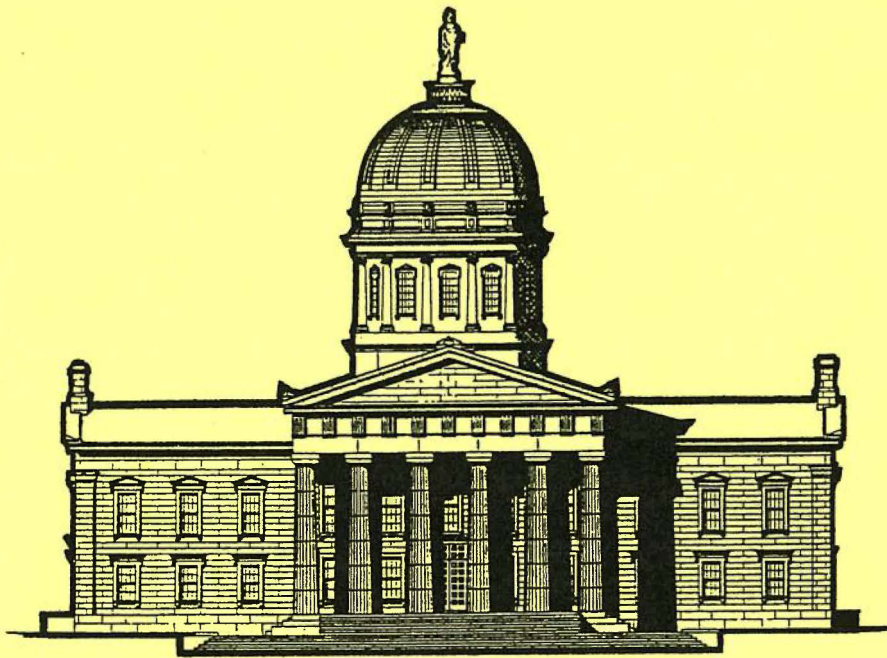

Vote Explanations

Page 1

S. 82 Shall the report of committee of conference be adopted?

Rep. Browning of Arlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote no because the contribution limits are too high and the disclosure should be greater close to elections. This is not enough to really be called effective campaign finance reform.”

Rep. Davis of Washington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

For many of the reasons that are pointed to in the findings section of this bill, I voted no because I do believe as stated in the finding that “in Vermont, lower limits do encourage candidates to interact and communicate with a greater number of voters.” This interaction between candidates and the voters helps build a greater confidence in our representative government and is likely to make candidates more responsive to voters. This bill jeopardizes our representative government.”

Rep. Hooper of Montpelier explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I struggled with this vote. I am, as are many of you, appalled by the influx of money into our campaigns. I take no comfort in fighting fire with fire – using money to fight money. I do take comfort in the notion that this is a beginning and that it provides more transparency to one of our most valued institutions.”

Rep. Mrowicki of Putney explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

After the Supreme Court Citizens United decision striking down our campaign finance laws, in effect, we had no campaign spending limits. I voted yes as this bill starts the process of setting limits.”

Rep. Wizowaty of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I would have liked to see lower limits. But I understand this is the best compromise we could arrive at today.”

Page 2

H. 655 Shall the bill pass?

Rep. Browning of Arlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I cannot support yet another spending bill that does not somehow incorporate the \$1.3 billion cost of tax expenditures in the basic budget accounts.”

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Vermonters have to live within their budgets, but state government continues to grow its spending at a rate far greater than those of the taxpayers’ paychecks paying the bills.”

Page 6

H. 640 Shall the report of the committee on Government Operations be amended as offered by Rep. Browning of Arlington?

Rep. Browning of Arlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes to have time to correct mistakes in Act 90. We all make mistakes. I believe that the lack of real limits on large donations and the lack of required disclosure about the employer and occupation of large donors are grave errors of omission in Act 90. It is never too late to correct an error, but it is never too soon to do so when the integrity and transparency of our democratic process is at stake.

I regret that today the House did not have a chance to undertake a better campaign finance reform bill.”

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This amendment would have left Vermont with no campaign limits at all, based only on the unsupported view that the next two legislatures may take no further action on this subject. That simply would make our limits weaker, not stronger, and was ample reason to reject it.”

Page 7

H. 217 Shall the bill be amended as recommended by the committee on Human Services, as further amended?

Rep. Feltus of Lyndon explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

While I support the restriction of smoking tobacco in work places and public spaces, I cannot endorse the exception carved out for the Vermont Veterans’ Home. Surely the residents and workers at that institution are as adversely affected by second hand smoke as are workers and members of the public in other locations.”

Rep. Morrissey of Bennington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I cannot vote for this bill at this time based on the committee not completing the committee jurisdiction process with Transportation. The marijuana health issues were also not addressed. I will wait until third reading to make my final vote.”

Page 8

H. 123 Shall the bill be amended as recommended by the committee on Health Care?

Rep. Morrissey of Bennington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This one’s for you, former Representative Dick Howrigan, and all of the Lyme Disease advocates and for those affected. May the Senate complete this year the work of the House Health Care Committee and the strong unanimous vote of this body. It is long overdue!”

Page 9

H. 501 Shall the bill be read a third time?

Rep. Branagan of Georgia explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

The issue of impaired driving is one of the most serious safety issues facing our state. However, this bill leaves too many chances for mistakes and has too many opportunities for misinterpretation. Let’s hope the Senate can tighten up the new language.”

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

A person who is impaired from any substance does not belong on our roads. A person who is affected in a slight degree by a medication is not necessarily in the least bit impaired. This language goes beyond its apparent legitimate and appropriate intent, and does not even mesh with the Supreme Court’s current interpretation, contrary to the citation given in the intent section.”

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

The ‘slightest degree’ standard used in this bill has been carefully interpreted by our Supreme Court and we have specifically called for that same interpretation to also apply here. Use of some different wording would simply confuse matters and lead to unnecessary litigation to argue about its application.”

Page 10

H. 823 Shall the bill be read a third time?

Rep. Conquest of Newbury explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I find it useful, always, to be cautious around Act 250, and I am here. In this case, though, the proposals here appear to me to simply encourage development in the smart ways we largely agree on and, importantly to me, don’t create new burdens to building small businesses in rural areas.”

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Few bills that we pass this year will do more to help ensure that the Vermont we love today will remain one that we can love as well in the future. One New Jersey is quite enough for any country.”

Rep. Mrowicki of Putney explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

My vote supports using smart growth principles to lead the way in the 21st century and balance the need for maintaining a cleaner environment with development.

Your Committee on Natural Resources has done some stellar work to promote housing, transportation alternatives and a better future for our children and subsequent generations.”

Rep. Pearson of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

It’s heartening to see many standing up to resist changes to Act 250. I, however, believe it is appropriate to make small changes that stimulate development and in-fill in our downtowns.”

Rep. Stuart of Brattleboro explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

America the beautiful will become America the ugly if we don't learn as a state and a nation to honor the beauty and sanctity of the American landscape.

Europeans and many other societies with histories far older than ours have learned to contain development in order to protect the heritage, beauty and values of their ancestors for generations to come.”

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I cannot support adding another condition in the Act 250 process that will likely add even more unpredictability to obtaining a permit.”

Page 11

H. 646 Shall the bill pass?

Rep. Botzow of Pownal explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

The strong vote for this Unemployment Insurance Bill tells me we are on the right track in addressing an important insurance program for our workers and our employers. I would especially like to thank the Representative from Bristol for his work on the disregarded earnings section.”

Page 12

H. 790 Shall the bill be amended as recommended by the committee on Human Services?

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This may prove to be one of the most significant actions we have taken in years on behalf of families in poverty, and I am proud to have been a part of it.”

Rep. Fay of St. Johnsbury explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted in support of the important progress made in supporting Reach Up participants' move toward self-sufficiency. But making this change by reducing critical support to perhaps the most vulnerable women and children in Vermont is extremely problematic.”

Rep. Hooper of Montpelier explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This is an outstanding bill. I just cannot agree with the means of financing it.”

Rep. Marcotte of Coventry explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Two days ago we began turning the cliffs into slopes by passing H.646 by changing the earnings disregard for unemployed Vermonters. We are now turning our Reach Up Program into a true Reach Up Program. I want to thank the member from Bristol on the earnings disregard and applaud not only the efforts of your Human Services Committee but also the member from Rockingham.”

