Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

It is the height of legislative arrogance to choose to act on a bill instead of delaying by less than two weeks at no negative consequence of a delay to await a report of experts on what issues we ought to be considering. We say we want to do this with care. This blatantly disregards that use of care.”

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I supported this motion to delay action at least until we have a critical report due just eleven days from now. Apparently the stampede to legalize takes precedent over everything else at this point. Isn't this issue important enough to Vermonters to get all available information first? The answer is a disappointing no.”

Rep. Browning of Arlington explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted yes to keep our communities safe and to limit the amount of marijuana that a person can hold from growing marijuana. Those who vote no have created an opportunity that drug dealers may exploit.”

H. 511 Shall the House concur in the Senate proposal of amendment with further amendment as offered by Rep. Conquest of Newbury as amended?

Rep. Bancroft of Westford explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I am profoundly disappointed in this body’s decision to legalize marijuana. If I was not a legislator, I am fairly confident, I would be sitting at home, hoping for legalization. As an elected representative, I have the duty to evaluate the social and economic cost and benefits of proposed legislation. My personal opinion is subservient to the best interest of the residents of this state. During my three-year tenure in the House, I have heard from hundreds of individuals on this issue. The majority oppose legalization. More important than the numerical majority opposing, is the credentials of those contacting me. I have heard from scores of physicians, medical researchers, educators, law enforcement officials and drug treatment professionals. They are absolutely adamant in their opposition to legalization. To ignore these professionals is foolhardy.”

Rep. Bartholomew of Hartland explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

We should never ignore the lessons of history. Prohibition has never worked and never will.”

Rep. Burditt of West Rutland explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

There is a Libertarian saying that talks about keeping government out of our bedrooms and out of our wallets. This bill goes even further to keep government out of our lives.”

Rep. Cina of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

Substance use should be treated as a healthcare matter, not as a crime. By passing judgement on others for the way that they deal with pain or seek pleasure, one further fuels the stigma that drives addiction. May all people be empowered to reduce the harm of their personal choices and to live free. Let this be another step towards the end of the war on drugs.”

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

The reasonable proposal to remove sanctions for adult use and cultivation of marijuana isn’t important enough to me to do it with the disregard of public safety and child protection that we have shown today.”

Rep. Fagan of Rutland City explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I vote no. If our action today leads to the harming of even one Vermonter, we have grievously erred in what we have done. I vote no.”

Rep. Forguites of Springfield explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker,

“After much self-deliberation, I vote “yes.”

If I ask myself if the possession of marijuana is legalized in Vermont is that a great thing for the State and humanity in general, the answer I get back is “no”.

If I ask myself if the possession of marijuana is not legalized in Vermont will it decrease the amount of marijuana that is presently being used in Vermont, the answer I get back is “no and it may increase usage”.

If I ask myself if the possession of marijuana is legalized in Vermont will it bring much needed revenue into the State from taxing the sale of it, the answer I get back is “yes” but my personal feeling is that if the possession of marijuana is legalized it should be done because it is felt that it is the right thing to do and not because it will bring revenue to the State. Legalizing something because it will bring revenue to the State is not a good way of governing in my opinion.

I have heard from constituents on both sides of this issue and my vote will disappoint some of them.

I respect the positions of law enforcement and health personnel and realize that passage of this bill will not make things any easier for them

But, at a time when our lakes are covered with green slime so that people cannot swim in them;

At a time when kids go to school hungry in the morning;

At a time when people are struggling to stay warm because of a lack of adequate housing;

And, while I may not agree with everything in the bill;

It is time to move on and deal with the issues the citizens of the state elected us to work on.”

Rep. Krowinski of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted in favor of this thoughtful and incremental approach to marijuana legalization. Vermonters are ready and support it. It is time to move forward.”

Rep. Martel of Waterford explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted no. This morning we all sang the state song “These Green Mountains”. These hills will now become a safe haven for marijuana growers. So much for calling these green, soon to be brown, mountains home. This is a sad day for Vermonters.”

Rep. McCoy of Poultney explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

To pass a marijuana bill without waiting eleven days for the report from the Governor’s Marijuana Advisory Commission and without including provisions for education, stricter highway safety laws, the safety of our citizens and, most importantly, the safety of our children, is an embarrassment.”

Rep. Van Wyck of Ferrisburgh explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted no. Vermont has a huge substance abuse problem. The preponderance of evidence indicates that legalization would exacerbate this problem. This legislation is irresponsible and reckless.”

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker,

I voted no. We cannot claim we are making the roads safer, or decreasing teen usage, or keeping people from going to jail for small amounts of marijuana. While Vermonters take a 9.4 cent increase on their property taxes, we don’t say let them eat cake, rather let them smoke a joint. We should have waited for more and better information, both from a report due in 11 days, as well as Colorado. This is a mistake that we will not be able to go back from, once done.”

H. 633 Shall the bill be read a third time?

Rep. Krowinski of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted yes for this budget adjustment because it continues to support our most vulnerable Vermonters while preparing us for the fiscal uncertainty in Washington, D.C. These targeted investments support working families so all Vermonters have a fair shot.”

H. 691 Shall the bill pass?

Rep. Colburn of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I support this bill because of convincing evidence that primary seat belt laws save lives and help to reduce racial disparities in roadside fatalities.

That said, I am concerned about creating any new opportunities that may add to racial disparities in traffic stops and ticketing. Collecting data is not enough. Eliminating disparities and bias requires evaluating and using that data to enact meaningful change. We can and must do better.”

Rep. Van Wyck of Ferrisburgh explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted no. Though in general I support primary seat belt enforcement, I don't support making ordinary drivers law-breakers for performing routine, trivial, low-risk, momentary activities with their vehicles, The body should pass common sense legislation and not treat adult drivers as third graders, who lack reasonable judgment.”

H. 410 Shall the bill be read a third time?

Rep. Krowinski of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

Adopting these efficiency standards is a win-win for Vermonters because we lower energy use while saving families and businesses money. I voted yes to adopt these standards because they move us forward on clean energy solutions in our communities and hopefully our country.”

H. 562 Shall the bill be amended as offered by Rep. Donahue of Northfield?

Rep. Rachelson of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I strongly believe that Vermonters need a privacy protection law for genetic testing and results. This amendment, while well intentioned, addresses the issue on the fly and has unintended consequences.”

H. 562 Shall the bill be amended as offered by Rep. Donahue of Northfield?

Rep. Cina of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I support this amendment as an improvement to current practices. However I have continued concerns about the rights of an individual to privacy and bodily integrity, especially in legal matters in which they may have no other connection besides their genetics.”

Page 26

H.R. 19 Shall the resolution be adopted?

Rep. Cina of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

Article 1 of the Vermont Constitution states that ‘all persons are born equally free and independent and have certain natural, inherent, and unalienable rights.’ We must not rest until we repair the harm of our past, by uprooting and ending systemic racism in our present. Only then will we create a future where our societal institutions protect and serve all people, in ways that guarantee liberty and justice for all.”

Rep. Condon of Colchester explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

Although I have some issues with the wording of this resolution, I vote yes in recognition of the oppression faced by most ethnic groups, African Americans, Bosnian Americans, Irish Americans, Italian Americans and so many others. We should all unite against oppression.”

Rep. Joseph of North Hero explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted yes but want to make it clear that I do not accept the suggestion that the criminal justice system in Vermont is as bad as those in other states.”

Rep. Rosenquist of Georgia explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

My son-in-law is a man of color; I love him dearly. However, I could not vote for this resolution since I believe it causes a greater separation between all people. I believe all lives matter – black and white and all together.”

Rep. Sharpe of Bristol explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

Events of the last couple of years have reminded me that although we may have made progress in my lifetime toward the vision put forth in the founding of this nation that ‘all men are created equal’, we still have far to go to realize the dream of Dr. Martin Luther King.”

Rep. Strong of Albany explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted yes on this resolution and I would like to acknowledge the disproportionate number of black unborn children that have been aborted in our country that would have been included in the number of black lives that matter.”

Rep. Stuart of Brattleboro explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

This resolution brings a long dark chapter of America’s history out of the darkness and into the light. Madam Speaker, may this resolution be one of many steps that affirm to Vermonters and everyone who wishes to visit, work, live, and play in our great state that black lives matter.”

Rep. Van Wyck of Ferrisburgh explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker,

I voted No. Same reasons as last year. I’ll email you a statement if you wish. Too long to say now.”

