Increase the Dementia Respite Grant

The Dementia Respite Grant provides flexible funds to help family care partners keep their loved ones with dementia at home.

Dear Chair Kitchel and members of the Senate Appropriations Committee,

Alzheimer's disease is a brain disorder that slowly destroys memory, thinking skills and the ability to carry out the simplest tasks. In 2022, Vermonters spent more than 28 million


hours caring for a loved one with dementia. The burden on dementia caregivers is significant:

- Almost 10% leave the workforce to provide care;
- 19% are forced to reduce their work hours; and
- The vast majority experience negative health outcomes.

In addition, the total lifetime cost of care for someone with dementia is estimated at almost \$400,000 with 70% of these

costs borne by family caregivers in the forms of unpaid care and out-of-pocket expenses.

The Dementia Respite Grant has been level funded at \$250,000 since 2003. These small grants, allocated via the Area Agencies on Aging, are essential for family care partners and help ensure that they can remain in the workforce and manage their own health and family needs. By doubling the allocation, up to 100 additional caregivers could access much needed resources to care for their loved one at home. This reduces stress on our long-term systems of care and ensures those living with dementia remain in their community where they have the greatest familiarity, connections and support.





This budget increase is supported by The Governor's Commission on Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders, The Health Care Advocate of Vermont Legal Aid, the UVMMC Dementia Family Caregiver Center, the Vermont Association of Adult Day Services, the Vermont Association of Area Agencies on Aging, the Vermont Chapter of the Alzheimer's Association, and the Vermont Ombudsman Project.

We ask you to increase Dementia Respite Grant allocation to \$500,000 in the FY25 budget.