Rep. O’Sullivan from Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This bill encourages working Vermont families. As we discuss minimum wage we confront similar cliffs. In the Kavet Report working Vermont families actually lose money between the \$10.60 and \$10.50 hourly wage, due directly to the child care subsidy.

This bill is a great model for future cliff reductions.”

Rep. Rachelson of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted yes because the existing Reach Up cliff is a policy that does no one any good, least of all the people who turn down work for economic reasons.

I remain gravely concerned and urge our body to find another way to pay for this change that doesn’t rob Peter to pay Peter. Surely there is a better funding.”

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This bill creates an incentive for people receiving assistance to improve their financial position by going to work and starts to address the benefits cliff problem which has stood in their way in the past. Thank you.”

Rep. Wizowaty of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I’m pleased to see the “income disregard” and changes to the asset test in this bill as a way to support people in “making work pay,” rather than having work result in a net loss. But I am concerned about the potential reduction in benefit amount to a different group of Reach Up Recipients if we don’t see a caseload reduction. I hope we will continue to work on supporting people in moving out of poverty into meaningful work that pays a livable wage.”

Page 13

H. 876 Shall the amendment offered by Rep. Branagan of Georgia be substituted for the amendment offered by Rep. Greshin of Warren?

Rep. Buxton of Tunbridge explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted against this bill because I believe it is irresponsible to commit taxpayer dollars when questions of constitutionality and fiscal impact have not been reviewed – let alone answered.”

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I find it ironic that by the defeat of this amendment we will not allow students from sectarian schools to have equal access to the Dual Enrollment program, yet under another committee’s bill on our desks, we will allow the state general fund dollars for that program to flow to sectarian post-secondary institutions.”

Rep. Hebert of Vernon explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

It is a shame that we allow equity only for those we allow to be equal.”

Page 14

H. 876 Shall the bill be amended as offered by Rep. Greshin of Warren?

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Our Vermont Constitution guarantees everyone the equal protection of our Common Benefits Clause including the right to attend our public schools. It does not provide the right to choose a different mode of education and to then tell the state to provide the same benefits that the public system would have given.”

Page 18

H. 590 Shall the bill be amended as offered by Rep. Higley of Lowell?

Rep. Koch of Barre explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I support this bill, but my support for this amendment echoes the member from Warren’s concern about ‘death by a thousand fees.’ Our habit of imposing regulations upon our citizens and then paying for it by charging them fees, as if they had purchased a service, is poor policy.

As the member from Warren suggested in debate, if a new position is important enough to the people of the state, put it in the budget, and let everyone share the cost.”

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This bill is remarkably simple – the owner of a dam and those who benefit from it should bear the cost of ensuring that it is safe. If the recent coal ash disaster in North Carolina teaches us nothing else about the dangers of failing dams it should at least teach us that.”

Page 19

H. 884 Shall the bill be amended as offered by Rep. Poirier of Barre City?

Rep. Feltus of Lyndon explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted no on this specific proposal because I favor a longer term and more comprehensive package of tax reforms.”

Rep. Hooper of Montpelier explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I had said I would vote against this amendment, but upon reflection I decided I had to put my vote where my mouth was.”

Rep. McCullough of Williston explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

‘Some hae meat and canna eat,
And some wad eat that want it,
But we hae meat and we can eat,
And sae the Lord be thankit.’

I quote the immortal bard Robert Burns as I supported the amendment for those who ‘wad eat that want it.’

This amendment will reduce hunger in Vermont.”

Rep. Yantachka of Charlotte explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted against this amendment not because I disagree with what it is trying to accomplish. I do agree with it. But I know that the committees have worked mightily to present us with a bill that threads the needle balancing needs with costs. There are a lot of things we need to do that we don’t have enough money to accomplish; and this concerns me very much. But until we change the way we collect income taxes, from basing it on taxable income to basing it on Adjusted Gross income as most other states do, our tax rates will continue to compare unfavorably in the public perception. Instead, I look forward to voting to raise the minimum wage to help those earning the least in our economy.”

Page 20

H. 884 Shall the bill be read a third time?

Rep. Browning of Arlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote no not because of what is in this bill but because of what is NOT in it. We need comprehensive tax reform to ensure that all pay a reasonable share and we can reduce tax rates for all.”

Page 21

H. 885 Shall the bill be amended as offered by Rep. Poirier of Barre City?

Rep. Kilmartin of Newport City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote ‘yes’ because this is truly for the family and our children. Too often we give lip service to the family and children. This amendment puts our money where our mouth is so often.”

Rep. Rachelson of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

While I don’t envy the Appropriations Committee and the hard decisions they had to make, I find it deeply painful to vote no on this amendment knowing it impacts so many children and families. The poverty level in Vermont is on par with many third world countries. We can and must do better for those Vermonters who are struggling financially. I hope we can commit to eradicating poverty in our state.”

Rep. Spengler of Colchester explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

As many Vermonters’ wages continue to erode, we must do what we can to keep food on the table.”

Page 22

H. 885 Shall the bill be read a third time?

Rep. Browning of Arlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

The Appropriations Committee has my undying gratitude for incorporating a pilot project to create a unified budget of spending, tax expenditures and capital bill allocations in their bill. However, it is not easy to get

my vote. This budget and the tax bill with which it is linked make little progress in properly managing the 'shadow budget' of tax expenditures or in properly addressing our long-term structural budget imbalances. I must vote 'no'."

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

This is a budget which moves Vermont forward in so many ways. In a year when we have focused real attention on the human and economic costs of opiates in all our communities it makes a new investment of \$10 million in opiate treatment and \$600,000 for crime victims. It will help not only those it directly assists; it ultimately will help every Vermonter."

Rep. Poirier of Barre City explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I voted 'yes' because the main minor party did not give this independent any alternative. It is easy to just say no. I hope this body will look favorably toward income equality with the minimum wage bill."

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

The Governor encouraged our schools to limit their growth in spending to 3%, yet his and this House proposal far exceeds that benchmark. I cannot support passage of this bill that spends an additional \$52.35 million in general fund, and a total of \$213.31 million in all funds in FY15 over FY14. The proposed rate of growth in spending is not sustainable and sets us up for large projected budget gaps in FY16/FY17. Further, the bill does not significantly reduce the state's reliance upon using one-time money to balance the budget, does not adequately address the retired teachers' healthcare pension issue, does not set aside an adequate amount of reserve, nor does it include adequate provisions to expand economic opportunity for our constituents and businesses. Thank you."

Page 23

H. 882 Shall the bill be amended as offered by Rep. Consejo of Sheldon and others?

Rep. Carr of Brandon explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I vote for this amendment fully appreciating the hard work and dedication of all those affected, but the employer involved in this case is not some member of the one percent with deep pockets but rather an employer that has as its funding source folks that in the economic downturn also have gone without raises or gotten raises of less than two percent. I was voting for the underlying bill before this amendment and I will vote for it after the amendment, but I also vote 'yes' on the amendment."

Rep. Ellis of Waterbury explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I oppose this amendment because the state's 700 exempt employees deserve the same pay raise as classified employees. This amendment treats those two categories differently and is unfair to hard-working, dedicated state employees who are exempt from union membership."

Rep. Waite-Simpson of Essex explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I vote 'no' on this amendment. I do support increasing the base salaries of the employees here who have no discretion in what they earn. We set their salaries in statute. But there is a distinctly different group of employees here who not only receive this COLA but are also eligible for an additional increase of up to 50% of their base. This is a benefit not enjoyed by all and it cries out for a less blunt solution."

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

Everyone deserves a raise in pay. This compromise amendment merely calls for a smaller increase in pay. At a time when the cost of living in Vermont is becoming more difficult by the day, we need to listen and set an example. The problem here is taxpayers, who often are not getting these kinds of pay increases, have to pick up the costs of these increases."

Page 24

H. 882 Shall the bill be amended as offered by Rep. Canfield of Fair Haven?

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

Our budget pressures forced us to limit the increase to all of our hardworking Medicaid funded providers to .75 percent for a half year. Those pressures include the 3.3 percent increase in the underlying bill before us. We must consider equity in our actions."

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

Part of attracting and retaining great employees is having the flexibility to properly compensate those who perform well. Every successful private business understands that and we have only followed their good example by defeating this amendment."

Rep. Rachelson of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I voted 'no' because it isn't right for us to only give raises to those who get them through collective bargaining. I remain concerned about the same inequities playing out in our appropriations bill."

