1	§ 4500. AUDIOLOGY AND SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY
2	<b>INTERSTATE COMPACT; ADOPTION</b>
3	This subchapter is the Vermont adoption of the Audiology and Speech-
4	Language Pathology Interstate Compact. The form, format, and text of the
5	Compact have been conformed to the conventions of the Vermont Statutes
6	Annotated. It is the intent of the General Assembly that this subchapter be
7	interpreted as substantively the same as the Audiology and Speech-Language
8	Pathology Interstate Compact that is enacted by other Compact party states.
9	<u>§ 4501. PURPOSE</u>
10	(a) The purpose of this Compact is to facilitate interstate practice of
11	audiology and speech-language pathology with the goal of improving public
12	access to audiology and speech-language pathology services. The practice of
13	audiology and speech-language pathology occurs in the state where the patient,
14	client, or student is located at the time of the patient, client, or student
15	encounter. The Compact preserves the regulatory authority of states to protect
16	public health and safety through the current system of state licensure.
17	(b) This Compact is designed to achieve the following objectives:
18	(1) increase public access to audiology and speech-language pathology
19	services by providing for the mutual recognition of other member state
20	licenses;
21	(2) enhance the states' ability to protect the public's health and safety:

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1	(3) encourage the cooperation of member states in regulating multistate
2	audiology and speech-language pathology practice;
3	(4) support spouses of relocating active duty military personnel;
4	(5) enhance the exchange of licensure, investigative, and disciplinary
5	information between member states;
6	(6) allow a remote state to hold a provider of services with a compact
7	privilege in that state accountable to that state's practice standards; and
8	(7) allow for the use of telehealth technology to facilitate increased
9	access to audiology and speech-language pathology services.
10	§ 4502. DEFINITIONS
11	As used in this Compact, and except as otherwise provided, the following
12	definitions shall apply:
13	(1) "Active duty military" means full-time duty status in the active
14	uniformed service of the United States, including members of the National
15	Guard and Reserve on active duty orders pursuant to 10 U.S.C. Chapters 1209
16	and 1211.
17	(2) "Adverse action" means any administrative, civil, equitable, or
18	criminal action permitted by a state's laws that is imposed by a licensing board
19	or other authority against an audiologist or speech-language pathologist,
20	including actions against an individual's license or privilege to practice such as

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1	revocation, suspension, probation, monitoring of the licensee, or restriction on
2	the licensee's practice.
3	(3) "Alternative program" means a nondisciplinary monitoring process
4	approved by an audiology or speech-language pathology licensing board to
5	address impaired practitioners.
6	(4) "Audiologist" means an individual who is licensed by a state to
7	practice audiology.
8	(5) "Audiology" means the care and services provided by a licensed
9	audiologist as set forth in the member state's statutes and rules.
10	(6) "Audiology and Speech-Language Pathology Compact
11	Commission" or "Commission" means the national administrative body whose
12	membership consists of all states that have enacted the Compact.
13	(7) "Audiology and speech-language pathology licensing board,"
14	"audiology licensing board," "speech-language pathology licensing board," or
15	"licensing board" means the agency of a state that is responsible for the
16	licensing and regulation of audiologists or speech-language pathologists, or
17	both.
18	(8) "Compact privilege" means the authorization granted by a remote
19	state to allow a licensee from another member state to practice as an
20	audiologist or speech-language pathologist in the remote state under its laws
21	and rules. The practice of audiology or speech-language pathology occurs in

1	the member state where the patient, client, or student is located at the time of
2	the patient, client, or student encounter.
3	(9) "Current significant investigative information" means investigative
4	information that a licensing board, after an inquiry or investigation that
5	includes notification and an opportunity for the audiologist or speech-language
6	pathologist to respond, if required by state law, has reason to believe is not
7	groundless and, if proved true, would indicate more than a minor infraction.
8	(10) "Data system" means a repository of information about licensees,
9	including, but not limited to, continuing education, examination, licensure,
10	investigative, compact privilege, and adverse action.
11	(11) "Encumbered license" means a license in which an adverse action
12	restricts the practice of audiology or speech-language pathology by the
13	licensee and said adverse action has been reported to the National Practitioners
14	Data Bank (NPDB).
15	(12) "Executive Committee" means a group of directors elected or
16	appointed to act on behalf of, and within the powers granted to them by, the
17	Commission.
18	(13) "Home state" means the member state that is the licensee's primary
19	state of residence.

