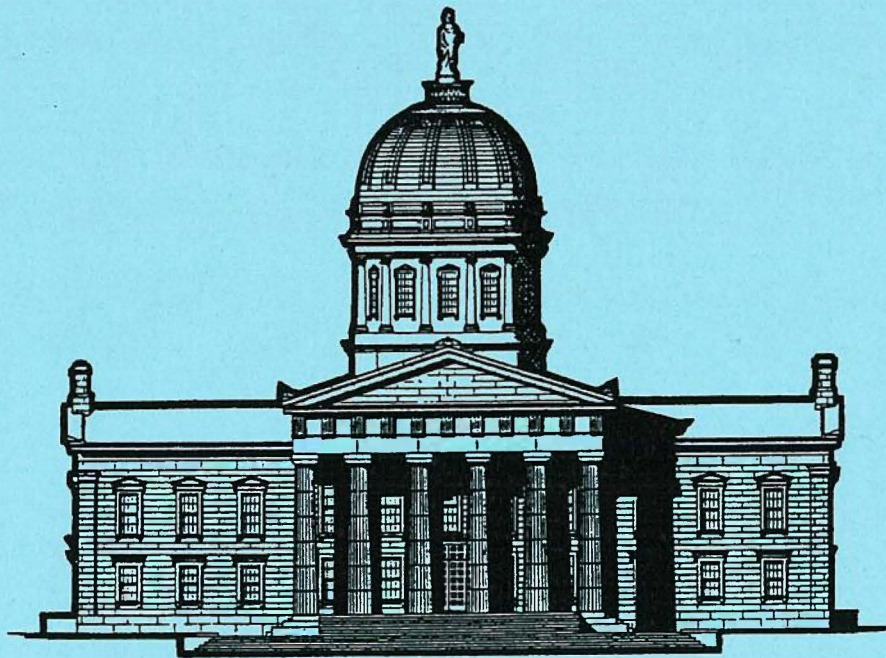

Vote Explanations

Page 1

H.265 – Shall the bill be read a third time?

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

All of us like good education and none of us like paying for it. If anyone knows of a method better than the one we have, let them propose it. All that is required is that it be constitutional, that it raise sufficient funds and that it convince a majority that it actually is better. I have waited for 10 years for one of the critics to present that but somehow I never actually see it."

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

A five cent increase in the tax rate this year and potentially a ten or even fifteen cent increase next year just to maintain the funding for programs that we currently require our schools to deliver is not acceptable to me. A vote to increase the statewide education property tax rate today does not address the underlying spending problem with our education system. Vermont education spending is growing at a pace far greater than that of the revenue sources needed to fund it. This has been blamed on the school boards, the voters or even the Governor (no matter what party he/she might be from). Yes, the school boards have made some choices, the voters have a choice to support the budget or not and the Governor can choose to fully fund the transfer from the general fund to education fund or not. All of which have occurred in the recent past. However, the policies adopted by this body have had a direct impact on what it costs to operate our schools as well. Ultimately this body has the obligation and the authority to address this problem in a manner that will put us back on a sustainable spending path. I feel that it is essential for this body to recognize that we cannot continue turning a blind eye to the real problem and accept responsibility for addressing it. Providing small school grants while encouraging consolidation is contradictory. Maintaining the current student/teacher ratios is not possible. Adding new programs or more unfunded mandates should not be an option. Increasing property tax rates and other revenue sources does not address the true and underlying problem of unsustainable growth in spending. Therefore, I cannot support this tax rate increase. Thank you."

H.265 – Shall the bill be amended as recommended by Rep. Browning of Arlington?

Rep. Browning of Arlington explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I regret that my attempt to ease the burden of the property tax rates on Vermonters has failed. I regret that the House has again put state needs and priorities above those of property taxpayers and again shirked a chance to fulfill their responsibility to fund their share of education."

H.265 – Shall the amendment as offered by Rep. Lippert of Hinesburg substitute the amendment as offered by Rep. Scheuermann?

Rep. Conquest of Newbury explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I applaud this amendment's author for trying to find a middle-ground. But I voted against it because it replaces an amendment that I believe requires of us a greater commitment to action - a greater commitment toward the same goal. Still, I look forward next year to considering what I hope will be the work of both

the Education committee and the Ways and Means committee, working together to examine and improve our education finance system."

Rep. Komline of Dorset explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

The attitude in this body with regard to Property Tax Reform is always "No, because...". We need a "Yes, if..." approach. The Scheuermann amendment gave us a date certain to come up with a property tax reform. It would have given us the impetus for this new change-in-thinking attitude. We have missed this opportunity."

Rep. Lippert of Hinesburg explained his vote as follow:

"Mr. Speaker:

In offering this amendment, I choose faith in our deliberative process and collaboration within our Ways and Means committee, over language of "shock and awe".

Rep. Manwaring of Wilmington explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

While the pain of property taxes may lead the call for change in our present education funding system, the problem is much larger. No matter what funding mechanism we have had in recent decades, nor how much money is spent, we still have too many students who don't perform at acceptable levels during their time in school and too many students who do graduate but arrive at college unprepared to do the work required. In order to address this, I hope an effort will evolve that not only encompasses the spirit of the amendments presented today, but also: 1. Recognizes that how money gets out of the education fund is fundamentally a different question than how it gets into the fund; 2. Examines out of the box solutions that are designed to align the goals and outcomes of both State policy/administration with those of every school. 3. Recognizes that the work of achieving outcomes resides in the schools and that unless the State is prepared to take over and run the schools, a framework is needed which moves from directing and penalizing to one of enabling and rewarding. 4. Understands that Education decisions in the present system are driven by 'head' issues (the numbers, funding pathways, administrative structures) as much as they are by the 'heart' which wants value for kids, for communities, for the investments they make."

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

Any Vermont farmer knows that you don't tear your barn down without a plan to pay for the new one. This substitute amendment simply confirms that we need to have a real replacement education financing plan before, not after, throwing out the only one we have."

Rep. Scheurmann of Stowe explained her vote as follows:

Mr. Speaker:

While I am pleased this debate happened today, the result is extremely disappointing. We had an opportunity to say to Vermonters that we hear and understand their concern and anxiety about property taxes, and that we are actually committed to taking action. Instead, we have asked for yet another report. UCLA Coach Bob Wooden used to say, "Never mistake activity for achievement." Indeed, this is no achievement."

Page 5

H.315 – Shall the bill be read a third time?

Representative Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I thank the presenter of this bill for the commitment to also continue to work for full equality in health care benefits for another disenfranchised minority, those like myself with a mental illness.”

Representative Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Vermont recognizes that same-sex couples have all of the same rights and benefits that other couples enjoy. With the threat of a future lawsuit removed we feel that our citizens should not be discriminated in this arena.”

Page 6

H.107 – Shall the bill be amended as recommended by Rep. Browning of Arlington?

Rep. Browning of Arlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I regret that this body has chosen to leave the power to determine the availability to Vermonters of independent health care services of their choice to a body of unelected and unaccountable regulators.”

Rep. Copeland-Hanzas of Bradford explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

What this amendment is suggesting is, ‘Let’s establish a high profit, high cost niche in our health care economy and see if we can sink the system by completely killing all rational efforts to rein in health care inflation.’ “

Rep Mrowicki of Putney explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted no, because this amendment seeks to move us backward and keep us bound up in a system that is unsustainable, unaffordable and inaccessible. For us to move forward, I voted to support the work of your Health Care Committee and keep us on the path of health reform.”

Rep. Till of Jericho explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote no. To pass an amendment such as this with no testimony and without careful consideration of all the possible consequences would be reckless and potentially dangerous to health care access for many Vermonters.”

H.99 – Shall the bill be read a third time?

Rep. Browning of Arlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Equal pay for equal work is already required by law. This bill requires conversations between employers and employees about work arrangements in a way that I find an unnecessary and burdensome intrusion into the management of businesses. I vote against that.”

Rep. Buxton of Tunbridge explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

It is unacceptable to me that in 2013 working women in VT still make 16% less than working men. I support efforts to end unlawful discrimination and efforts to eliminate the systemic barriers that women face in participating fully in the workforce and economy.”

Rep. Davis of Washington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

For me, as a working woman and an equal ‘bread-winner’ for over 34 years, I think it is very important that we strengthen Vermont law (give it some teeth), give employees the ‘right to ask’ for flexible workplace arrangements without fear of retaliation and that we have consistent protections against retaliations.

As a working woman, I want fair and equal treatment. I support the bill.”

Rep. Wizowaty of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

In my life I have worked for good places where I was told I was not allowed to share my salary information with anyone else on the staff – nor were they. This bill will enable employees to ask without retaliation and to answer without retaliation if we choose to. It is an important step on the road to ensuring equal pay for equal work.”

H.510 – Shall the bill be amended as recommended by Rep. Hubert of Milton?

Rep. Hubert of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Over 13,000 people have signed this petition: Say no to increased gas tax. Vermont lawmakers are considering an 8 to 10 cent increase in Vermont’s gas tax. Such a tax will make gas in the state even more expensive, with total state and federal taxes of more than 53 cents per gallon. In addition, the proposal calls for automatic increases in the future, as well as including a sales tax component that will increase the tax whenever the price goes up. Tell Vermont lawmakers you are already paying enough!”

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

When I hear that 13,000 out of 630,000 Vermonters say they oppose a gas tax increase, I suspect that few of them realized that if we do as they ask we will forfeit \$45 million in federal funds, that it would result in failing roads and bridges, or that nearly one-third of our gas taxes are paid by visitors to our state and not by Vermonters. That is why I opposed this amendment and support the bill.”

Rep. Russell of Rutland City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote no on this amendment to end Amtrak passenger service in Vermont. Amtrak’s subsidy translates into upgrading our railroad infrastructure, as well as jobs, which boosts our state’s economy.”

Page 13

H.510 – Shall the bill be read a third time?

Rep. Browning of Arlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote no to protest a significant increase in the gas tax and to urge our House Transportation to do better to seek rational and sustainable funding sources for transportation, which is so important to Vermonters.”

Rep. Donohue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

Given constituent sentiments, I cannot go as far as this bill goes in both shifting to a percentage and indexing, and in not going further to ensure that all transportation taxes stay in the transportation fund."

Rep. Hebert of Vernon explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I reluctantly voted yes today. I think the indexing of the tax is not the right way to do tax policy. However, we have exhausted all the alternatives for paying for our infrastructure. We must maintain our roads and bridges and our communities cannot afford the burden of paying for this with local taxes."

Rep. Lanpher of Vergennes explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes. These funds are needed, not only to fix the aging and crumbling roads and bridges in our state and in our home districts, but also to stimulate Vermont's economy. These funds go directly to employ Vermonters and Vermont contractors."

Rep. Mrowicki of Putney explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

Our roads and bridges are broken and need fixing. We can pay now or pay later, but pay we will. The fiscally responsible way to go is with the good work of your Transportation Committee."

Rep. Myers of Essex explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I really wanted to vote for this bill. The maintenance of our transportation infrastructure is vitally important to the life and the economy of this state. But day after day I am hearing from my constituents who say 'no new taxes.' Today I received a note saying 'you are taxing the life out of the working class.' Therefore I voted no on this bill."