Page 25

H. 882 Shall the bill be read a third time?

Rep. Bouchard of Colchester explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I voted 'no'. I think the process we use to pay our state employees is flawed."

Rep. Cross of Winooski explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I support our hard working and dedicated state employees; thus, I voted 'yes' on this bill."

Rep. Donovan of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I voted 'yes' for a small increase in the salaries of our state work force because I know these dollars will be invested in towns and villages across the state. A true economic development tool!"

Rep. Koch of Barre Town explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I have many constituents who are state employees and I have many friends in Barre Town and elsewhere who are state employees. I value and appreciate their work and they deserve a pay increase.

It is the magnitude of the proposed increase that is the problem. I also have retirees in Barre Town who get only a 1.5 percent increase in their Social Security and no increase at all in their pensions. And I have other employees in Barre Town whose raises are not as large as these increases.

I don't know anyone else in these times who is getting a 4.1 percent raise this year and a 4.1 percent raise next year. This agreement was poorly negotiated; it is not in line with private sector raises and it should be rejected. As for the exempt employees, the raises are simply excessive. I am compelled by the concept of equity to vote 'no'."

Rep. Lewis of Berlin explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

My 'no' vote is in no way a reflection on how I view state employees, many of whom are my friends and neighbors. I truly respect and appreciate all that they do."

Rep. Savage of Swanton explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

My vote on this year's Pay Act is not a reflection of my feelings toward hard working state employees. I support their efforts and hard work and always have. Rather, I voted 'no' out of concern for my constituents and their limited financial resources."

Rep. Shaw of Pittsford explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I do support our hard working state employees. I support the compromise amendment that would have honored the agreement negotiated for classified employees and given a modest increase to our non-classified employees. But I cannot support an increase that puts further burden on the taxpayers I represent, many of whom have not had a comparable increase in their wages for a long time. Therefore my 'no' vote."

Rep. Stevens of Waterbury explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

No matter what work we do, what any working Vermonter does, it is reasonable to expect just compensation. It is difficult to contemplate in such an open and transparent way the salaries for the work we do and for what many hundreds of people do on behalf of this state. My appreciation goes out to the Gov't Ops Committee for addressing pay fairness in this most public of ways."

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I recognize and appreciate the hard work of our dedicated state employees. However, we are also obligated to our constituents. Many of them have been deeply affected by the recession and are still struggling to pay their bills. H.882 provides for annual pay raises greater than 4% over the next two years which equates to more than \$10 million this year and \$11 million next year. From our perspective, this bill does not strike the right

balance between rewarding employees' efforts and adding additional burden to our constituents. There, I cannot support it. Thank you."

Page 26

H. 884 Shall the House suspend rules to permit consideration of a non-germane amendment?

Rep. Browning of Arlington explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes to at least discuss obtaining the materials about how health insurance for Vermonters may be financed in the future. If Green Mountain Care is not financially and politically viable we need to continue to work on alternative approaches.

I greatly regret that this House will not even CONSIDER asking this Administration to live up to the legal requirement to deliver a GMC financing plan contained in ACT 48."

Rep. Gage of Rutland City explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I am disappointed with this vote. We need to be transparent about the way we finance our health care if the government runs it. So far neither this body nor the administration will tell us how to pay for what was 20% of our economy, even though it is required by law and we are currently in violation of our own law."

Rep. Komline of Dorset explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

It is concerning to see the increasing use of parliamentary procedure to stifle debate posed by the minority opinion. Our constituents' interests are equally deserving of a voice."

Page 27

H. 885 Shall the amendment offered by Rep. Kilmartin of Newport City be substituted for the amendment offered by Rep. Koch of Barre Town?

Rep. Browning of Arlington explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes to require again that the Administration provide possible financing plans for GMC as already required by law. The more that someone believes in Green Mountain Care, the more they want it to come into effect, the more I would think they should want to see the financing plan. Without a fiscally sustainable and politically viable financing plan, there will be no Green Mountain Care."

Rep. Kilmartin of Newport City explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

A legislature that has no respect for the laws it passes has no respect for those it serves. The chaos and uncertainty this vote creates imperils the people's trust in us. The right to control one's health choices is fundamental to constitutionally guaranteed personal liberty. This vote says "We don't care about your health and well-being, or your need for certainty and your ability to plan. We only care about our power over you and your choices. When we get good and ready, we will tell you what we have planned for you!"

Rep. Komline of Dorset explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

It is significant that, in a tri-partisan committee vote, a majority of your Ways and Means committee supports a financing plan from the Administration.”

Rep. Mrowicki of Putney explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted no to move past this distraction so we could get on with the real business at hand, voting for the budget.”

Rep. Scheuermann of Stowe explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This body just voted, yet again, to allow the Governor to remain in violation of the law we passed 3 years ago. But more importantly, it voted to allow the Governor to hide from Vermonters his financing plan for a \$2.2 billion taxpayer-financed program. Vermonters expect, and frankly deserve, better.”

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This amendment would freeze the appropriations associated with Green Mountain Care until which time the Governor complies with the law. He is obligated to provide answers and a plan to Vermonters. What is Green Mountain Care going to cost? How is it going to be paid? Who is going to pay? Questions we all deserve to know prior to the 2014 election, which will be Vermonters’ only opportunity to weigh in on this plan. Thank you.”

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

If we are not going to require the Administration, after missing the deadline by 14 1/2 months, to comply with statutory language on a single payer finance plan, then we may as well remove the language because it is meaningless. Today, we failed Vermonters.”

Page 28

H. 885 Shall the amendment offered by Rep. Johnson of South Hero be substituted for the amendment offered by Rep. Koch of Barre Town?

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

It would be better to do nothing, than to do nothing under the guise of doing something.”

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

We now have affirmed that the legislature must receive a more detailed plan before Green Mountain Care can become a reality. That, despite the often arcane details of our debate, is a requirement that I believe unites all thoughtful Vermonters.”

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This amendment does nothing more than dispel a legitimate amendment with a re-statement of what is already in law. The very same law that the Governor has chosen to ignore for well over a year. Thank you.”

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

The word ‘operationized’ shall now forever live in infamy, of how to replace an amendment with one that accomplishes nothing.”

Page 29

H. 885 Shall the bill pass?

Rep. Savage of Swanton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

The Governor encouraged our schools to limit their growth in spending to 3% yet his and this House proposal far exceeds that benchmark. I cannot support passage of this bill that spends an additional \$52.35 million in general fund, and a total of \$213.31 million in all funds in FY15 over FY14. The proposed rate of growth in spending is not sustainable and sets us up for large projected budget gaps in FY16/FY17. Rep. Toleno of Brattleboro explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I supported this budget because it represents the good work of dedicated Vermonters who care deeply that our spending decisions are responsible, thoughtful and driven by the need to improve the lives of all Vermonters.”

Rep. Zagar of Barnard explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

A YES vote on this bill is a vote of confidence in our legacy industries – agriculture and forest products. They are both expanding and growing jobs, and with this continued support for the Working Lands Enterprise Initiative and Farm to Plate, will have an even brighter future, as will Vermont.”

Page 30

H. 889 Shall the bill be amended as recommended by the committee on Appropriations in the 5th and 7th instances of amendment?

Rep. Branagan of Georgia explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I oppose this amendment because nearly all the work has already been done by employees of the Agency of Education and by volunteers. A new appropriation is not needed. The amendment was not submitted through the proper process. It was not vetted properly through testimony, fiscal research or other methods. It should not become Vermont law.”

Rep. Conquest of Newbury explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

We must control the costs of education. The first and most critical step in doing that is to have an accurate and clear accounting of our spending. This position in the Agency of Education is essential to doing that and we can’t afford to wait any longer to get our books in order.”

Page 31

H.889 Shall the bill be amended as offered by Rep. Strong of Albany?

Rep. Davis of Washington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Our small schools are a huge part of the community spirit that exists in our small communities and, like our small farms, they are a big part of what rural Vermont is all about.”

Rep. Koch of Barre Town explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote ‘no’ with deep regret. The fact that we can no longer afford our small schools tells us how much Vermont has changed.”

Rep. Sharpe of Bristol explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

There are no large schools in Vermont. Perhaps what we need to do is give a small schools grant to every school in Vermont!”