Page 28

H. 294 Shall the bill be amended as recommended by the Committee on General, Housing, and Military Affairs?

Rep. Krowinski of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

It’s time to rewrite the rules so that women’s work and contributions are fully valued. Women in Vermont are paid 84 cents for every dollar paid to men, amounting to an annual wage gap of nearly \$8,000. The practice of having to disclose one’s current salary only reinforces the pay gap by gender or race in our state. By eliminating this step, we can help level the playing field. I am proud to support this equal pay bill.”

Page 29

H. 624 Shall the bill be amended as recommended by the Committee on Government Operations?

Rep. Donovan of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

President Trump stated 3 to 5 million voted illegally in 2016. After a thorough investigation by the Brennan Center of Justice at New York University it was determined to be fake news.

President Trump then stated he lost New Hampshire because thousands of Massachusetts residents were bussed to the neighboring state to cast ballots against him. After thorough investigation, this too was determined to be fake news.”

Rep. Giambatista of Essex explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

Vermont is a leader on ensuring the right to vote for all of our citizens. When a national commission was convened to collect sensitive voter data from Vermont and other states, I heard my neighbors’ calls for privacy loud and clear. The passage of this bill is an important step to ensure personal and private voter information is kept secure. I urge the body to pass this sensible bill.”

H. 764 Shall the bill be read a third time?

Rep. Mrowicki of Putney explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I want to thank the Chair of Judiciary for the reminder that this bill is another tool to protect those who’ve experienced domestic abuse and another way we can offer support to those who’ve experienced domestic abuse and say we support you, in staying safe.”

Rep. Stuart of Brattleboro explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I’m proud of the good work the House Commerce and Economic Development, Ways and Means, and Judiciary Committees did on this bill. Madam Speaker, protecting our fellow Vermonters’ private personal information from bad actors who would use such information for nefarious purpose is a duty I take more seriously than ever in our interconnected world. Madam Speaker, this is a good step in the right direction of protecting Vermonters’ private personal information.”

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

The notion that this bill will protect consumers from someone gathering your information, which is currently available public, is false. To suggest otherwise misleads the very constituents we are supposedly attempting to protect! Thank you.”

H. 582 Shall the bill be read a third time?

Rep. Bancroft of Westford explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

While I support the objective of this bill, I cannot vote for it unless I am provided with a better understanding of the historical transfers from the Universal Service Fund to the Connectivity Fund and the use of these transferred monies. I also want to know, if the Service Fund assessment is not increased to 2.5%, is it reasonable to believe there will be between \$1.5 and \$2 million in the Universal Service Fund that can be transferred to the Connectivity Fund.”

Rep. Martel of Waterford explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted no on bill H.582.

I am sick of this body always tacking a ‘little bit’ on our utility bills to raise money, as it never stops and it always ends up with increases, all we do is continue to pay, pay, pay, and it never disappears, another foot in the door.”

Rep. Sibilias of Dover explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

All Vermonters deserve to be connected to modern life.”

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I support expanding high speed internet to all Vermonters. However, I am opposed to increasing the USF fee/tax which has been robbed before on the premise it will be restored in four years. Thank you.”

Rep. Viens of Newport City explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

Connectivity in rural Vermont is critical, but until we get a true cost and a plan to implement this service I cannot support this bill.”

Rep. Yantachka of Charlotte explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I vote yes. Economic development requires investment. Even a small investment is better than none.”

Rep. Young of Glover explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I supported the bill to bring basic infrastructure to my communities. In 2018 it is time to join the 21st century. We talk about bringing young people to Vermont, but without action it is just talk. I thank the body for taking action, because doing nothing is not an economic development strategy for rural Vermont.”

H. 636 Shall the recommendation of amendment of the Committee on Natural Resources, Fish, and Wildlife be amended as offered by Reps. Smith of Derby and Helm of Fair Haven in the second instance (Section 17)?

Rep. Rachelson of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

While I appreciate the importance and significance of this new crime, I cannot in good conscience vote to keep the “up to 60 day jail time” on the books. Prison, which our country overuses, has significant negative consequences and cost for society. I’d support community service or home detention as more fitting substitutes.”

Page 37

H. 636 Shall the bill pass?

Rep. Bartholomew of Hartland explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

Coyotes are neither vermin nor cuddly forest creatures. They are predators at the top of the food chain. They are part of an increasingly dysfunctional ecosystem. If humans did not continue to attempt to eradicate our predators, we would not find it necessary to expend so much energy into managing our wildlife populations. Organized competitions to kill coyotes should not be permitted. We should have learned the lessons about killing off our predators in the last century.

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I support banning the coyote hunt contests. I also supported eliminating jail time for now, with the hope that the penalties now in place will work. But I hope that we do indeed reserve jail time for serious animal cruelty offenses. There should be no mistake: humans should go to jail for many animal cruelty offenses, and other crimes as well.”

H. 675 Shall the report of the Committee on Judiciary be amended as offered by Rep. LaLonde of South Burlington in the first instance only (Section 1a)?

Rep. Deen of Westminster explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

This is a good amendment. It came through our House process. We are not in business to please the Senate. We are here to do our job.”

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I believe that I can say with some certainty that every person in this chamber is deeply concerned about the use of weapons by those who intend to do great harm. We also know there are difficult issues whenever we are balancing individual rights and the common good. I deeply regret that decisions and actions tonight prevented us from a unified voice on one specific action that could have moved to a rapid resolution. Other measures could still have been, and others, still will be debated separately. But we refused to stand together in the one arena that could have brought both bodies in this building together, tonight.”

Rep. Krowinski of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted yes because support for the second amendment goes hand in hand with keeping the guns out of the hands of dangerous people. I’m voting for what my constituents asked me to vote for.”

Rep. Lewis of Berlin explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

It is so unfortunate that this amendment falls under a political tit for tat. We were offered a bill and a reasonable amendment by the member from Northfield. An amendment that exactly replicates S. 221 as passed by the Senate unanimously 30-0. And now it seems for pure political motives, a substitute amendment was accepted. No wonder residents of this state are fed up with politicians. Our families are looking to us to make common sense laws and not play ping pong. This is a disgrace.”

Rep. McFaun of Barre Town explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted no on H. 675 because at this last minute H. 675 was amended to change a bill this House Judiciary committee had voted in favor 10-0-1, that could have been amended by a Senate bill S. 221 that passed the Senate 30 to 0 which together would have been a common sense gun bill and I would have supported. And maybe we all could have supported. I believe this is a perfect example of this political maneuvering that takes place in Washington that produces absolutely nothing. I believe we are going to get the same result when this bill goes to the Senate, absolutely nothing. I refuse to be part of this maneuvering that produces nothing that makes Vermont a safer place to live.

Rep. Stuart of Brattleboro explained her vote as follows”

“Madam Speaker:

I am very proud to have voted for this bill and this amendment. May we lead and may the Senate follow.”

Page 39

H. 675 Shall the report of the Committee on Judiciary be amended as offered by Rep. LaLonde of South Burlington in the second instance only (Sections 1b and 1c)?

Rep. Till of Jericho explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I vote yes. Domestic violence is a problem in Vermont. Vermont has the eighth highest rate of domestic violence in the country. Nearly half of the adult murders in Vermont occur in the setting of

domestic violence. 69% of those murders are with firearms. We need to take guns away from people who shouldn't have them especially at the times we know are most dangerous.”

Page 40

H. 675 Shall the report of the Committee on Judiciary as amended be further amended as offered by Rep. Donahue of Northfield?

Rep. Grad of Moretown explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted no on this amendment so we can pass a strong and effective bill that truly serves public safety.”

Rep. McCoy of Poultney explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

We had a real opportunity to come together in unity today, joining with our fellow legislators in the Senate, and pass S. 221; a bill voted out by the Senate 30-0. The Senate dealt with this issue in a non-partisan way. I am truly disappointed that we could not rise together, and do the same.”

Rep. Sullivan of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I'm not sure when it became more important to have a kumbyah moment on the floor of the House than to stick with our values and to represent our constituents.”

Rep. Yacovone of Morristown explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

The test of our progress has little to do with whether we get along or go along, though to be clear civility is paramount. Bipartisanship is important but our standard is not whether those of divergent opinions can come together. Our standard should be the safety of the children. Individual rights are important, but the welfare of our children must always come first.”

Page 41

H. 675 Shall the bill be read a third time?

Rep. Cina of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

Guns don't kill people, people kill people. And guns won't keep us safe, people can keep people safe, through the power of our relationships to each other. Although we may not all agree on the path forward, it is clear to me that the people here in this body care about the people of Vermont. Let this be another step towards greater public safety and a society that resolves its differences through peaceful means and not through violence.”