Rep. Savage from Swanton explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I have voted No on this year's Transportation Bill, not because I feel that our transportation network is not in need of serious attention. I have voted against this bill, not even for an increase in the gas tax; though not popular, we all know the need for critical repairs to our highways, bridges and culverts that will cost millions. It is the fact that in addition to an increase in this tax, there is as well a new formula that will put any future increases on 'auto-pilot.' In my opinion, this leads to a lack of oversight of future budgets of this agency. We have offered several amendments to avoid this increase and new formula. Unfortunately, none have passed. I am therefore forced to vote against, for the first time in my legislative career, the Transportation Bill."

Rep. Yantachka from Charlotte explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

When the public is constantly bombarded by paid partisan TV ads decrying any kind of tax increase without any rationale other than 'our taxes are too high', it is no surprise that we get many communications urging us to vote No. But voting No means that roads won't get repaired, bridges won't get repaired, and snow won't get plowed from our highways. It may be easier to vote NO, but it is much harder to analyze the legitimate needs of the people of Vermont and take the hard steps to meet those needs, and have the courage to vote YES."

Rep. Young of Glover explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

While I certainly don't want to pay more for gas, I'd rather fix the roads than see them get any worse and fix my car instead."

Page 14

H.99 – Shall the bill pass?

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

There are times that we overdo it in the balance between important public interests and burdens on our small businesses. This is one. And the next direction the bill suggests? Paid family leave? We are setting ourselves up for unintended and unsustainable consequences."

Rep. Pearson of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I'm proud to vote for this bill and of the work that went into it. Those that say this is a solution in search of a problem ought to ask their mothers, daughters, wives, sisters, or anyone else who makes 84 cents for every \$1 a man makes for equal work, to see if they agree."

Rep. Stuart of Brattleboro explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

It pains me to say that, during my over 30 years as a professional woman, with 14 years spent working in New York City and 19 here in Vermont, I experienced some of the most unfair and abusive treatment by a male supervisor who got paid twice as much as I did and who worked half as much as me and my staff of five. Mr. Speaker, do I believe our daughters need us to continue to fight for equal pay and fair treatment under the law? You bet. And, Mr. Speaker, I'm one of the lucky ones, I'm married to an attorney."

Page 15

H.510 – Shall the bill be amended as recommended by Rep. Koch of Barre Town?

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I remain distressed by the indexing to inflation. However, this amendment at least builds insistence on keeping transportation taxes in the transportation fund. We clearly do need to supplement the drop in transportation revenues. I vote yes so that, if this amendment passes, I will be able to change my vote to a yes on the underlying bill."

Rep. Lanpher of Vergennes explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I vote No on this amendment, not because I believe Transportation should not consider its responsibility to fund a portion of the state police, but because it has been considered and has been reduced by tens of millions over recent years. I believe it is not a solution to the Transportation funding gap to isolate a legitimate use of Transportation funds as a problem and then promote a public misconception that this funding of the State Police is a 'raid' or misuse. Thank you."

Rep Masland of Thetford explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I vote no. The member's concern about moving money out of the Transportation Fund notwithstanding, I note that since 1996 there have been transfers from the General Fund to the Transportation Fund totaling

over 24 million dollars. Members who would like to verify this fact may be referred to page 18 of the current version of fiscal facts.”

Rep. Russell of Rutland City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

As the committee has addressed by incorporating purification of transportation funds through Section 25 of this bill, I will vote no on this amendment. We are listening to our constituents and will continue to ensure our transportation needs are met judiciously and in a financially responsible manner.”

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

My yes vote reflects the message that I have been getting from constituents over and over: Keep the Transportation Fund pure. This amendment offered a formula to do that over a period of years and to say to voters, we hear you. It is time for us to solve this problem once and for all.”

Page 16

H.522 – Shall the bill be amended as recommended by Rep. Lippert of Hinesburg?

Rep. Burditt of West Rutland explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I stand not only in support of this amendment but also in support of the underlying bill. Many times we hear of tools needed to get a job done. This amendment adds another tool to the box that the main bill will fill. It shows the people we are serious about getting illegal drug problems under control and also the addicted the help they need.”

Rep. Donaghy of Poultney explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

We are going through a crisis of epidemic proportions with too many of our Vt. citizens becoming addicted to opiate prescription drugs. While H 522 goes a long way in addressing the problem, it is my opinion that we should go a little further by allowing drug diversion officers, under very controlled circumstances, to search the VPMS data base as part of a bona-fide investigation based upon a reasonable suspicion standard rather than a probable cause standard. This position is supported by our Gov. and by the Commissioner of Public Safety and should be included in this bill. Without its inclusion I cannot support this bill.”

Rep. Russell of Rutland City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I proudly vote ‘Yes’ to strengthen our Vermont communities and families. This is a big step in taking back our Green Mountain State. I thank all concerned in announcing this vital legislation.”

Page 17

H.520 – Shall the bill pass?

Rep. Cheney of Norwich explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Our leaky structures create a thirst for oil and other fossil fuels that is emptying our wallets and contributing to climate change. We are spending twice as much to heat our homes today than we did 10 years ago. By taking on this challenge, we can slow down climate change, save Vermonters money, and create jobs in the building industry. We cannot afford not to do this. Next year I hope we will add funding to the effort.”

Rep. Klein of East Montpelier explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

It’s a baby step forward but the problem is huge. We need to face that reality. We need to do much more and much sooner. If we don’t then we create a huge injustice to the generations that follow us.”

Rep. Morrissey of Bennington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Though I support many of the initiatives within H520, I cannot support this piece of legislation because it is mainly a result of the twenty-one million dollar CVPS/taxpayers of the State of Vermont payback agreement. The twenty-one million dollars should have been paid back to the rate payers and the state at the time of the CVPS/Green Mountain Power deal of last year.”

Rep. Mrowicki of Putney explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This bill puts us one step closer to our goals of a thoughtful, sustainable energy future. It will save us money through thermal efficiency, keep LIHEAP funds helping the needy, and it keeps Vermont ahead of other states in having an evolving plan for our energy future.”

Rep. Pearson of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This bill continues our work on the critical issue of thermal efficiency. That has repeatedly been identified by experts as the best thing we can do to combat climate change. I can only hope we will back up the committee’s excellent work with the investments needed to reach the laudable goals set in statute.”

Rep. Stuart of Brattleboro explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I thank the House Natural Resources and Energy Committee for their hard work crafting this excellent piece of legislation. This is the cost-effective right thing to do to mitigate global climate and to protect the earth for future generations.”

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I support many of the initiatives included in this bill. However, I voted ‘No’ because this is another example of an unfunded mandate. Expanding services and increasing eligibility without the necessary funding or resources required is not fiscally responsible. The costs associated with this bill are clearly outlined in the fiscal note prepared by the Joint Fiscal Office dated 3/21/13 and delivered to our desk this morning.”

Page 18

H.526 – Shall the bill be amended as recommended by Rep. Helm of Fair Haven?

Rep. Webb of Shelburne explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

The January, 2013 Act 138 report already answers the questions posed by this amendment. In addition, the underlying bill has an extensive process for property owners, municipalities, lake users, lake group’s and businesses to participate in shore protective standards. This amendment would simply be a waste of money.”

H.526 – Shall the bill be read a third time?

Rep. Donaghy of Poultney explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This is no more than eminent domain in camouflage. Lake St. Catherine is tested weekly and has been found to be in great shape, thank you. We don’t need this property rights invasion by the state.”

Rep. Koch of Barre Town explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Protecting Vermont’s lakes is extremely important, and I would like to support a good bill for that purpose. This bill, however, hands the Agency of Natural Resources a blank check and tells the Agency to fill in the blanks for us by defining “best practices” that will have the force of law. If I vote for this bill, I have no idea what, in fact, I’m voting for. That’s no way to legislate.”

Rep. Lenex of Shelburne explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I rise in support of and appreciation for this legislation that establishes lake shoreland protection standards. When we protect our water quality, naturally vegetated shorelines offer economic benefits for shoreline homeowners as well as the community and state.”

Rep. McCullough of Williston explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes on H.526! I am proud of my committee’s long, careful, thoughtful, and quadripartisan hours of work. Further, I am proud of this Body’s wise recognition of the need for furthering statewide water quality protections. H.526 requires shoreland protections to be put in place to protect Vermont’s lakes and ponds. It honors our Public Trust obligation to protect the waters of the State. It honors the municipalities’ desire to manage their own lakeshores, providing they have chosen to do so. Importantly, it honors Vermonters’ needs to use their shoreland properties with the mantra of best management practices for minimum water quality degradation.”

Rep. Partridge of Windham explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This is a long overdue first step to protect our lakes. I appreciate that your Fish, Wildlife and Water Resources Committee deferred to the existing Accepted Agricultural Practices and the water quality protection standards that apply to agricultural activities.”

Rep. Shaw of Pittsford explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

My constituents have spoken to me very clearly in opposition to H.526. My no vote represents their interests.”

Rep. Webb of Shelburne explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Through twelve drafts the committee struggled to address the rights of property owners, the desire for local control, and the compelling evidence that we can no longer maintain the status quo. Should this bill become law, we will join New Hampshire, Maine, Massachusetts, Connecticut and Rhode Island to establish standards long overdue to protect these exquisite resources in our state, allowing plenty of time for public participation.”

H.528 – Shall the bill be read a third time?

Rep. Batchelor of Derby explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I cannot support raising taxes on working Vermonters. During this session, this body has increased state fees, raising \$3 million in new revenue, increased property taxes by 5 cents, raising \$52.6 million in new revenue, the gas tax by 6.7 cents, raising \$22 million in new revenue, and today a variety of taxes including the income tax, raising a total of \$59.3 million in new revenue over two years. This totals \$136.9 million in new revenue in a single session. Working Vermonters cannot afford these increases! Thank you.”

Rep. Browning of Arlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote against this bill because it is a raising revenue raid, it is not the principled tax reform that Vermont desperately needs.”

Rep. Burditt of West Rutland explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

We are a compassionate body to those in need. We need to add a demographic to the list: ‘The working Vermonter and taxpayer who is footing this bill.’ Working Vermonters cannot afford these tax increases.”

Rep. Cupoli of Rutland City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I cannot support raising taxes on working Vermonters. The income tax is a broad based tax. Eliminating an income bracket and capping standard deductions places an unfair burden on hard working Vermonters.”

Rep. Dickinson of St. Albans Town explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

The overwhelming response from my constituents is that they do not want any more taxes. The legislature has already approved a 5 cent increase on the Homestead Property tax, a 6 cent increase on the Non-Homestead Property tax, and 6.7 cent per gallon on the gasoline tax. With these new taxes, it will create more of a burden on working Vermont families.”

Rep. Feltus of Lyndon explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

The revenue increases in H.528 are needed to fund projected appropriations. The problem is that the projected appropriations are not reasonable.”

