Vote explanations (at back of book)

The following are the House Rules governing voting in the House

**XI
OF VOTING**

69. The alphabetical roll call shall be called upon any question if demanded by five members

70. Explanations of votes will be allowed only after the roll call is complete and immediately before the result thereof is announced. Explanations shall be submitted immediately to the Clerk in writing. It is generally recommended that vote explanations should be infrequent and brief.

71. A division of the House shall be had upon order of the Speaker or upon demand of one member. Of the vote be taken by division, a voting member who is unable to stand need not rise to express his or her vote but shall indicate the vote in some other manner.

72. No member or other person may remain by the Clerk's desk when the roll is being called.

73. When a vote is taken, every member present shall vote unless excused by the House; but no member may be compelled to vote who was absent when the question was stated from the Chair.

74. At the conclusion of the call of the roll, the alphabetical roll of the absentees will be called and, subject to Rule 73, members who were absent when their names were first called and who are now present shall then vote. Members not present when their names were called the second time shall not be permitted to vote, except by leave of the House.

75. Member shall not be permitted to vote upon any question in which they are immediately or directly interested.

76. The Speaker shall not be permitted to vote except in cases of elections by ballot, or when the House is equally divided, or when the Speaker's vote, if given to the minority, will make the division equal. In case of an equal division, the question shall be lost.

Rep. O'Donnell of Vernon explained her as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

Until we control the cost of the services we receive we cannot call this Health Care Reform. Mandating insurance companies only puts the burden of cost on the employer and the employee in their premiums at a time when business is crumbling in Vermont. This is just one more increase in cost."

Rep. Kilmartin of Newport City explained his as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I vote no for several reasons: the bill limits patient and physician choice; the bill freezes colorectal screening to two soon-to-be outmoded screening modalities; it ignores real cost effective combined preventative and diagnostic tests that are in the pipeline; it creates cost shifts which are nothing more than secret taxes. It is an excellent example of "flat earth" medicine imposed by a political agenda unrelated to the needs of the patient."

Rep. Koch of Barre Town explained his as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

Rep. Andrews of Rutland City explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I believe in Vermont's citizen legislature and the need for adequate compensation so everyone can serve. I would not jeopardize this over the long-term. Today, I voted yes for a temporary reduction in my pay during these extraordinary times out of respect for the people I serve in a community that has lost hundreds of jobs in the past couple of years.

Rep. Nease of Johnson explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I hope that Vermonters will take notice and check to make sure that all of those who voted yes here today, have already placed their names on the list of people who voluntarily took a cut in pay.”

“Mr. Speaker:

We state today that sexual abuse of a child is more heinous than the premeditated murder of a child. We single out those accused - not convicted, but accused - of one crime only, as not worthy of the same rights. We invest millions to prosecute one crime, even as resources are draining away from the very supports that build stronger families, more able to protect their children; that protect abused and neglected children; and that treat and counsel both the victims of abuse and the abusers of tomorrow, who are all too often, one and the same.”

Rep. Mook of Bennington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted yes for this bill because there is nothing more important than the life a Vermont child, and that trumps my many concerns for the bill.

This bill should not be about licensure and background checks of educators, nor to create unfunded mandates for schools. This bill should be more about addressing this public health issue - recognizing that 95% of victims know and trust their predator.”

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

There has been no response as to why we would take up a bill now that will not take effect unless we take one particular of two possible later actions – either of which will be based upon all the relevant factors to protect Vermonters and which must occur before the effective date of this bill.”

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I oppose the continued raid of the Transportation fund that has forced us to raise taxes to meet the needs of our state infrastructure.”

Rep. Koch of Barre Town explained his vote as follows:

“Madam,. Speaker:

In general I support this bill, but I vote No today because I cannot support future tax increases that will occur automatically, without a vote of the Legislature.”

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

“Madam. Speaker:

Difficult times demand difficult decisions and this is only the first of many we will be called upon for spending for the new fiscal year. A yes vote on this bill is a “yes” to begin fixing our crumbling roads.”

Rep. Minter of Waterbury explained her vote as follows:

“Madam. Speaker:

I vote yes to ensure we fulfill our obligation to fix our transportation infrastructure and create jobs, and not allow the problems to get worse and more expensive to fix, leaving yet another unsolvable problem for the next generation.”

Rep. Savage of Swanton explained his vote as follows:

“Madam. Speaker:

Until just a few minutes ago I was inclined to vote yes on this bill.

However, I cannot in good faith vote to raise the gas tax (assessments) that continues to fund JTOC.

Let’s keep the transportation fund whole and stop the rape of the funds that got us to this point to being with.”

Page 16

Rep. Conquest of Newbury explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted no, not because it sounded like an unreasonable proposal, but because it sounded like the wrong place to be amending the law.”

Page 17

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

If our economic situation this year demands tax increases, we cannot add them one bite at a time without being able to see the overall impact. Even pennies grow into dollars.”

Rep. Rodgers of Glover explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

To do nothing is irresponsible. Poor roads cost Vermonters much more in auto repairs than a motor fuel assessment will cost them.”

Page 18

Rep. Copeland-Hanzas of Bradford explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Even with a CPI adjustment, the fuel assessment will be far cheaper than the suspension work my car requires every other month.”

Page 19

Rep. Ancel of Calais explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This bill is a critical step toward maintaining our roads and bridges. This is simply a smart investment.”

Rep. Clark of Vergennes explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I cannot support raising any taxes or indexing of the proposed gas tax while the appropriations bill, which also promotes raising taxes, has not been resolved.”

Rep. Flory of Pittsford explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This is a difficult vote for me because a project in my District that I have fought hard for 10 years is in this bill. However, I cannot support increasing a gas tax until we have stopped raiding the transportation fund

This year, with over 160 million coming in from the stimulus funds, was the ideal time to stop this decades old raid.”

Rep. Kilmartin of Newport City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote no. I cannot support a highly regressive fuel tax increase, automatic increases for existing furl taxes, and a continuation of robbing the transportation fund to pay for other fundamental government services. I cannot be party to increasing taxes citizens of the Northeast Kingdom, while we give future tax monies to those who have created our current economic tsunami which threatens our continued existence as individuals and a body politic.”

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Every Vermonter knows the sorry state of our roads and bridges. They will not improve without more money no matter how much we wish they would. This bill begins the long task of doing so.”

Rep. McDonald of Berlin explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I have a great deal of respect for the Chair of the House Transportation committee and the hard work done by committee members under his leadership

This bill is a good bill – one I would like to support. I have been a supporter of bonding for roads, bridges and culverts while serving as Secretary of Transportation and I certainly support the funding to municipalities contained in this bill.

But these are troubling economic times for all Vermonters. Without knowing the impact of the total tax package that will undoubtedly be presented to this body, along with the gas and diesel tax and indexing provisions contained in this bill, I felt I needed to vote no.”

Rep. Minter of Waterbury explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted yes because the time has come to stop the downward spiral of our crumbling bridges and roads. 36 percent of the roads in very poor condition, 16 percent of bridges structurally deficient and a \$23 million dollar decline in the transportation fund this year. Enough is enough. Let’s take responsibility for fixing these serious problems now rather than leaving a bigger bill to others in the future.”

Rep. Morrissey of Bennington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I truly appreciate the hard work of the transportation committee, however, I cannot support a five cent gas tax at this time when we don’t have a complete tax revenue policy plan before us.

Our tax payers deserve, especially in these difficult times, a clear understanding of what the raid will be on their wallet.”

Rep. Mrowicki of Putney explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Even though this bill probably won't help the mud road that I live on, I voted to address the long-defeated and sorry conditions of our roads and bridges.

As has been said earlier in the session, we can't cut our way out of this problem. It's time to pay the piper and repair our roads and bridges.”

Rep. Savage of Swanton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Although I know as we all know that our roads and bridges need much needed attention, I cannot support legislation that includes automatic tax increase based upon an index.”

Rep. Zuckerman of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

My mom and dad always told me you can't get something for nothing. I would rather have tourists pay for their share of the maintenance, rather than put 100% of the burden on Vermonters through the alternative, increased fees.”

Page 21

Rep. Kilmartin of Newport City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

No to an unbalanced budget! No to an unknown increase in the already crushing tax burdens under which Vermonters are groaning. Government must make the same cuts in expenditures that we are forced to make in our lives. To do otherwise will drown us in debt.”