Page 32

H. 889 Shall the bill be amended as offered by Rep. Scheuermann of Stowe?

Rep. Conquest of Newbury explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I strongly support what this amendment wants to do. I agree that the present finance system is flawed, perhaps fatally. I think it should be the highest priority of the legislature to address both the issues with the funding system and the cost of education. But I’m afraid that eliminating the present system before we know what we’re replacing it with might leave us in worse shape.”

Rep. Klein of East Montpelier explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

To simply end our schools’ current funding structure with no hint of what a future funding source would look like is, to say the least, not a credible solution and, at best, just not a responsible path to go down. And that is why I vote ‘no’. “

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Telling the next legislature to accomplish that which we ourselves have failed to do simply is a message that we somehow think talk is action. Never was, never will be.”

Rep. Scheuermann of Stowe explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This body, that is here to serve the people of Vermont, just told Vermonters that we will not commit to education and property tax reform. Just a few weeks from the defeat of so many school budgets, and as we hear day after day the frustration of so many Vermonters – we just said ‘sorry we just can’t help.’ What a shame!”

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

It is ironic that so many members of this body were willing to support dismantling our healthcare system a few years ago in Act 48 because we could not sustain the increasing costs. There was ideological vision with no details on how much it was going to cost or how we were going to pay for it or who was going to pay. However, today when it came to charting a course to address the unsustainable increases in the cost of education and property taxes, the majority choose to ignore the will of my constituents for real property tax reform.”

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

We need to send the strongest message possible to Vermonters that we were listening on Town Meeting Day, that we get the message: This system is not working. Support for this amendment would have been the strongest message possible.”

Rep. Yantachka of Charlotte explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I opposed this amendment not because I disagree with its premise. Indeed, the present system is too complex for the ordinary citizen to understand and it needs to be simplified. Since H.889 clearly states our intention to move toward a simpler system, the first part of the amendment is covered. However, it makes no sense to me to commit this body to repeal the existing system without first proposing an alternative system to take its place.”

Page 33

H. 889 Shall the bill be amended as offered by Rep. Browning of Arlington?

Rep. Browning of Arlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes to lower property tax rates. To vote no puts the hypothetical reorganization of our education system and any uncertain future benefits from it above real immediate relief for Vermonters, however small.”

Rep. Yantachka of Charlotte explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This amendment, if approved, would save \$2.40 on an annual tax bill for a \$100,000 house or \$9.50 per year on a \$500,000 house. Other than its value as a political statement, it makes no significant impact on property tax rates. For that reason, I voted ‘NO’.”

Page 35

H. 889 Shall the bill pass?

Rep. Dakin of Chester explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I voted today for this bill even though for my district the results are not necessarily the most advantageous. I voted to support this bill because I trust the process we follow and in this bill I can see the steps forward to address the issues of fairer funding of education.

The committee has worked hard to address and present a path for change. Thank you to the members for the hard work you have done to date.”

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

We had the opportunity yesterday to endorse a stronger version of mere intent language to address our education financing system in the future, and we failed to do so. We have strung along such an intent for too many years. This is a decent bill as a whole, but I vote no for the lack of that amendment.”\

Rep. Manwaring of Wilmington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr Speaker,

I voted yes reluctantly because the elimination of small school grants will harm children in my district. But even more importantly I believe that eliminating small schools grants is one of those blunt instruments borne of economy of scale thinking that seeks efficiency, not effectiveness. How do we know if education opportunities for students displaced will be enhanced or curbed? What will be the remaining property tax burden for taxpayers in that town as they will still be spending on tuitions for their children to attend neighboring schools.

I applaud the language in this bill that seeks to understand a new paradigm to raise the revenues for Vermont’s education system by looking at increasing reliance on Vermonter’s ability to pay through a greater reliance on income taxes rather than property taxes. I am, however, disappointed that once again there is no recognition in this legislation that there is an equally important need to re-evaluate the spending side of the formula.

Most importantly under the current spending framework in the formula, we need to ask whether the spending side of the formula that distributes the money that arrives in the Education fund achieve the outcomes for all students that we need to prepare our children for the 21st century?

We need to ask how can we adapt the formula so that every student can achieve his or her personal best outcome? Does the principle of equal spending buy all students that opportunity?

We need to ask why do we continue to use penalties to influence spending decisions at the local level? Why not rewards as well.

We need to ask what levers other than economies of scale with it’s blunt instruments of influence are available to achieve the outcomes for all students at a cost we are willing to pay.

Finding the balance between spending and outcomes is the dance we do every year in this legislature for all spending. It is no different in what I believe is perhaps the most important use of public money – educating our children. If through this or other legislative efforts we move toward evidence based outcomes for students then the spending side of this formula needs to adapt?

Mr. Speaker, we can take on this responsibility and do it in a way that respects Brigham. We need to get started.”

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

At the start of this session many Vermonters feared the impact of a projected 7 cent increase in residential tax rates. This bill has managed to reduce that burden by 43% and that fact alone is ample reason to have voted for it beyond everything else it accomplishes.”

Rep. Mrowicki of Putney explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

My vote affirms the good work of your Ways and Means Committee in providing the necessary funds to invest in our children’s education and invest in the future of Vermont.

When I look up and see the school children in the balcony here, and when I visit the schools in my district, I am reminded of the importance of those investments in our children and how easy it is for me to focus on those children and tell them they are worth it.”

Rep. Poirier of Barre explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted yes because this is an improvement to what was calculated earlier this winter. The taxpayers of Barry City will appreciate the further reduction of the original rate.”

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This bill once again nibbles around the edges but does not address the real problem of unsustainable increases in education costs. It shifts the sting of who is going to be hit the hardest by large tax increases to yet another group of Vermont taxpayers. It increases the rates by 4 and 7 1/2 cents this year on top or in addition to the 5 and 6 cents last year for a total of 9 cents for residential and 13 1/2 cents for non-residential property taxes. This as we face projections of an additional 5 cents increase per year for each of the next two years in FY16 and FY17. This bill does not provide the long term meaningful taxpayer relief that is so desperately needed by our constituents.”

Page 38

H.552 Shall the bill be amended as recommended by the committee on General, Housing, and Military Affairs, as further amended?

Rep. Conquest of Newbury explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I do support raising the minimum wage and I hope to have another chance this session to show that support with my vote. But my concern about implementing the increase without giving small businesses the time they need to plan and adjust prevents me from doing so now.”

Rep. Davis of Washington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

A raise in the minimum wage puts money into the pockets of low-income consumers, who immediately spend it at local businesses. Recent surveys available show that businesses across the US are not as concerned what their employees make but rather how much their customers have in their pockets to spend. I vote for independence: a raise in the minimum wage and putting more money directly into the pockets of our low wage workers!”

Rep. Fay of St. Johnsbury explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Vermont needs sustainable jobs that allow people working full time to provide for their basic needs and those of their family. It’s time to explore supports for small businesses that allow them to thrive alongside their employees.”

Rep. Myers of Essex explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I would have been happy to support the Governor's proposal to increase Vermont's minimum wage in step increases to \$10.10 by 2017. But I cannot support an immediate raise to \$10.10 due to the effect it will have on Vermont businesses and their ability to support such an increase."

Rep. Russell of Rutland City explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

Our actions today will make whole our entire community. A rising tide floats all boats! I vote yes for both Vermont workers and business."

Rep. Savage of Swanton explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I voted no on this bill. If the amendment offered by the member from Burlington and others had passed, I would have voted yes. I do not want to be in the position to explain to my constituent who lost their job as a result of this bill that 'Oh well, you were one in an estimated 250 who are now unemployed because of my vote.'"

Rep. Shaw of Pittsford explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

A minimum wage rate of \$10.10 per hour is a reasonable rate of compensation for our Vermonters. How we get to this rate is very important to our Vermont employers. A reasonable tiered approach is the best way to arrive at this new wage rate. As we have defeated a reasonable amendment to do so I cannot support a one step fits all approach and hence my no vote."

Rep. Spengler of Colchester explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

Let's hope this modest increase gives some hope to our lowest paid Vermonters struggling to get by."

Rep. Stevens of Waterbury explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

Let's make believe I got a raise of \$40 today. I spend \$4.79 for Vermont milk, \$3.69 for Vermont cheese, \$3 for a can of Vermont beer, \$4.99 for a box of cereal for my kids, \$10 at Old Navy for a pair of pants on sale to work in, a bag of potatoes for \$3.99, a bag of apples for \$3.99, \$3.00 for a rose for my bride, and a gallon of gas for the car."