Rep. Fisher of Lincoln explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

H.524 raises revenue in a fair and honest fashion to fund valued services for Vermonters. I particularly appreciate that this bill repeals the Employer assessment, a tax that many small business people advocated for the repeal of.”

Rep. Gage of Rutland City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I cannot support raising taxes on working Vermonters. Raising the sales tax on bottled water, dietary supplements, clothing, candy and soft drinks is unnecessary, regressive and will further hinder the ability of Vermont businesses to remain competitive especially along the New Hampshire and Massachusetts borders. Thank you.”

Rep. Goodwin of Weston explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

As I rode up a ski lift Monday a friend asked me how things went up here and if they’re going to have to leave. It’s going to be tough when the whole bill falls to working Vermonters.”

Rep. Hebert of Vernon explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted no because: I represent Guilford and Vernon, Vermont, not Hinsdale, Chesterfield, Keene, or any other town in New Hampshire, the very communities that would benefit most as a result of the passage of this bill. This is an economic development plan for the state of New Hampshire. This bill places a greater burden on our hard working Vermont taxpayers. This bill places greater burden on Vermont businesses and provides their competitors to the east more of an unfair advantage. This bill will harm our citizens and businesses. This bill will hinder Vermont’s economic development.”

Rep. Higley of Lowell explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This year more than any, I have received many messages from my constituents stating ‘NO NEW TAXES’. If we choose not to implement any new initiatives in the budget, this tax package of \$27 million for FY 2014 and \$38.3 million for FY 2015 will not be needed. I voted ‘NO’ to give Vermonters the opportunity to continue to recover from this recession without the burden of new taxes.”

Rep. Hubert of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I cannot support raising taxes on hard working Vermonters. During this session, this body has increased state fees raising 3 million in new revenue, increased property taxes by 5 cents raising 52.6 million in new revenue, the gas tax by 6.7 cents raising 22 million in new revenue over the objection of 13,000 Vermonters who signed a petition. And now today a variety of taxes including the income tax and expanding the sales tax raising a total of 59.3 million in new revenue over two years. This totals 36.9 million dollars in new revenue in a single session. Hard working Vermonters cannot afford these increases. Thank you.”

Rep. Johnson of South Hero explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I thank the Ways and Means Committee for eliminating the Catamount Assessment on employers. This will make it easier for our businesses – of all sizes – to grow and create more jobs for Vermonters.”

Rep. Juskiewicz of Cambridge explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I have not received any emails supporting the bill. I cannot support raising taxes on working Vermonters. The Income Tax is a broad based tax. Eliminating an Income Tax bracket and capping standard deductions places an unfair burden on hard working Vermonters. Also, this will penalize people who want to be charitable and will have a financial impact on nonprofits who are struggling today.”

Rep. Kilmartin of Newport City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote NO to targeting Vermont taxpayers more because they have high itemized deductions which result from deductions for high state income taxes, high property taxes, home mortgage interest, charitable contributions to churches and hospitals, catastrophic losses (e.g. uninsured losses from flood, fire, wind, etc.), unreimbursed employee expenses. This particular provision is heartless, cruel and destructive. Most of all it is deceitful because its purpose is to partially replace a \$15 million employer assessment from

Catamount Health which is being eliminated and provide start up fund for a new liberty destroying health care system. This provision is irrational theft from citizens who are dedicated to their communities, families, church and children.”

Rep. Komline of Dorset explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Four weeks ago this House voted to increase property taxes. Last week voted to increase the gas tax. Today this body voted to increase a myriad of broad base taxes including our clothing, our meals, our income and even out water. I speak for my constituents when I say Enough is Enough.”

Rep. Larocque of Barnet explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I cannot support raising taxes on working Vermonters. Raising the sales tax on bottled water, dietary supplements, clothing, candy and soft drinks is unnecessary, regressive and will further hinder the ability of Vermont businesses to remain competitive especially along the New Hampshire and Massachusetts borders. Thank you.”

Rep. Lawrence of Lyndon explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

As a former business owner I am well aware of what an increase in taxes will do in my area, it will only encourage people to visit the neighboring state of New Hampshire and will put additional burdens on our local businesses. The message I receive from constituents is very clear – we cannot support additional taxes.”

Rep. Lewis of Berlin explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I cannot support this tax bill. We cannot keep asking our citizens to dip deeper into their pockets. They know better how to spend their money than we do. We should not be writing checks when there is no money in the bank. I'm sure most members in this body campaigned on “no new taxes”, but certainly this bill goes way beyond!”

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

No one likes to pay taxes but this bill proposes to both make Vermont taxes fairer while also spreading burdens fairly and with minimum burdens on any one group of Vermonters. Explaining why you oppose taxes always is easy. Paying for good government never is.

Rep. McFaun of Barre Town explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

My constituents are telling me loud and clear, stop taxing me. I can't afford it. That's why I vote no.”

Rep. Morrissey of Bennington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I cannot support raising taxes on working Vermonters. Add the taxes from H.528 to the many others taxes to Vermonter's bottom line suck as additional property tax and the new gas tax to name a few. No matter what we call it today, a tax, a fee, surcharge or contribution, it all adds up and to the bottom line from our hard working Vermont taxpayers. Our tax payers have said 'Enough is enough.'”

Rep. Moran of Wardsboro explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

As one who has the honor to Co-Chair the Working Vermonters Legislative Caucus I speak for myself to praise your Ways and Means Committee for moving us towards a more progressive tax structure in Vermont. “

Rep. Mrowicki of Poultney explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

As a hard-working Vermonter, I support the hard work of your Ways and Means Committee. It has resulted in a prudent and fiscally responsible proposal to provide the necessary resources for doing the people’s business. I was elected to make tough decisions but the hard, wise work of your committee makes this decision easy and I vote yes to keep Vermont and Vermont values moving forward.”

Rep. Pearson of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

The bulk of this proposal asks those who can afford it, to pay a little more. It repeals the unpopular employer assessment for health care and allows us to avoid making drastic cuts to anti-poverty programs when poverty is on the rise. It is the right step to take.”

Rep. Quimby of Concord explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I represent towns along the NH border. I don’t need to explain why I cannot support raising more taxes on those people. It is evident why. They have asked that I don’t vote to raise taxes, and I won’t. “

Rep. Scheuermann of Stowe explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

“The collection of taxes which are not absolutely required is only a series of legalized larceny. ” Calvin Coolidge said that in his day and he was correct. The fact is, we do not need to raise taxes at all. We can meet the fiscal year 2014 budgetary needs, including a responsible increase in spending, without raising a dime in taxes. We are just choosing not to. Vermonters are urging us to live within our means and it is disappointing that we are ignoring those pleas.”

Rep. Smith of New Haven explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I cannot support raising taxes on working Vermonters. Over the last five years our state budgets have risen about 5% per year at the same time most of my constituents have seen their income remain flat. With cost of inflation around 2-3% resulting in reduced ability to pay these taxes. We need to find ways to control costs. Thank you.”

Rep. Stevens of Waterbury explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted for this bill because it addresses a very difficult question – how to support the public good equitably – in a way that acknowledges that we must all share in that responsibility. I appreciate the committee’s work. One of the original proposals was to raise \$17 million from 44,000 people, working hard to raise themselves out of poverty, who could least afford it has been replaced by one that is fairer. Fairer does not mean easy. A recent report showed that the total average income change for the bottom 90% of our taxpayers since 1966 is \$59. For the top 10%, it was over \$160,000. I am proud of the work the Ways and Committee did, and look forward to explaining it to my constituents. I’m satisfied that the hard working middleclass Vermonters have been reasonably protected.”

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I cannot support raising taxes on working Vermonters. Raising the sales tax on bottled water, dietary supplements, clothing, candy and soft drinks is unnecessary, regressive and will further hinder the ability of Vermont businesses to remain competitive, especially along the New Hampshire and Massachusetts borders. The elimination of an income tax bracket, capping standard deductions and limiting contributions is not fair and equitable taxation. During this session, this body has increased state fees raising \$3 million in new revenue, increased property taxes by 5 cents, raising \$52.6 million in new revenue, the gas tax by 6.7 cents, raising \$22 million in new revenue and today a variety of taxes raising a total of \$59.3 million in new revenue over two years. A total \$136.9 million dollars in new revenue in a single session. Working Vermonters, my constituents, cannot afford these increases. Thank you."

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

Vermonters expect us to live within our means, just as they do when times are tough. This is not a time for spending increases outside the rate of inflation. I vote not because this bill unnecessarily increases the tax burden on Vermonters in the middle of a still soft economy. I applaud the committee's hard work but they ultimately raised significantly more than the Speaker called for, and more than was needed, because they could. In the 1960's the Beatles had a famous song called "The Tax Man". To many Vermonters, that is what we are becoming.

H.528 - Shall the bill be amended as recommended by Rep. Scheuermann of Stowe?

Rep. Russell of Rutland explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I thank the Ways and Means Committee for their thoughtful and meticulous work on H.528 and vote no on this amendment. Especially important is the committee's vision in their support of our Vermont communities and neighborhoods put forth in this legislation."

Rep. Scheuermann of Stowe explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

This was a chance for the House to recognize the importance of nurturing the 21st century economy. We failed, and in fact sent the exact opposite message."

Rep. Young of Glover explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

Last year I cosponsored a bill with the member from Stowe that exempted cloud based computing. Businesses were given huge tax bills based on a new interpretation of the law. We did the right thing in holding them harmless. This year we have no money in the budget to continue building out faster broadband and I am sure many of my colleagues in this body promised that they would work for this. If we can connect the collection of this money to further telecom investments then we would be doing the state a great service."

Thereupon, the bill was read the third time and passed.

Page 22

H.530 - Shall the bill be amended as recommended by Rep. Donahue of Northfield?

Rep. Batchelor of Derby explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I am surprised and disappointed that Washington DC politics has come to the state of Vermont."

Rep. Branagan of Georgia explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Our work here is absolutely dependent on process. In fact, that is how we ensure the voices of those who sent us here are heard. I am very disappointed in the outcome of this vote and, even more, I am bothered by the lack of regard for one of our most important points of ethics.”

Rep. Burditt of West Rutland explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

We finally had an opportunity to hold a hand out to needy Vermonters and offer them the services that they need to achieve self-reliance in a fiscally responsible way. Unfortunately, the majority party leadership has undermined this process with reckless regard for its apparent casualties. Mr. Speaker, I hope that your Human Services committee is not one of those casualties.”

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Whatever confusion may once have existed, the Appropriations Committee today, with full information, voted to reject this amendment. I, too, voted against it based on its merits, not upon an inconclusive attempt at forensic analysis.”

Rep. Stuart of Brattleboro explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I’m surprised and disappointed by the tenor of the debate today, which has devolved into tea party political rhetoric. Under the guise of a failed process and spurred on by the concern that this proposed amendment may fail, members whose opinions differ have hurled unfounded accusations at those who spent hour, after countless hour in committee grappling with these exceedingly tough financial issues.

Mr. Speaker, last Saturday, Brattleboro had a historically long town meeting that lasted 13.5 hours. As many of you know, Brattleboro is one small town with one huge diversity of opinion. During the two decades the former Speaker of the House, Tim O’Connor, presided over our Representative Town meeting, he never presided over a Town meeting that lasted anywhere near 13 hours.