Rep. Pugh of South Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes. This budget is both responsible and protective of essential state government services. It cuts a million more dollars than the Governor's budget did from the base general fund budget; it does not shift \$63 million dollars onto the backs of property taxpayers and it keeps VParM, the critical prescription drug coverage for our senior citizens and Vermonters with disabilities.”

Rep. Zuckerman of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote no. While I believe the committee has done yeopersons work within the parameters given to them, I do not believe in balancing the budget by using frontline Vermont state workers as a political football.”

Page 22

Rep. Toll of Danville explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted no on this amendment because I believe the residents in my district do have the opportunity to be heard on this and any other issue that may come before this body.

I respond personally to emails, phone calls, messages left at the Sergeant at Arms office, mailed letters and personal conversations. In a state the size of Vermont, Representatives, Senators and yes, even our Governor, are all easily accessible.

The opinions of those who live in Cabot, Danville and Peacham are the greatest importance to me, not the opinions of those who live outside of our state's borders..”

Rep. Browning of Arlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted against the amendment to put the Same-Sex marriage question to a public referendum despite the fact that I expect to vote against the underlying legislation.

There is already an excellent and effective public referendum that occurs every two years on election day.

We do not need to delay our proceedings to enter into all the potential pitfalls of using public referendum questions to guide our decision.”

Page 23

Rep. Gilbert of Fairfax explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Simply because I, as an individual believe that marriage is a sacrament and chose to be married within a church, does not mean that everyone must have the same beliefs. Others may choose a civil marriage ceremony, a civil union, a different church, or nothing at all. These alternatives have absolutely no affect on my marriage, my faith, or my individual commitment to my wife and family. They cost me nothing. The choice to marry is a public declaration of a personal choice made by a couple that loves and is committed to care for each other. As a person, I cannot deny the rights to others that I claim for myself. As a legislator, I must uphold the Vermont and U.S. Constitutions and my Oath of Office. I support this bill .”

Rep. Grad of Moretown explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes for S. 115. As a member of your House Judiciary committee my goal is to promote justice for all Vermonters so they may attain equal access rights, benefits and privileges under the law.

Through testimony on this bill I learned that civil unions does not do this but creates a separate status for same sex couples and their children who are often discriminated against, stigmatized and marginalized.

Studies show that there is no credible scientific evidence that parenting effectiveness is related to parental sexual orientation, but instead is related to parenting styles.

In voting for this bill I vote for Vermont same-sex families and their children with the hope to begin to repair the wounds of discrimination they suffer and give all Vermont children a more tolerant world in which to grow.”

Rep. Audette of South Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted no but I respect people for who they are and not their sexual orientation.”

Rep. Clarkson of Woodstock explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes in support of a bill that furthers the cause of equality in Vermont and because anything that promotes love and commitment is wonderful and further promotes the common good.”

Rep. Kilmartin of Newport City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Marriage in all cultures throughout recorded history has been between a man and a woman and for good and indisputable reasons. There is a male father and female mother who carry the child to term. To give the title to same-sex couples does nothing but introduce confusion and chaos into the very nature of marriage and the family. The way the bill is structured, it denies individuals and mothers and fathers the exercise and practice their sincerely held beliefs and denies them their Constitutional rights to raise their

own children according to the dictates of their conscience. The bill cleverly sets up clergymen and religious institutions as those entitled to freedom of conscience while intentionally denying the individual citizens their constitutionally guaranteed rights.”

Rep. Koch of Barre Town explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Due to the necessity of attending the wake of a close friend back home, the member from Vernon has asked me to note for the record that she would have voted no on this question.”

Rep. Ram of Burlington explained her vote as follows

“Mr. Speaker:

To say that Civil Unions offered the same rights as marriage is nothing less than saying once upon a time there are two drinking fountains that both dispense the same water. I vote yes to lift this final weight off the shoulders of our otherwise free society.”

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows

“Mr. Speaker:

Voting “no” tonight on this bill was a very difficult decision for me. Several of my family members and close friends are gay and I fully support their rights under the Civil Union laws of our state. I believe in and have performed many Civil Unions in the past. However, I just could not come to terms with redefining the term marriage. I fully respect the proponents position of this legislation and can understand and will respect my position on this issue. Thank you.”

Rep. Wheeler of Derby explained his vote as follows

“Mr. Speaker:

I found myself wishing when I came into this debate I had strong opinions one way or another, but I didn’t.

When I was a newspaper reporter covering the Civil Union debates it was far easier for me to know how I would vote on that issue, but probably only because I didn’t have to actually vote. In voting “no” I know that I have disappointed some people including, some dear friends. My vote came after much talking and listening to people on both sides of the issue. In voting “no”, which a huge percentage of my constituents asked me to do, I hope my gay and lesbian friends and colleagues don’t feel that I threw them under the bus, but on the other hand, I won’t blame them if they do. As a history writer I wonder if I voted on the right or wrong side of history – only time will tell. Will I look back on my vote with disappointment? Only time will tell. I apologize for those who I have disappointed, and I thank everybody for keeping this process civil.”

Rep. Zuckerman of Burlington explains his vote as follows

“Mr. Speaker:

Nine years ago twenty-two members of this body voted for full equality. Today ninety-five members did. In and of itself, that is a huge victory. A huge majority has spoken.”

Page 24

Rep. McFaun of Barre Town explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I agree with the underlying premise of the amendment but I feel there are going to be some drastic unintended consequences because of the way it is written.”

Rep. Morrissey of Bennington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote no on this amendment because due process never took place in the committee of jurisdiction.”

Page 25

Rep. Morrissey of Bennington explained her vote as follows

“Mr. Speaker:

I rise in opposition to this amendment, an amendment that I do support in concept. However, once again this body has chosen to go around due process.”

Rep. Atkins of Winooski explained his vote as follows

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes on this bill to protect jobs of State workers.

However, I do so with reservations because this topic is the purview of Government operations and I do not like to write laws on the House floor.

Page 26

Rep. Krawczyk of Bennington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted no on this amendment. It appears that it is an attempt to reduce the budget gap we have in our FY 10 budget. I am reminded of a bill we voted on a few weeks ago asking the legislature to reduce our legislative salaries to save our taxpayers money and the bill was rejected. There appears to be a double standard in this chamber.”

Rep. Morrissey of Bennington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This amendment that we are now voting on could certainly have been a part of the appropriations bill as it came to this floor to be presented, for the vote on this amendment by the committee was seven to four. The citizens and the taxpayers of the state of Vermont deserve better than this body playing politics on this most important issue that will certainly affect their lives now and long into the future.”

Rep. McFaun of Barre Town explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote no on this amendment because it circumvents the committee process and uses the legislative process to send a message to the administrative branch that if implemented could have the unintended consequences of destroying an individuals working career – this is politics at its worse!”

Page 27

Rep. Adams of Hartland explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

A better day to have voted on this bill would have been April Fools Day – then we could have rightly referred to it as Budgetary Follies Day.”

Rep. Bohi of Hartford explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Education fund to cover general fund expenditures is a failure to finally begin dealing with our infrastructure’s deterioration and is cutting VPharm.

This budget meets those needs. That is why I support it.”

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I have never voted for an appropriations bill that either quietly or loudly, did not have identified revenues to support it. This bill shouts it our, and if for no other reason, I cannot support it.”

Rep. Kitzmiller of Montpelier explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

No budget ever reflects any member’s idea of perfection.

Knowing, however, the annual difficulty faced by the hard-working folks on the appropriation committee, I again vote “yes” as I have every year that I’ve been here, regardless of which caucus controlled the process.”

Rep. Lanpher of Vergennes explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

We have heard this budget described as foolhardy, as a disaster waiting to happen. It is not.

This budget is a straight forward effort to address the illusion of fiscal management we received from the Governor in January.

I commend the efforts of the appropriations committee for their diligence and honesty.”

Rep. Manwaring of Wilmington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Even though I am uncomfortable with increasing revenues yet to be identified, it is far preferable to me than the increases in the property tax in the budget presented to us.”

