6	Statement of purpose of bill as introduced: This bill proposes to make multiple
7	amendments to the requirements of the Rozo McLaughlin Farm-to-School
8	Program (Program), including specifying the purpose and State goal of the
9	Program.
10	An act relating to the Rozo McLaughlin Farm-to-School Program
11	It is hereby enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Vermont:
12	Sec. 1. 6 V.S.A. chapter 211 is amended to read:
13	CHAPTER 211. THE ROZO MCLAUGHLIN
14	FARM-TO-SCHOOL PROGRAM
15	§ 4719. PURPOSE AND STATE GOAL
16	(a) Purpose. It is the purpose of this chapter to establish a farm-to-school
17	program to:
18	(1) encourage Vermont residents in developing healthy and lifelong
19	habits of eating nutritious local foods;

1	(2) maximize use by Vermont schools of fresh and locally grown,
2	produced, or processed food;
3	(3) work with partners to establish a food, farm, and nutrition education
4	program that educates Vermont students regarding healthy eating habits
5	through the use of educational materials, classes, and hands-on techniques that
6	inform students of the connections between farming and the foods that students
7	consume;
8	(4) increase the size and stability of direct sales markets available to
9	farmers; and
10	(5) increase participation of Vermont students in school meal programs
11	by increasing the selection of available foods.
12	(b) State Farm to School Network goal. It is the goal of the
13	Farm-to-School Program to establish a food system that by 2025:
14	(1) engages 75 percent of Vermont schools in an integrated food system
15	education program that incorporates community-based learning; and
16	(2) purchases 50 percent of food from local or regional food sources.
17	§ 4720. DEFINITIONS
18	As used in this chapter, "Farm-to-School Program" means an integrated
19	food, farm, and nutrition education program that utilizes community-based
20	learning opportunities to connect schools with nearby farms so that child
21	nutrition programs can provide students with locally produced fresh fruits and

1	vegetables, dairy and protein products, and other nutritious, locally produced
2	foods; help children develop healthy eating habits; provide nutritional and
3	agricultural education in the classroom, cafeteria, and school community; and
4	improve farmers' incomes and direct access to markets.
5	§ 4721. LOCAL FOODS GRANT PROGRAM
6	(a) There is created in the Agency of Agriculture, Food and Markets the
7	Rozo McLaughlin Farm-to-School Program to execute, operate, and award
8	local grants for the purpose of helping Vermont schools develop
9	farm-to-school programs that will sustain relationships with local farmers and
10	producers, enrich the educational experience of students, improve the health of
11	Vermont children, and enhance Vermont's agricultural economy.
12	(b) A school, a school district, a consortium of schools, or a consortium of
13	school districts, or registered or licensed child care providers may apply to the
14	Secretary of Agriculture, Food and Markets for a grant award to:
15	(1) fund equipment, resources, training, and materials that will help to
16	increase use of local foods in the School Food Service Nutrition Program;
17	(2) fund items, including local farm food products, gardening supplies,
18	field trips to farms, gleaning on farms, and stipends to visiting farmers, that
19	will help teachers to use hands-on educational techniques to teach children

about nutrition and farm-to-school connections; and

1	(3) provide <u>fund</u> professional development and technical assistance, <u>in</u>
2	partnership with the Agency of Education and farm-to-school technical service
3	providers, to help teachers, school nutrition personnel, and members of the
4	farm-to-school community educate students about nutrition and farm-to-school
5	connections and assist schools in developing a farm-to-school program.
6	(4) fund technical assistance or support strategies to increase
7	participation in federal child nutrition programs that increase viability of
8	sustainable meal programs.
9	(c) The Secretaries of Agriculture, Food and Markets and of Education and
10	the Commissioner of Health, in consultation with farmers, food service
11	workers school nutrition staff, and educators, and farm-to-school technical
12	service providers jointly shall jointly adopt rules procedures relating to the
13	content of the grant application and the criteria for making awards.
14	(d) The Secretary shall determine that there is significant interest in the
15	school community before making an award and shall give priority
16	consideration to schools and, school districts and registered or licensed child
17	care providers that are developing farm-to-school connections and education
18	that indicate a willingness to make changes to their school or child care
19	nutrition programs that increase student access and participation and that are
20	making progress toward the implementation of the Vermont nutrition and

fitness policy guidelines School Wellness Policy Guidelines developed by the

1	Agency of Agriculture, Food and Markets, the Agency of Education, and the
2	Department of Health, dated November 2005 updated in June 2015 or of the
3	successor of these guidelines.
4	(e) No award shall be greater than \$15,000.00.
5	§ 4722. FARM ASSISTANCE; SECRETARY OF AGRICULTURE, FOOD
6	AND MARKETS
7	(a) The Secretary of Agriculture, Food and Markets shall work with
8	existing programs and organizations to develop and implement educational
9	opportunities for farmers to help them to increase their markets through selling
10	their products to schools, registered or licensed child care providers, and State
11	government agencies and participating in the federal food commodities
12	program, including the federal Department of Defense Fresh Program, and
13	selling to regulated child care programs participating in the Adult and Child
14	Food Program that operate or participate in child nutrition programs.
15	(b) For the purposes of this section and section 4723 of this title, the
16	Secretary may provide funds to one or more technical assistance providers to
17	provide farm-to-school education and teacher training to more school districts
18	and to assist the Secretaries of Agriculture, Food and Markets and of Education
19	to carry out farmer and food service worker training. The Secretary of