Rep. Terenzini of Rutland Town explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

Small business died on the floor of the Vermont General Assemble today – rest in peace."

Rep. Till of Jericho explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

Even with this increase the minimum wage will provide less buying power than it did in 1968. With income inequality at an all-time high in this country and still growing rapidly, this increase must be just the first step toward regrowing the middle class."

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I wanted to vote for an increase in the minimum wage. But the majority position of a \$1.37 increase in one year, with no consideration on the impact on the very people it is meant to help, or on small business, the backbone of Vermont, made it impossible to support this bill. I hope the Senate takes note of the strong minority vote for the phased in approach.”

Page 39

H.878 Shall the bill be read a third time?

Rep. Deen of Westminster explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

The effects of raising construction wages to Davis Bacon levels was unfortunately misstated by some members on the floor during this debate. Davis Bacon wage levels mean better trained workers, high retention rate of workers, and better supervision. These companies are better able to compete for construction contracts because of a more productive work force. There is no ‘having it two ways,’ as was claimed. Davis Bacon companies historically have proven to be more efficient and that does make them more competitive. As long as we have equal competition, Davis Bacon contractors will do just fine and do so within the budget and capital limits we set here.”

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted yesterday to not pay more when it risks injury to sustaining Vermont jobs. I vote today to pay more when it may bring jobs back to Vermont. We walk on a tightrope on some of these issues, and we all hope to not fall off.”

Rep. Spengler of Colchester explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This bill gives Vermonters a competitive advantage. Vermont will experience the multiplier effect of these Vermont paychecks rippling through our economy, enriching our state and its people.”

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This bill will not likely help our Vermont businesses, will not create any new jobs, will reduce how far Vermont’s capital dollars will go and once again put an additional burden on our Vermont taxpayers. Thank you.”

Page 40

H. 586 Shall the bill pass?

Rep. Buxton of Tunbridge explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I strongly support the protection of Vermont’s waterways. I do not believe that this bill does enough to support our small farming operations in complying with the accepted agricultural practices. I hope that future legislation will designate money to help support these important policies, practices and enforcement.”

Rep. Keenan of St. Albans City explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker”

I vote yes but with disappointment. We have approved H586 without adequately addressing the low hanging fruit compromising our state waters and, with our failure to provide the needed financial resources to do

so, we take the risk of spending millions on municipal discharge systems without making a dent in the poor water quality of our state and risk further action by the EPA.”

Rep. Pearson of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker

It’s heartening to see such strong support for cleaning up our lakes and waterways. But today is a small step. I can only hope that when it comes time to fund subsequent steps, support will remain strong.”

Page 41

Shall the House journalize the remarks of Rep. Kilmartin of Newport City?

Rep. Branagan of Georgia explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This is an unfortunate situation. But when there is no apology where one is due, hurt lasts a long time. Very unfortunate.”

Rep. Cross of Winooski explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted no on this motion, although I support the concept that every member of this body has the right to speak his or her mind.”

Rep. Koch of Barre Town explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Sometimes we say things that unintentionally offend others. Sometimes we voice our offense. Sometimes we respond. The time comes when all that needs to be said has been said, and it behooves us to move on.

I respect all those who have engaged in this discussion, and I do not think it is helpful to memorialize their disagreements in our Journal.”

Rep. Kupersmith of South Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I understand the wish to have these remarks journalized, but I fear the precedent of having this sort of disagreement extended beyond the verbal.”

Rep. Mrowicki of Putney explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Obviously we are getting to that time in the session when fatigue feeds misunderstanding and the cumulative stress of the session can amplify those misunderstandings.

I hope we can all take a lesson here as we head to the end of the session to take care in all we do or say – and take an extra breath before we do.”

Rep. Poirier of Barre City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted yes because I believe this situation is a bad example of how the Vermont legislature should conduct itself. The member from Burlington was out of order to offer her privileged remarks during the orders of the day.”

Rep. Rachelson of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I may not fully understand all the implications of requesting journalizing remarks, but do not want to deny anyone’s request for this. I regret that so much time has been spent that is diverting us from the important work we have to do.

I hope moving forward we can find another way besides this in the chamber to address underlying issues between members.”

Rep. Scheuermann of Stowe explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted yes to journalize the remarks, not only because I appreciated the member’s further explanation of his comment yesterday, but because I cannot ever remember voting against a motion to journalize a member’s remarks.

Given all of the recent talk of etiquette and respect, it is exceptionally disappointing to see the vote fail.

I am hopeful that, sometime soon, we will see the return in this body of mutual respect and understanding.”

Rep. Weed of Enosburg explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted no because the member’s remarks cannot be journalized accurately.”

Page 42

H. 112 Shall the House concur in the Senate’s proposal of amendment?

Rep. Bartholomew of Hartland explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

It is unfortunate that genetically engineered food products have been introduced to the public without adequate safety testing. The testing that has been done has been inconclusive and contradictory. Without the labeling of these products, people cannot make informed choices about the food they buy for themselves and their families. I vote yes in support of the huge percentage of Vermonters who want to know what is in their food.”

Rep. Batchelor of Derby explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted no because I too believe we should be asking the 15% to label their foods “organic” and not ask the 85% to label their foods, knowing a lawsuit will follow. It makes no sense.”

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I have always supported the consumer right to have information on the content of the food they buy. My better judgment would go against supporting a bill with such potential for a high financial liability. My constituents, however, strongly endorse it despite that potential cost, so I cede to that judgment and choice.”

Rep. Feltus of Lyndon explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted no on this bill and that to me is incongruous because I do support the consumer's desire to have accurately labeled products. However, I fear that the ambiguous labeling authorized by this legislation and the likely expensive legal challenge will defeat the will of the public."

Rep. Kilmartin of Newport City explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I vote 'NO!' We again misdirect our scarce resources into a horror house of smoke and mirrors with a non-refundable multi-million dollar entry fee borne by the taxpayers.

The cost-effective constitutional remedies have been ignored by the General Assembly. They are:

1. Make it easier for non-GMO foods to label their foods appropriately. The presumption will be all other foods have GMO ingredients.

2. Bar the food monopolies and oligarchies from owning and controlling the food chain.

In the words of my mother, 'We strain at the gnat and swallow the camel!'"

Rep. Klein of East Montpelier explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes because it's what Vermont wants and deserves. It's simply the right thing to do."

Rep. Koch of Barre Town explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I recognize that this bill enjoys widespread popularity across the Vermont electorate. I understand – and support – every consumer's right to know what is in the food we eat. What I do not support is Vermont's sticking its neck out, again, all alone, to pay an estimated \$1.5 million to defend this law, with the potential of an additional \$6 million or so if we lose. I think we have better things to do with the taxpayers' money and the fund set up in Section 4 does not give me comfort. Frankly, I find it embarrassing and a bad precedent to have our great state pass the hat to support the laws we enact."

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

If we decline to act from fear of being sued and possible losing, we put ourselves at the mercy of every powerful interest which engages in threats. To do so would be to abdicate our most fundamental role as legislators. To do so, in a context where our worst potential loss is \$8 million while our Attorney General recovers \$40 million in other litigation annually, simply would be financially ludicrous."

Rep. Mitchell of Fairfax explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I firmly believe in the premise of this bill, but I believe we should have had a more thought out approach that would not put our state in fiscal jeopardy."

Rep. Mrowicki of Putney explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I vote YES to carry the voice of my constituents to the State House. Plain and simple, Vermonters want and deserve to know what is in their food. And once again little old Vermont is leading the nation."

Rep. Pearson of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

In a time of dark national politics it is important for those who are able and courageous to stand up and lead.”

Rep. Quimby of Concord explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I support the idea that we have a right to know what is in our food but I can’t support a bill that undoubtedly will cost the taxpayers of Vermont millions of dollars. Seems as though we could have used a different avenue to solve the problem.”

Rep. Russell of Rutland City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote ‘yes’ in support of our renewed organic farming community bringing jobs and economic activity to Vermont.”

Rep. Webb of Shelburne explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Vermonters did not send us here to do the easy thing. They sent us here to do the right thing. This bill reflects the right thing. For health, religious, environmental and economic reasons, Vermonters want to know this and the bill is carefully crafted to be defensible. As goes Vermont, so goes the nation.”