Rep. Morris of Bennington explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

My son will soon be 7. He has been doing active shooter drills since the age of 3. I will never forget the terror I felt when I got the call informing me of a lock down on his campus pre-school due to a nearby threat. In honor of his life and the lives, courage, and voices of the Vermont youth who demand we do better, I cast my vote to be on the right side of history. I will not turn my back on their truths.”

Rep. Sibilias of Dover explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted yes after extensive deliberation, because this bill increases protections for our people and that we have done that while protecting the Second Amendment.”

Page 42

H. 707 Shall the bill be amended as recommended by the Committee on General, Housing, and Military Affairs?

Rep. Copeland-Hanzas of Bradford explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

Vermonters are cheering the great work of the General, Commerce, and Judiciary Committees in reviewing and passing this bill today. But don’t take my word for it. Here are a few quotes from postcards I got in the mail from two high school students yesterday. ‘I think it is very important that you’re trying to protect victims of sexual harassment and make it easier for them to come forward. Thank you for creating a bill that could help so many Vermonters.’ And, ‘As a 15 year old girl, knowing that actual positive change is coming of the #MeToo movement, gives me hope. I look forward to entering a workforce in a society where your bill has passed and brought about a safer culture.’”

Rep. Stuart of Brattleboro explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

When I moved to Vermont after pursuing my professional career for fourteen years in New York City, I believed I was moving to a kinder, gentler state. Sadly, I suffered the most devastating harassment experience of my career here in Vermont shortly before I became a State Representative eight years ago. Luckily for me, my husband is an attorney, and justice prevailed.

I want to thank State Representative Copeland-Hanzas and the House Committees that crafted this bill for their excellent work. Thanks to this legislation, henceforth sexual harassment will have no home here in the great state of Vermont.”

Page 43

H. 639 Shall the bill be read a third time?

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

Access to relevant diagnostic imaging for all diseases is vital, but we have not found a way to get there yet. This bill forces those who are on their own with cost sharing for imaging for their lung cancer, heart disease, or prostate cancer, to pay added costs in their insurance for the benefit of those with one specific illness. This is bad public policy.”

Rep. Krowinski of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I vote yes because 2 out of 8 Vermont women will be diagnosed with breast cancer and that is unacceptable. Any barriers we remove to ensure women have access to critical screenings will save lives. Thank you.”

Rep. Till of Jericho explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

The women of Vermont deserve this victory. H.639 removes the financial barriers to early detection of breast cancer which is so painfully common in Vermont. This bill will reduce cases of advanced breast cancer in our state and increase chance of survival for those unfortunate enough to develop the disease.”

Page 44

H. 730 Shall the bill be amended as offered by the Committee on Natural Resources, Fish, and Wildlife as amended in the first instance only (Sections 1, 3, 4, and 5)?

Keefe of Manchester explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I grew up in Franklin County, as did my mom. I believe we should be giving Lake Carmi help and attention. But this bill seems to give the Secretary of Natural Resources unlimited power to impose conditions that are beyond anything set forth in existing statute or rule. Regardless of other intentions of this bill, I cannot endorse conveying this seemingly limitless power to an executive agent.”

Page 45

H. 730 Shall the bill be amended as recommended by the Committee on Natural Resources, Fish, and Wildlife, as amended, in the second instance only (Section 2)?

Rep. Brumsted of Shelburne explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I stand in explanation of my no vote, Madame Speaker. I am very supportive of clean waterways for our ponds and lakes, and I applaud the committee for setting up a process for designating a lake in crisis so that they can access important state assistance, but to set up a process and then declare who will realize this designation first in the same bill seems unfair. I agree that Lake Carmi is in need and has met all three criteria but after setting up this process shouldn't we give the Secretary the chance to designate the lake, in his/her own and if it does not happen then consider more legislation, otherwise we will be setting up a precedent for more neighbors, communities and towns to come to us to declare their lakes and ponds in crisis.”

Rep. Sheldon of Middlebury explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted yes today because Vermonters have waited long enough for clean water. A yes vote is a vote for clean water.”

Rep. Weed of Enosburgh explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

Lake Carmi is in crisis and it is up to the legislature to deem it so by statute. This bill puts together a process for other lakes to come forward and request the same consideration. It is a good bill and demonstrated commitment to clean water, the reason that many people choose to love and work here. Without clean water we lose our ability to draw people to Vermont to occupy some of these jobs that we are trying to fill. It is not only a necessity, it is our moral obligation to future generations.”

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

My no vote simply reflects a concern about creating a precedent for the legislature in the future, rather than waiting to see if the Secretary would declare the lake in crisis as the process has been designed. I do support all efforts to clean up Lake Carmi.”

Page 47

H. 730 Shall the bill pass?

Rep. Van Wyck of Ferrisburgh explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted No. You never let a serious crisis go to waste. And what I mean by that it's an opportunity to do things you think you could not do before.”

Page 48

House Rule 27 Shall the House grant leave for the Committee on Judiciary to meet while the House is in session?

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

Our processes are intended to protect the voice of the minority. That voice has been trampled on today, through an unconscionable and unprecedented vote by this body. The significance cannot be understated.”

Rep. Webb of Shelburne explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

It has been said the committees do the work of the people; the floor is the show. Enough said.”

Page 50

H. 919 Shall the bill be read a third time?

Rep. Myers of Essex explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I have served in the Legislature for many years, and with deference to the Committee on Corrections and Institutions, I consider H.919 one of the most important bills I had the pleasure to help craft and introduce.”

Rep. Toleno of Brattleboro explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

Central to our commitment to having an economy that works for all is the opportunity all Vermonters deserve, to have training and support they need to access good jobs. Vermont employers also need a system which helps them grow and thrive by connecting them to talent. Now, more than any time in decades, we have found a coalition of stakeholders ready to shift the way we organize our workforce and training system, which is the central achievement of this worthy bill.”

Rep. Van Wyck of Ferrisburgh explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted Yes — for the show.”

Page 51

H. 911 Shall the bill be amended as offered by Reps. Sibilias of Dover and Gannon of Wilmington?

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I vote yes. Without this amendment, the underlying bill creates a new income tax that will be collected back-dated to January. I cannot support a retroactively applied tax.”

Page 52

H. 897 Shall the bill be read a third time?

Rep. Sibilias of Dover explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

Vermont’s demographic and economic challenges are also being felt in our school districts, and perhaps most profoundly in our rural and poor districts.

I and many other members of this body are deeply grateful that our House Education Committee remained committed to the completion of the good work this body, the Senate and the Administration agreed to last year. Studying the accuracy of current weights and the possibility of new student weights for students in low population density districts remains critical work that must be completed in order to ensure equity for our students.

I’m a long term planner in my regular work. When we are trying to solve a problem, if we don’t have up to date data, an accurate accounting of the situation on the ground, and an understanding of our partners, we will conduct a study to make sure we are able to move forward as surely and efficiently as possible. Studies have increasingly been frowned upon in this building, and perhaps we do ask for too

many. Having said that, the information we will glean from this study is long overdue, and our students have been waiting a long time for it. Let's get it done."

Page 54

H. 911 Shall the bill be amended as offered by Rep. Scheuermann of Stowe?

Rep. Gage of Rutland City explained his vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

We need to tie school spending to taxes paid for accountability sake, cause and result. No longer should one town subsidize another. Unfortunately that didn't happen today."

Rep. Graham of Williamstown explained his vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

I voted yes on this amendment for lower property taxes that people in this state have asked for, for a long time."

Rep. Read of Fayston explained his vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

I come from a rural, high-spending district, yet I voted yes. People want local control and this was our opportunity to provide our constituents with what they are asking for, independence and control over their own decisions."

Rep. Smith of Derby explained his vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

I have a obligation to my constituents. I stand behind my promise to my constituents to do everything that I can to reduce their property taxes."

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

It's disappointing that the majority of this body just voted against a 40 cent reduction in the education homestead property tax."

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

We have talked about the need for serious, bold reform for too long on property taxes and education funding reform. Today was a lost opportunity to re-connect voters to local spending decisions, to simplify the system and to reduce property taxes by an average of over 42 percent."

Rep. Young of Glover explained his vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

That was weird. If and when we raise 120 million dollars in income taxes to reform our education finance system, let's make sure we get it right. This wasn't it."

H. 911 Shall the bill pass?

Rep. Colburn of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I appreciate the work of the Ways and Means and Education committees on this complex issue and the many improvements this bill puts forward – most notably a shift to income tax as an education funding mechanism. I represent a district that has cut its school budget significantly year after year, while struggling to meet the needs of a large number of students learning new languages, living with poverty and trauma, and with special education needs. I’m concerned about the impact of this bill on these students through the state mandated cost containment measures on local processes. When school boards, superintendents, municipalities and teachers unions around the state all share these concerns, I think we have more work to do to get it right.”