Agriculture, Food and Markets shall work with distributors that sell products to

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and child care personnel and use a portion of the funds appropriated for this

1	purpose to enable the trained people to provide technical assistance at the
2	school and school district levels.
3	(c) Training provided under this section shall promote the policies
4	established in the Vermont nutrition and fitness policy guidelines School
5	Wellness Policy Guidelines developed by the Agencies of Agriculture, Food
6	and Markets and of Education and the Department of Health, dated November
7	2005 updated in June 2015, or the guidelines' successor.
8	§ 4724. LOCAL FOODS COORDINATOR FOOD SYSTEMS
9	<u>ADMINISTRATOR</u>
10	(a) The position of local food coordinator Food Systems Administrator is
11	established in the agency of agriculture, food and markets Agency of
12	Agriculture, Food and Markets for the purpose of assisting Vermont producers
13	to increase in increasing their access to commercial markets and institutions,
14	including schools, state registered or licensed child care providers, State and
15	municipal governments, and hospitals.
16	(b) The duties of the local foods coordinator <u>Food Systems Administrator</u>
17	shall include:
18	(1) working with institutions, schools, registered or licensed child care
19	providers, distributors, producers, commercial markets, and others to create
20	matchmaking opportunities that increase the number of Vermont institutions

that purchase foods grown or produced in Vermont;

1	(2) coordinating funding and providing support to the farm-to-school
2	and farm-to-institutions programs within the agency of agriculture, food and
3	markets Agency of Agriculture, Food and Markets, and coordinating with
4	interested parties to access funding or create matchmaking opportunities across

6	(3) encouraging and facilitating the enrollment of state employees State
7	employee access and awareness of opportunities for purchasing local food,
8	including: enrollment in a local community supported agriculture (CSA)
9	organization, purchasing from local farm stands, and participation in a farmers
10	market;
11	(4) developing a database of producers and potential purchasers and
12	enhancing the agency's website Agency's and partners' ability to improve and
13	support local foods coordination through the use of information
14	technology; and
15	(5) providing technical support to local communities with their food
16	security efforts.
17	(c) The local foods coordinator <u>Food Systems Administrator</u> , working with
18	the commissioner of buildings and general services Commissioner of
19	Buildings and General Services pursuant to rules adopted under 29 V.S.A.

1	(1) encourage and facilitate CSA enrollment awareness of and
2	opportunities to procure healthy local foods by state State employees through
3	the use of approved advertisements and solicitations on state owned
4	State-owned property; and
5	(2) implement guidelines for the appropriate use of state State property
6	for employee participation in CSA organizations, including reasonable
7	restrictions on the time, place, and manner of solicitations, advertisements,
8	deliveries, and related activities to ensure the safety and welfare of state State
9	property and its occupants.
10	(d) The local foods coordinator <u>Food Systems Administrator</u> shall
11	administer a local foods grant program, the purpose of which shall be to
12	provide grants to allow Vermont producers to increase their access to
13	commercial and institutional markets.
14	Sec. 2. 16 V.S.A. § 559 is amended to read:
15	§ 559. PUBLIC BIDS
16	(a) When the cost exceeds \$15,000.00. A school board or supervisory
17	union board shall publicly advertise or invite three or more bids from persons
18	deemed capable of providing items or services if costs are in excess of
19	\$15,000.00 for any of the following:
20	(1) the construction, purchase, lease, or improvement of any school
21	building;

1	(2) the purchase or lease of any item or items required for supply,
2	equipment, maintenance, repair, or transportation of students; or
3	(3) a contract for transportation, maintenance, or repair services.
4	* * *
5	(e) Application of this section. Any contract entered into or purchase made
6	in violation of the provisions of this section shall be void; provided, however,
7	that:
8	* * *
9	(4) nothing Nothing in this section shall be construed to prohibit a
10	school board from awarding a school nutrition contract after using any method
11	of bidding or requests for proposals permitted under federal law for award of
12	the contract;. Notwithstanding the monetary amount in subsection (a) of this
13	section for which a school board is required to advertise publicly or invite three
14	or more bids or requests for proposal, a school board is required to publicly
15	advertise or invite three or more bids or requests for proposal for purchases
16	made from the nonprofit school food service account for purchases in excess of
17	\$25,000.00, unless a municipality sets a lower threshold for purchases from the
18	nonprofit school food service account.