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1	(14) "Impaired practitioner" means an individual whose professional
2	practice is adversely affected by substance abuse, addiction, or other health-
3	related conditions.
4	(15) "Licensee" means an individual who currently holds an
5	authorization from the state licensing board to practice as an audiologist or
6	speech-language pathologist.
7	(16) "Member state" means a state that has enacted the Compact.
8	(17) "Privilege to practice" means a legal authorization permitting the
9	practice of audiology or speech-language pathology in a remote state.
10	(18) "Remote state" means a member state other than the home state
11	where a licensee is exercising or seeking to exercise the compact privilege.
12	(19) "Rule" means a regulation, principle, or directive promulgated by
13	the Commission that has the force of law.
14	(20) "Single-state license" means an audiology or speech-language
15	pathology license issued by a member state that authorizes practice only within
16	the issuing state and does not include a privilege to practice in any other
17	member state.
18	(21) "Speech-language pathologist" means an individual who is licensed
19	by a state to practice speech-language pathology.

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1	(22) "Speech-language pathology" means the care and services provided
2	by a licensed speech-language pathologist as set forth in the member state's
3	statutes and rules.
4	(23) "State" means any state, commonwealth, district, or territory of the
5	United States of America that regulates the practice of audiology and speech-
6	language pathology.
7	(24) "State practice laws" means a member state's laws, rules, and
8	regulations that govern the practice of audiology or speech-language
9	pathology, define the scope of audiology or speech-language pathology
10	practice, and create the methods and grounds for imposing discipline.
11	(25) "Telehealth" means the application of telecommunication
12	technology to deliver audiology or speech-language pathology services at a
13	distance for assessment, intervention, and/or consultation.
14	<u>§ 4503. STATE PARTICIPATION IN THE COMPACT</u>
15	(a) A license issued to an audiologist or speech-language pathologist by a
16	home state to a resident in that state shall be recognized by each member state
17	as authorizing an audiologist or speech-language pathologist to practice
18	audiology or speech-language pathology, under a privilege to practice, in each
19	member state.
20	(b) A state must implement or utilize procedures for considering the
21	criminal history records of applicants for initial privilege to practice. These

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1	procedures shall include the submission of fingerprints or other biometric-
2	based information by applicants for the purpose of obtaining an applicant's
3	criminal history record information from the Federal Bureau of Investigation
4	and the agency responsible for retaining that state's criminal records.
5	(1) A member state must fully implement a criminal background check
6	requirement, within a time frame established by rule, by receiving the results
7	of the Federal Bureau of Investigation record search on criminal background
8	checks and use the results in making licensure decisions.
9	(2) Communication between a member state, the Commission, and
10	among member states regarding the verification of eligibility for licensure
11	through the Compact shall not include any information received from the
12	Federal Bureau of Investigation relating to a federal criminal records check
13	performed by a member state under Pub. L. No. 92-544.
14	(c) Upon application for a privilege to practice, the licensing board in the
15	issuing remote state shall ascertain, through the data system, whether the
16	applicant has ever held, or is the holder of, a license issued by any other state;
17	whether there are any encumbrances on any license or privilege to practice
18	held by the applicant; and whether any adverse action has been taken against
19	any license or privilege to practice held by the applicant.

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1	(d) Each member state shall require an applicant to obtain or retain a
2	license in the home state and meet the home state's qualifications for licensure
3	or renewal of licensure as well as all other applicable state laws.
4	(e) An audiologist:
5	(1) must meet one of the following educational requirements:
6	(A) on or before December 31, 2007, has graduated with a master's
7	degree or doctorate in audiology, or equivalent degree regardless of degree
8	name, from a program that is accredited by an accrediting agency recognized
9	by the Council for Higher Education Accreditation, or its successor, or by the
10	U.S. Department of Education and operated by a college or university
11	accredited by a regional or national accrediting organization recognized by the
12	board;
13	(B) on or after January 1, 2008, has graduated with a Doctoral degree
14	in audiology, or equivalent degree, regardless of degree name, from a program
15	that is accredited by an accrediting agency recognized by the Council for
16	Higher Education Accreditation, or its successor, or by the U.S. Department of
17	Education and operated by a college or university accredited by a regional or
18	national accrediting organization recognized by the board; or
19	(C) has graduated from an audiology program that is housed in an
20	institution of higher education outside the United States:

