# FY24 Budget

FY24 GF \$15,079,997 5.0% increase in State GF – primarily in wage adjustment (union contract), health insurance, retirement

#### Notable Issues and Budget Pressures

Significant workload increases on all SA Offices' staff: attorneys, victim advocates, administrative support

Restarting trials – significant increases in required expert witness testimony, transcripts, mileage, transportation, lodging for witnesses

Vacancy Savings required to meet budget \$231,869

Implementation Costs of Union Contract – will require full funding in the Pay Act

Criminal Case Management System Implementation - \$1.7M ARPA; project management costs required to be paid from SA Budget

- The Department is requesting the following for operational support and staffing:
- Budget language allowing conversion of already authorized temps to two-yr. limited-service positions utilizing existing funding (ARPA-converted-to-GF) to clear the case backlog.
- Permanent positions: 9 Deputy State's Attorneys (Bennington, Chittenden (includes conflict counsel to Addison), Franklin, Lamoille, Orleans, Washington (2), Windham, Windsor;
- 9 Legal Assts (Bennington, Chittenden, Franklin, Lamoille, Orange, Orleans, Washington, Windham, Windsor);
- \$2,046,000

## Special Investigations Unit

FY24 Budget

FY24 Recommend: \$2,228,629-3% increase

- all funds are State GF
- Costs include:
- SIU Grant Manager: \$62,817
- Law Enforcement Grants: \$793,000
- SIU Program Supports: \$1,347,047
- Program support includes SIU local program staff and NCA Crimes tracking system

#### FY24 Pressures

- Difficulty in law enforcement agencies' ability to dedicate staff due to their own staff leaving law enforcement positions, and nationwide difficulty in recruiting new staff to LEO positions.
- Identified needs include training for forensic interviewing; board training for oversight role.
- Examining consolidation of SIU programs if savings and efficiency can be achieved.

## FY24 Budget

FY24: \$5,089,314 4.8% increase - All funds are State General Fund

- Notable Issues and Budget Pressures
- Increases in wage, benefits, training and unionization of State Transport Deputies
- Duties: Transports, Extraditions, Assistance to Judiciary, DOC, AHS, Post Release Transportation;
- Civil Process; general law enforcement
- Impact of Courts reopening;
- Impact of remote hearings;
- Civil Process; Warrants; special projects for State government.
- Other duties as approved by SAS

- Requests for Sheriffs assistance in many areas of State government: Judiciary Courthouse Security and Transports; DOC transports; OCS civil process; other state civil process; AHS with juveniles' supervision;
- FY24 anticipated costs of unionization
- Pressure on per diem & mileage lines which were reduced in prior years to meet budget targets
- Increase to mileage and per diem lines may be needed to enable State Deputies to assist with other security and law enforcement duties for the State.

# SAS Victim Advocate Program

FY24 Budget

FY24 Recommend: \$2.571,497 All funds are State GF - increase 0.3%

- Costs include:
- Salary and benefits (96%); Operating 4%
- Funding for FY24 will not cover costs of union contract provisions or increased costs for benefits (health and retirement, in particular) for the Victim Advocates

Programmatic and Funding Needs:

Additional Victim Advocates and dedicated administrative support staff

Funding for additional trainings, supplies (postage, brochures)

VA Program Manager: currently Limited Service, 1 year reauthorization of LS position; paid under ARPA converted funding.

7 Victim Advocates (under the VA budget) Caledonia, Franklin, Lamoille, Orleans, Rutland, Washington, Windsor: \$764,000