Rep. Minter of Waterbury explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I am proud to support this budget that restores domestic cuts to programs for seniors, people with disabilities, prescription drugs for seniors, health care to the underinsured, affordable housing and conservation and many other critical programs that Vermonters depend upon. This budget makes strategic program cuts, wisely employs federal stimulus dollars, and avoids the \$63 million cost shift to property taxpayers. This is the approach Vermonters need to weather the economic storm we are in.”

Rep. Mrowicki of Putney explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Last year the administration budget proposal included \$50 million from the leasing of the lottery. This year’s budget proposal included shifting \$60 million onto property taxes. This response from the appropriations committee is a reality based budget which fills the holes left by the administration.”

Rep. Weston of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes because in these difficult economic times this budget presents a more realistic and responsible approach to weathering the storm than the budget presented by the Governor.”

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This budget fails Vermonters. It raises taxes in a recession, is not sustainable and fails to make the tough decisions that were necessary.”

Page 29

Rep. Courcelle of Rutland City explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Traditions continually change. Separate is not equal. Let us celebrate and accept our differences.”

Rep. Cheney of Norwich explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I may be the most recently married member of this assembly. I want all members of this House to have the same right to marry the person they love.”

Rep. Peltz of Woodbury explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted yes. I dedicate my vote to family members and friends who have passed on and missed the benefits of this bill.”

Rep. Pellett of Chester explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Today I proudly cast my vote for those back home, Jane and Jean, Ron and James, my colleagues here, Bill, Steve, Jason, Suzie, and my former colleague Robert – and for my predecessor Bill. I cast my vote for all Vermonters to be treated equally, with respect and dignity in every part of life. Life is short – we only get one chance. Happiness should elude no one.”

Page 30

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

We did not necessarily take this vote with a common or clear understanding of its intent or implications. More time and a more inclusive process could have made a difference and may have brought about a more unified outcome.

To me, this is not about changing the institution of marriage: the longstanding cultural beliefs about the influence of God as we individually understand it in our lives. It is about the state role in fully equal treatment of those who differ, and in acceptance of that difference.

Tolerance, however, is a two-way street, and discrimination takes many forms. It remains socially acceptable to mock religious faith. I felt the sting of that mockery on the floor last week; the anti-Catholicism that remains in a state where only a generation ago, hooded men burned a cross on a hilltop in Northfield.

If this law fosters intolerance towards those with different, but deeply held beliefs, then I will have voted on the wrong side of the pages of the history of our civilization.”

Page 31

Rep. Adams of Hartland explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

During the 2008 campaign season our nation’s Vice-President declared it “patriotic” for Americans to pay more in taxes. This bill decides for us to be more “patriotic”.

I don’t know about you but I don’t believe there is anything patriotic about giving more of my, and my constituents, hard-earned money to the government to bankroll an agenda to increase spending..”

Rep. Clark of Vergennes explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Government is created of, for and by the people, not the other way around. We ought to be making the same difficult monetary decisions as our constituents, not asking them to pay a higher tithing rate than they already do.”

Rep. Clarkson of Woodstock explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes to support this bill in order to prevent cuts to services so many Vermonters value – to prevent job cuts which will further drain our unemployment insurance fund, put additional pressure on state services and reduce revenues to the state – and to prevent adding 13 cents to our residential property tax rate.”

Rep. French of Shrewsbury explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Understanding that raising more revenue with tax increases is always unpopular, we find ourselves in a difficult situation in state government. While the recession affects many businesses with decreased demand for goods and services – they must shrink revenue to balance. The same recession affects our government with both decrease in revenue and increase in demand for services. This bill reflects that unique problem.”

Rep. Poirier of Barre City explained his vote as follows

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted yes for House bill 442 because even with a small temporary income tax, H-442 still counts on the elimination of a large number of State employee positions.

Mr. Speaker, Vermont faces a revenue shortage not an over-abundance of State employees.

I supported a bill sponsored by the member from Lincoln and that bill would have prevented blaming State employees as the problem to our present economy.

I hope before third reading we develop the political courage to protect the innocent individuals in this debate – the State employees.”

Rep. David Sharpe of Bristol explained his vote as follows

“Mr. Speaker:

When the economy is shrinking is no time for government to shrink from its responsibilities. The revenue raised in the bill allows us to deliver the services Vermonters expect from their State government, such as life saving medicine for Senior citizens.”

Rep. Zuckerman of Burlington explained his vote as follows

“Mr. Speaker:

I think it would be a very revealing experience to have the Governor’s proposed FY10 budget and taxes go into effect for two months. A \$260 property tax increase, doubling of motor vehicle fees and other hidden increases while cutting state services to thousands of Vermonters. Then shift to the combined budget and tax plan of this chamber restoring some budget cuts and lowering the tax increases. The reality behind the Administration’s rhetoric would then be exposed.”

Page 32

Rep. Atkins of Winooski explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote no on H. 147.

I have stated my feelings many times regarding my dislike of creating small groups for special regulations.

I have also stated that primary enforcement of this bill be by guess and by gosh. The ability to stop a vehicle because an officer thinks the driver may not be wearing a seat belt is not acceptable to me.”

Rep. Malcolm of Pawlet explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes but I find it ironic to vote for a cell phone use ban before most people in my district have the opportunity to use cell phones to begin with.”

Rep. Rodgers of Glover explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote no for this bill and yes to freedom.

I now have to put my faith in the wisdom of the Senate to stop the erosion of our freedom.”

Page 33

Rep. Geier of South Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

It is my feeling that the state of Vermont should not be encouraging more family debt by its citizens. If we do anything about credit cards we should educate our citizens how to use the ones they have.”

Rep. Townsend of Randolph explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I am a proud Vermonter. As such, I feel very protective of the Vermont name and logo. I admire the great name of our Green Mountain State on our milk, cheese, maple syrup, etc. I do not want it on a credit card.”

Page 34

Rep. Zuckerman of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

In three years this exemption will save wealthy Vermonters more than 10 times the taxes that are being assessed under the temporary three-year surtax. Members who want lower taxes should think of the long-term bonus we are extending to those wealthy Vermonters.”

Page 35

Rep. Clark of Vergennes explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Vermonters are screaming “don’t tread on me”. We ought to be listening.”

Rep. Geier of South Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

We had the opportunity to show Vermonters that we are hearing them, that we are listening to them. It would be a good time to cut taxes.”

Page 36

Rep. Bray of New Haven explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I know from listening to thousands of conversations while going door-to-door that Vermonters, regardless of their political affiliation, expect us to solve the state’s challenges using a fair, balanced approach.

When it comes to the budget, we have four tools; cuts, rainy day funds, stimulus funds and new revenues.

This bill uses all four of these tools and lives up to our voter’s expectations for reasonable, respectful, and productive compromise.”

Rep. Consejo of Sheldon explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I listened very carefully to all the explanations that were given today on that very important issue. At the end, I found myself compelled to support my colleagues in their quest to bring some balance between the needs, and the wants of the people of Vermont. There will be more cuts to be done in the future and I know, we will again have to decide the services that we will have to suspend or eliminate.”

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

We are cheated of our ability to represent the best interests of the people of this state when we are forced to vote on fragmented pieces of an unknown overall strategy – assuming one even exists.”

Rep. Fagan of Rutland City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote no on new taxes and I vote no on saddling our/my youngsters with the results of our mistakes.”

Rep. Gilbert of Fairfax explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

The math is simple. A cost shift hiding a tax increase would cost \$260; a surcharge would cost \$27.00. Give me the tax anytime.”

Rep. McDonald of Berlin explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted no. When Forbes magazine ranked Vermont last year as the greenest state, no one contested the findings. But when the same magazine ranks Vermont as the state that levies the nation’s largest tax burden on individuals, the results are challenged. Yet, all we need to do is to listen to Vermonters who know first-hand that they are already being taxed too much and then tell them we are raising their taxes by \$24 million in FY 2010.”

Rep. Myers of Essex explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Since town meeting day, voters in Essex have defeated four budgets – two municipal budgets and yesterday, two school budgets. The people in my community are hurting. For all of those people, last week I voted no on the budget, and today I vote no on an increase in taxes.”

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

My no vote reflects my disappointment in our inability to make fundamental, structural changes that are badly needed. Instead all we do is the same old – same old. We raised taxes, discouraged business investment and job creation, and we did this during a recession. This is not what Vermonters expected.”