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1	(i) for which the program and institution have been approved by
2	the authorized accrediting body in the applicable country; and
3	(ii) the degree program has been verified by an independent
4	credentials review agency to be comparable to a state licensing board-approved
5	program;
6	(2) has completed a supervised clinical practicum experience from an
7	accredited educational institution or its cooperating programs as required by
8	the Commission;
9	(3) has successfully passed a national examination approved by the
10	Commission;
11	(4) holds an active, unencumbered license;
12	(5) has not been convicted or found guilty, and has not entered into an
13	agreed disposition, of a felony related to the practice of audiology, under
14	applicable state or federal criminal law; and
15	(6) has a valid U.S. Social Security or National Practitioner
16	Identification number.
17	(f) A speech-language pathologist:
18	(1) must meet one of the following educational requirements:
19	(A) has graduated with a master's degree from a speech-language
20	pathology program that is accredited by an organization recognized by the
21	U.S. Department of Education and operated by a college or university

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1	accredited by a regional or national accrediting organization recognized by the
2	board; or
3	(B) has graduated from a speech-language pathology program that is
4	housed in an institution of higher education outside the United States:
5	(i) for which the program and institution have been approved by
6	the authorized accrediting body in the applicable country; and
7	(ii) the degree program has been verified by an independent
8	credentials review agency to be comparable to a state licensing board-approved
9	program;
10	(2) has completed a supervised clinical practicum experience from an
11	educational institution or its cooperating programs as required by the
12	Commission;
13	(3) has completed a supervised postgraduate professional experience as
14	required by the Commission;
15	(4) has successfully passed a national examination approved by the
16	Commission;
17	(5) holds an active, unencumbered license;
18	(6) has not been convicted or found guilty, and has not entered into an
19	agreed disposition, of a felony related to the practice of speech-language
20	pathology, under applicable state or federal criminal law; and

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1	(7) has a valid U.S. Social Security or National Practitioner
2	Identification number.
3	(g) The privilege to practice is derived from the home state license.
4	(h) An audiologist or speech-language pathologist practicing in a member
5	state must comply with the state practice laws of the state in which the client is
6	located at the time service is provided. The practice of audiology and speech-
7	language pathology shall include all audiology and speech-language pathology
8	practice as defined by the state practice laws of the member state in which the
9	client is located. The practice of audiology and speech-language pathology in
10	a member state under a privilege to practice shall subject an audiologist or
11	speech-language pathologist to the jurisdiction of the licensing board, the
12	courts, and the laws of the member state in which the client is located at the
13	time service is provided.
14	(i) Individuals not residing in a member state shall continue to be able to
15	apply for a member state's single-state license as provided under the laws of
16	each member state. However, the single-state license granted to these
17	individuals shall not be recognized as granting the privilege to practice
18	audiology or speech-language pathology in any other member state. Nothing
19	in this Compact shall affect the requirements established by a member state for
20	the issuance of a single-state license.
21	(j) Member states may charge a fee for granting a compact privilege.

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1	(k) Member states must comply with the bylaws and rules and regulations
2	of the Commission.
3	<u>§ 4504. COMPACT PRIVILEGE</u>
4	(a) To exercise the compact privilege under the terms and provisions of the
5	Compact, the audiologist or speech-language pathologist shall:
6	(1) hold an active license in the home state;
7	(2) have no encumbrance on any state license;
8	(3) be eligible for a compact privilege in any member state in
9	accordance with section 4503 of this subchapter;
10	(4) have not had any adverse action against any license or compact
11	privilege within the previous two years from date of application;
12	(5) notify the Commission that the licensee is seeking the compact
13	privilege within a remote state or states;
14	(6) pay any applicable fees, including any state fee, for the compact
15	privilege; and
16	(7) report to the Commission adverse action taken by any nonmember
17	state within 30 days from the date the adverse action is taken.
18	(b) For the purposes of the compact privilege, an audiologist or speech-
19	language pathologist shall only hold one home state license at a time.
20	(c) Except as provided in section 4506 of this subchapter, if an audiologist
21	or speech-language pathologist changes primary state of residence by moving