Rep. Gannon of Wilmington explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I want to thank the House Ways and Means committee for their thoughtful and hard work on this bill. However, the cost containment tax formula will negatively impact many rural school districts, like the school districts in my district, and will not lead to lower K-12 costs statewide. My school districts should not have to wait for the outcome of litigation against the Agency of Education to resolve the inequities that exist in our education funding system.”

Rep. Long of Newfane explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted yes to support H. 911. It responds to the ongoing statewide request to reduce property taxes, refocuses the education fund on PK-12 education and eliminates the tax on social security for low and middle income Vermonters.”

Rep. Lucke of Hartford explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

It is a step forward from current education funding practice here in Vermont, lowering property taxes. It is progress. H. 911 removes several non PreK-12 costs from the education fund, it provides tax relief to Vermonters receiving social security benefits. H. 911 begins the reform process, creating an framework and initial step that will allow for the time and opportunity, hopefully in the next biennium, to effectively develop the type of bold change that must happen in Vermont for our communities and schools.”

Rep. McCoy of Poultney explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

As with any tax change of this magnitude, there are winners and losers. According to the Tax Department and JFO analysis, some of the biggest winners in this plan are several high spending districts who will enjoy the removal of the excess spending threshold. This is, of course, the opposite of what the bill claims to do, which is to increase the consequence of high spending.”

Rep. Poirier of Barre City explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted yes because my community will see a reduction of 19 cents under H. 911. This bill is the only train leaving the Montpelier station.”

Rep. Stevens of Waterbury explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted yes. Maybe I’m naïve, but I would think a bill that returns \$30 million to Vermonters because of the mistakes in the incomprehensible Republican tax bill last December, and one that makes a substantial reduction in property taxes, and one that will give municipalities a better understanding of how their property taxes are used, would have been an unanimous vote. I’m proud to vote for a bill that finally changes the direction of the Titanic we call education financing.”

Rep. Till of Jericho explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I vote yes. H. 911 reduces residential property taxes by 15 cents on average. That is a significant reduction for my constituents. While I wish we had been able to end the income sensitivity program which so confuses taxpayers and complicates our system, H. 911 begins the process of removing expenses from the Education Fund which are not under control of our school boards. Hopefully in the future we’ll find a way to remove the current use expenses from the Education Fund.

H. 911 also removes taxation of social security benefits of middle income Vermonters. It also returns \$30 million to Vermonters that they would have been paid in Vermont Personal Income tax as a result of Federal tax law changes.”

Page 56

S. 55 Shall the House postpone action on the bill until April 10, 2018?

Rep. Grad of Moretown explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted no on this motion for a number of reasons.

First, a public hearing on gun legislation was held 6 weeks ago in this chamber that I and other members attended.

Second, this bill received an enormous amount of testimony in committee.

Third, I, with the help of my committee assistant, have created a public record on my committee page where I forward all emails to be posted there. All paper messages are kept on file.

Fourth, my committee held hearings for House members to testify on S.55.

Fifth, members held public hearings in Barre, Bennington and elsewhere.

Sixth, the Education Committees of this body and the other body held public hearings.

The House Judiciary Committee has done its due diligence thoughtfully and with the utmost process and so I voted no.”

Rep. Hebert of Vernon explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted yes. Many of my constituents have been pleading for a public hearing on this proposed monumental shift in Vermont culture. This refusal by this body to respect and honor their requests is indefensible.”

Rep. Joseph of North Hero explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

There is no need for a delay. I have attended a public meeting where people spoke out about S.55. I placed a description of that meeting in my local newspaper, The Islander, and received phone calls and emails from constituents in all 6 towns that I represent. The public is well-informed about this bill.”

Rep. Krowinski of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I vote no. I’m proud of the work our Judiciary committee has done to thoroughly vet this gun violence prevention bill. Vermonters are ready for us to act. Let’s get to work.”

Rep. Mrowicki of Putney explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted No.

We have had many public hearings on this issue. The time for talk is done. It’s time to vote.”

Rep. Poirier of Barre City explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted yes to give the people of Vermont what they want – a public hearing.”

Rep. Sibilia of Dover explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I attended the well-attended Senate public hearing in this chamber. The member from Wilmington and I held a hearing in our towns last week in Whitingham.”

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

Our legislative process was designed to be a slow methodical process in order to allow all stakeholders equal opportunity to share their view on the issue at hand. It seems that in this case, this body didn’t want to hear anymore from the gun rights advocacy. Adding additional time would have allowed everyone the time they requested. Thank you.”

Rep. Walz of Barre City explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted NO on this question, but not because I am opposed to public hearings. We already held a very large public hearing on this bill here at the State House, and a number of us have held hearings in our local communities. Barre’s was just on Tuesday. And I know all of us have heard from the public in other ways. The process has been a good one. It is time to make some decisions.”

Rep. Willhoit of St. Johnsbury explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I vote yes because, while the Senate held a public hearing early this session, neither S.55 as passed by the Senate nor as further amended by House Judiciary were discussed.

Given the significance of our body’s work today, the people of Vermont deserve a public hearing.”

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

A public hearing in one community or one committee is not the same as a full public hearing in the well of the House. I voted yes to allow both sides to weigh in on an issue that emerged as a very different bill than anything the public or the legislature was considering 6 weeks ago. This is too important to ensure that all sides, across the state, not just in a committee hearing, feel they had the opportunity to be heard.”

Page 57

S. 55 Shall the report of the Committee on Judiciary be amended as offered by Rep. Bancroft of Westford?

Rep. Burditt of West Rutland explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I vote no. However, I like the potential of this amendment. Unfortunately it need more time and vetting to do it right. I hope the member pursues bringing it forward.”

Rep. Frenier of Chelsea explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

This amendment makes a bad bill better but not good enough. It is still a bad bill and always will be.”

Rep. Morris of Bennington explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

This body has been falsely painted as rushing through this deliberative process. Moving forward with floor amendments on issues of this importance flies in the face of the very criticism aimed against the good members of this body. While an important consideration it has not had the time or review needed to ensure its appropriateness.”

Rep. Rosenquist of Georgia explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted yes. This is a practical way of getting this done. What happens if you can’t find a gun dealer to do the transaction. This is constraint of trade. I can’t sell my weapon.”

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted yes. It is unfortunate to hear that this amendment may have had merit, but that the committee did not have time to adequately consider it, right after voting against a delay to provide for a public hearing, a delay that would also have allowed time to properly consider this proposal. A proposal that might have worked better and been less costly for Vermonters, while potentially achieving the same result.”

Page 59

S. 55 Shall the House propose to the Senate to amend the bill as proposed by the Committee on Judiciary in the second instance, Section 9, only?

Rep. Bancroft of Westford explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted yes under the assumption that there will be an amendment to change the effective date of the bump-stock ban.”

Rep. Devereux of Mount Holly explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I want to prohibit bumpstocks, but until we figure out a way to not turn the present owners into criminals I cannot support this.”

Rep. McCoy of Poultney explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted no today as there is no time frame for those law abiding citizens to relinquish their bump-fire stocks purchased legally without fines and imprisonment. I look forward to an amendment to rectify this section of the bill.”

Rep. McCullough of Williston explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I support this ban on bump stocks. This is ‘common sense’ legislation. Also, it is comforting for me to know the National Rifle Association agrees and has my back.”

Rep. Sibia of Dover explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

This is a reasonable measure. We have to make reasonable accommodations for Vermonters to comply. I will offer an amendment that will accomplish that.”

Rep. Stuart of Brattleboro explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

Shortly after the massacre of roughly 59 innocent civilians at an outdoor concert at the Mandalay Bay Hotel in Las Vegas, I attended a legislative conference there I had paid for months before.

Madam Speaker, The cold-hearted shooter mowed down these individuals with a semi-automatic weapon equipped with a bump stock on a beautiful evening of what was supposed to be wonderful outdoor country music.

As I looked out the window of the Mandalay Bay Hotel each night, the location where the deranged killer shot those concert goers and wounded 500 others from his hotel window, I could not stop thinking about the mothers and fathers, sisters and brothers and friends that now have a hole in their hearts. Madam Speaker, I vote yes to banning bump stocks.”

Page 60

S. 55 Shall the House propose to the Senate to amend the bill as recommended in the report of the Committee on Judiciary in the third instance, Section 6, only?