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote ‘no’ despite my support for Vermonters’ “right to know’. In this case the label should also read ‘Vermonters beware, this label may cost millions’. There was a better way to do this.”

Page 43

S. 247 Shall the bill be recommitted to the committee on Human Services?

Rep. Browning of Arlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes to respect the committee process. This amendment was not considered by Human Services and we do not have a formal vote and report from them as to whether or not they find it favorable.”

Page 44

S. 247 Shall the report of the committee on Human services be amended as recommended by the committee on Ways and Means?

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

No one is against more information, but the Ways and Means Committee can get the information without a ‘formal study.’ A formal study endorsed by the legislature sends the message to Vermonters that we are indeed taking the first step to legalization of marijuana. It is amazing to me that when I called for a resolution asking for Corrections to study and report back with recommendations on how to deal with ‘highly likely to re-offend sexual predators’, that resolution sits on a committee wall, but a study to legalize put moves swiftly through the body. Where are our priorities?!”

Page 45

S. 247 Shall the House propose to the Senate to amend as recommended by the committee on Human Services, as amended?

Rep. Till of Jericho explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

What matters matters. I vote yes. A no vote is a vote to deny treatment to children with intractable seizures. Some types of medical marijuana are proven to dramatically reduce seizure activity and immeasurable suffering. I for one could never vote against relieving this kind of suffering.”

Page 46

H. 123 Shall the amendment of the committee on Health Care be amended as offered by Rep. Till of Jericho?

Rep. Martin of Wolcott explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This is what I would expect from my physician today – have a conversation about my treatment. Do we really need to put it in law?”

Rep. McFaun of Barre Town explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes. Because of the controversy over being able to diagnose this disease, I see no reason why my physician can’t assure me that the test will be done by a certified lab.”

Page 47

S. 220 Shall the bill be read a third time?

Rep. Browning of Arlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes, but Vermonters should be aware that government funding of private for profit corporations usually ends up with the public bearing the costs of the private corporation enjoying the profits. State government should not be picking some businesses as worthy of support at the expense of others. I believe this is what will happen under the Vermont Enterprise Fund.”

Rep. Russell of Rutland City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I applaud the House Commerce and Economic Development Committee for their efforts in preserving and promoting commerce, economic development and jobs. This is positive comprehensive legislation for my city of Rutland and for Vermont. I am pleased to vote yes for jobs!”

Page 48

S. 239 Shall the bill be read a third time?

Rep. Quimby of Concord explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

S.239 is duplicative. Industry is already regulated by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration. We also have a process here in Vermont to ban a chemical. The bill exempts many things that could hurt a child, such as electronics, sporting goods, batteries, food products, tobacco and many more. And yet, products deemed to be harmful to children include toys, teething rings, and car seats. This bill is a direct hit on businesses in Vermont, and thus a direct hit on families in Vermont.”

Rep. Sharpe of Bristol explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

One small step for the Vermont legislature, one large step for our children and grandchildren.”

Rep. Spengler of Colchester explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

It is difficult for me to understand a no vote on this bill, denying our children protection from toxic chemicals. Let us work to further protect our Vermont children from the onslaught of these poisons on their developing bodies.”

Page 49

H. 883 Shall the report of the committee on Ways and Means be amended as recommended by the committee on Education?

Rep. Waite-Simpson of Essex explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote ‘yes’ on this bill but I sincerely hope that we give ourselves a dose of our own medicine next biennium because, in my estimation, until we combine education policy and education funding into the same legislative committee, just as we do with our transportation fund, we will not ever be able to contain the high costs of pre-K-12 education, and that, Mr. Speaker, is the cry I hear in my district.”

Page 50

H. 883 Shall the bill be amended as offered by Rep. Wright of Burlington and others?

Rep. Branagan of Georgia explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This fiscally sound amendment represents the kind of thinking needed to get our education spending under control. It is a small change, but will take pressure off the Education Fund and away from the property tax.”

Page 51

H 883 Shall the bill pass?

Rep. Batchelor of Derby explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted no on bill H.883. I believe that small schools will be harmed in the long run. Let’s fix the schools that need fixing and leave the ones running well alone.”

Rep. Christie of Hartford explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted yes on this bill on behalf of the children of Vermont. I could not stand by when a valedictorian cannot attend our university due to the inequity of her curriculum.”

Rep. Consejo of Sheldon explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Change is hard, change is scary, and sometimes changes fail. But one thing is sure, if we keep doing what we have always done, we will get the same results we always had. This bill will move our education system on a path of modernization that is both necessary and exciting for our upcoming generation.”

Rep. Davis of Washington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I have to wonder, when the electorate wakes up – realizing they no longer have a budget to vote on. How will they react?”

Rep. Peltz of Woodbury explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

My vote for H.883 is one of the two most important votes I have made in this chamber over the past eight years. Education governance was last legislatively changed in 1892 when 2,500 school districts became 300 town districts. There were 97,000 students at that time, approximately 10,000 more than today. This afternoon we have approved moving from school districts to community districts. As Vermont has transitioned from school to community districts, we have sustained our commitment to our students’ equal access to quality education. Thank you.”

Rep Scheuermann of Stowe explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

While this may be a difficult vote, I voted because my constituents expect me to do my job, and actually cast votes when the House is in session, and I am present.”

Page 52

S. 252 Shall the report of the committee on Health Care be amended as offered by Rep. Browning of Arlington?

Rep. Browning of Arlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote ‘yes’ to obtain information about the GMC financing plans that Vermonters deserve to know and that is overdue. I regret that the majority of the House does not support the principles of transparency and accountability in this way.”

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

It is important that we have a good plan, not one on any member’s desired schedule. We have set a process in place to get that plan. I am pleased that we have voted to continue serving Vermont’s best interests on that thoughtful basis.”

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I supported this amendment because it is time for the Governor to produce and share with Vermonters a financing plan. To believe that the basic elements of a financing plan do not already exist, requires a suspension of disbelief.”

Page 53

S. 184 Shall the House propose to the Senate to amend the bill as recommended by the committee on Judiciary?

Rep. Christie of Hartford explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I listened to our discussion this morning and was proud of the work of our Judiciary committee and our body. Until you are followed in a store for no reason, treated differently for no reason or stopped by an officer for no reason, it may seem difficult to understand why we need to legislate equity. I am proud to be a Vermonter.”

Rep. Kilmartin of Newport City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Yes, to pass this generally excellent legislation enhancing innocence, with the recognition that Section 3 on Bias-Free Policing needs minor amendments to restrict the use of collected roadside data in a manner that makes personal identification of drivers in a roadside stop confidential and non-public, and prohibiting the information collected being used evidence in litigation.”

Rep. Pearson of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Let our record show that when we actually document our position, bias is less likely to appear. We demonstrate the need for this important policy.”

Rep. Stuart of Brattleboro explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

To all of the Latinos and people of color here in “The People’s House” today, I want to apologize from the bottom of my heart for the pain the police here in our state have caused you. That kind of behavior is not “the Vermont way,” and has no place here in the Green Mountain State.”

Page 54

S. 287 Shall the bill be read a third time?

Rep. Spengler of Colchester explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I want to thank the Judiciary and the Human Services Committees for showing compassion toward our most vulnerable Vermonters by offering this bill.”

Rep. Strong of Albany explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

S.287 is a step backward for appropriate mental health care in the state of Vermont. Involuntarily medicating a person is a violation of their freedom and personal autonomy. There are methods of care and treatment that could be available that are more humane and that help people recover in a more timely way. Our Department of Mental Health has failed those in mental health crisis. This bill does nothing to increase the number

of resources available to those in need.”

Page 55

S. 252 Shall the House proposal of amendment be amended in the second instance of amendment as offered by Rep. Dickinson of St. Albans Town?

Rep. Scheuermann of Stowe explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes because Vermonters deserve to know. For four years now Vermonters have heard over and over again of the plan to put in place a publicly-financed single-payer health care system. Yet for four years, they have been told nothing of the plan for this public financing. And they are the public. Vermonters are anxious and deserve better.”

Rep. Stevens of Shoreham explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

While this may be framed as a partisan issue, I am a member of the legislature, and I am tired of being put in the position of running interference for the administration, whether it be the condition of state highways in my district, underfunding of the weatherization program, or health care financing. Plus, I am simply curious to know. That’s why I vote ‘yes.’”