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1	between two member states, the audiologist or speech-language pathologist
2	must apply for licensure in the new home state, and the license issued by the
3	prior home state shall be deactivated in accordance with applicable rules
4	adopted by the Commission.
5	(d) The audiologist or speech-language pathologist may apply for licensure
6	in advance of a change in primary state of residence.
7	(e) A license shall not be issued by the new home state until the audiologist
8	or speech-language pathologist provides satisfactory evidence of a change in
9	primary state of residence to the new home state and satisfies all applicable
10	requirements to obtain a license from the new home state.
11	(f) If an audiologist or speech-language pathologist changes primary state
12	of residence by moving from a member state to a nonmember state, the license
13	issued by the prior home state shall convert to a single-state license, valid only
14	in the former home state.
15	(g) The compact privilege is valid until the expiration date of the home
16	state license. The licensee must comply with the requirements of
17	subsection (a) of this section to maintain the compact privilege in the remote
18	state.
19	(h) A licensee providing audiology or speech-language pathology services
20	in a remote state under the compact privilege shall function within the laws
21	and regulations of the remote state.

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1	(i) A licensee providing audiology or speech-language pathology services
2	in a remote state is subject to that state's regulatory authority. A remote state
3	may, in accordance with due process and that state's laws, remove a licensee's
4	compact privilege in the remote state for a specific period of time, impose
5	fines, and/or take any other necessary actions to protect the health and safety
6	of its citizens.
7	(j) If a home state license is encumbered, the licensee shall lose the
8	compact privilege in any remote state until the following occur:
9	(1) The home state license is no longer encumbered.
10	(2) Two years have elapsed from the date of the adverse action.
11	(k) Once an encumbered license in the home state is restored to good
12	standing, the licensee must meet the requirements of subsection 4504(a) of this
13	subchapter to obtain a compact privilege in any remote state.
14	(1) Once the requirements of subsection (j) of this section have been met,
15	the licensee must meet the requirements in subsection (a) of this section to
16	obtain a compact privilege in a remote state.
17	§ 4505. COMPACT PRIVILEGE TO PRACTICE TELEHEALTH
18	Member states shall recognize the right of an audiologist or speech-
19	language pathologist, licensed by a home state in accordance with section 4503
20	of this subchapter and under rules promulgated by the Commission, to practice
21	audiology or speech-language pathology in any member state via telehealth

1	under a privilege to practice as provided in the Compact and rules promulgated
2	by the Commission.
3	§ 4506. ACTIVE DUTY MILITARY PERSONNEL OR THEIR SPOUSES
4	Active duty military personnel, or their spouse, shall designate a home state
5	where the individual has a current license in good standing. The individual
6	may retain the home state designation during the period the service member is
7	on active duty. Subsequent to designating a home state, the individual shall
8	only change the individual's home state through application for licensure in
9	the new state.
10	<u>§ 4507. ADVERSE ACTIONS</u>
11	(a) In addition to the other powers conferred by state law, a remote state
12	shall have the authority, in accordance with existing state due process law, to:
13	(1) Take adverse action against an audiologist's or speech-language
14	pathologist's privilege to practice within that member state.
15	(2) Issue subpoenas for both hearings and investigations that require the
16	attendance and testimony of witnesses as well as the production of evidence.
17	Subpoenas issued by a licensing board in a member state for the attendance
18	and testimony of witnesses or the production of evidence from another
19	member state shall be enforced in the latter state by any court of competent
20	jurisdiction, according to the practice and procedure of that court applicable to
21	subpoenas issued in proceedings pending before it. The issuing authority shall