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

Friend to friend transfers in Vermont are not the loophole in background checks that will increase safety if closed. The real gaps in law are beyond our control because that have to do with the flaws in the ability to establish who prohibited persons are under federal law, how to identify persons we are trying to address as risks in accessing weapons, who are also the very persons who will lie on applications. This law may feel like it addresses our safety issues. In fact, it does almost nothing in that regard while simultaneously burdening the ability of law-abiding citizens to purchase and sell firearms. My test for sensible gun safety laws are approaches to safety that are actually effective and workable, and that does not place burdens disproportionate to actual benefits. This bill fails that test.”

Rep. Dunn of Essex explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I support section 6 of S. 55. There have been times in all of our lives that we thought we knew a person, and we were wrong. Domestic abusers, and those who have a restraining order, are found in all socio-economic groups. They are in fact frequently indistinguishable from you and me. I believe background checks are necessary to prevent a person we thought we knew from receiving a gun he should not have. And if its only one mass shooting we prevent that might mean 15-20 people live. This is worth it.”

Rep. Harrison of Chittenden explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

This requirement is too easy to sidestep by traveling a short drive to New Hampshire to avoid this requirement and fee. I plan to offer an amendment to delay this section to address this issue.”

Rep. Mrowicki of Putney explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

Background checks work if they save just one life it’s worth it.”

Rep. Rachelson of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

Research from many reputable studies has shown that universal background checks from all firearm purchases, including private sales, are effective in saving lives including through suicide decreasing gun fatality rates and keeping guns out of the hands of criminals when someone is denied a handgun purchase the risk that they will commit a crime drops as much as 30%.”

Rep. Rosenquist of Georgia explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted no on this portion of the bill since the process presented is impractical, a financial burden, and is a constraint on trade. If you cannot find a compliant dealer you cannot complete the sale. The amendment from the member from Westford was much more straight-forward and practical. I may have voted yes on this portion if his amendment had been added.”

Page 61

S. 55 Shall the House propose to the Senate to amend the bill as recommended in the report of the Committee on Judiciary in the fourth instance, Section 8, only?

Rep. Keenan of St. Albans City explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I am voting yes on the premise that an issue I am concerned about will be addressed prior to third reading. If this situation is not addressed I will be a no vote on Tuesday.”

Rep. Sharpe of Bristol explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I fail to understand why we do not restrict the magazine capacity when shooting people while we do restrict the number of bullets in a gun when hunting wildlife.”

Rep. Weed of Enosburgh explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I vote yes and look forward to an amendment that excludes our local gun manufacturers.”

Page 62

S. 55 Shall the House propose to the Senate to amend the bill as recommended by the Committee on Judiciary in the fifth instance, Section 7, only?

Rep. Bancroft of Westford explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I am bothered by the duplicity of those who support the 26th Amendment of the US Constitution and, at the same time, support limiting the rights of individuals between the age of 18 and 20. I am curious of what sort of mental gymnastics one must go through to on one hand conclude the 18-20 year olds are not intellectually mature enough to buy a firearm, buy or drink alcohol, and starting July 1 prohibited from growing and possessing marijuana and then on the other hand believe they have the mental acumen to decide who our local, state and nation leaders will be and join our armed forces.”

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I do not support age discrimination in constitutional rights among those who have reached the age of majority.”

Rep. Dunn of Essex explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted yes for this portion of the bill. In the U.S. a minor is generally legally defined as 18 years of age. Although in Vermont in the context of alcohol, gambling and marijuana the age is 21. And to rent a car is 25. I do support 21 as the age for purchasing a gun. And if they satisfactorily complete a Vermont hunter safety course they can buy a gun sooner.”

Page 63

S. 55 Shall the bill be read a third time?

Rep. Ancel of Calais explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

After Sandy Hook, I made a promise that I would support any reasonable restrictions on firearms that were consistent with the constitution. S. 55 represents my first real opportunity to act on that promise and I am proud to vote yes. I do this on behalf of my three grandsons and to honor the young people who have raised their voices to demand that we act.

Rep. Chestnut-Tangerman of Middletown Springs explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted yes on all three of these measures, in part because of changes made for reasonable exemptions. These steps alone obviously will not eradicate gun violence, but I believe that they are an important part of the mix. What all of these measures do cumulatively is decrease both the possibility and the lethality of impulsive destruction.”

Rep. Christie of Hartford explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

This is a complex issue, our work today was an important part. I remember the Friday night of Sandy Hook I met with my superintendent and we started the hard work of securing our schools, my responsibility to the 1500 students and 400 staff. Each of our schools have a police officer and yesterday we did active shooter training and I will continue to work to keep our community safe. I vote yes to share the hope.”

Rep. Colburn of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I have two daughters, ages 11 and 1, and I have watched and listened in gratitude and awe as students around the state have flooded into this building to speak not just to their experience, but to the experience of my own children. They have begged us to act. I do not believe, as many have claimed, that this bill offers them false promises. I believe it offers common-sense, evidence based gun safety reforms that have proven to reduce fatalities in jurisdictions that have adopted them. I vote yes as one step to improve the safety of all Vermonters. I echo the words of a Burlington high school student who earlier this week testified ‘we act now because we have the privilege to be alive right now.’”

Rep. Copeland-Hanzas of Bradford explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

We've heard the argument that the safety measures in this bill won't solve the problem. But I don't think anyone in this chamber would argue we shouldn't have BAC limits, require bartenders to cut you off if you are overly impaired, equip our police with BAC sensors or allow our court system to take away your rights to drive if you have driven while intoxicated. Our kids are asking us to take real and meaningful steps to lessen the chances that someone with violent intent will have free and unfettered ability to murder them while they are at school. Moviegoers, concertgoers, churchgoers, night club patrons across the country should be afforded this small piece of mind. I am proud of the work we've done today in this chamber."

Rep. Donovan of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

I voted yes on S. 55 for the young woman who was taken off life support last evening at the UVM medical center after being shot in the head on Main Street in Burlington. This one young life lost in a random shooting because a man had access to a handgun."

Rep. Morris of Bennington explained her vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

This work is hard and very important. We took large measures to have very thoughtful considerations to each aspect of this bill. As a gun owner, as a mother, as a Vermonter, I take this work seriously and with great respect for the responsibility given to each person who sits in these seats. I vote in support of this bill for needed change, for our future."

Rep. Stuart of Brattleboro explained her vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

'What about our right to live' a young woman from Florida stated on the TV news shortly after the most recent school shooting in Parkland, Florida. That was her counterpoint to the constitution's right to bear arms. America comprises a mere 4.2% of the world's population, yet we own 42% of the world's guns. A recent study shows Americans are 10 times more likely to be killed by guns than people in other developed countries. Madam Speaker, I support Vermont's hunting traditions and responsible gun ownership. This bill does nothing to infringe upon those or Vermonters' second amendment rights. But we must stand up as lawmakers and leaders to stem the slaughter of innocent civilians. Our youth are pleading with us for common sense gun legislation. S.55 is a step in the right direction."

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

Regrettably, I could not support this bill. I voted for 3 of the provisions, as well as supporting other bills such as the extreme risk protection bill and domestic violence. But the universal background check, without consideration of an amendment that might have been better and united people rather than divide them, made this bill unpalatable to me, unfortunately."

Page 64

H. 924 Shall the bill be amended as offered by Rep. Viens of Newport City?

Rep. Sibilia of Dover explained her vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

I voted in favor of the extreme protection orders legislators in this body passed. We have to maintain our ability to enact and staff that law if it is to make a difference in ensuring student safety.”

Rep. Yantachka of Charlotte explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted no, but when we have competing needs and refuse to consider additional revenues, we end up starving both. This is not living up to our responsibilities.”

Page 65

H. 923 Shall the bill be amended as offered by Rep. McFaun of Barre Town?

Rep. Rachelson of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I ultimately voted yes but want to be clear that I have confidence in the Vermont School Safety Center, a collaborative partnership between the Vermont Department of Public Safety and the Agency of Education. My hope is that this advisory group helps to reinforce this important work of school planning and emergency responding. Also I want to be on the record that research shows our children will be safer in schools if we take a multi-pronged approach that must include sensible gun violence legislation like background checks, limiting access to guns by minors, etc.”

Page 67

S. 55 Shall the House proposal of amendment be amended as offered by Rep. Poirier of Barre City as substituted?

Rep. Rachelson of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted no. I would support this body looking into a real buy back program that could benefit individuals as well as businesses. But, we'd need to do our homework and due diligence in funding it responsibly and not just put it on a charge card.”