Page 38

Rep. Marcotte of Coventry explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Although I vote no on the amendment because of many unanswered questions, I support the spirit of the amendment. Just as Ways and Means and the Appropriations committees look at what the fiscal impacts are on the state, it is only natural that we look at what the fiscal impacts are on private enterprise. I call upon our Government Operations and our Rules committees to come up with a positive solution to this issue.”

Rep. Milkey of Brattleboro explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

The debate, confusion and rewriting of this amendment on the House floor points out precisely why we have committees and why this issue should be addressed in committee, rather than in haste on the House floor. The committee of jurisdiction has stated that it will do just that. For that reason, I vote no.”

Rep. Sharpe of Bristol explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I find it ironic that this confusing, and what I believe to be a very expensive amendment, comes to the floor for consideration without a fiscal note.”

Rep. Morrissey of Bennington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

As a member who talks often on this floor about committee process, I vote “no” with great anticipation that our Government Operations committee will seriously take up this important issue. Accountability, especially in financial matters, is critical in our deliberations on matters that most affect our Vermont citizens and the taxpayers.

It amazes me that today many members spoke passionately about the committee process and yet last week three amendments to the budget were presented that never saw the light of day in committee. What short memories we have! I suggest we consider adding more funding to our good friends in the Alzheimer’s Association.”

Page 40

Rep. Adams of Hartland explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

We have wasted hours today simply for the purposes of political posturing. Let’s do the work before us for the benefit of our cities and towns instead of adjourning for the weekend.”

Rep. Koch of Barre Town explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

After waiting around for two hours, it seems all we can do now is adjourn in an effort to play inter-chamber games. Our towns have been waiting for their highway funds; they deserve them, and we have the chance to deliver them. Instead, we adjourn and head home.”

Rep. Komline of Dorset explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

We had an opportunity today to take up S. 145 – a bill that would have given our towns the highway aid payments that they are due.

It is unfortunate that this body was reluctant to support our towns during these difficult times.”

Rep. Scheuermann of Stowe explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Towns throughout Vermont have been clamoring for the restoration of the FY 2009 Town Highway Aid Program to ensure they don’t have to raise local property taxes. We had an opportunity today to do just that. As the Chair of the Stowe Select Board, I am extremely disappointed.”

Page 41

Rep. Cheney of Norwich explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted yes for jobs, for clean energy, for locally generated renewable power sources with stable, predictable rates that will support our Vermont economy.”

Rep. Fagan of Rutland City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Additional 1.5% return on investment guaranteed to developers, absent the repayment of costs for projects never brought on-line and absent preferential rates set by the legislature in lieu of PSB set rates, I support this bill.”

Rep. Hubert of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

A vote for IBM. Not for higher rates.”

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

The concern over this bill’s possible minimal impact on ratepayers for renewable energy somehow was missing from those voices when we discussed a \$450 million decommissioning deficit a few weeks ago.

Apparently, ratepayers only need protection from small costs, not large ones.”

Rep. Savage of Swanton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted no, not because I am against clean renewable energy – nothing further from the truth.

In my district, there are 3000 electric customers that have enjoyed the benefit of hydropower for well over 100 years. And 18 years ago made a major investment to expand the facilities. We now have the second lowest residential rates in the state with no rate increase in 17 years.

We should be focusing on larger scale renewable projects for better cost effectiveness.”

Page 42

Rep. Atkins of Winooski explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted no because the term “waters” was too broadly used.

I could have voted yes had our two largest lakes been selected.”

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Members who have voted to oppose a bill, rarely then seek to substantially expand its scope. When they do I’d like a committee to examine the implications, so I voted no for now.”

Rep. Webb of Shelburne explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This amendment is very interesting but raises more questions than answers. These questions must be thoroughly developed and investigated as to meaning and implications in a different forum other than a floor amendment.”

Page 43

Rep. Branagan of Georgia explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Even a little help is good for the farmers in my district. We need to make up our minds to support Vermont farmers and give them an advantage wherever possible, or we’re going to lose them all.”

Page 44

Rep. Bray of New Haven explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Today is the 39th anniversary of the very first Earth Day on which 20 million Americans, 10% of the population, marched to call for an end to business as usual and its wide-reaching damage to our environment.

In the 39 intervening years we have continued to use and abuse our environment. To be responsible stewards of the earth we have inherited, we must make changes and do better than “business as usual”. H. 446 is a modest but important step toward environmental health and sustainability, and it is fitting that we do this on Earth Day 2009..”

Rep. Edwards of Brattleboro explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

The words “sustainable” and “renewable” are not just catch phrases or marketing terms used in glossy tourist brochures. In passing this bill we demonstrate leadership that moves us beyond the status quo. This bill will give renewable energy producers a way to grow their businesses, create hundreds of jobs and move us to a more secure, less volatile energy future! It lists barriers and represents a bright spot in our future. We all benefit.”

Rep. Donovan of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Today the President of the United States is visiting a wind tower production facility to highlight that our energy policy needs to create jobs and reduce our dependence on fossil fuels. H. 446 is the right bill at the right time!.”

Rep. Fagan of Rutland City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Absent the three points I raised yesterday, I support this bill.”

Rep. French of Shrewsbury explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Nearly everyone agrees that we need to increase our capacity for renewable and sustainable energy for many reasons. That lip service often goes no further if there is a cost rise involved. Consequently, we never take the first step.”

Rep. Jerman of Essex explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I support every section of this bill. It will move small to medium size non-global energy projects past the talking phase at minimal cost to ratepayers.

The section of the bill that helps IBM to meet its energy efficiency goals in a pilot project is just one strong piece of a very strong bill. My yes vote has nothing to do with where I live.”

Rep. Klein of East Montpelier explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes on H. 446 because this bill walks the walk instead of just talking the talk when it comes to the development of renewable energy.”

Rep. Kilmartin of Newport City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

No.! This bill represents the penultimate “flat earth mentality. It forces the use of energy sources that are too costly and unreliable. It will increase rates to residential and commercial customers. It will drive manufacturing jobs from Vermont, which will in turn require an increase in residential rates on customers who no longer have a sustainable income stream. Price and cost setting assumes a level of clairvoyance for which this House is particularly unsuited and ill-equipped. The Public Service Board lacks the capability of finding the right numbers. The phrases “An economic analysis” and “a generic cost” are two examples of the subjections and incomprehensible duties we are imposing on the Public Service Board. When is “fair”, “fair”? When is “enough”, “enough”, When is “sufficient incentives”, sufficient incentives”? When is a “reasonable approximation”, a “reasonable approximation”? One thing I can say for sure, H. 446 is an excellent example of linguistic nonsense..”

Rep. McCullough of Williston explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted for H. 446 because it inserts sustainable renewable energy; thereby promoting Vermont economic growth and recovery, the reduction of greenhouse gases, and directs Vermonters toward a future of energy security with lower full cycle costs.”

Rep. Mrowicki of Putney explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Today is Earth Day when our President is moving us past the dark ages of the past eight years when we’ve been without an energy policy that exceeds three words.

Today I vote yes to move the U.S. towards energy policy that protect all Vermonters economically and environmentally for today, tomorrow and for generations to come.”

Rep. Waite-Simpson of Essex explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

It has been said that I voted for this bill because it benefits a large business in my community. That is true and is important to me. But more importantly, I vote ‘yes’ for my children so that they can enjoy Vermont in the years ahead that they have clean air to breathe and clean water to drink. I currently pay over \$2,000 per year for electricity – paying a bit more to guarantee my children’s future is my obligation and I fulfill it willingly.”

Page 45

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

The concept that school boards could collectively reduce their budgets by \$60 million in a few weeks time was completely unrealistic. It did at least raise a valid issue of attempting to include school budget cuts on the table along with all other spending to spread the impact of cuts. However, it is completely inaccurate to describe it as having been a proposal to raise property taxes.”

Rep. Howard of Rutland City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote to oppose this \$63 million dollar property tax increase, a proposal which was made earlier by the Governor and according to the non-partisan joint fiscal office’s real actual and existing analysis of the

Governor's budget would resulting a \$.13 per \$100 of assessed value increase in the property taxes paid by Vermonters."

Page 46

Rep. Kilmartin of Newport City explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

No! I was sent here to approve expenditures. I would violate my oath of office by authorizing a small coterie of unrepresentative persons to approve of anything other than a reduction in expenditures. This is clearly an unconstitutional delegation of power."