I deeply respect my colleagues from different sides of the aisle whose points of view differ from mine. But I respectfully request that we keep the debate civil, and that we keep the dialogue productive. As former House Speaker Tim O’Connor said after over 13-hours of vigorous but civil debate ‘that’s what it’s all about.’”

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

We understand our role as the minority party. However, the rules and this legislative process entitles us the opportunity to present our constituents’ views in a respectful and thoughtful manner. This opportunity was taken away from us by this underhanded maneuver. The integrity of this institution is of utmost importance. I hope that we remember this in the future. Thank you.”

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote ‘yes’ on the substance of the amendment, though it is not perfect in my opinion. Beyond the substance, the process was more than disturbing. A committee vote was held and never forwarded on to Appropriations for consideration. It was as if the vote never happened. What does this say on any committee vote going forward? Not getting the vote you want out of committee should not mean the process can be subverted. This should not happen again.”

Rep. Young of Glover explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote ‘no’ with serious reservations. I am afraid that ‘trust the committee process’ will mean little to anyone if this sort of thing continues to happen.”

Page 23

H.530 - Shall the bill amended as recommended by Reps. Moran of Wardboro, Campion of Bennington, Christie of Hartford, Davis of Washington, Fay of St. Johnsbury, Krowinski of Burlington, McCarthy of St. Albans City, McCormack of Burlington, Till of Jericho, Toleno of Brattleboro, Townsend of South Burlington, Weed of Enosburg, Wizowaty of Charlotte, and Zagar of Barnard?

Rep. Patsy French of Randolph explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

It is difficult to vote against the Appropriations Committee because they do good work. However, for me, this is all about the children. If we remove the Reach Up support from a family, how will the children be safe and protected if the family can’t afford housing? Will the children be more or less likely to continue in a cycle of generational poverty? Will those children be more or less likely to be able to overcome the education gap that we know exists between children in poverty and children not in poverty? I fear for what the answers to those questions may be. For me it’s all about the children and that is why I voted ‘yes’.”

Rep. Morrissey of Bennington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

If the policy in regards to the Reach Up program had gone through the appropriate committees of jurisdiction process, we might all have been able to vote for this amendment today. It is with regrets that I have to vote ‘no’.”

Rep. Spengler of Colchester explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

As a woman, as a mother and frankly as a democrat, I am offended.

In a time of the greatest income inequity since the gilded age this bill raises revenue by taking women off Reach Up.

It is morally wrong to focus our time and energy examining ways to extract funds from low-income Vermonters instead of looking to Vermonters who could well afford to share their good fortune.

Was it last week that we passed the equal pay bill taking women and children one step forward? And today we are asked to turn around and deny women a chance to succeed? This is an assault on women and, specifically, poor women and their children.”

Rep. Stuart of Brattleboro explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I have been an outspoken advocate for the poor and the hungry, and I have spoken out frequently about the growing gulf in our country and the world between the rich and the poor.

But, Mr. Speaker, with all due respect to my colleagues from all sides of the aisle, I request that we respect the committee process. I also respectfully request that we appreciate the endless hours the Big Money Committees, who do the heaviest lifting in this House, devoted to stretching every dollar in the budget as far as it could go.

And Mr. Speaker, although I too have reservations about a few sections of both big money bills, I defer to the Big Money Committees, I defer to the committee process and I defer to their best judgment. Because they are the ones that heard countless hours of testimony. And they are the ones that did the best research.”

Rep. Waite-Simpson of Essex explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I support the underlying principle in this amendment but I vote 'no' because we have given ample discretion to the agency to waive the caps. I do not for one minute believe that the Agency of Human Services could be so ruthless as to plunge compliant families further in to poverty."

Page 24

H.60 – Shall the bill be read a third time?

Rep. Higley of Lowell explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I understand the concept of having good meals for our children but let's not continue to take the responsibility of paying for it away from parents. Forty cents a meal is not too much to ask!"

Page 25

H.530 - Shall the bill be amended as recommended by Rep. Poirier of Barre City?

Rep. Christie of Hartford explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

In my time here this has been the most difficult vote I have had to make. After receiving over 800 votes more than the closest candidate of the four on the ballot, I have to remember what was said to me most. This is why we sent you here."

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

The struggle between what the state can afford and what we seek for health access outcomes is, for the first time, facing us as a reality. It is a clear statement about the prospects of success of our health reform goals. It demonstrates how unreal many expectations are. That has been my concern from day one, and I join in opposition to an unsustainable step today."

Rep. McCormack of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

While I would have liked to vote for this amendment, I cannot vote for any tapping of the Reserve Fund since that fund will be needed more than ever next fall to assure adequate funding for the LIHEAP federal shortfall we are likely to see especially with looming federal sequestration."

Rep. Poirier of Barre City explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

With this vote, it is clear to me that the path to a state run health care system will be an exercise in futility for low income working Vermonters. If this is the road to change I will not support it."

Page 26

H.530 – Shall the bill pass?

Rep. Browning of Arlington explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I vote no because this budget contains a structural imbalance of spending increases that keep the state's finances on the current unsustainable path."

Rep. Johnson of South Hero explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This budget supports community based mental health, opens the state hospital after a decade of debate, helps people get back to work and grow business by investing in Regional Development Corporations, working lands and childcare. We reduced health care cost shift by increasing Medicaid payments to every provider and we left \$9M in reserves for future needs. I’m proud to vote yes.”

Rep. Poirier of Barre City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted no because of the fact that the working poor are not protected from high out-of-pocket cost. I cannot believe that a majority of the members believe that a family making \$23,000 a year can afford potential out-of-pocket cost of \$5,884 a year or 20% of their gross income.”

Rep. Savage of Swanton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted no on the budget, as each year this body continues to approve budgets that are unsustainable. I will not have my fingerprints on a budget that will eventually come crashing down in a financial meltdown.”

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This House GOP-Hubert amendment achieved a number of our caucus goals which we outlined for you and the chair of Appropriations earlier in the session. It is unfortunate that your appropriations committee rejected it on a party line vote. It was fiscally responsible and we are hopeful that some of these ideas will be adopted at some point in this session for the good of Vermont and its taxpayers.

The proposal before us today, with a spending growth rate of 4.7%, is unsustainable, it establishes over 70 new positions within state government, it sets aside \$8 million in reserves which is not adequate to address the impending impact of federal sequestration, it does not implement a plan to address the pension shortfalls, especially the teachers retiree healthcare funding, and it creates new programs while expanding existing programs. Further, it relies on \$50 million of one-time money and a net of \$109.1 million in new taxes to balance. We do not feel that this proposal is fiscally responsible, is detrimental to Vermont’s economy and will have a very negative impact on working Vermonters. Therefore we cannot support its passage. Thank you.”

Page 28

H.262 – Shall the bill be read a third time?

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

The fiscal note for this bill describes a “to be determined” fee. This is another blank check to establish a program first, and then pay later through our ever-growing fees.”

Page 31

H.200 – Shall the bill be read a third time?

Rep. Batchelor of Derby explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I am voting no on bill H.200. I believe it is wrong to send this message to not only our young people but to all Vermonters.”

Rep. Bouchard of Colchester explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I think this bill moves Vermont in the wrong direction. It is sending our children and grandchildren a wrong message.”

Rep. Branagan of Georgia explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Why did we not see the information concerning the fiscal impact of these changes on revenue and expenditures for the state? When we are forced to vote without complete information, those we serve lose out.”

Rep. Browning of Arlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote no because this bill is deeply flawed. The desire to protect young people from the criminal consequences of a mistake could have been solved with mandatory diversion under current law. The decriminalization goes into effect without usable tests for marijuana DUI. And the amount decriminalized is so large that it might not be solely for personal use.”

Rep. Buxton of Tunbridge explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

In two different surveys of my constituents on this issue within the last year, over 70% of respondents voiced support for this legislation. My vote reflects the views of the people I am here to represent.”

Rep. Davis of Washington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

When we took our oath, we vowed to do no harm. For me, more harm is caused by criminal prohibition of marijuana than by the use of marijuana itself. That is why I support H.200.”

Rep. Dickenson of St. Albans Town explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote no on this bill. Potential employees do not need a criminal record for drug use to have difficulty getting or retaining a job. Employers have the right to do drug tests on employees and they do, in all business sectors. This bill ignores the impact on our workforce and it is disappointing that the committee did not hear testimony regarding this issue.”

Rep. Fagan of Rutland City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

For the past 20 years I have talked to my children, answered their questions and advised them to not use drugs. Someday, if they so bless me, I hope to have the same discussion with my grandchildren and advise them to not use drugs. I cannot and will not advise them to do as I say and not as I vote. So, I vote no to decriminalization.”

Rep. Kilmartin of Newport City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote ‘no.’ The proponents claim they are doing this to save our young people from the consequences of youthful indiscretions, i.e., criminal convictions for ‘minor’ possessions of marijuana. The opposite is true. They are using our children as sacrifices on the altar of smug and callous self-indulgence. The message to our children is ‘it’s OK’ to toke up. While not all children ‘toking up’ will become substance addicts, we know that many will. It’s really NOT for the children regardless of the semantic smoke and mirrors. It’s for arrested, rebellious adolescents masquerading as adults.

Rep. Shaw of Pittsford explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I heard the word legalize several time on the floor today. My concern is our youth will translate decriminalization to mean legalize. That is not a translation or message I am comfortable with. Hence my no vote.”

Rep. Stevens of Waterbury explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted yes for this well-crafted and thoughtful bill. While the change in law reflects a change in penalties, it does not condone use. By lessening the immediate penalties, it gives those who use marijuana – and get caught – an opportunity to straighten out their lives before they are ruined by perceived poor choices. The message I’ve sent to my children is this: Purchase and use of marijuana is illegal. If you are caught, there are consequences. The message the state sends today is that we will show compassion towards initial offenders. But only for a while.”

Rep. Strong of Albany explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

As a legislator who helps shape public policy I want to give the message to my constituents that I encourage all Vermonters to make the healthiest possible choices with their lives. I believe that decriminalizing marijuana lowers the bar on that message, and I am not willing to support it.”

Page 32

H.200 – Shall the bill be amended as recommended by Rep. Browning of Arlington?

Rep. Browning of Arlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes in an effort to protect young Vermonters and to avoid providing protection for drug dealers.”

Rep. McFaun of Barre Town explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker

I vote no because I don’t think we should be decriminalizing any amount of marijuana, period, unless it is going to be used for medical purposes.”

Page 35

H.200 – Shall the bill pass?

Rep. Batchelor of Derby explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted no on H.200. When I am not working here in the legislature, I work for the Department of Corrections. The decriminalizing of the possession of any amount of marijuana is just wrong and sends the wrong message to the people of Vermont.”

Rep. Branagan of Georgia explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I am very disappointed in the results of this vote. Many questions remain, including mine regarding the cost of these changes. The fiscal note was extremely difficult to understand. Most members still do not know the true cost of this change. Why should only some members have access to this information?”