Page 68

S. 55 Shall the bill pass in concurrence with proposal of amendment?

Rep. Batchelor of Derby explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted no on S. 55. I do not believe that this bill will solve our problems. Safety in our schools is the best solution. We need to make our schools safe not restrict the citizens and infringe on their 2nd amendment rights.”

Rep. Chestnut-Tangerman of Middletown Springs explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

Like other members of this body I have listened to hundreds of messages and opinions on all sides of this issue, some of them very extreme. But what I have experienced in this body is the legislative process doing what it should. We have crafted reasonable bills, we have adopted reasonable compromises and we have had reasonable discussions with friends and strangers with differing opinions. Like all compromises, this bill is not perfect, but it works in conjunction with H. 422, S. 221 and with mental health efforts and school security to move us forward.”

Rep. Gannon of Wilmington explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

This bill should have been easy for me to support. My daughter Katherine was at the Boston Marathon bombing. Waiting to find out if she was okay was frightening. We were lucky. Although she was diagnosed with PTSD, she survived. Now she is a teacher. I can’t imagine what it was like for the parents in Parkland that were not so lucky. However, balanced against our interest to protect our children is the 2nd Amendment right to bear arms. That is why I held a school safety forum with the member from Dover so I could hear my constituent’s thoughts. I took their views very seriously. But there are limits on our rights in order to protect innocent people. We all believe in the 1st Amendment guarantee of free speech, but you can’t yell “fire” in a crowded theater. And we can reduce gun violence consistent with the 2nd Amendment. This is what S. 55 does and that is why I voted for it. This bill will not stop every act of gun violence and it might not have stopped the last gun massacre, but if it stops one act of mass violence, it was a step worth taking.”

Rep. Gardner of Richmond explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted yes. It is time for us to stand and be brave. It is shameful that it has taken our children to lead us here. But, finally, today we have passed legislation that will help keep them safe.”

Rep. Grad of Moretown explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

As a mother and advocate for legislation that prevents domestic violence, suicide and school shootings, I vote yes for S. 55. S. 55 addresses school and community safety by ensuring guns remain in the hands of those who should have them. In S. 55 we are decreasing the opportunities to obtain firearms for those who intend to harm themselves or others. S. 55 is a vital component of sensible gun safety laws such as extreme risk protection of Vermonters while balancing our public safety with Vermont’s hunting traditions.”

Rep. Harrison of Chittenden explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

At each of the town meetings I attended earlier this month, I told members of our district that I would support measures that I believed would make a difference but would not favor those proposals that I felt were either offered for political purposes or would not work. I appreciated the work of the House Judiciary committee as they tried to find the right balance. I supported a few provisions of S. 55, and opposed others. In the end, S. 55 did not find the right balance for me and I voted no.”

Rep. Houghton of Essex explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I know that this legislation alone will not keep Vermont safe, but it is a step toward that goal. This legislation may make purchasing a firearm a bit harder for some but it won't prevent a law abiding citizen from purchasing or owning a firearm. This legislation may give school children a few precious seconds to live. This legislation may prevent a troubled youth from making a life altering decision. This legislation may allow our youth to focus on learning and not jump at every sound they hear. I vote yes for them. I vote yes for life."

Rep. Lucke of Hartford explained her vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

I voted yes. I know young people at Fair Haven H.S. and had a poignant conversation with their mother; last week I waited anxiously to hear if my friends children at Great Mills H.S. were alive; I am inspired by students from Hartford H.S. who used their voices and took leadership to walk out, come here to testify and to protest in Montpelier and in our nation's capital. Over the past 227 years we have had the right as peaceful citizens of this country and state to keep and bear arms. These rights continue with this legislations in a way that supports Vermonters hunting and sporting community. This is democracy at its finest, finding the balance between passionate, competing priorities and perspectives of our citizens old and young. Some will say we didn't go far enough."

Rep. Miller of Shaftsbury explained her vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

The Pope encouraged youth around the world to "shout out" against violence. My voice and vote today is a "shout out" for our youth in Vermont who asked us to help."

Rep. Morris of Bennington explained her vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

This bill represents a thoughtful, deliberate consideration of needed legislation in line with national trends and changing sensibilities. We are being proactive by collaboratively working towards solutions to one of the most pressing and personal issues of our time. I am proud of the work today and the small measures we developed to move us from an either or dance to one that supports innovation and is Vermont specific. I believe in Vermont and the strength, ingenuity and problem-solving abilities of Vermonters who care deeply to come to the table and move us forward. I remain committed to addressing the social determinants of negative health outcomes. Gun violence, violence in our communities, including our schools are but symptoms of a torrent of ever-growing challenges that are hurting our nation. This bill is but one part of a multi-faceted long-range approach."

Rep. Norris of Shoreham explained his vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

I voted no on S. 55. I heard from many of my constituents, mostly from the FHUHS district, that this bill would do nothing to make our schools safer.

I believe we pushed this bill through to make it look like we were doing something but in reality it will prevent nothing. We need to look further into why these young adults feel so angry with their fellow students and work to make schools safer, this bill doesn't address that."

Rep. Poirier of Barre City explained his vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

I voted no for all the many law abiding gun owners who live in Barre City that may become criminals for possession of a legal firearm.”

Rep. Pugh of South Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I vote yes for the one life it saves, for the one injury it prevents. I vote yes for the steps this legislation takes in building a stronger and safer Vermont for all of us who love this, our home, Vermont.”

Rep. Savage of Swanton explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

With the passage of this bill, 227 years of Vermont tradition has gone down the drain.

We have gone from one of the most lenient gun states to one of restriction almost literally overnight.

We are on the path to having to change our state motto of 'Freedom and Unity' as we are losing the means to ensure our freedom.”

Rep. Scheu of Middlebury explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I support this common sense gun violence prevention legislation because I believe we should all have the freedom to be safe in our homes, our schools, our neighborhoods, and at work, without the constant threat of gun violence hanging over our heads. These laws will help save lives.”

Rep. Sibia of Dover explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted yes. And I thank all of the members and staff who worked so hard to make necessary changes over the weekend.

No guns are being made illegal by this bill, all high capacity magazines that Vermonters currently own they can keep, Vermonters of all ages will continue to be able to possess and use their firearms.”

Rep. Stuart of Brattleboro explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

As a matter of public health, gun suicides are a huge problem in the United States. Suicide is the most common cause of death for Americans between 15 - 34, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). Vermont’s suicide increased by nearly 60% between 1999-2010, according to the CDC.

Madam Speaker, Those who oppose sensible guns laws are on the wrong side of history. Young people are pleading with us to stem the senseless loss of lives. I’m proud to have voted for S.55, and I did so in honor of my daughter’s friend who took her own life with a gun.”

Rep. Till of Jericho explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I vote yes on S. 55. We have a public health problem in Vermont.

We have 11.1 deaths per 100,000 residents, only 15th best in the country.

We have only the 6th lowest murder rate in the country.

We have the 8th worst state rate for domestic violence deaths.

We have a suicide rate consistently higher than national rates.

S. 55 expands background checks to private gun sales including on line sales in Vermont. Background checks have prevented over 3000 sales by licensed firearm dealers to individuals who are forbidden from owning firearms including almost 1000 felons, 650 individuals with active restraining orders or history of domestic violence and 350 users of illegal drugs.

We know that individuals who attempt to buy guns on line are 6 times more likely to fail background checks. Extending background checks will absolutely make Vermont safer.

We also raise the age to purchase long guns to 21. That matters because the data says 3/4 shooters in K-12 schools are under 21. I am proud to support S. 55. We need to keep guns out of the hands of people who shouldn't have them."

Rep. Troiano of Stannard explained his vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

I voted yes. Thousands of our students have come to us and asked us to do this. It is time for compromise. There is no reason for these tragedies and there is no one solution. Just one section of this bill, age 21 could have kept the young man from Fair Haven purchasing the firearm on that day. All sections have passed constitutional muster. We do not know if this will work but if it saves one life it will all be worth it."

Rep. Wood of Waterbury explained her vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

I voted in favor of this legislation because it has the potential to save lives – do any of us know that for certain – the answer is no. We have no guarantee in life but Madam Speaker, working within all constitutional boundaries, I take the responsibility very seriously to do what I can to enable Vermonters to live peacefully, to address the demands for common sense gun safety laws and to enable our children to grow up and pursue their own liberty and happiness."