Page 47

Rep. Ainsworth of Royalton explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

Although I have concerns about the sale of raw milk, this bill is better than current law."

Rep. Clark of Vergennes explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I'm voting no, not because there isn't any interest in the bill in my district, but because of the liability that could occur as an unintended consequence of this bill's passage."

Rep. Pugh of South Burlington explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes, but reluctantly due to my concerns about the health risks. However, regulating the sale is better for the consumer than the current unregulated practice. I look forward to amendments tomorrow adding additional testing for disease and bacteria."

Rep. Waite-Simpson of Essex explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I have great concerns about the health risks in consuming raw milk. I vote "yes" because current law poses a greater health risk than the bill we are considering."

Page 49

Rep. Webb of Shelburne explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

While I agree that raw milk should not receive the Vermont Seal of Quality at this point, I believe this amendment is unnecessary.

The Agency of Agriculture is the appropriate agency and already has criteria in place as to the standards required to receive our precious, guarded Vermont Seal of Quality. In addition, suppliers will not be advertising their product."

Page 50

Rep. Andrews of Rutland City explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I am concerned about young people without strong parental and community guidance who may slip through the cracks and be penalized for their ignorance. I would support a plan to remind and educate them about their responsibilities at the time they apply for a license, but this feels like an unwarranted intrusion of Federal requirements into our state business. I also feel this proposal should be reviewed by the House committee on General, Housing and Military Affairs."

Page 51

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I support the effort to craft a balanced approach to the sex offender registry. I very much regret the unnecessary and unrelated extension of law to sending the fingerprints of persons to the FBI central database from the point of arrest, prior to any judicial review.”

Rep. Myers of Essex explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted yes on the good work of the Judiciary committee, but I resent the move to circumvent the committee process by the addition of an amendment which should have been decided by the committee to which the question was first presented.”

Rep. Nease of Johnson explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted yes. That’s twice today that the member from Guildhall and I have voted in agreement. It must be that the end is near... the end of the session, I mean.”

Page 52

Rep. Ainsworth of Royalton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Once again within a year of the start-up of a program and with no record of experience and no cost or enrollment numbers we expand another program. All is well at Lake Woebegone.”

Rep. Dickinson of St. Albans Town explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote reluctantly for this amendment. I strongly support pre-K education, but feel in these difficult economic times, we must not expand the existing program and lift the caps without understanding the full cost of this section.”

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Our fiscal situation is getting progressively worse. We are facing tax increases. Our property tax equity system remains dysfunctional, and we have done repeated studies on the impact of mandates. We will be asking our schools next year to either cut more or raise property taxes. This underlying bill and this amendment are excellent initiatives. But we are cutting human services programs that – just like this expansion – save money through early interventions. It comes at a time that we are being forced to retrench on other critical programs that invest in our children, that fight poverty, and that would help rebuild our economy. What will it take us to get the message?”

Rep. Milkey of Brattleboro explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This amendment is penny wise and pound foolish. The money spent on early education services helps our children succeed in school, rather than starting school un-ready, falling further behind each year, possibly dropping out before they complete high school – or, possibly ending up under the auspices of the department of corrections. How much does that cost? Opposing this amendment is a “no brainer”.”

Rep. Pearce of Richford explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted in committee to not remove the cap because of a particular situation in my community. So I vote

that way again today, however, I fully support the rest of the bill.”

Rep. Peltz of Woodbury explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted against this amendment and for full access to pre-K programs. Vermont is the envy of the country for the quality of its schools, and it all begins with our youngest students..”

Page 53

Rep. McFaun of Barre Town explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted yes on this amendment because when this bill was presented it was said under findings that this act is necessary to increase transparency for consumers by requiring disclosure of allowable expenditures and gifts to health care providers and facilities providing health care. This amendment did just exactly that. It insured all gifts and allowable expenditures would be reported on a per person per occurrence basis.”

Page 54

Rep. Zuckerman of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted yes because I believe we should hold all humans who make critical decisions for others, whether doctors or politicians, to the same standard. I support the underlying bill and hope we will hold ourselves to the same standard next year.”

Page 55

Rep. French of Shrewsbury explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote no on this amendment. If there is a real benefit to low income patients from free drug samples it’s hard to imagine that many doctors would discontinue providing them solely because of so-called security risks or possible faulty reporting.”

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Passage of this amendment was important to ensure that low and moderate income Vermonters can continue to access prescriptions that are so important to them. We know some doctors will stop signing for these samples as a result of this requirement. I hope the Senate fixes this, and protects these vulnerable Vermonters.”

Rep. Zuckerman of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I too greatly respect the opinion and medical advice of Dr. Richter. I hope all of those who voted yes on this amendment due to her expertise will also follow her medical advice and will support universal health care in the future.”

Page 56

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

No Vermonter can be unaware of the unsavory impact of pharmaceutical marketing efforts on our health care costs and services. Despite great resistance, this bill brings much needed transparency and responsibility to this problem at long last. Just as with our controlling data mining, we have taken a welcome step forward.”

Rep. Kilmartin of Newport City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

No! This is nothing but the theatre of the absurd, and a slap in the face of the integrity of health providers who are both my friends and neighbors.”

Page 57

Rep. Jerman of Essex explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I reluctantly vote no today because I think the Pre-K section of the bill misses the mark. The problem with Pre-K is that over forth school districts have no programs; no new programs have been started since we passed the original bill in 2007. We need another bi-partisan effort to work on the thorny budget questions that have stopped the Pre-K movement from reaching its full potential.”

Rep. McDonald of Berlin explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote no on S. 136 primarily because of the changes made to the Pre-K program regarding the elimination of the cap.

When the Pre-K bill was passed during the 2007-08 biennium, promises were made in this building regarding the cap. Those promises have now been broken.”

Page 58

Rep. Clarkson of Woodstock explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes, again, to ensure that adequate funds are available to return the Vermont site to its highest possible use as soon as possible after the closing of Vermont Yankee – whenever that may be. The possibility of waiting 60 to 100 years for an inadequately capitalized decommissioning fund to recover this site is unacceptable.”

Rep. Deen of Westminster explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I would like to congratulate the chair of the Natural Resources and Energy committee for taking the steps necessary to move H. 436 to passage this year. All of our parliamentary rules allow and welcome the steps taken to reach a decision that reflects the will of the majority of the Vermont House. On behalf of my constituents I am glad we have set the requirement in law that the decommissioning fund must be fully funded .”

Rep. Morrissey of Bennington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Process, process, process!!! Shame on this legislature for not honoring due process on this important issue. What has just been allowed to happen on this floor, this evening is beyond comprehension. It is totally disrespectful to all of the conference committees who have been hard at work to honorably complete the business of the state.

We just hit an all time low, Mr Speaker!

Rep. Mrowicki of Putney explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This bill protects Vermonters from supporting a bailout without oversight and giving corporate welfare to Entergy Louisiana. It ensures Vermonters don't have to cover their costs of doing business, while the profits go out of state, and that the money is there for decommissioning.

I applaud the work and time put into this over the course of the session by the Committee and the entire body.”

Rep. Reis of St. Johnsbury explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

We have driven another nail into the coffin of economic development in the state of Vermont.”

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote no tonight. This amendment does everything but shut Vermont Yankee down. I also want to make sure that the decommissioning fund is fully funded. However, I can’t understand why we don’t just stop fooling around with the closure issue and take the vote that many people in this room want to take. That is whether to close the plant or not. This could have been easily accomplished tonight by striking the last eight lines of this amendment. Again, we skirt the real issue (plant closure) to give us another opportunity to coerce more money out of the plants parent company. This is wrong!”

Page 59

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

My no vote is with regret, and was only with the intent to delay the bill until next year to assess the status of our economy and of our electric rates, and to allow fuller review of the Senate proposals. We often act too quickly in the rush to adjournment.”

Rep. French of Shrewsbury explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

The upside for the rate-payer in this bill is that by encouraging alternative and sustainable energy projects it puts in place a system to adapt to when the price of fossil fuels inevitably becomes prohibitive.”

Rep. Gilbert of Fairfax explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I didn’t support this bill in April as it is like a mandated cow power. I would have preferred incentives coincidental with a contract with electrical companies as they try to diversify their portfolios to meet the goal of 20% renewable. That position did not prevail, but I can now support this bill as it creates jobs, encourages investment and is a policy that is in the public interest.”