Re. Donaghy of Poultney explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted no, but I would like to publicly congratulate the advocacy of NORML (National Organization for the Reform of Marijuana) on achieving this, their second hurdle (the first being medical marijuana) toward their ultimate goal of legalizing marijuana as a recreational drug. Although I am adamantly opposed to this goal, I would like to commend the members from West Rutland and East Montpelier for their courage and honesty in openly discussing their support of legalizing the use of marijuana. H.200, with its bogus rationale, presents a disingenuous journey toward that goal.”

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I support the core purpose of this bill. Without a stronger component regarding smoking marijuana while driving, and without distinguishing in any way between private use and exposing the broader public to personal use, I am unable to vote yes.”

Rep. Feltus of Lyndon explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I supported this bill because I think it will lead to more consistent enforcement across the state. I also believe pushing our youth to diversion programs is a better way of addressing this behavior.”

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This bill, at long last, recognizes the reality of low level marijuana use in Vermont and creates penalties which are realistic but which do not ruin lives for no real reason. No one can seriously maintain that our current approach has worked or ever will. This bill will help us place our focus where it belongs – on serious drug use rather than on small amounts of marijuana.”

Rep. Mrowicki of Putney explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Thanks to your Judiciary Committee for hard work on another complex issue. As the narrative of the November votes are played out in today’s vote, the people I represent want Vermont to move forward and so I vote yes to do just that, move Vermont forward.”

Rep. Waite-Simpson of Essex explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I believe in compassion, in forgiveness and in giving second chances for offenses considered a vice more than a crime. We must make the penalty fit the offense and if we fail to do that, we have failed as a society.”

Page 36

H.536 – Shall the House suspend its rules to permit consideration of a nongermane question?

Rep. Donovan of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted no today, but that does not mean that I support the deployment of the F35A.”

Rep. McCullough of Williston explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes. One cannot get more military than the F35A. Vermonters detest pollution. The noise pollution from the F35A is of grave concern to the families and children in the base area. Recognizing we do not have jurisdiction, we do have the responsibility of discussion.”

Rep. Morrissey of Bennington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I asked for this roll call and vote ‘no’ to demonstrate the overwhelming support of this body for the F-35 Project and our Vermont National Guard!!!”

Rep. Nuovo of Middlebury explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I think different issues should have a chance to be heard.”

Page 37

H.536 – Shall the bill be amended as recommended by Rep. Cross of Winooski?

Rep. Kilmartin of Newport explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Having received an explanation of the inter-relationships among 2 V.S.A. §12(c)(1)-(5), I vote ‘no’ to advance the bill to third reading, to give the body an opportunity to retain (c)(1)-(5) which have coherency and integrity, to eliminate (c) (6) which contradicts (c)(1)-(5), and restrict the authority of the Board to screening the qualifications of applicants and passing on to the General Assembly all candidates meeting criteria (c)(1)-(5).”

Page 38

H.536 – Shall the bill pass?

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I support this bill because it addresses at least three important issues; it improves the selection process of Adjutant General by requiring that only qualified candidates apply in the future. It also creates an important review board to deal with sensitive and potentially confidential issues. Lastly, the bill requires a report on the issue of sexual assault and harassment involving members of the guard. This is a good bill.”

Page 39

H.510 - Shall the House concur in the Senate proposal of amendment with further proposal of amendment thereto?

Rep. Kilmartin of Newport City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote ‘yes’ because highways and roads know no party label. Regardless of your political values and persuasion, if you cannot get there, you cannot practice them. I apologize to my committee for not being present for the committee vote this morning. Had I been present I would have voted ‘yes.’”

Rep. Martin of Wolcott explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

While I was hoping to find an alternative way to raise money to meet the federal match, I vote yes. Our communities rely heavily on state funding for aid for local highways, bridge and paving grants. Good infrastructure is essential for our economy.”

Rep. Mrowicki of Putney explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Recently a constituent asked if we really have to fix all the roads in Vermont. I think we do and until someone comes up with a better way to figure out how to pay for fixing our roads and bridges, I will support the work of your committee and vote yes.”

Rep. Russell of Rutland explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote ‘yes’ in support of Vermont’s future which will be brighter with investment in our state’s infrastructure.”

Rep. Savage of Swanton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

As we are all aware our transportation infrastructure is the heart and soul of our economy and our State. We should not neglect it nor should we short change our other obligations to pay for it. I appreciate the hard work of the Transportation Committee; they have worked long and hard, many hours in offering this amendment this morning. However I cannot support this bill because I cannot support some of the choices to fund this bill. Many of my constituents and over 13000 other Vermonters have expressed their opposition to the increase in the gas tax and now the diesel tax. Working Vermonters again will be the brunt of this choice to raise the gas and diesel taxes. Our small businesses along the NH and MA borders are already at a significant disadvantage and this will make it worse.

Page 40

H.538 – Shall the bill be read a third time?

Rep. Browning of Arlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote “no” because although there are useful components of this bill, it does little to address some of the key drivers of education costs and property tax rates. I see the omitted factors as the behavior of the state itself through mandates on schools, through \$200m in tax expenditures within the Education Fund that drive up base property tax rates and through shorting the General Fund transfer into the Education Fund by over \$20m in each of the last ten years.”

Rep. Scheuermann of Stowe explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

While I voted ‘yes’ for this very small step, this is an exceptionally disappointing bill in terms of education funding reform. I am just hopeful that one of these days we will actually listen to, and hear, Vermonters’ pleas for comprehensive education reform and take meaningful action.”

Page 43

S.14 – Shall the Report of the General, Housing and Military Affairs Committee be amended as recommended by Rep. Bouchard of Colchester?

Rep. Kate Webb of Shelburne explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

As a teacher in my district, the cost of my union dues is less than 1% of my salary. For paraeducators, on an hourly wage, the cost is almost 2%. I would hope that the gain in dues for support staff would offset the cost for support staff members.”

S.14 – Shall the Report of the General, Housing and Military Affairs Committee be amended as recommended by Reps. Campion of Bennington, Terenzini of Rutland Town and South of St. Johnsbury?

Rep. Mary Morrissey of Wilmington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Amazing – another study, only this time we’re going to fool Vermonters by calling it an analysis. Wow!”

Page 46

S.14 - Shall the bill be read a third time?

Rep. Bouchard of Colchester explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Passing S.14 shows the meaning of transparency in government. This is a big gift to the unions wrapped in a see-through box using see-through plastic wrap.”

Rep. Davis of Washington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

For me, S.14 is about fairness. When I worked for the state, I was a member of the union. When I moved into a management role, I continued to pay union dues because I felt that if, as a manager I received an extension of benefits that had been bargained for, that I should pay my fair share. I voted ‘yes’ for fairness.”

Rep. Fagan of Rutland City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

The Constitution of Vermont states (in part) that ‘all persons are born equally free and independent and have certain natural, inherent and inalienable rights, amongst which are enjoying and defending life and liberty.’ Our Constitution does not mention fairness but does prominently mention, and hold dear, Liberty. Today we have trodden upon and weakened our right of liberty. I vote ‘no’.”

Rep. Hebert of Vernon explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote ‘no’ in support of working Vermonters and their freedom of choice, not the union hierarchy’s special interests.”

Rep. Krebs of South Hero explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

The underlying theme of the discussion today, and the rationale for rejecting amendments, has been mostly limited to ‘fairness’. I assume this is why the bill is called Fair Share. Is it fair that those choosing not to join the union receive all the benefits of collective bargaining on their behalf? I would say ‘no.’ And, similarly, is it fair for those paying agency fees to have to carry what is known as ‘free riders’? Again, I would say ‘no.’

But, I also have to ask myself if it is fair for employees that have made a career choice and understand that they are exempt because of an agreement in place to have to now pay agency fees. I would say ‘no.’ Most importantly, I reflect on when a group of employees choose to organize and form a union. At that point in history, there should be a clear and unambiguous understanding that the newly formed union may have to represent both members and non-members AND that all costs may have to be supported by only 51% of the employees.

The fundamental fairness issue starts there and legislation should not be used to redefine prior agreements and understandings. Vermonters, and especially us in the legislature, need to honor that history.”

Rep. Lenes of Shelburne explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I prefer contract negotiations to deal with the real educational issues that truly help student learning."

Rep. Lewis of Berlin explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I cannot support Agency Fees. It should not be government and business to dictate that an employee must pay a fee to a union. If they choose not to join, that is their personal choice. This bill will affect those earning the lowest wages in schools and municipalities."

Rep. Poirier of Barre City explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I voted 'yes' because it is the right thing to do. I look forward to the future support of all my Republican friends who are concerned with the plight of the low-income workers in our state in my next attempt to protect them from further economic decline."

Rep. Russell of Rutland explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I was a dues paying member of the Crewmembers' Union for 34 years at American Airlines. The good quality of life, work rules and benefits gained through hard fought negotiations were also enjoyed by those who did not wish to be a part of the Union, for a fee. I vote 'yes' for fairness in the workplace."

Rep. Stevens of Waterbury explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

This is a bill that brings a little economic justice to union members in our State Police, our teachers, and in every department of state government that provides services to Vermonters every day, which is a special interest to all of us."

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I vote 'no' because this bill forces non-union members to pay an agency fee for the first time, despite the fact that they cannot participate in union elections or even vote on ratification of a contract that may not even ultimately benefit them. We, as a legislature, are forcing agency fees on people and interfering with a decision best left to local school boards. Why? This is not about fairness."

Page 47

S.30 – Shall the bill be read a third time?

Rep. Komline of Dorset explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I vote no because this bill simply requires that two of our committees do their jobs but that we'll pay them six times in the off session to do it."

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes so that the information that my constituents have been seeking, since Georgia Mountain Community Wind first proposed the concept of 400' tall wind turbines on our scenic Georgia Mountain, may finally be available to other communities facing this in the future. Thank you."

S.14 - Shall the bill pass in concurrence with proposal of amendment?

Rep. Browning of Arlington explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I vote no because it is unfair for the legislature to change the terms of employment for current employees like this. Agency fees should have been left to the collective bargaining process."

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I quote from comments by others on the floor yesterday: it is a gross abuse of government power to force payments to a private organization by people who do not wish to join. I will not participate in that abuse."

Rep. O'Sullivan of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I support this bill because it is time. Our state, municipal and educational institutions have been unionized for years. Over all of those years every new hire has known they are accepting a position in a union shop. Over all those years those new hires accepted their benefits and expected their workplace rights to be upheld.

Many have referred to the high cost of union dues. They have talked about a windfall coming to the unions. They are right. Every union member is finally getting a break after all those years of paying for everybody else.

I supported fair share because it's time."

Rep. Pearson of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

As someone who often urges more action at a faster pace, I have to acknowledge this bill is stronger and goes further than the bill we nearly passed on the last day of session, last biennium. Thank you for your leadership and the good work of your committee."

H.270 - Shall the bill be read a third time?

Rep. Bouchard of Colchester explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

Pre-K funding is a local school board decision. We already took away one school board decision last week. Pretty soon we will not need local school boards.