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1	pay any witness fees, travel expenses, mileage, and other fees required by the
2	service statutes of the state in which the witnesses or evidence are located.
3	(3) Only the home state shall have the power to take adverse action
4	against a audiologist's or speech-language pathologist's license issued by the
5	home state.
6	(b) For purposes of taking adverse action, the home state shall give the
7	same priority and effect to reported conduct received from a member state as it
8	would if the conduct had occurred within the home state. In so doing, the
9	home state shall apply its own state laws to determine appropriate action.
10	(c) The home state shall complete any pending investigations of an
11	audiologist or speech-language pathologist who changes primary state of
12	residence during the course of the investigations. The home state shall also
13	have the authority to take appropriate action or actions and shall promptly
14	report the conclusions of the investigations to the administrator of the data
15	system. The administrator of the coordinated licensure information system
16	shall promptly notify the new home state of any adverse actions.
17	(d) If otherwise permitted by state law, the member state may recover from
18	the affected audiologist or speech-language pathologist the costs of
19	investigations and disposition of cases resulting from any adverse action taken
20	against that audiologist or speech-language pathologist.

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1	(e) The member state may take adverse action based on the factual findings
2	of the remote state, provided that the member state follows the member state's
3	own procedures for taking the adverse action.
4	(f) Joint investigations.
5	(1) In addition to the authority granted to a member state by its
6	respective audiology or speech-language pathology practice act or other
7	applicable state law, any member state may participate with other member
8	states in joint investigations of licensees.
9	(2) Member states shall share any investigative, litigation, or
10	compliance materials in furtherance of any joint or individual investigation
11	initiated under the Compact.
12	(g) If adverse action is taken by the home state against an audiologist's or
13	speech-language pathologist's license, the audiologist's or speech-language
14	pathologist's privilege to practice in all other member states shall be
15	deactivated until all encumbrances have been removed from the state license.
16	All home state disciplinary orders that impose adverse action against an
17	audiologist's or speech-language pathologist's license shall include a statement
18	that the audiologist's or speech-language pathologist's privilege to practice is
19	deactivated in all member states during the pendency of the order.

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1	(h) If a member state takes adverse action, it shall promptly notify the
2	administrator of the data system. The administrator of the data system shall
3	promptly notify the home state of any adverse actions by remote states.
4	(i) Nothing in this Compact shall override a member state's decision that
5	participation in an alternative program may be used in lieu of adverse action.
6	§ 4508. ESTABLISHMENT OF THE AUDIOLOGY AND SPEECH-
7	LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY COMPACT COMMISSION
8	(a) The Compact member states hereby create and establish a joint public
9	agency known as the Audiology and Speech-Language Pathology Compact
10	Commission:
11	(1) The Commission is an instrumentality of the Compact states.
12	(2) Venue is proper and judicial proceedings by or against the
13	Commission shall be brought solely and exclusively in a court of competent
14	jurisdiction where the principal office of the Commission is located. The
15	Commission may waive venue and jurisdictional defenses to the extent it
16	adopts or consents to participate in alternative dispute resolution proceedings.
17	(3) Nothing in this Compact shall be construed to be a waiver of
18	sovereign immunity.
19	(b) Membership, voting, and meetings.
20	(1) Each member state shall have two delegates selected by that member
21	state's licensing board. The delegates shall be current members of the

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1	licensing board. One shall be an audiologist and one shall be a speech-
2	language pathologist.
3	(2) An additional five delegates, who are either a public member or
4	board administrator from a state licensing board, shall be chosen by the
5	Executive Committee from a pool of nominees provided by the Commission at
6	large.
7	(3) Any delegate may be removed or suspended from office as provided
8	by the law of the state from which the delegate is appointed.
9	(4) The member state board shall fill any vacancy occurring on the
10	Commission within 90 days.
11	(5) Each delegate shall be entitled to one vote with regard to the
12	promulgation of rules and creation of bylaws and shall otherwise have an
13	opportunity to participate in the business and affairs of the Commission.
14	(6) A delegate shall vote in person or by other means as provided in the
15	bylaws. The bylaws may provide for delegates' participation in meetings by
16	telephone or other means of communication.
17	(7) The Commission shall meet at least once during each calendar year.
18	Additional meetings shall be held as set forth in the bylaws.
19	(c) The Commission shall have the following powers and duties:
20	(1) Establish the fiscal year of the Commission.
21	(2) Establish bylaws.