Rep. Lewis of Derby explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Looks like we’ve done it again. Another financial impact on Vermonters. If we keep it up a Vermonter will be an endangered species.”

Rep. McFaun of Barre Town explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I supported this bill in the past but after further review I see very clearly how the business entrepreneur is protected and I agree they should be. Unfortunately, I don’t see clearly how the consumer is protected and I feel that is just as important.”

Rep. Townsend of Randolph explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

The town of Randolph is excited about the opportunity to be a part of the Vermont Village Green Renewable Pilot Program.”

Page 60

Rep. Andrews of Rutland City explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes only because this bill provides significant safety improvements over current law. I am concerned that tier one sellers will not be required to register, and I continue to have grave concerns about the health risks posed by the sale of raw milk to the public.”

Rep. Lewis of Derby explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes even though I have issues with this bill, but it is better than the present law.”

Rep. Marcotte of Coventry explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I believe that adults should make their choice on what to eat and drink, but I vote no because our children must eat and drink what is put in front of them. They do not have the choice.”

Page 61

Rep. Clark of Vergennes explained his vote as follows

“Mr. Speaker:

I am pleased that with the exemption of samples from the reporting list, we have protected low and moderate income Vermonters.”

Rep. Copeland-Hanzas of Bradford explained her vote as follows

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes today because Vermonters should know the extent of the marketing money big

Pharmacy sends into Vermont. Despite this eleventh hour compromise, this bill still puts Vermont in the forefront of states willing to shine the light on the unnecessary 34% of revenues manufacturers put toward pushing their expensive drugs onto Vermonters struggling to afford their life-saving drugs”.

Rep. Fagan of Rutland City explained his vote as follows

“Mr. Speaker

This bill, while better than the previous version, still has great possibility to hurt our local business people who appreciate and count upon drug representative business.

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows

“Mr. Speaker:

This compromise bill still represents significant progress toward controlling the adverse

Impact of drug marketing on our state. However, I regret the fact that attaining that compromise required eliminating much needed transparency regarding exactly how much impact free samples have on prescribing patterns in Vermont.”

Page 62

Rep. Adams of Hartland explained his vote as follows

“Mr. Speaker:

Several weeks ago our legislative leaders feigned surprise that Vermont is in a financial crisis. They had been warned time and again since last October that the negative news received from the state economist would be coming and that this body needed to make hard decisions to stabilize and prepare Vermont for the tough times ahead. Instead we are preparing to continue with what has become our M.O.-raise taxes on hard-working Vermonters. We fail to remember or perhaps ignore that Vermonters pockets are not

bottomless and whose assets in these troubling times are not limitless. Thousand of Vermonters all across our beautiful state are getting by with less, or with very little at all. Business owners are experiencing sales so bad that they go without paying themselves and in some cases – closing their doors (perhaps for good) and putting their employees out of work. Homebuilders, contractors and others in the building trades are having the same issues as shopkeepers as new housing starts are at an all-time low. Realtors who are only compensated when a property sells have seen sales dwindle to a fraction of what they once were. Farmers make less on a gallon milk than what it costs them to produce it. Yet we under the Golden Dome continue putting more pressure on Vermonters that struggle hard to earn a living by requiring they open their wallets wider and send us more to fritter away on our favorite programs.

We need to remember, no we **must** remember, that government was instituted to be a protector of our rights, not a provider of privileges.”

Rep. Ainsworth of Royalton explained his vote as follows

“Mr. Speaker:

In passing this budget, the legislature has effectively refused to make the tough choices that all Vermonters are facing during these challenging economic times. Instead of living within our means and ensuring that we fund government at a level we can afford, Democratic leadership has placed over \$30 million in new taxes onto the backs of struggling Vermonters. I think one of our Senators put it best: we already knew that we can’t afford to live in Vermont, now we can’t afford to die, we can’t afford to move, and if we want to drown our sorrows in drink we can’t afford to that now either.”

Rep. Ancel of Calais explained her vote as follows

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted yes for a tax cut for low and middle income taxpayers for progressivity and for continued prosperity in our income tax structure.

43% of Vermonters will have lower income taxes as a result of today’s action. 54% will see no change. This is a tax policy we can be proud of.

Rep. Branagan of Georgia explained her vote as follows

“Mr. Speaker:

This weekend is the opening of the newest star Trek movie of which I am a long time fan. I dearly wished to attend the opening this weekend, but feeling strong responsibility to complete this legislation (and hope to make Vermont’s fiscal future better) kept me here.

After looking at this budget and revenue package, all I can say is “Beam me up Scottie”.

Rep. Clark of Vergennes explained his vote as follows

“Mr. Speaker:

We cannot build a loyal and trusting citizenry by taxing away their independence and initiative. If we continue to erode their confidence and trust by punishing their success, we chance never regaining their respect and trust. They know and we know that this budget attempts to escape the fiscal responsibility we have to all Vermonters over the next several years by evading our responsibility today. We need to adopt fiscal policies based on the sound fiscal policies that made this state so great: common sense, initiative, hard work and frugality.”

Rep. Dickinson of St. Albans Town explained her vote as follows

“Mr. Speaker:

Our job as legislators is to build a budget that the Vermont economy can support. We have less revenue and we must work together to find the balance between raising taxes and budget cuts that will protect our neediest citizens, provide necessary services and that will not threaten our struggling tax-payers and business community.

I regret that I cannot support a budget because it fails to address the economic reality that faces Vermonters today.

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows

“Mr. Speaker:

I am tired of leaving this building each year hanging my head because of the process by which we addressed the most significant issues facing the role of our government. I do not know how we look our constituents in the face. This year, in addition to all else, we addressed an economic crisis through decisions narrowed into a few weeks of time, outlined to us in a 132-page document received three hours ago. We have no contingency for the further downgrades likely in the months ahead.

I vote no for many of the reason identified by others regarding our fiscal sustainability and the substance of this bill. But I vote no even more so, because of the way we have conducted ourselves in its development and review.

In these past few days, I believe we have reached new heights in the travesty of process, and the abdication of our responsibility to our constituents and our state that occurs when we vote on major legislation on this floor without allowing time to think it through, ask questions, get information and make careful judgments that are appropriate to the gravity of the issues. I protest this vote.

Rep. Fagan of Rutland City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This budget chooses pet projects over scholarships for our Vermont students. It chooses conservation over economic development. It chooses a short-term band aid in lieu of a long-term solution. Mr. Speaker, this budget must do better to address the public’s interests.”

Rep. Fisher of Lincoln explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This is a very tough budget package for me to come around to support. I know the impacts of the cuts we have made here. I know the lives that will be impaired.

When people say we have not made the tough decisions, I say they don’t know the people who will be most impacted.

Yet a balance has been found here. While I would call for enough revenue to provide for a sound safety net, this is a supportable compromise. I am thankful that many far worse cuts have been avoided. I am thankful for this good work on behalf of all Vermonters.”

Rep. French of Shrewsbury explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Over a two year period with the help of AARA funding specifically designated to be used in that manner, this body has made over 400 million dollars in cuts while only raising 21.4 million in new revenue. A remarkable achievement in an extraordinary economic climate. Sounds like a lot of hard choices to me.”

Rep. Higley of Lowell explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Vermonters need their legislators to be responsible with their money now more than ever. I vote “no” on this irresponsible budget.”

Rep. Howard of Rutland City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I support this budget because it includes a middle class tax cut for the hardworking Vermonters. According to the non-partisan analysis of JFO 43% of Vermonters will get a tax reduction as a result of this proposal at a time when they need it the most.”

Rep. Hubert of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted no on the budget today for the following reasons:

1. In the economic hard times we are in now, hard working Vermonters need a break from more taxes.
2. The tax increases you are asking for are flawed (DLC 4.4 million) cigarette tax 2.50 per carton and 100% increase in all other tobacco products. This will not increase revenues, but will send 15 to 50% of our tax dollars to other states.
3. We need cuts, not more taxes.”

Rep. Hube of Londonderry explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

To characterize the steps taken to balance the 2120 budget as adjustments or cuts is a disservice to the people of this state.