Rep. Cupoli of Rutland City explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

As we say in Rutland City - 'Kids First.' This bill will provide a brighter future for our kids."

Rep. Spengler of Colchester explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

Every child in Vermont should have an equal educational opportunity. This bill helps to move Vermont closer to this shared belief and will save taxpayers money in the long term."

Page 51

S.77 – Shall the House postpone action on the bill indefinitely?

Rep. Russell of Rutland City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote “no” to suspend debate. The very essence of debate is the Vermont way.”

Page 52

S.77 – Shall the House propose to the Senate to amend the bill as recommended by Rep. Poirier of Barre City?

Rep. Poirier of Barre City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted ‘yes’ as I believe this is the precursor to health care rationing in our new health care experiment”

Page 56

H.270 – Shall the bill pass?

Rep. Klein of East Montpelier explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I did vote yes because I believe in the benefits of early education. However, I am concerned about adding to the educational structure without a comprehensive evaluation of the system and the structure as a whole. I don’t know how long our current educational structure will remain viable.”

Rep. Manwaring of Wilmington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Last week we were asked to support a bill, H.538, that through several strategies sought to constrain spending on education thus also contain increases in property taxes. Yet this bill we’ve just passed, H.270, mandates increased spending by our schools which will exert upward pressure on property taxes, despite its promise of long term value.

That we can pass two bills in quick succession, one of which cancels impacts of the other, is the best argument yet for the need to reassess the construct of our education Finance system. And when we do, I hope we will consider the following:

How money gets out of the Education Fund is fundamentally a different question than how it gets into the Fund. While the principle of Equity is important in raising taxes, it should not be the driving principle in spending money. We don’t use equity to evaluate other State spending. We assess need and look for outcomes.

We need to decide once and for all whether the State wants to take over and run our schools, which is where the arc of the present Education Fund construct wants to go.

If our local communities are to continue to run our schools, which is where the work to educate our children is done, then we need to embrace that reality for its value and enable and empower our schools to deliver 21st century skills to all Vermont’s children.

And perhaps most importantly, we need a holistic system of funding and outcomes that is transparent, where every Vermont taxpayer sees what his or her investment in education tax dollars is buying, where every taxpayer, parent, student and citizen can see the value of public education, which is arguably our most important public good.”

Rep. Pearson of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

Empowering parents to make choices for their young children sounds like a no-brainer. But taking public dollars to pay for private education is a dangerous principle. In the end the powerful benefits of universal pre-k and the need for greater access earn my vote but I remain concerned that we are turning a corner that will ultimately undermine our public education system."

Rep. Weed of Enosburg explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I wholeheartedly support pre-k but cannot support any more educational taxes, or any taxes in addition to what we already approved this year. My district has the highest unemployment rate in the state. We must look at new revenue sources when we implement new programs, other than from the taxpayers."

Page 57

S.77 – Shall the House proposal of amendment be amended as recommended by Rep. Till of Jericho?

Rep. Till of Jericho explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

We're asking a lot of certain doctors. Without this amendment we are asking physicians who find this practice completely unethical, and believe this has no place in medical practice, to counsel patients about their full range of options including physician assisted suicide."

Page 58

S.77 – Shall the House proposal of amendment be amended as recommended by Rep. Wright of Burlington?

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

This amendment would have destroyed all the work to date of this House and prevented any bill from being adopted for at least a year. Beyond that, it asked about voter support for a bill 'similar' to the original version of S.77. How many people voting on that would even have read S.77? The likely answer is none. If passed, how would our Members then interpret 'similar'? The honest answer is any way they choose. This amendment called for a process without any real understanding from beginning to end."

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

This amendment would have given Vermonters the right to weigh in on this issue for the first time. Citizens would have clearly known what they were voting on because it would have been debated vigorously across the state. I trust Vermonters and their ability to cast informed votes."

Page 60

S.77 – Shall the bill pass in concurrence with proposal of amendment?

Rep. Batchelor of Derby explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

Death should be between the physician, the patient and his or her God. It is not up to us to decide when we die. I cannot support S.77."

Rep. Burditt of West Rutland explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

The state cannot giveth. The state cannot take away. I had a choice before this bill. I have a choice after – my choice."

Rep. Carr of Brandon explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I vote for this bill because it compels no one and permits anyone to follow their own dictates and beliefs. I believe in choice."

Rep. Christie of Hartford explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I voted no in obligation to my faith. Two weeks ago in Burlington I was knighted into the Knights of Columbus Knight of the 3rd degree."

Rep. Cole of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

Options - people with wealth can find them, poor people have a harder time.

Some of the people we represent now have family members who live in many locations far away. At the end of life there are a minority of people for which available pain medication is not sufficient. How can we not legally allow them and their doctors to figure out what is most merciful and loving for them.

I received a strange call saying it'd be hard cleaning up after someone who shoots themselves. Pass death with dignity so they can get medication and so they don't have to clean up the blood after someone shoots themselves.

Please let people Die in Peace with options."

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

This bill creates a complex government structure to support and sanction the actions of a person to deliberately provide a deadly drug to another person for the explicit purpose of helping them to kill themselves. No matter what compassion drives it, it creates an unprecedented breach in the balance between individual rights and the common good. Is one unintended death, one irreversible mistake, directly caused by our actions today, worth it? I do not believe so."

Rep. French of Randolph explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I voted yes on this bill to give dying Vermonters a full range of choices regarding their final days and hours of life. Most Vermonters will never fully use this bill, but for any who gain a measure of comfort because they have that full range of choices available to them, I am thankful to have been a part of making that possible."

Rep. Shaw of Pittsford explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

My no vote is extremely personal. This is not a legislative issue for me."

Rep. Till of Jericho explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I do not see the bright ethical line between what S.77 proposes and current practice. In both cases medical judgments are made about quality of life and life expectancy, medications are ordered, and medications which expedite death are given.

In medical ethics the number one tenet is autonomy. When autonomy conflicts with 'first do no harm', autonomy is more important. This bill gives dying patients more autonomy."

Rep. Van Wyck of Ferrisburgh explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

This bill in the final stages is not about health care, nor about the withdrawal of extraordinary medical intervention. This is the State's construction of physician assisted suicide by the prescription of a lethal dose of a controlled drug.

The House oath states: 'I will not propose, or assent to, any bill, vote or resolution, which shall appear to me injurious to the people...' This bill is beyond injurious; it is lethal. Physician assisted suicide will be a cancer in Vermont's health care system – just like it is now in Oregon's."

Rep. Yantachka of Charlotte explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

This bill does not encourage suicide. Rather, it encourages someone suffering from a terminal illness to consider feasible alternatives, through an informed decision-making process through their own free will. If they decide to continue to hasten their death, it will be with a choice of methods based on medical knowledge."

Page 63

S.59 – Shall the bill pass in concurrence with proposal of amendment?

Rep. Cross of Winooski explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I voted yes to allow our friends and neighbors to organize in a union if they so vote. I hope that those who proposed a direct raise for these deserving employees this afternoon and those who voted yes on this bill will join together and agree to fully fund whatever collective bargaining contract is worked out between the parties."

Rep. Hebert of Vernon explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I vote no to this injustice. How can we deny these hard working and deserving Vermonters a pay increase with one vote and then deliver an empty vessel with the next?"

Rep. Koch of Barre Town explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

My vote in favor of this bill is cast notwithstanding a number of reservations, including:

1. This arrangement is extremely awkward. The recipient of services is the actual employer, but the bill proposes to allow workers to form a union to negotiate not the employers, but with the state.
2. The state has limited funds. If an increased wage rate is negotiated, it may result in decreased levels of service.
3. While pay raises may be successfully negotiated, they may be so small – in view of the state's limited resources – that the pay raises may be eaten up by union dues.
4. This bill may violate the National Labor Relations Act, in that the union will be negotiating with the state – not with the employers."

Rep. Komline of Dorset explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I support helping these workers but without my amendment I can't be sure this bill would do anything but feed a union's bureaucracy on the backs of a program meant to benefit Vermont's most needy."

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This bill simply allows a group of workers who serve out state and some of its most vulnerable citizens the right to consider forming a union. The arguments against it rest entirely on speculation about what might happen if they do – not fact, but sheer speculation. That was no reason to deny them the same right other Vermont workers enjoy – simply to bargain for their pay and working conditions.”

Rep. McFaun of Barre Town explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

These workers have been trying for years to get proper compensation for the work they perform – to no avail. Some of the work they do is critical in assisting an individual to carry out the most basic actions of life. That’s when you join together in a union to fight as a group for what is right and fair. That’s why I vote yes on this bill.”

Rep. Mrowicki of Putney explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I would imagine for those watching in the gallery or listening at home, it might be confusing to hear how the last two votes were registered. The bottom line is I voted to support your right to organize, along with all those who voted yes on this vote.”

Rep. Poirer of Barre City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted ‘yes’ as this is another sad day for low income workers in Vermont.”

Rep. Stevens of Waterbury explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This bill is a major step forward for working Vermonters, as well as for the elderly and people with disabilities who so desperately need their support services. By voting to allow home care workers to have a seat at the table, we are fulfilling another part of our promise to provide better working conditions to those who provide the most intimate services to our most vulnerable population.”

Rep. Toll of Danville explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted no. Not because I do not support these workers, but because I feel no additional pressure can be put on the state budget. I look forward to joining those who voted yes today by voting yes on the budget supporting a 3% increase for these valuable workers.”

Page 64

H.169 - Shall the House concur in the Senate proposal of amendment with a further amendment thereto?

Rep. Clarkson of Woodstock explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I’d like to thank the House Commerce Committee for responding to the needs of our small businesses devastated by Vermont’s natural disasters of 2011. This bill provides much needed relief for those whose unemployment insurance tax went up more than fourfold – and relief in the future when natural disasters may close our businesses again.”

Rep. Poirier of Barre City explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I voted 'yes' with reservation because the rule adopted by the Douglas administration flies in the face of the carriers' working rights to working compensation benefits. These carriers have been deprived of this benefit for seven years. What is one more year? I hope not a serious injury."

Page 66

S.38 - Shall the bill be recommitted to the Committee on Transportation?

Rep. Gage of Rutland City explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

Our safety as a nation is more important than giving driving rights to a few immigrant workers."

Rep. Kilmartin of Newport City explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

This is one of two explanations I shall give on this bill. By refusing to commit this bill back to committee for review by Homeland Security, we are putting mere convenience of those here illegally over their safety and the safety of our children and grandchildren who trust us to do the right thing. A prominent state official said, 'We look the other way when it comes to illegal aliens.' 'Looking the other way' will not be an adequate answer to those who use the security loopholes in this bill to do us serious harm. It will do little to quell the tears and grief of the widow and her children when an act of terrorism causes the loss of a husband."

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

Our highly respected Commissioner of Public Safety is in regular contact with Homeland Security. He supports the bill as it is before us. He certainly would not do so if he thought it posed any security problem or if he had any thought whatsoever that it required a Homeland Security review."

