

PEOPLE IDENTIFYING AS WOMEN IN THE VERMONT LEGISLATURE
1921 – PRESENT

The first woman elected to the Vermont General Assembly was Rep. Edna Beard in 1921, following ratification of the 19th Amendment of the U.S. Constitution.

From 1921 through 1965, there were 246 members of the Vermont House of Representatives; and since 1966, there have been 150 House members.

The Vermont Senate was formed by constitutional amendment in 1836 and has had 30 members since its establishment.