Rep. Till of Jericho explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote no. At this point in time we still have dueling actuaries with five different work groups trying to reach consensus on the overall costs. The Green Mountain Care board has not decided yet on the benefit package. The Administration has testified in our committee they can have a detailed financing plan to us by January 15, 2015. Frankly I don’t believe we can get an accurate financing plan prior to that, any more than I believe GMC will be ready by 2017.”

Page 56

S. 252 Shall the bill pass in concurrence with proposal of amendment?

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I greatly appreciate the clarity that 2017 is not the immutable target date for universal health care, since that is the public perception. This bill demonstrates that despite progress on understanding the complexity of issues yet to be addressed and of even the data we need in order to address them, we are still falling short in recognizing the questions that have yet to be asked.

The downside of this learning curve is that we remain left in ongoing uncertainty of what the future of health care in Vermont will look like.”

Rep. Kilmartin of Newport City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote No! We are dealing with the most fundamental liberty, control over one’s life, body and well-being in a cavalier and calloused manner. We deprive ourselves and our fiduciary duties of timely information upon which to make ‘life and death decisions’, while we create a diabolical and most intrusive social experiment called ACE (adverse childhood experiences) founded upon the ‘excitement’ of pseudo-science and social control

over our youth and their families. The ACE program is going to add another dark chapter to Vermont's history of eugenic control and injury to the nuclear family.

We are waiting to create total frustration of the Vermont citizens, so they have no alternative but to accept total government control over their health care.

When government controls our health care, we are in a worse form of slavery than what occurred before the Emancipation Proclamation.”

Rep. McFaun of Barre Town explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote no because this bill, in my opinion, puts off again giving information in a timely manner, to the people of Vermont concerning whether a publicly financed single payer Health Care System is feasible or not for Vermont.”

Rep. Poirier of Barre City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted no on this bill for not what is in the bill but rather for what is not included in the legislation. S.252 gave us the opportunity to express to the Green Mountain Care Board the legislature's support for adult dental care as part of the benefit package. Last year the Green Mountain Care board rejected dental care for Vermonters. Mr. Speaker, we waste millions of dollars on health care spending because we do not address the significant ill effects of dental diseases. I can only hope that in the future we will recognize the benefits good dental care has on healthy living.”

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

It has been four years of uncertainty since Act 48 passed this body. The Governor's dream with no detail and many unanswered questions has continued to divide this body and our constituents. Does the Governor really have a plan? If he does why does he refuse to share the information, miss self-imposed deadlines, violate his own law or answer these three simple questions: What does the benefit package look like? Who is going to pay? How much is it going to cost? Vermont's health care system needs to have time to stabilize before undergoing another drastic change.”

Page 57

J.R.S. 27 Shall the resolution be adopted in concurrence?

Rep. Copeland-Hanzas of Bradford explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I believe our vote here today confirms what Calvin Coolidge said: ‘If ever the spirit of liberty should vanish in other parts of our Union, and support of our institution should languish, it could all be replenished from the generous store held by the people of the brave little state of Vermont.’”

Rep. Cross of Winooski explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I abhor the excessive use of money to influence politics as much as anyone in this room. However, I believe our fellow citizens will take the corrective actions needed as they vote. Sooner or later common sense will trump money.”

Rep. Donaghy of Poultney explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This could possible lead to a situation where Governor Shumlin would have to give half of his million dollar campaign war chest to Heidi. I don’t think that would be fair.”

Rep Fay of St. Johnsbury explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Potential candidates for statewide or national office face a number of considerations - "do I have the stamina? How will this affect my family? What are my platform positions?" We should not face the question of whether we are willing to compromise our independent voice, our integrity, and our values in order to run a competitive race. My vote for JRS27 is a vote of hope that our democracy can be restored.”

Rep. Gage of Rutland City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This resolution has more unknowns than knowns although I support the concept of limiting the influence of big money. This resolution offers little to the framework and process of future legislation. The devil is in the details that are lacking with this resolution.”

Rep. Klein of East Montpelier explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes because when many of our elder statesmen lawyers serving in the legislature suggest we shouldn’t go forward and many of our young representatives say yes, go forward, I know I have made the correct choice for the future of our country.”

Rep. Rachelson of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Legal scholars have debated the ability for constitutional conventions to be limited, but it’s never been done before. While Citizens United is destroying democracy as we know it, this resolution and a constitutional convention could make this much worse.”

Rep. Wizowaty of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Although like most members of this body, I am appalled by the unlimited ability of corporations and wealthy individuals to influence elections, I don’t trust the process. There is no guarantee such a convention could be limited, as supporters hope. Maybe I’m too cynical about our country right now, but there’s also no guarantee we would have 13 Democratically controlled states that would be able to prevent the repeal of crucial rights currently enshrined in the Constitution – and potential outcome, which even supportive legal scholars acknowledge is a possibility, would be even more disastrous than the situation we have now.”

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes to send the message that we understand the negativity that comes with super-PACs....on all sides. Money is pervasive in politics. But we need reform right here in Vermont as well and if I am back here next year, I will introduce legislation to limit the influence of lobbyists through contributions to PACs, particularly during the legislative session.”

S. 287 Shall the House proposal of amendment be amended as offered by Rep. Moran of Wardsboro?

Rep. Kilmartin of Newport City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Yes. This data is extremely important to the safety and welfare of both patients and personnel providing treatment. Shutting the blinds in the treatment room denies needed protections and transparency to the process of involuntary drugging. Sunshine and transparency are what is needed to protect all citizens. Come on, “Let the sunshine in!” What do we have to lose?”

Rep. Pugh of South Burlington, explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker”

The sun is shining and I voted no because there is transparency. Section 3 of the bill already requires reports of staff injuries to the Department of Mental Health. Staff safety is important. The sun does shine in.”

S. 316 Shall the bill be recommitted to the committee on Appropriations?

Rep. Toll of Danville explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

My no vote on this motion reflects my belief that this bill needs to be decided on by the full legislative body, so that 150 voices are heard, and its fate not determined by a committee of 11.”

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

The committee on appropriations failed us on this bill. Committee leadership choosing to ignore their responsibility on this bill by taking no action after learning what this bill would cost the state is very disappointing. A bill that we know will add an additional \$9.6 million dollars in upward pressures to the FY16 budget, a budget that is already projected to have a gap exceeding \$70 million dollars. Their unwillingness to make the difficult decision is an attack on the integrity of the legislative process and our VT institution.

Thank you.”

S. 316 Shall the bill be read a third time?

Rep. Clarkson of Woodstock explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

We talk about the importance of children being well launched in life and yet we show how much we value the people responsible for this work by paying them quite poorly – on average about \$18k a year.

The vast majority of these employers are women. This bill creates a big tent under which women, who largely work alone, can negotiate together.

Unions are good for women. Unions improve women’s’ income.

I support these women, these employees and their wonderful important work.”

Rep. Kilmartin of Newport City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote 'No'! Put the taxpayers' money where our mouth is! We should set the rates and qualifications for subsidies if we really care about the families and children. We shouldn't talk about 'women negotiating'. We should do it ourselves. That is what we were sent here to do!"

Rep. Lewis of Berlin explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I oppose this bill because 76% of the licensed home child care providers in VT oppose it. I am here to represent my constituents AND be thoughtful of the overall impact on Vermonters. Any budget increase is passed on to our taxpayers."

Rep. McFaun of Barre Town explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I vote 'no' because I have never heard of a union that is made up of owners of a business – that are going to negotiate for their customers to get more money from the state so the owners can pay themselves more money for their service. I believe in the right to bargain but not for this reason."

Rep. Morrissey of Bennington explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

Today I vote 'no' on S.316. My vote is based on the fact that the most important and powerful committee in this State House, the Appropriations Committee, chose to send this bill to the floor without a recommendation. I can only wonder why this committee would not do their job to say "yeah" or 'nay" on this important piece of legislation. It is clear that this committee had serious questions and concerns about this bill; however, we will never know. The fiscal note highlights many of the concerns which should have been articulated by Appropriations to this Chamber. The Human Services Committee should also have had a review of this Bill. It is most disappointing that the committee process and government transparency is certainly not alive and well under the Golden Dome."

Rep. Rachelson of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

The people who care for and educate our infants, toddlers and children have one of the most important jobs and deserve to be paid better than they are. The current subsidy rates are not acceptable. It is my hope that this bill will not have the unintended consequence of making it even harder than it already is for children who are on subsidy to get access to quality childcare.