Rep. Russell of Rutland City explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

Our farmers and associated communities are crying out for the need to fill jobs so vitally important to the success of our Green Mountain State's economy. These necessary and historically proud jobs go unwanted by so many Vermonters in today's culture.

My vote is to render these newly migrated men and women the respect we should always give each human being. I was most impressed during testimony, hearing from each individual, just how diligent the effort to find work in order to support their families. As well as the strong desire to fit into a community and state they have come to love. My vote is for a sense of uplifting hope for these folks as well as for our dairy industry.

We as Vermonters are a far better people than name calling or placing titles or assigning stereotypes. We should embrace these newcomers as yet another one of the threads of our fabric. That quilt we hold high as Vermont, which makes us such a special place. Our collective brand will survive and become even stronger in response to our positive actions here today.

My vote has been cast for inclusion, independence, dignity, justice, equality and in support of the human spirit. Look above; we stand for Freedom and Unity.

I vote no to recommit. I vote yes for fairness!"

S.38 – Shall the bill pass in concurrence with proposal of amendment?

Rep. Canfield of Fair Haven explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I see this as a kick in the teeth to all of the millions of immigrants who have done things correctly and became naturalized United States citizens. I cannot support this measure.”

Rep. Connor of Fairfield explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This bill is not just about the dairy community. However it is this very community that has born the brunt of ugly comments. My family and friends have heard from Vermont farmers who support S.38. I have also heard from non-farm constituents asking me to support this legislation. In the morning, I have to look myself in the mirror and voting for S.38 will allow me a peaceful heart.”

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes for safe driving for all Vermonters. I regret that this also involves supporting something I am less comfortable with, because I feel I lack an adequate understanding of the potential consequences of the non-driver identification card with its primary purpose of identification, rather than of driving.”

Rep. Fagan of Rutland City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This bill (S.38) has not been reviewed by the federal government, we do not know if it undermines the security procedures put in place to protect us from those in our country with the intent to do us harm. My vote has nothing to do with equity and fairness or adding new voices to the American Chorus. My vote has to do with protecting our state and nation before we proceed with S.38 which a Department of Homeland Security review would help to insure. I vote no because we have not had S.38 reviewed.”

Rep. Goodwin of Weston explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted yes, but not without concern for our farmers who are, more than ever, identified as employers of undocumented immigrants; and, Mr. Speaker, if I thought the people this bill is meant to accommodate were a threat, I would not have voted yes. But I think we lack the defensive thought that will develop after our first ski area sabotage.”

Rep. Kilmartin of Newport City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I would like to vote ‘yes.’ But I vote ‘no’ because my research shows clearly that this bill has significant potential for causing catastrophic harm to Vermonters and also to those among us undocumented from Mexico and Guatemala. Our farm workers know better than I, first hand, up-close, and personal, the reach of the four drug cartels based in Mexico. The Department of Justice has informed us that one or more of the drug cartels based in Mexico have active bases of operation in every state bordering Vermont. The same cartels have caused murder and mayhem in each of our border states. This bill expands drug cartel opportunities as many say, ‘We are looking the other way.’

In addition to drug cartels, we need to understand terrorism. The bill expects DMV to accept Mexican and Guatemalan consul cards at face value, and accept other consul ID cards if they meet the same ID and security standards and protocols of Mexico and Guatemala. But DMV does not have the ability to know the Mexican or Guatemalan standards and protocols, so what does DMV do when Syria, Iran, etc., create consular ID cards and claim they are the same as Mexico? Is it really ‘looking the other way’, or is it ‘intentionally turning a blind eye’ to the rights and needs of Vermonters, their children and grandchildren.

Equally important, we have turned a blind eye to the circumstances which drove them here. They came here to escape a barren landscape of opportunity, full of corruption, and murder of courageous officials and the most vulnerable. We have turned a blind eye to integrity, honesty, and protection of those we claim we are trying to help – Mexican and Guatemalan farm workers.”

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

We have roughly eleven and a half million illegal immigrants in the U.S., the overwhelming majority of whom are hard-working and actually pay taxes. The notion that a careful process to issue those few in Vermont with identification cards or driving cards will either affect immigration enforcement or threaten national security by its existence simply exalts fear over reason. Reason prevailed today.”

Rep. Mrowicki of Putney explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Buenos tardes mes amigos, I vote yes to honor my immigrant grandparents. I haven’t forgotten where I came from. I vote yes to welcome new immigrants, new Americans, and to help move Vermont into the 21st century. Viva los nuevos inmigrantes.”

Rep. Terenzini of Rutland Town explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted against this bill because it is a breach of homeland security.”

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote, no. The answer lies in Federal immigration reform, which I believe is within our grasp. Today, in order to help people who are undocumented, we ignored the serious concerns of law enforcement and the reality of what has happened in other states. The potential consequences of our actions could be very serious. We chose to ignore those concerns.”

Page 70

S.82 - Shall the House proposal of amendment be amended as recommended by Rep. Wright of Burlington?

Rep. Gage of Rutland City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted for this amendment because Vermonters should not have to pay for litigation in connection with S.82 when much larger states have chosen not to go down this road, given that litigation estimates are between 6-11 million dollars if we lose this case; it could cost this average working family in Vermont about \$55.00.”

Rep. Koch of Barre Town explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

As an attorney, I am not afraid to battle for what I think is right in court. But before I do so, I take care to assess my chances of success.

In this case, I believe the Supreme Court of the United States will find that the bill’s effort to restrict contributions to what have come to be known as ‘super PACS’ violates the First Amendment right of free speech.

We are assured that a court challenge to this provision will be filed, and a loss by the State of Vermont will result in payment of ‘loser fees,’ probably in excess of \$5 million.

I think we have better uses for the taxpayers’ money.”

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

By opposing this amendment, this body just took a good bill and made it into a costly multi-million dollar law suit that we are likely to lose. When we do not learn from history we are doomed to repeat history. Clearly, at least in the House, we have not learned from history. The language from the 2nd Circuit Court of Appeals makes clear why this is a mistake. May the Senate save us."

Page 71

S.82 - Shall the bill pass in concurrence with proposal of amendment?

Rep. Kilmartin of Newport City explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I vote 'no'. We are not being 'first again in the nation', as so proudly claimed. Fool us once, shame on you. Fool us twice, shame on us, the Vermont House of Representatives.

We fooled ourselves once, at a taxpayer cost of over \$7 million to have the Supreme Court laugh at us. We have been warned by many credible voices, including those who do not like super-Pacs. We show ourselves not merely fools twice. We show ourselves small minded actors in the theatre of the absurd for all the world to see. To this absurd theatre we will pay the price of admission to the tune of millions of dollars of Vermont taxpayers' money.

Instead of protecting the public treasury, we squander it on a form of death with no dignity, only derision and ridicule as the House hears passes by the streets lined with Vermont taxpayers.

The ultimate absurdity will be heard from the lips of a Supreme Court Justice: 'Mr. Attorney General, did that super-Pac win one election.' Attorney General: 'No.'"

Rep. Koch of Barre Town explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I wish the committee had produced a bill that we could all vote for, and indeed, they came very close. Overall, this is a very good bill.

A few sections are troublesome, however, notably the attempt to restrict the First Amendment rights relative to 'super-PACS.' I simply cannot vote to commit millions of dollars of the taxpayers' money to what I believe will be a losing court case."

Rep. Pearson of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I voted no. It seems to me we had an opportunity to pass a strong campaign finance bill. We could have protected the grassroots nature of Vermont's politics as we tried to do several times under the previous administration. Instead we have opened our doors to big money's influence and welcomed the damaging impact that comes with it."

Rep. Poirier of Barre City explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I voted no because this bill allows unlimited contributions to major party candidates, and thus makes independent candidates an endangered species. And furthermore, I do not believe wealthy people should lose their First Amendment Rights."

H.112 - Shall the bill be read a third time?

Rep. Ellis of Waterbury explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

The labeling of genetically-engineered foods will promote the free flow of information, the marketplace of ideas and the discovery of truth, ideals that are embodied in, and protected by, the 1st Amendment of the U.S. Constitution. Vermont won the mercury-labeling case. This bill, too, can survive a constitutional challenge. I vote yes."

Rep. Fay of St. Johnsbury explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes. Members opposed to genetically engineered food labeling have likened concerns about health risks to baseless conspiracy theories. Biotech companies could put all this to rest by simply submitting their products for legitimate, independent testing. Instead, we're asked to take them at their word. The revolving door between the regulators and the industry they are appointed to regulate gives me no confidence. In the absence of these checks and balances, we have the right to clear labeling so that consumers can make informed choices about what we eat and what we feed our children."

Rep. Goodwin of Weston explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I voted yes with the sincere hope that this bill will be transformed by amending modification to a bill I can vote for again."

Rep. Grad of Moretown explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

My yes vote is to support the legitimate and strong state interests set forth in this bill of food safety, public health, economic development, environmental protection and the prevention of consumer confusion and deception."

Rep. Higley of Lowell explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I'm not opposed to knowing what's in our food products but I believe we are going about it the wrong way by supporting this particular bill."

Rep. Hubert of Milton explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I voted no.as we are doing this backwards, making 85% change instead of promoting the 15%who are doing it now."

Rep. Kilmartin of Newport City explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I vote 'no' for several reasons:

1. The laudable goal of fully informed food buying decisions by Vermonters will not be achieved by this bill. This bill misleads the consuming public into a false sense of security. The goal can be achieved cost-effectively by making it easier for gmo-free producers and retailers to label their products 'gmo free' or 'no gmo ingredients'.
2. The real gmo problems lay with Supreme Court decisions allowing genetic alteration of life forms to be patented commercially, while allowing the owners of those patents to defy antitrust considerations. The lack of Court or Congressional imposed restrictions, including restrictions on vertical monopolies on gmo

seeds, fertilizers, pesticides, and end products, the current trespass perversions and unconscionable contract provisions, etc., prevent an individual state from untying the existing federal Gordian knot.

3. With this bill, Vermont is going to offend the First Amendment, interstate commerce clause and federal exclusivity over patents, copyrights, and other intellectual property. Congress enhanced the Gordian knot by recently granting huge liability exemptions to Monsanto and other predatory corporations, which are already close to monopolizing, and jeopardizing the security of, our food chain through gmOs.

4. Finally, for the second day in a row, this House parades on the stage of the theatre of the absurd. While this bill has a marginally greater chance of surviving court challenge than the caps on Super-Pacs, the difference, between a million-to-one and five-hundred-thousand-to-one, is statistically insignificant. If we get hit with Plaintiff's attorney's fees to the tune of several million dollars, Vermont consumers and taxpayers are twice the victims of consumer fraud perpetrated by those who claim to protect them and their purse. For the second day, we send the House hearse down the street with its undignified occupants wearing the proverbial 'Emperor's new clothes.'

Quite a picture, indeed!"

Rep. Koch of Barre Town explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

While I fully support the intent of this bill, I cannot vote for it, because I believe it is unlikely to survive a court challenge to its constitutionality.

