AHS-1045) and Human Biology (BIO-1140) through CCV.

A total of 36 college credits were earned.

For 2022-2023 students had the opportunity to take 6 Fast Forward Credits; Introduction to Healthcare (AHS-1045) and Human Biology (BIO-1140) through CCV. Students also had the opportunity to take Introduction to Psychology as an additional Fast Forward course through CCV. Five students earned 9 college credits each and 5 students earned 6 credits each.

Ten students earned a total of 75 college credits. Grades will be posted in June 2023.

Tier 2 IRCs: CCMA (just added), will be adding Phlebotomy as well for FY23.

Natural Resources:

For 2021-2022 in Natural Resources/Intro to Horticulture/LAH-1020-TTC1 44.4% or 4 of 9 students received 3 Dual Enrollment/Fast Forward credits through CCV.

A total of 12 college credits were earned.

For 2022-2023 our Natural Resources students will participate in ENVS 110 Introduction to Environmental Studies through White Mountains Community College. 4 credits (3 lecture credits, 1 lab credit).

Plumbing & Heating:

Tier 2 IRCs: Level 1 VT Plumber Apprenticeship, Level 2 Plumber Apprenticeship and NCCER Construction Core and NCCER Plumbing for 2021-22 students.

* All programs offer the National Career Readiness Certification through WorkKeys.

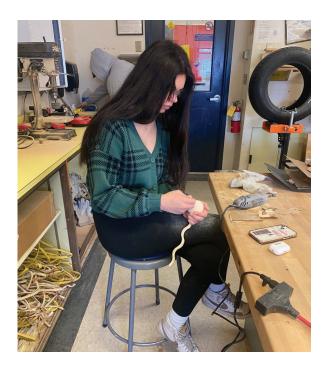
