Overview of CTE Center Funding

1. Types of schools offering Career and Technical Education, CTE:

- a. Regional CTE center operated by and part of a school district.
- b. Regional career technical center school district
 - i. A CTE center that is technically a school district but does not offer diplomas.
 - ii. Acts as a supervisory district for administrative and planning purposes.
- c. Comprehensive high schools a public or approved independent school providing CTE.

2. Duties of the boards regarding budgets and voters:

- a. Local board that operates a CTE center:
 - i. Establish a regional advisory board.
 - ii. Set the budget in consultation with the regional advisory board.
 - iii. CTE budget becomes part of host school district budget for voter approval.
- b. Board of directors of a regional career technical center school district:
 - i. Set the annual budget.
 - ii. Voters from the member school districts in the service region vote on the budget.
 - iii. Once the budget is voter approved, a member district's share becomes a legal obligation of the district.

3. Tuitions are based on CTE center costs less federal and state grants.

- a. Perkins grants are federal.
- b. State grants include:
 - i. Transportation assistance \$1.50 in 1998 dollars, adjusted annually by the NEEP index (\$3.23 per mile for FY2024).
 - ii. Salary assistance:
 - 1. Director of CTE center 50% of State average salary and benefits for position or 50% of individual costs, whichever is less.
 - 2. Guidance director same as director.
 - Co-op teacher (finds job training opportunities for students) the lesser of 35% of State average salary and benefits for position or 35% of the individual's cost.
 - 4. Assistant director for adult education up to 50% of State average salary and benefits for position, prorated if not full-time.
 - 5. Assistant director of career technical center if full-time equivalent (FTE) enrollment is 150 or more and the aggregated sending school population is at least 30% or more of the FTE enrollment same as coop teacher.

4. Tuition reduction:

a. Supplemental assistance grant – 35% of the base education amount per FTE. For FY2024, the supplemental assistance grant is \$4,375 per FTE.

- b. CTE center experiencing increased FTE enrollment of 20% or more from one fall semester to the next receives an extra supplemental assistance grant:
 - i. In year 1, receives two-thirds of 35% of base education amount per FTE increase over previous fall semester.
 - ii. In year 2, if the subsequent enrollment change from fall to fall is less than 20%, the CTE center receives one-third of 35% of base education amount times the original FTE increase.
- 5. Tuition rates are determined by the CTE center net cost divided by the total FTE count of students.
 - a. For Vermont students, the tuition rate will be calculated net of the supplemental assistance grant (4a).
 - b. For out-of-state students, the rate shall be the full rate.
- 6. **Full-time equivalent student** is a six-semester average of the full-time equivalent enrollment for a CTE center. It is the current fall semester FTE enrollment averaged with the preceding five semesters.