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1	(3) Establish a code of ethics.
2	(4) Maintain its financial records in accordance with the bylaws.
3	(5) Meet and take actions as are consistent with the provisions of this
4	Compact and the bylaws.
5	(6) Promulgate uniform rules to facilitate and coordinate
6	implementation and administration of this Compact. The rules shall have the
7	force and effect of law and shall be binding in all member states.
8	(7) Bring and prosecute legal proceedings or actions in the name of the
9	Commission, provided that the standing of any state audiology or speech-
10	language pathology licensing board to sue or be sued under applicable law
11	shall not be affected.
12	(8) Purchase and maintain insurance and bonds.
13	(9) Borrow, accept, or contract for services of personnel, including, but
14	not limited to, employees of a member state.
15	(10) Hire employees, elect or appoint officers, fix compensation, define
16	duties, grant individuals appropriate authority to carry out the purposes of the
17	Compact, and establish the Commission's personnel policies and programs
18	relating to conflicts of interest, qualifications of personnel, and other related
19	personnel matters.
20	(11) Accept any and all appropriate donations and grants of money,
21	equipment, supplies, materials and services, and receive, utilize, and dispose of

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1	the same, provided that at all times the Commission shall avoid any
2	appearance of impropriety or conflict of interest, or both.
3	(12) Lease, purchase, accept appropriate gifts or donations of, or
4	otherwise to own, hold, improve, or use, any property, real, personal or mixed,
5	provided that at all times the Commission shall avoid any appearance of
6	impropriety.
7	(13) Sell, convey, mortgage, pledge, lease, exchange, abandon, or
8	otherwise dispose of any property real, personal, or mixed.
9	(14) Establish a budget and make expenditures.
10	(15) Borrow money.
11	(16) Appoint committees, including standing committees composed of
12	members and other interested persons as may be designated in this Compact
13	and the bylaws.
14	(17) Provide and receive information from, and cooperate with, law
15	enforcement agencies.
16	(18) Establish and elect the Executive Committee.
17	(19) Perform other functions as may be necessary or appropriate to
18	achieve the purposes of this Compact consistent with the state regulation of
19	audiology and speech-language pathology licensure and practice.

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1	(d) The Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall have the
2	power to act on behalf of the Commission according to the terms of this
3	Compact.
4	(1) The Executive Committee shall be composed of 10 members:
5	(A) seven voting members who are elected by the Commission from
6	the current membership of the Commission;
7	(B) two ex-officios, consisting of one nonvoting member from a
8	recognized national audiology professional association and one nonvoting
9	member from a recognized national speech-language pathology association;
10	and
11	(C) one ex-officio, nonvoting member from the recognized
12	membership organization of the audiology and speech-language pathology
13	licensing boards.
14	(e) The ex-officio members shall be selected by their respective
15	organizations.
16	(1) The Commission may remove any member of the Executive
17	Committee as provided in bylaws.
18	(2) The Executive Committee shall meet at least annually.
19	(3) The Executive Committee shall have the following duties and
20	responsibilities:

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1	(A) recommend to the entire Commission changes to the rules or
2	bylaws, changes to this Compact legislation, and fees paid by Compact
3	member states, such as annual dues and any commission Compact fee charged
4	to licensees for the compact privilege;
5	(B) ensure Compact administration services are appropriately
6	provided, contractual or otherwise;
7	(C) prepare and recommend the budget;
8	(D) maintain financial records on behalf of the Commission;
9	(E) monitor Compact compliance of member states and provide
10	compliance reports to the Commission;
11	(F) establish additional committees as necessary; and
12	(G) other duties as provided in rules or bylaws.
13	(4) Meetings of the Commission. All meetings shall be open to the
14	public, and public notice of meetings shall be given in the same manner as
15	required under the rulemaking provisions in section 4510 of this subchapter.
16	(5) The Commission or the Executive Committee or other committees

12	(H) disclosure of investigative records compiled for law enforcement
13	purposes;
14	(I) disclosure of information related to any investigative reports
15	prepared by or on behalf of or for use of the Commission or other committee
16	charged with responsibility of investigation or determination of compliance
17	issues pursuant to the Compact; or
18	(J) matters specifically exempted from disclosure by federal or
19	member state statute.