No other state has passed a similar bill; they all seem to be waiting for Vermont to go first and 'lead the nation.' What they mean is that they don't want to risk their taxpayers' money – they want us to risk Vermonters' money. That is a 5 to 10 million dollar risk, and one that I am not willing to take.

Have we learned nothing from our losses in the rBST, campaign finance, and data mining cases?"

Rep. Lippert of Hinesburg explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

When we passed Civil Unions, we were told that Vermont would be boycotted and that our tourism industry would die.

When we passed mercury labeling requirements, we were told that fluorescent lightbulbs would no longer be for sale in Vermont to light our homes and offices.

Now we are told that if we pass GE labeling, we will lose our boxes of corn flakes and face empty grocery store shelves.

Let us move forward and lead the nation once again.

I vote yes, once again, without fear."

Rep. Mitchell of Fairfax explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I voted no on this bill with the idea that there is no need to put Vermont in a \$10 million jeopardy. Let others lead and we can follow for a change."

Rep. Mrowicki of Putney explained his vote as follows:

Plain and simple, Vermonters are asking for the right to know what is in their food. I vote yes so Vermonters know we're listening."

Rep. Russell of Rutland City explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I vote 'no' as I am concerned with possible job losses in my Rutland district. In addition, I have concern that this legislation may expose the state to costs through possible litigation."

Rep. Scheuermann of Stowe explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes on this bill with significant reservations. While I wholeheartedly support full transparency in this regard, I am very concerned about the estimated 5-10 million dollars of Vermont taxpayer money that will be at risk for an all-but-certain lawsuit.

I also have significant concerns about the effects it will have on our state’s thriving specialty food industry. I am hopeful that when the Senate takes this legislation up next year, they will take into consideration these concerns and modify it accordingly so that it is a bill everybody can support.”

Rep. Shaw of Pittsford explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

My constituents have spoken and my yes vote indicates their wishes.”

Rep. Spengler of Colchester explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I’m looking forward to truth in labeling as my European cousins are able to enjoy. Thank you Monsanto for supporting European GMO labeling.”

Rep. Wizowaty of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I believe we have carefully and thoroughly vetted the constitutional issues raised and have ended with an excellent, defensible bill that promotes the public welfare. I am proud of our work.”

Rep. Zagar of Barnard explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I want to believe that genetically engineered foods are perfectly safe and have been sufficiently tested and regulated, for my sake and the sake of everyone else I know who consumes them because of their unacknowledged presence in most of the food we eat. But I don’t. I have a right and a reason to know what I’m being sold in a free market.”

S.152 – Shall the House suspend its rules to take up consideration of a non-germane amendment?

Rep. Browning of Arlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes to at least consider reducing uncertainty and increasing choice for Vermonters by making participation in the proposed Health Benefits Exchange voluntary instead of mandatory. We do not know if the new website system will be ready and we need a better backup for Vermonters in place NOW.”

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

In less than 5 months over 100,000 Vermonters will be forced into buying their health insurance on the health benefit exchange, an entity that as of today does not exist. I want to be sure that there is coverage available when Vermonters need it. We understand that a safety net exists, but what is wrong with allowing people to gradually migrate onto the system over the next 18 months? Thank you.”

S.152 – Shall the bill pass in concurrence with proposal of amendment?

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I will not vote for a bill that makes a conscious and deliberate statement of exclusion of mental health from the policy discussion table.”

Rep. Poirier of Barre City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted yes because if this bill does not pass there will be no consumer advocacy before the Green Mountain Care Board. This legislature has taken the Department of Financial Regulation out of consumer protection.”

Page 75

H.112 - Shall the bill be amended as recommended by Rep. Johnson of Canaan?

Rep. Conquest of Newbury explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted no because I believe this proposed labeling requirement would clearly be struck down as preempted by federal law. But I wholeheartedly support the idea that we all benefit from more information about our food, including expanded country of origin labeling.”

Rep. Koch of Barre Town explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I agree with the member from Canaan that the loopholes in federal labeling law are truly disturbing, but I believe that this amendment suffers from some of the same constitutional deficiencies as the underlying bill. Once again, I need to vote NO in order to spare Vermont’s taxpayers from a costly loss in court.”

Rep. Toleno of Brattleboro explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This amendment does nothing to address the underlying legitimate concerns about GE foods which this bill addresses. It is federally pre-empted and will not help Vermont citizens avoid potential health and environmental risks from GE foods, nor further their freedom to live in harmony with their ethical and religious tenets.

H.112 – Shall the bill pass?

Rep. Bartholomew of Hartland explained his vote as follows:

Vermont has a compelling state interest in the labeling of food products manufactured from genetically engineered crops.

The FDA disregarded the concerns raised by its own scientists when it adopted a policy that requires no safety assessment of new genetically engineered food products coming onto the market.

Numerous studies and findings have identified potential health risks associated with these foods in both animals and humans, including tumors, liver and kidney problems, flu-like symptoms, skin irritation, immune system responses, digestive disorders, serious reproductive disorders, and an increased incidence of food intolerance and food allergies.

There are also significant environmental concerns. Herbicide-tolerant weeds are on the rise around the world, leading to a huge increase in the use of ever-more potent herbicides.

Unfortunately, significant disagreement remains among scientific experts about the safety of genetically engineered foods. There are numerous unanswered questions because important safety studies have not been done. Labeling will serve as a risk management measure to deal with scientific uncertainty.

Vermont has the opportunity to lead the way so that the United States might finally join the 60 other nations that already require labeling of genetically engineered products.

There is enough evidence already published in the scientific literature to give us serious pause regarding the safety of these food products. Polls have shown that 95% of Vermonters want these products labeled. This extends well beyond simple consumer curiosity because there is enough doubt about the safety of these products to make it clear that consumers have a right to know; to be able to make informed choices regarding what they eat, one of the most basic of human needs.

Rep. Batchelor of Derby explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted no, not because I don’t want to know what is in our food but because we cannot afford to be the only state requiring this information. This should be a request by the Federal Government.”

Rep. Bouchard of Colchester explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted no. I would prefer that Oregon pick up the bill.”

Rep. Burditt of West Rutland explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

We have sugar free – fat free – gluten free – caffeine free and many other labels so listed ‘free.’ Why not GMO/GE free? Vermont has just missed an opportunity to enhance and market its products as GMO/GE free. We chose to knock down one industry to level the playing field instead of marketing and raising our respected Vermont brand to the top.”

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I strongly support the right of people to know what is in their food. There were two ways to achieve this: a likely unconstitutional violation of corporate free speech by mandating labeling of 80% or more of our food products, or a more likely constitutional ban on the mislabeling of foods as ‘natural’ when they include genetically engineered ingredients. A ban on mislabeling would equally allow consumers to identify GE-free foods, and I therefore proposed an amendment to pass only that section of the bill. Because we have retained the mandatory labeling section along with the ban on mislabeling, I am very regretfully unable to vote yes.”

Rep. Feltus of Lyndon explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I support identification of genetically engineered ingredients in our foods; however I believe this to be of national jurisdiction rather than a state responsibility. I also believe the probable consequences of market disruption and litigation will be detrimental to all Vermonters.”

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Vermont did not win its independence by fearing the unknown costs or by cowering before superior power. Our decision today honors those same values. We have acted to protect Vermonters’ basic right simply to know what they are eating. None of us can safely predict whether we will win or lose in that effort. Not to try, though, would be to have conceded that fight before it even began.”

Rep. Smith of New Haven explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I voted no on this bill; however I support the right to know. I am quite confident when I go into a store to purchase food knowing that 90+% of our corn, soybean and canola are being grown from gmo seed I can be quite certain that the foods I purchase contain GMO's . If I don't want to purchase these products I already have the option to purchase certified organic food or foods from the gmo free project, both are certified gmo free.

During testimony on this issue we heard that a state gmo labeling bill could cost the state up to \$5 -\$10 million to defend. Why expose Vermont to this risk when we have other options?

Research done by several universities indicates that food costs would go up 3 % to 10% for each and every consumer if we require this gmo labeling.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration currently requires labeling of GE foods if the food has a significantly different nutritional property; if a new food includes an allergen that consumers would not expect to be present (e.g., a peanut protein in a soybean product); or if a food contains a toxicant beyond acceptable limits. Early in 2001, the FDA proposed voluntary guidelines for labeling food that does or does not contain GE ingredients.

A voluntary labeling option made on the national level or the state level would eliminate Vermont's exposure to a law suit and still let me know what is in my foods and still give me the option to purchase good healthy foods at a reasonable cost.

Thank you."

Rep. Webb of Shelburne explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

Nothing in this bill bans the right to sell or purchase products containing items produced with genetic engineering. It simply allows us the right to make an informed choice. Nothing in this bill restricts the right to grow products produced through genetic engineering. It simply allows us to make an informed choice. Nothing in this bill attempts to invade a biotech company's patent rights. It simply allows us to make an informed choice. We ask for this right based on emerging health concerns, religious laws, moral and ethical convictions, economic opportunity, environmental concerns and consumer choice. Passage of this labeling is not a matter of "if" we will get this right; it is a matter of "when." As goes Vermont. So goes the nation.

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

My no vote reflects my belief in labeling and consumer information, but also my concerns with this particular bill. The chief executive of our state appeared to express similar concerns to the Rutland Chamber of Commerce in an article in the Times Argus titled 'Shumlin: GMO labeling good, bill bad.'"

S.129 – Shall the bill pass in concurrence with proposal of amendment?

Rep. Poirier of Barre City explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I voted yes because there are good provisions in the bill. I can only hope that once we pay off the debt, we the legislature will support accelerated increases for the employees who have been frozen since 2008."

Rep. Russell of Rutland City explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I am a former 33 year member of an airline union and am always most supportive of workers' rights and benefits. I will vote 'Yes' in support of the Commerce Committee's always fine work in hopes that next year will be brighter economically for Vermont."

S.18 – Shall the bill be read a third time?

Rep. Burditt of West Rutland explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

We regulate people, places, things and business. Even though I don’t believe this bill goes far enough, regulating government to stop infringing on citizens can’t go far enough.”

Rep. Lippert of Hinesburg explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes for the additional regulations that this legislation imposes on law enforcement’s use of ALPR - automated license plate recognition systems - and look forward to this body’s more in depth consideration of privacy and civil liberties concerns before the 2015 sunset of this regulation.”

Rep. Malcolm of Pawlet explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes for this bill to create some level of regulation to this situation. However, the issue of surveillance of the public and its potential for abuse needs much more discussion by this legislature than this bill provides.”

H.530 - Shall the House adopt the report of the Committee of Conference?

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

My yes vote is in recognition of the work of the committees to bring a budget with a growth rate that is much more sustainable than that of the budget that passed this body earlier in the session. However, I remain concerned about the use of \$55 million in one-time dollars and not addressing the pension issues in the future. Thank you.”

Rep. Wizowaty of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I’m voting for the investments we’ve made with this budget – in mental health services, Choices for Care, Legal Aid, increased reimbursements for Medicaid providers, LIHEAP, and more. We live in an imperfect world and I might wish we could do more, but I’m glad for what we’ve been able to accomplish.”
