Viable and sustainable student mentoring program, expand on health services for students during and after school, establish adult learning opportunities for the community, address community issues related to food insecurity, expand outdoor learning and community recreation spaces, improve the school gardens, and engage with the community around instructional programs -- specifically Universal Design for Learning and Literacy initiatives underway.

CRAFTY STITCHERS CLUB II (grades 4-6): You will complete your own sewing projects from start to finish. In addition to sewing machine safety, you will learn how to use different features of the machine and how to thread it. This club will be fun and relaxed, with coloring sheets, knitting looms and pompom makers always available for self-guided crafts.

GARDENING CLUB (grades 1-6): Do you enjoy getting into dirt? Do you like working with your hands? Do you want to grow your food? Welcome to the gardening and light cooking club! We will do fall planting, learn how to propagate plant cuttings, cook together using all the flavors of the fall season, and more.

ART CLUB (grades 1-6): Explore all the art room has to offer! We will focus on creating art that is enjoyable, relaxing, and fun to make. Artists will have a chance to experiment, practice skills, and try new ideas by engaging in self-directed projects of their choosing. Join art club to paint, draw, construct, or try any art activity that inspires you!

CRAFTY STITCHERS CLUB I (grades 1-3): This club will focus on simple, fun sewing projects. 