Page 69

H. 923 Shall the bill pass?

Rep. Wood of Waterbury explained her vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

As a former, albeit brief, member of the Corrections and Institutions committee, I want to express my appreciation for the work of the committee. The major policy issues this committee deals with cuts across the work of almost every other committee. I'm proud to support their work to address corrections, clean water, mental health, youth justice, state buildings infrastructure, town roads, continuing flood recovery and school safety just to name a few."

Page 71

S. 103 Shall the House concur in the Senate proposal of amendment to the House proposal of amendment?

Rep. Krowinski of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I vote yes to better protect Vermonters - especially our children - from toxic chemicals.”

Rep. Morris of Bennington explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I vote in favor of this bill for two reasons:

1. It is our duty to ensure the harmful practices of the past do not continue to hurt Vermonters into the future.

2. Science is real.”

Rep. Mrowicki of Putney explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I vote yes to support the committee’s work to protect Vermonters - especially children - from dangerous chemicals in the environment.

These kinds of protections will move Vermont into a future that ensures a strong, healthy Vermont.”

Page 72

S. 221 Shall the bill be read a third time?

Rep. McFaun of Barre Town explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted yes on S. 221 because it is a true public protection bill. I thank the committee for their good work.”

Rep. Willhoit of St. Johnsbury explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

The incident thankfully thwarted in Fair Haven shook us all. I vote yes as S. 221 provides for extreme risk protection orders that can and will be properly accessed when someone poses a threat to themselves or others.”

Page 75

S. 237 Shall the bill be read a third time?

Rep. Batchelor of Derby explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted no on S.237. The problem is not if someone is legal or illegal. It is the State's lack of money to support this bill at this time."

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

Clarifying authority for the Defender General to advise existing clients on intersecting immigration matters is the right and appropriate thing to do. When immigration is the sole issue, this bill does not extend any new authority for representation. I will be offering an amendment for third reading to clarify the bill's intended scope."

Rep. Keenan of St. Albans City explained her vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

Having heard Appropriations' testimony about the financial difficulties the Defender General has providing needed statutory services I am very hesitant to add additional work, nor do I expect state employees to work without pay or expense reimbursement.

Leaving children in unsafe homes as we do now due to inadequate resources does not justify adding new additional workload at this time."

Rep. Kimbell of Woodstock explained his vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

I voted no on this bill because I believe expanding the scope of the work of the Defender General's office into a complex legal area will require additional resources or money and legal expertise or a reduction of existing services. I hope that by third reading I can be more comfortable with our ability to provide these legal resources in a competent and viable manner."

Rep. Krowinski of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

I believe everyone, those advising and those being advised, have fundamental rights and protections.

I voted yes to ensure our public defenders have the protections they need to do their work.

Thank you."

Rep. O'Sullivan of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

My yes vote supports the people who work on our farms with no minimum wage, no health care, and no safety regulations – we accept their work because they keep our farmers in business. They have earned and deserve our support."

Page 76

S. 101 Shall the House propose to the Senate to amend the bill as recommended by the Committee on Agriculture and Forestry?

Rep. Connor of Fairfield explained his vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

I would like to thank the committee on Agriculture and Forestry for their good work with the strike all of S.101. The amendment as written beginning on page 1534 will go the distance in addressing many concerns that members/constituents of the forestry industry have expressed to me in recent years.”

Rep. Sibilía of Dover explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

This is another bill your House Rural Economic Development Working Group supported this year. I voted yes.”

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker,

Vermont’s trees, forests, and our economy are dependent on a strong forestry industry.

I vote yes.”

Page 79

H. 167 Shall the House postpone action indefinitely?

Rep. Bartholomew of Hartland explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

While the arguments in support of this bill have merit, the bill has not been thoroughly vetted by the appropriate committees. We’ve already taken steps to address the question of marijuana legalization and made significant changes to Vermont law. The time remaining in the biennium is too short to adequately create a tax and regulate plan that can gain widespread support. Spending additional legislative time on this issue would be a disservice to my constituents and to all Vermonters.”

Rep. Copeland Hanzas of Bradford explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

There are many in this body, indeed, I suspect, a majority who would like to move to set up a tax and regulate system. There is great frustration among those members that the failure to move a bill this session sets back this effort beyond 2019. I am disappointed that we couldn’t agree upon a path that saves us this extra year. However, it is clear we have many critical decisions to make and it is time to get back to our work protecting our waters, balancing our budget, and educating our kids.”

Rep. Gonzalez of Winooski explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

In a time of tight budgets this was an opportunity to address revenue issues and provide much needed funds to many things, including prevention and treatment of addiction, by 2020. We have already spent much time and debate on this issue.”

Rep. O’Sullivan of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted yes with regret. We should tax and regulate as soon as possible, however, we don't have the time left in this session to build the consensus we would need to override the inevitable veto from the Governor."

Rep. Sibilia of Dover explained her vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

I support a tax and regulate but also the process needed to get us there. Therefore I voted yes to postpone."

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

I am and remain opposed to legalizing recreational marijuana. However that bill passed and will become law on July 1. Today, I vote no because I believe that legalization without regulation and taxation is bad policy for Vermont. It's unfortunate this body has decided to take this path at this time."

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

Tax and regulate scheme for marijuana in the waning days of the session is bad policy and worse process. If this is over to be done it needs to be done right. Now is not the time."

Page 80

S. 281 Shall the House propose to the Senate to amend the bill as recommended by the Committee on Government Operations?

Rep. Christie of Hartford explained his vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

I am moved and proud of the statement this body has made. Today we have made history. I thank you all sincerely."

Rep. Gamache of Swanton explained her vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

I voted yes, but I am disturbed that no testimony was given by either the VSEA or the VNEA as to the number of instances of demonstrable racism experienced by their members."

Rep. Mrowicki of Putney explained his vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

Once again, as we proceed into the 21st century we come upon another issue for which we can say 'It's time, we address this.'

This may seem like a small step forward to mitigate systemic racism, but it's time, and I proudly vote YES."

Rep. Van Wyck of Ferrisburgh explained his vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

I voted No. In college, I learned there were Lies, Damnable Lies, and then there is Statistics. I am not impressed with a number of these statistics.”

Page 81

S. 175 Shall the bill be read a third time?

Rep. Frenier of Chelsea explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted no because the bottom line for drug companies will not change regardless of what we do here in Vermont. If we attempt to take advantage of Canada’s bulk purchase pricing, neither the Canadians nor the drug companies will allow tiny Vermont’s drug purchases to alter the current sweet deal they both enjoy. This is a waste of time and money.”

Rep. Till of Jericho explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I vote yes. S.175 provides a possible pathway to tremendous savings on pharmaceutical costs for Vermonters. It would be irresponsible for us to not try to pursue this possibility when health care costs are so overwhelming to so many of our constituents.”

Page 82

J.R.H. 17 Shall the resolution be adopted?

Rep. Van Wyck of Ferrisburgh explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted No. This resolution is about proposed rules for a number of years in the future. It doesn't roll back existing regulations. As they say in investing, ‘Past performance is not indicative of future results.’ It's uncertain how this would affect the automobile industry.”

Page 83

S. 197 Shall the House propose to the Senate to amend the bill as recommended by the Committee on Judiciary?

Rep. Copeland-Hanzas of Bradford explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

If my neighbor has been exposed to a dangerous toxin someone will need to pay for medical monitoring to detect the possible illness early.

Will that be paid for by the taxpayers of Vermont? Will it be paid for by the person who’s been poisoned? Or will it be paid for by the polluter? There are protections in this bill so frivolous cases won’t harm businesses that are doing the right thing. Madam Speaker, the polluter should pay.”

Rep. Dunn of Essex explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I support this bill. If an employer provides the correct personal protective equipment to their employee; if the employer stores their chemicals in the proper way; if the employer uses it in a responsible manner; and finally when the employer is alerted to its change in status to a hazardous material they stop using it and dispose of it properly, they have nothing to fear and neither do the people of Vermont.”

Rep. Troiano of Stannard explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted yes to honor my friend Steve Johnes who served in my unit, who died of pulmonary disease as a result of Agent Orange, and all the others who have passed as a result of chemical poisoning at the hands of Dow Chemical.”

Page 84

S. 105 Shall the bill be committed to the Committee on Commerce and Economic Development?

Rep. Scheuermann of Stowe explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

It is unconscionable that this body would put at risk the success of one of the industries we so often talk about wanting to help grow and prosper without ensuring our own committee that has jurisdiction over economic development does its due diligence.

Yesterday we slapped down our tech. industry. Today, it's our all important outdoor recreation industry. We should be ashamed of ourselves.”

Page 85

S. 260 Shall the proposal of the Committee on Natural Resources, Fish, and Wildlife be amended as recommended by the Committee on Ways and Means in the first instance only (Sections, 2; 3; 4; 4a)?