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1	(6) If a meeting, or portion of a meeting, is closed pursuant to this
2	provision, the Commission's legal counsel or designee shall certify that the
3	meeting may be closed and shall reference each relevant exempting provision.
4	(7) The Commission shall keep minutes that fully and clearly describe
5	all matters discussed in a meeting and shall provide a full and accurate
6	summary of actions taken, and the reasons therefore, including a description of
7	the views expressed. All documents considered in connection with an action
8	shall be identified in minutes. All minutes and documents of a closed meeting
9	shall remain under seal, subject to release by a majority vote of the

12	(A) The Commission shall pay, or provide for the payment of, the
13	reasonable expenses of its establishment, organization, and ongoing activities.

#### § 331. DEFINITIONS

(1) "Person who is deaf or hard of hearing Deaf, Hard of Hearing, or <u>DeafBlind</u>" means any person who has such difficulty hearing, even with amplification, to the extent that he or she the person cannot rely on hearing for communication.

(2) "Proceeding" means any judicial proceeding, contested case under 3 V.S.A. chapter 25, or other hearing before an administrative agency not included under 3 V.S.A. chapter 25.

(3) "Qualified interpreter" means an interpreter for a person who is deaf or hard of hearing <u>Deaf</u>, <u>Hard of Hearing</u>, or <u>DeafBlind</u> who meets standards of competency established by the national or Vermont Registry of Interpreters for the Deaf <del>as amended</del>, by rule, by the Vermont Commission of the Deaf and Hard of Hearing.

§ 332. RIGHT TO INTERPRETER; <u>COMMUNICATION ACCESS</u>

REALTIME TRANSLATION (CART) SERVICES; ASSISTIVE

LISTENING EQUIPMENT

(a) Any person who is deaf or hard of hearing <u>Deaf, Hard of Hearing</u>, or <u>DeafBlind</u> who is a party or witness in any proceeding shall be entitled to be provided with a qualified interpreter or <u>CART services</u> for the duration of the person's participation in the proceeding.

(b) Any person who is deaf or hard of hearing <u>Deaf</u>, <u>Hard of Hearing</u>, or <u>DeafBlind</u> shall be entitled to be provided with a qualified interpreter or <u>CART</u> <u>services</u> upon five working days' notice that the person has reasonable need to do any of the following:

\* \* \*

(c) If a person who is deaf or hard of hearing <u>Deaf, Hard of Hearing</u>, or <u>DeafBlind</u> is unable to use or understand sign language, the presiding officer or State board or agency or State legislative official shall, upon five working days' notice, make available appropriate assistive listening equipment for use during the proceeding or activity.

§ 333. APPOINTMENT OF INTERPRETER

(a) The presiding officer in a proceeding shall appoint an interpreter after making a preliminary determination that the interpreter is able to:

(1) readily communicate with the person who is deaf or hard of hearing, to Deaf, Hard of Hearing, or DeafBlind; (2) accurately interpret statements or communications from the person who is deaf or hard of hearing, Deaf, Hard of Hearing, or DeafBlind; and to

(3) interpret the proceedings to the person who is deaf or hard of hearing Deaf, Hard of Hearing, or DeafBlind.

\* \* \*

### § 336. RULES; INFORMATION; <del>LIST OF INTERPRETERS</del> <u>CONTRACT</u> <u>SERVICES</u>

(a) The Vermont Commission of the Deaf and Hard of Hearing shall, by rule, establish factors to be considered by the presiding officer under section 333 of this title before appointing an interpreter who is not a qualified interpreter. Such factors shall encourage the widest availability of interpreters in Vermont while at the same time ensuring State of Vermont shall maintain contracts to operate CART services and a statewide sign language interpreter referral service to provide services to a person who has a right to an interpreter or CART services under section 332 of this subchapter. The contract shall require that the <u>an</u> interpreter providing services through the sign language interpreter referral service:

(1) is able to communicate readily with the person who is deaf or hard of hearing Deaf, Hard of Hearing, or DeafBlind;