Roughly 40% of the \$59 million in cuts are nothing more than cost shifts or raids – this is net of the additional \$.03 per \$100 tax reduction that truly is owed to Vermont property owners.

Hopefully, we will be recipients of divine intervention when constructing our 2011 and 2012 budgets as we will have run out of smoke and mirrors.”

Rep. Johnson of South Hero explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

In two years Vermont has seen a cumulative \$423 million budget gap. Less than 5% of that - \$21.3 million – has been in new revenues. This budget spreads responsibility fairly across all Vermonters. Some Vermonters will see a decrease in services. Some will see very slight increases in taxes. All will see a long-term reduction in marginal tax rates. I support this difficult, responsible budget.”

Rep. Koch of Barre Town explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This bill demonstrates this legislature’s inability to make the hard decisions needed to assure Vermonters’ financial health. It preserves pet programs in a time when belt tightening is in order, and it manifests an attitude that the taxpayers can always be tapped for just a little more.”

Rep. Lewis of Derby explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This could be the final straw that will break the back of Vermonters.”

Rep. Lawrence of Lyndon explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

In this budget, we have instituted an elimination of the capital gains exemption that is retroactive to January 1, 2009. How can we do this to elderly Vermonters who use these funds for their income, to family businesses, farmers, and loggers who have already made financial decisions based on the exemption in place:

We have pulled the rug out from under many Vermonters – we have broken their trust and faith in government.”

Rep. Maier of Middlebury explained his vote as follows

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote YES to support a budget that supports health care for Vermonters. In these difficult economic times, people all over the country who lose their jobs also lose their health care. That is not true in Vermont and I

am proud of our state.”

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows

“Mr. Speaker:

“Hard times require hard decisions. Those charged with preparing this budget asked us all over and over and over again for explanations as to how they could approach that task in better ways. So few explanations then, so many now after the fact and after the hard work is all done.”

Rep. McAllister of Highgate explained his vote as follows

“Mr. Speaker:

At a time when Vermont families and small businesses are reducing their spending in order to pay their bills and stay in business, the state, in this budget, is increasing its spending and using \$40 million in new, additional taxes on Vermonters to do so. It’s as if we just applied for a new credit card to pay for a shopping spree, only this time, it’s Vermonters who are going to have to pay the balance and interest payments for years and years to come.”

Rep. Minter of Waterbury explained her vote as follows

“Mr. Speaker:

“Any budget in these economic times needs to use multiple strategies to maintain economic security, ensure safe neighborhoods, strong communities, excellent schools and social stability. We are all in this together and Vermonters want to see the compromise, responsibility and leadership, which this budget provides. I support this budget, not just because it makes me feel good, but because it faces our economic challenges in a responsible way. Our state revenues are rapidly declining and this budget asks Vermonters to weather this economic storm together. It asks for sacrifice from those most in need of state services while asking more from those with income security. This budget asks from all sectors, including the education fund, in these economic times.”

Rep. Morrissey of Bennington explained her vote as follows

“Mr. Speaker:

“It is with a heavy heart that today I cannot support a 2010 appropriations bill as presented. The appropriations bill is the most critical piece of legislation we pass during a session.

Mr. Speaker, we had a tremendous opportunity, especially in these difficult times to have our committees prioritize their work to address the efficiencies and the inefficiencies in state government.

This bill does nothing to plan for our near certain future reductions in state revenue, relies heavily on temporary “tax payers” federal dollars and places us at the edge of a cliff that we will fall off in 2 years or less.

The budget today, is unsustainable, and does little to plan for our state’s future.

Our constituents were looking for us to help to provide some stability as they continue to struggle with their own financial challenges. Unfortunately, I fear we have only added to them now and long into the future.”

Rep. Mrowicki of Putney explained his vote as follows

“Mr. Speaker:

This budget provides medicine for elders, hardly a pet project. It assists single mothers struggling in poverty that would have been cut, and on and on. It does cut \$60 million but balances the cuts with an even-handed compassion. I’m proud of the legislative leadership that has stepped up to present a budget that faces our responsibilities without forsaking our neighbors in need.”

Rep. Poirier of Barre City explained his vote as follows

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted yes, while not agreeing with all the provisions, because in January the Governor announced that he was going to cut 600 state employee positions, regardless of how they were funded. The Governor has shown no respect to the state employees during these past 4 months, and no desire to negotiate a responsible compromise.

Fortunately, the conference committee adopted language to treat the Vermont workforce as professionals and with dignity.”

Rep. South of St. Johnsbury explained his vote as follows:

Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes because this bill supports the resident’s of St. Johnsbury and the NEK with good paying jobs at the correctional center which also helps support area business.

Rep. Stevens of Waterbury explained his vote as follows:

Mr. Speaker:

I strongly supported this budget – it expresses the American ideal of compromise and extraordinary times require extraordinary measures, rather than take political potshots at each other. I hope next year our desire to address the fundamental deficiencies of funding our government overwhelms our political divide.

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

Mr. Speaker:

It is with great disappointment I vote no on this budget. We have failed to make fundamental change and structural reform. We have increased spending and nearly every tax imaginable. Rather than work together the entire legislative session to find workable solutions, we passed a political document that faces a certain veto. Today we have failed Vermonters on our most basic obligation: Do No Harm. The dark clouds and gathering storm outside, as we vote today, are symbolic of the action we took today. Passage of this budget would result in thunderous harm to Vermont’s economy.

Rep. Branagan of Georgia explained her vote as follows

“Mr. Speaker:

Preparation of a balanced sustainable and responsible budget is the most important task of the Legislature. The Governor vetoed this budget because H. 441 does not fit that definition.

I support the veto and am extremely concerned about the nearly \$200 million deficit it creates in 2011 and 2012.”

Rep. Cheney of Norwich explained her vote as follows

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted yes to support a budget that reduces income-tax rates for low and middle-income earners; to support a budget that includes millions of dollars in difficult cuts while maintaining the safety net of critical state services; and to support a budget that brings in new revenue without the disastrous shift to the property tax that would have cost Vermonters a great deal more.”

Rep. Clark of Vergennes explained his vote as follows

“Mr. Speaker:

This budget increases spending and raises taxes on hard working Vermont families who can ill afford it. It is irresponsible and shameful to abuse their trust this way.”

Rep. Dickinson of St. Albans Town explained her vote as follows

“Mr. Speaker:

Our job as Legislators is to build a budget that all Vermonters can afford and that will support the Vermont economy.

We must determine the best way to balance the costs of state services, the needs of our most vulnerable citizens, while recognizing the demands made on our struggling taxpayers and business community. I vote to sustain the Governor’s veto and it is a vote for all of us to work toward a better budget that is reflecting the reality of Vermont’s economy in the next few years. I think we can do better for hard working Vermonters.”

Rep. Donaghy of Poultney explained his vote as follows

“Mr. Speaker:

At a time when state government should be reducing the cost of operations, like businesses and households throughout this state must, this budget increases the cost of government by 26 million dollars of taxpayers money.

At a time when Vermonters are hurting financially, this Legislature has the audacity to ask more from them. How Shameful !!

Rep. Geier of South Burlington explained his vote as follows

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted to override the Governor’s veto because of what I heard last week at the public hearing. I want to thank the leadership for holding those two days of hearings, eight hours total where over 100 Vermonters spoke in favor of this bill. Only a handful spoke in opposition and those mostly calling for compromise.

I believe we are driving along the rim of a potential disaster. This vote requires us to begin work July 1st to assure we don’t drive over the cliff.”

Rep. Lanpher of Vergennes explains her vote as follows

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes today to uphold the budget passed by this body because, I believe this budget is in the best interest of Addison-3 by keeping a compromise holding taxes as low as possible, while providing the much needed services in this tough time for many citizens in my district. Thank you Mr. Speaker.”

Rep. Lorber of Burlington explained his vote as follows

“Mr. Speaker:

We are all in the family car, and we are out of gas. We have to make it to the top of the hill. Everyone gets out of the car and pushes. Even Grandma. That’s the budget before us.

Some argue, “don’t ask Buddy to help, even though he’s the strongest one in the car, because if we did, then Buddy might go to New Hampshire.”

I voted yes to support the rules of the car, “less whining, more pushing.”