I have grave concerns voting for a bill that will cost money that is not earmarked because some other vulnerable populations will be affected."

Page 61

H. 526 Shall the report of the Committee of Conference be adopted?

Rep. Peltz of Woodbury explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

Woodbury has more lakes and ponds than any other town in VT. Lakes and ponds of sufficient size are public domain and the quality of water is the state's responsibility. I voted 'yes' on H.526 because it protects our open water and lets towns regulate and protect the shorelands."

Page 62

S. 184 Shall the amendment offered by Rep. Lippert of Hinesburg be substituted for the amendment offered by Rep. Kilmartin of Newport City?

Rep. Christie of Hartford explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

With all due respect, I understand Representative Kilmartin’s amendment. But what recourse would I have if I found out while talking to Representative Consejo that I was stopped 3 times while driving through town and he was stopped also in the same town.”

Rep. Donaghy of Poultney explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I find it rather insulting and challenging to the integrity of the professional law enforcement agencies throughout this state to require their police officers, via statute, to record the personal profile of each person who is the subject of a roadside stop. What we’re saying in essence with this bill is we don’t trust you on your own to root out racial bias in your departments, if indeed it even exists. The debate on this floor last week demonstrated a very clear bias... one that is anti-police.

And further, Mr. Speaker, as a former police officer, I find it bad public policy to codify by legislation the manner in which police agencies conduct investigations, including how line-ups and interviews or interrogations of suspects are conducted. Police agencies throughout this country have adopted professional accepted best practices on their own without having them imposed upon them by a legislative micro-managed mandate. Best practices change. Must we revisit and amend this statute each of these times?”

Rep. Lippert of Hinesburg explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I am pleased that Vermont law enforcement, especially the Vermont State Police, values and embraces bias free policing and the collection and analysis of roadside stop race data. We are fortunate to have Vermont law enforcement leading the way.”

Rep. O’Sullivan of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted in favor in compliance with the recommendations from every single law enforcement agency that participated in the 2008 briefings before the Vermont Advisory committee to the U.S. Commission on Civil rights. Further in support of the ACLU’s request that every single piece of data should be public.”

Rep. Wyck of Ferrisburgh explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Though I support most anti-bias measures, I voted against this bill due to its invasive reporting requirements.

This part of the cure is worse than the disease.

The overall effect will mentally handcuff far too many hard working police officers during the legal performance of their duties and lead to the degradation of public safety – the basic duty of government.

The public is better served by increased patrols rather than endless meetings and reports concerning statistical anomalies.

There are better compliance indicators.”

Page 65

S. 316 Shall the House proposal of amendment be further amended as offered by Rep. Bouchard of Colchester?

Rep. Kilmartin of Newport City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Yes this amendment is needed to prevent a useless union from robbing the most poor and vulnerable parents and children, and small business women, of needed monies to increase subsidies raised from tax revenues. The only ones to gain will be the ‘new’ union bosses and the politicians who support this scandalous folly. ‘Steal from the poorest and most vulnerable’ – apparently the majority of this assembly believes that is the way to go.”

Rep. Walz of Barre City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote against the amendment for many reasons but do not believe the math. \$1.2 million is 1% of \$120 million, divided among 1500 providers, means they are earning \$80,000 apiece if you believe the math. I do not believe the math.”

Page 66

S. 316 Shall the bill pass in concurrence with proposal of amendment?

Rep. Hebert of Vernon explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted for this bill because providers in my district overwhelmingly supported this bill.

However, I still remain unconvinced that this bill will provide the benefits they hope for, nor will the bill add value to our children’s education.”

Rep. Lanpher of Vergennes explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Having heard from my constituents – half in favor, half against – I am comfortable supporting this bill, as it will allow those same constituents the ability to determine their future, with their own direct vote, on whether to organize.”

Page 67

H. 673 Shall the bill be read a third time?

Rep. Browning of Arlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote no because this bill shifts part of the costs of a state obligation onto the property tax and lessens the resources for the education of Vermont children.”

Rep. Scheuermann of Stowe explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes as I have long advocated for addressing the critical issue of our state’s unfunded liabilities. We have put it off for too long and this is a step in the right direction. I am hopeful, however, that this is another kick in our backside that makes us realize the need to fundamentally

reform our education funding system and provide property tax relief.”

Page 68

S. 220 Shall the House propose to the Senate to amend the bill as offered by Rep. Botzow of Pownal in sections 61, 62, 63?

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Including sections 61-63 prevailing wage language in this strike all amendment is likely to put Vermont’s smaller contractors at a competitive disadvantage when bidding on state projects and reduce the number of projects the state’s capital dollars can purchase by \$3 million dollars annually. Who is the beneficiary?”

Page 69

H. 673 Shall the bill be amended as offered by Rep. Browning of Arlington?

Rep. Browning of Arlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes to protect the education of our students and to protect property taxpayers. The state must take responsibility for its own obligations and not shift them onto the Education Fund.”

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Timing can indeed, sometimes, be everything. Timing demands a solution to the Teachers’ Retirement System funding this year. But it also demands that we do not add to the burdens of the property tax as part of the solution this year. I vote yes because this small component of the solution can and should wait for our intended overhaul of education funding and financing.”

Page 70

H. 673 Shall the bill be amended as offered by Rep. Komline of Dorset and others?

Rep. Conquest of Newbury explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I’m happy to support this amendment. Establishing the policy of identifying the dollar figure of unfunded mandates in our education system and committing to paying for them is critical. If we find we have to revisit the mechanics of how we do that, it will only serve to remind us of the importance of doing it. No bad thing.”

Page 72

H.R. 24 Shall the resolution be adopted?

Rep. Kilmartin of Newport City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

No. The resolution is poorly drafted, insufficiently comprehensive, while being overly broad and intrusive. In my faith community I have often served on multiple committees and sub-committees. As a lawyer I work for clients...to list them publically would be an ethical breach and an invasion of their privacy.

In the words of my late mother, ‘Once again we strain at the gnat and swallow the camel.’”

Rep. Wizowaty of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes with trepidation. Honestly, I don’t believe that the organizations I belong to are anyone’s business but my own. I understand the public may feel differently – apparently this is the case – but I regret the further diminishing of my and our privacy.”

Page 73

H. 552 Shall the amendment offered by Rep. Poirier of Barre City be substituted for the amendment offered by Rep. Stevens of Waterbury?

Rep. Klein of East Montpelier explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote no reluctantly. We are playing with people’s lives. We toss numbers around like they were dice on the craps table. But because it is about real people I must side with take what we can get. I apologize, I have no better answer.”

Page 75

H. 552 Shall the House concur in the Senate proposal of amendment?

Rep. Consejo of Sheldon explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I am very proud of this vote and this body; this is what can happen when we listen and truly work for the benefit of the people of Vermont. Together we are stronger.”

Rep. Stevens of Waterbury explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Along with the good work on this bill by everyone on the committee, I would like to recognize the original presenter of the bill, the representative from Burlington, who could not be here tonight. Her work made this bill happen.”

Page 76

H. 596 Shall the House concur in the Senate proposal of amendment?

Rep. Browning of Arlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote no. Despite some useful elements this bill is profoundly flawed by the lack of enforcement of the requirement for a GMC financing plan. Yet the bill then allows for more planning and waiver applications for a GMC program that does not really exist.

Vermonters deserve certainty and security for their future health insurance, not vague promises and good intentions.”

Rep. Mrowicki of Putney explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote for this to support all the good work included and especially for including the ACE process to help address trauma and break the cycles of dysfunction in some families. In my work with families, I’ve realized

it is not a good thing that cannot stand to have some light shined on it – and shining light is exactly what this helpful process achieves.”

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote no. The majority has allowed the administration to repeatedly miss deadlines; now we are allowing them to make it through another election season with voters in the dark as to how they plan to finance the 2 billion dollars in health care costs. This is truly disappointing.”

Page 77

S. 220 Shall the House agree to the report of the committee of conference?

Rep. Davis of Washington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I could not support this conference report because the section on prevailing wage was removed. This was a top priority of mine and it was one of the top priorities for the legislative workers’ caucus and this would have put money into the pockets of hardworking Vermonters.”

Rep. Greshin of Warren explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I’m disappointed not to support this legislation. The benefits of this bill are overcome by the changes to our workers’ compensation statutes which could do lasting damage to our employers and our economy.”