(2) is able to interpret accurately statements or communications by the person who is deaf or hard of hearing <u>Deaf</u>, <u>Hard of Hearing</u>, or <u>DeafBlind</u>;

(3) is able to interpret the proceedings to the person who is deaf or hard of hearing Deaf, Hard of Hearing, or DeafBlind;

(4) *shall maintain confidentiality;* 

(5) *shall* be impartial with respect to the outcome of the proceeding;

(6) shall does not exert any influence over the person who is deaf or hard of hearing Deaf, Hard of Hearing, or DeafBlind; and

(7) *shall does* not accept assignments the interpreter does not feel competent to handle.

(b) Rules established by the Vermont Commission of the Deaf and Hard of Hearing pursuant to subdivision 331(3) of this title amending the standards of competency established by the national or Vermont Registry of the Deaf shall be limited to the factors set forth in subsection (a) of this section. [Repealed.]

(c) The Vermont Commission of the Deaf and Hard of Hearing shall prepare an explanation of the provisions of this subchapter which shall be distributed to all State agencies and courts. [Repealed.]

(d) The Department of Disabilities, Aging, and Independent Living shall maintain a list of qualified interpreters in Vermont and, where such information is available, in surrounding states. The list shall be distributed to State of Vermont shall maintain access to qualified interpreters in Vermont and <u>CART services for</u> all State agencies and courts <u>through the statewide</u> contracts maintained by the State pursuant to subsection (a) of this section.

#### § 337. REVIEW

(a) A decision, order, or judgment of a court or administrative agency may be reversed on appeal if the court or agency finds that a person who is <del>deaf or</del> <del>hard of hearing</del> <u>Deaf</u>, <u>Hard of Hearing</u>, <u>or DeafBlind</u> who was a party or a witness in the proceeding was deprived of an opportunity to communicate effectively, and that the deprivation was prejudicial.

#### § 338. ADMISSIONS; CONFESSIONS

(a) An admission or confession by a person who is deaf or hard of hearing <u>Deaf, Hard of Hearing, or DeafBlind</u> made to a law enforcement officer or any other person having a prosecutorial function may only be used against the person in a criminal proceeding if:

(1) The the admission or confession was made knowingly, voluntarily, and intelligently and is not subject to alternative interpretations resulting from the person's habits and patterns of communication.; and

(2) The <u>the</u> admission or confession, if made during a custodial interrogation, was made after reasonable steps were taken, including the appointment of a qualified interpreter, to ensure that the defendant understood <u>his or her the defendant's</u> constitutional rights.

(b) The provisions of subsection (a) of this section supplement the constitutional rights of the person who is deaf or hard of hearing Deaf, Hard of Hearing, or DeafBlind.

§ 339. COMMUNICATIONS MADE TO INTERPRETERS; PROHIBITION ON DISCLOSURE

(a) An interpreter, whether or not the interpreter is a qualified interpreter, shall not disclose or testify to:

(1) a communication made by a person to an interpreter acting in his or her the capacity as of an interpreter for a person who is deaf or hard of hearing Deaf, Hard of Hearing, or DeafBlind or a person with limited English proficiency; or

(2) any information obtained by the interpreter while acting in his or her the capacity as of an interpreter for a person who is deaf or hard of hearing Deaf, Hard of Hearing, or DeafBlind or a person with limited English proficiency.

(b) There is no prohibition on disclosure under this section if the services of the interpreter were sought or obtained to enable or aid anyone to commit or plan to commit what the person who is <del>deaf or hard of hearing</del> <u>Deaf</u>, <u>Hard of</u> <u>Hearing</u>, or <u>DeafBlind</u> or the person with limited English proficiency knew or reasonably should have known to be a crime or fraud.

(d) As used in this section, "person with limited English proficiency" means a person who does not speak English as his or her the person's primary language and who has a limited ability to read, write, speak, or understand English.

*Sec.* **#**8. *EFFECTIVE DATES* 

This act shall take effect on July 1, 2023, except that Secs. 1–3 (audiologists and speech-language pathologists interstate compact) and Sec. 6 (fees) shall take effect on July 1, 2024.