Rep. McDonald of Berlin explained her vote as follows

I believe this was a session of lost opportunities. We had the time and should have had the willingness to work together to the benefit of the people we serve and to ensure and reinforce the economic viability of this State. I am very concerned that the future will now require more difficult decisions – deeper cuts and higher taxes.

Rep. Morrissey of Bennington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

My vote to sustain today’s veto represented my greatest wish for the legislature and the administration to

go back to the table to iron out a sustainable and responsible budget for all Vermonters. My vote today does not represent my concern as to “the shift of power” in this building or who’s posturing to run for Governor or Lt. Governor in 2010, as has been highlighted in headlines and newscasts across Vermont as what seems to be a top priority for some of my colleagues.

My vote today represents my concern for my constituents back home and for all Vermont taxpayers who are truly struggling in these tough economic times. Let’s get back to the table for I do have faith that we can do this through further hard work and compromise from all sides.”

Rep. Peaslee of Guildhall explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I contend that for a nation (state) to try to tax itself into prosperity is like a man standing in a bucket and trying to lift himself up by the handle. – Winston Churchill.”

Rep. Stevens of Shoreham explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

As town moderator I ask people to speak. As a mediator I ask people to listen. Last week I asked administration and legislative leadership to listen to each other. You, Mr. Speaker, gave it an honest effort in order to avoid this vote.

I want to thank you for that.”

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote to sustain the Governor’s veto. The reason or the need for this vote today is very disappointing to me. The breakdown in negotiations between leadership and the administration has set up this showdown. A showdown that is politically motivated and definitely not in the best interest of our constituents. I feel that this breakdown is bad for Vermonters and bad for Vermont in general.

Further, I feel that this budget would have been improved if all parties would have negotiated in good faith and stayed at the table until the job was done. Compromise is the foundation of our government and is absolutely essential to its continued viability.

Too much or too little power undermined the effectiveness of these negotiations and may have the potential for a very bad long-term effect on the process. I feel that this is the case with this budget bill. A point proven by the introduction of new language today, designed to correct the most obvious and serious problems with the bill approved by this legislature and subsequently vetoed by the Governor. My only hope is that this vote does not set a precedent or establish a tone for the next session and beyond. At this point in time, one of the most challenging economic periods in history, Vermont and all Vermonters in general need us to work together to solve our problems and to chart a course for the future of our state.”

Rep. Wheeler of Derby explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

One way or another I am ready to move on to work for the good of Vermonters but I am saddened that the so-called public hearings were held in the middle of the week, in the middle of the day, when many Vermonters were too busy trying to make a living. I think that shows just how out of touch we in the legislature can be when it comes to understanding the lives of average Vermonters.”

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Two roads diverged in a woods... one sent us down the road of overriding the Governor’s veto. That road leads us to a steep cliff, a cliff that leads to fiscal instability and a budget that is not sustainable. The other road, sustaining the Governor’s veto, led to compromise, what Vermonters expected. This process served some politicians well, but Vermonters poorly.”

Rep. Zuckerman of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

While this budget is not what I would have preferred, the alternatives, in every way, are worse. Further reliance on property taxes would only hurt our small businesses and our schools even more than this budget does. It is one thing to vote against this budget and complain, it is quite another to actually take ownership for the alternatives and their further impacts on hard working Vermonters. I also want to add that even with the new tax package, we are actually collecting far fewer revenues from Vermonters than last year.”

Rep. Adams of Hartland explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

How many times does it take to get a budget right? It obviously wasn't once nor was it twice. This is attempt number three and I vote yes because there are a few positives included, thanks to our Governor pointing out the fallacies of the original document. I continue to be saddened that we couldn't do what previous legislatures have done – pass a clean, balanced and responsible budget.”

Rep. Bray of New Haven explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I have voted yes two days running, knowing full well yesterday that the companion bill publically announced last week, and before us today as H. 442, were offered as a package of bills. Yesterday's H. 441 budget was 161 pages and 3381 lines long, containing many, many compromises. Today's companion bill was a further compromise, an explicit response to the Governor's veto message.

We can improve our process, but let's not confuse a lack of consensus with a lack of compromise. We can improve our performance, but let's not confuse disagreement with a lack of respect.

H. 441 and H. 442 combined reflect a fiscally and socially responsible strategy for helping all Vermonters come through this economic downturn to build the better state we all desire.”

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Our country was founded upon principles of shared power. Fundamental to it is the transparent and open process of government.

Yesterday's vote was a scam – a scam perpetuated upon this body and the people of Vermont. We were told that we were voting on whether to uphold the budget passed by this Legislature in May, not that we were voting on a budget with pending, substantive, revisions already decided upon.

Our acts today are a culmination of a session in which the deliberative process was eviscerated not only to the point of repeated errors, but also with a growing disrespect for our obligation to stewardship of the democratic process.”

Rep. Donaghy of Poultney explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Vermonters, I would like to thank you, Governor Douglas, for your leadership and impetus in bringing about these much needed changes as we see in H. 442.

It's too bad we did it the way we did.”

Rep. Fagan of Rutland City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Employers in our state volunteered to be a part of the solution regarding unemployment compensation. They volunteered to increase the taxes they pay into the fund and asked that recipients of benefits take a small reduction in benefits. The Representative from Burlington yesterday said that we should all get out

of the car and push, this bill allows those who receive benefits to remain in the car and hot help. Is this how we thank those who volunteer to help!.”

Rep. Flory of Pittsford explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Although I believe this is akin to putting bubble gum in a cracked dike, I vote yes because we are finally starting to address some of the fiscal issues many of us have been pushing for since January.

Hopefully, we can all work together in January to establish a viable, sustainable budget on the first try.

Hopefully, the bubble gum will hold the dam back until then.”

Rep. Kilmartin of Newport City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes, but oh so reluctantly. The process behind H. 442 and the override of the Governor’s veto shows a level of political gamesmanship that violates the rules and reveals the highest level of hypocrisy. The improvements in the budget of the Democratic caucus are marginal at best, but have been carefully contrived to attempt to obfuscate the awfulness of the budget. Make no mistake, H. 441 has been unmasked as a travesty injurious to the people of Vermont. H. 442 cannot remask what has been unmasked..”

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This conference report makes several improvements in our already strong budget work. It continues to carry out our responsibility to be both responsible and protect those Vermonters who need it most. That is why it passed so overwhelmingly in this House. No explanation changes that reality.”

Rep. Poirier of Barre City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

While there are good components to H. 442, I voted no because I cannot support any legislation that negates on a commitment to the working people of Vermont. \$13.00 may not seem like a large amount, but it is if, you have lost your job..”

Rep. Reis of St. Johnsbury explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This so-called “companion bill” is nothing more than sugarcoating on the poison pill this body fed to Vermonters yesterday, with the budget bill.”

Rep. Savage of Swanton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted yes on H. 442 reluctantly. I feel that it will provide Vermonters some protection from the erupting sewer that we call H. 441..”

Rep. Scheuermann of Stowe explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

While there are provisions in this bill that will improve the tragedy we passed yesterday, we did not address the underlying problems of the budget – the large spending increases, the large tax increase, and the \$200 million hole. Simply put, this legislature failed the people of Vermont. We failed to do our jobs – what Vermonters expected us to do to get us through this economic crisis.

H. 442 simply tries to cover up our failures and I will not be a part of it.”

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I support H. 442 because it makes a seriously flawed bill marginally better. But this “companion” budget legislation was negotiated first in the press, next by a small number of legislators – but never in an appropriate manner.... Working together with the Governor and the minority. This process was anything but open and transparent and has further served to undermine this body’s credibility.”

Rep. Zuckerman of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I have never been in the party of power. But I have not felt the process has been disrespected by this leadership or any other in the thirteen years I have been in the Legislature.”

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

A poor Vermonter who has a gain in their retirement account pays tax on every cent of that gain. This amendment would have given a 40% tax break on the same exact gain to a wealthy Vermonter if it happens outside a retirement account. That’s not fair and it’s not the Vermont way. That’s why I voted no.”

Rep. Scheuermann of Stowe explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

With this vote, we had a choice to drastically raise taxes on our struggling senior citizens or not. By choosing to raise the capital gains tax on them. Vermont seniors will be disappointed that we, in fact, just made their lives and retirement that much more difficult.”

Rep. Webb of Shelburne explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

While I would like to support this amendment, I do not believe it can be accomplished without revisiting the entire bill to balance the difference.”