Rep. Browning of Arlington explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I vote no because I refuse to enact destructive taxes even to fund clean water, and even with the possibility that these unfortunate revenue changes will be replaced by something better. We should identify pollution taxes on materials and activities that cause water pollution, as described in the amendment to S.260 that I am likely to be prevented from offering to the House.”

Rep. Deen of Westminster explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

Tourists don't magically appear in Vermont. They use our roads, drives/parking lots, buildings, carbon discharges, all challenges to boatable, swimmable, drinkable water. How attractive is stinking green water, dead fish, toxin laden beaches. A real tourist attraction.”

Rep. Kimbell of Woodstock explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted yes with the firm belief that in the next 18 months we will deliver a better package of funding mechanisms that have greater nexus to water pollutions sources and will provide the needed funds to clean and protect our waterways.”

Rep. Lucke of Hartford explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I am a Vermonter who wants all of the EPA boxes checked. The game of NOT IT by stakeholders and administration must stop – this legislation gives us a backstop to insure the EPA requirements are met.

MY hope is with this in place that stakeholders and administration will work collaboratively to provide a dynamic long term funding source for clean water in Vermont that includes the examination of Vermont’s tax code and exemptions.”

Rep. Martel of Waterford explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

It is a sad day when we have to pick on unclaimed beverage deposits and distributors, and increase our rooms and meals taxes to fund clean water. These are hard-working people that are getting penalized.”

Rep. McCormack of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

Finally.”

Rep. Poirier of Barre City explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted no. I would have voted yes if we had taxed the polluters, such as a parcel tax. My constituents do no pollute the lake, so why should they be taxed for someone else’s problem.”

Rep. Scheuermann of Stowe explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

First no new funding for our clean water efforts is needed until 2021.

As importantly, though, when we do institute a funding source it must have a nexus to water. Putting the vast majority of the burden to clean up our state’s waterways on our hospitality industry is both unfair and misguided.”

Rep. Smith of Derby explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted no and I won’t have to explain my vote to my constituents!”

Rep. Sullivan of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

Unless we are willing to pay for water clean-up, we will not have clean water. We have tried to do it this way before. I believe it is an investment very much worth making.”

Rep. Yantachka of Charlotte explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

When I travel, I have never once checked on the taxes and fees of my hotel room. However, I do flush the toilet.”

Page 86

S. 260 Shall the bill be read a third time?

Rep. Browning of Arlington explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

While I greatly appreciate the inclusion of the possible pollution taxes in this bill, I have to vote no because the bill still enacts destructive taxes. The ends don’t justify the means. Vermonters deserve better.”

Rep. Gannon of Wilmington explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

Tourism is critical to the economy of my community. It has already been damaged by the closure of the Hermitage Club. This bill will further damage our fragile economy.”

Rep. Krowinski of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

We can’t kick the can down the road when it comes to cleaning up our lakes and streams. By voting yes we are taking action to secure a long term plan because our drinking water, tourist economy, property values, and quality of life depend on it.”

Rep. Myers of Essex explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I was going to vote no on S.260. I was going to vote no because of the funding of the water cleanup in the bill. But for a long time I have felt that the amendment made by Rep. Browning is the right way to move forward on the cleanup. Therefore today I voted yes in the naïve hope the intent language will actually see the light of day.”

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

Everyone wants to clean up water. Without passage of this bill we will invest over \$21 million to that cause in FY20. This is another case of overreach by this body in an attempt to embarrass the Governor. I vote ‘No.’ Thank you.”

Page 89

S. 260 Shall the House proposal of amendment be further amended as offered by Rep. Helm of Fair Haven?

Rep. Smith of Derby explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

Just last week a member stated that 9.25% rooms and meals is a tax that no one looks at anyway and that 9.25% passed. So what’s wrong with 9.6% where jobs are plentiful and where Lake Champlain exists and where this added tax will go.”

Page 90

S. 234 Shall the House proposal of amendment be further amended as offered by Rep. Buckholz of Hartford and Rep. Donahue of Northfield in the second instance of amendment only (Sections 2-5)?

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

Another little death knell for civil liberties in Vermont.”

Page 91

S. 40 Shall the report of the Committee on General, Housing, and Military Affairs be amended as offered by Rep. Browning of Arlington?

Rep. Browning of Arlington explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I vote yes to try to be sure that future minimum wage increases truly benefit all minimum wage workers and to be sure that the effects on economic activity in rural parts of the state are taken into account. This amendment would ensure that we do not try to do too much too fast, and that we understand the full consequences of our actions.”

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

A thoughtful, balanced, rational approach to a troubling dilemma. All features of problem-solving that we appear to abandon in the way we often deliberate in this body.”

Page 93

S. 40 Shall the report of the Committee on General, Housing, and Military Affairs be amended as offered by Rep. Poirier of Barre City?

Rep. Chesnut-Tangerman of Middletown Springs explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

In my district there are no large employers. There are farmers, loggers, slate quarries, and small shops. While I would love to see all Vermonters earning at least \$15/hour today, the reality that I see is that these small businesses cannot make this big a jump this fast. I reluctantly voted NO.”

Rep. McFaun of Barre Town explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I vote no on S.40 Poirier amendment. Increasing the earned income tax credit is a much more stable way to decrease poverty – and it doesn’t have any side effects like job loss or hours of work cut or benefit reductions.”

Rep. Poirier of Barre City explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted yes because this amendment was a chance to bring the minimum wage to an amount that reflects people’s chances to join the ranks of being self-independent. Madam Speaker, our vote on this amendment is a sad day for the working poor.”

Rep. Weed of Enosburgh explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted no, but not because I think that workers don’t deserve – they do. Instead I trust the good work of your General, Housing, and Military Affairs committee in thoroughly vetting this bill. This is indeed a good small step forward. We must consider small business and I believe that we have.”

Page 94

S. 40 Shall the House propose to the Senate to amend the bill as recommended by the Committee on General, Housing, and Military Affairs?

Rep. Browning of Arlington explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

Good intentions will not suspend the laws of economics. I vote no because: 1) this bill will hurt some of the Vermonters it is intended to help; 2) this bill will likely hurt regions of the state that are already struggling; 3) House Appropriations could not support this bill, perhaps due to uncertainty about the effects on the budget, and 4) this bill was never referred to House Ways & Means despite potential effects on the revenues of the state.”

Rep. Christie of Hartford explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I simply voted yes as I put my buttons on my jacket. I pulled out my VALIC button which simply says “remember low income Vermonters.”

Rep. Cina of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

No one who works 40 hours a week should be living on the cusp of poverty. By raising the minimum wage over time to \$15 per hour, we take another step towards a more just economy. A rising tide lifts all boats.”

Rep. Gamache of Swanton explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted No! If the goal of this legislative body is to reduce poverty in VT, then this body would pass regulatory and tax laws that would create economic policies where all businesses would thrive and grow, so that employment and wages would increase organically. This bill does not accomplish that goal and places additional hardships on businesses.”

Rep. Grad of Moretown explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted yes because raising the minimum wage is a key element of effective criminal justice reform and vital to support Vermonters’ enjoyment of their civil liberties.

Raising the minimum wage can be expected to have a positive effect on reducing Vermont’s crime and incarceration rates, saving Vermont money and improving the lives of Vermonters and their families.

According to a White House study of 2016, studies have found that increases in the minimum wage significantly decrease crime. When low-skilled workers are paid higher wages, violent and property crimes are reduced.

According to a study done by the ACLU of New Jersey, crime and poverty are correlated and criminal behavior is often motivated by a lack of economic opportunity. Studies estimate that a 10 percent increase in wages for non-college educated men could result in a 10-20 percent reduction in crime rates.

Access to life’s basic needs is critical to order to enjoy the rights and freedoms guaranteed by the Vermont and federal constitutions. People cannot participate fully in society and therefore utilize their constitutional and civil liberties if they are struggling to provide for themselves and their families. Without a sufficient wage, the basic necessities are out of reach for too many Vermonters.

Safe communities are good for the economy. Raising the minimum wage is workforce development and an integral part of sound justice reform.”

Rep. Harrison of Chittenden explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

We do not possess a magic wand. We cannot pass an edict from Montpelier for \$15 and assume there will not be negative consequences to our economy and our small businesses.”

Rep. Morris of Bennington explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

As a person who has wrestled with the pains and trauma of poverty as a child and adult, I can say with certainty that a dignified wage provides a dignified life. When my family struggled we disappeared from our local economy. We survived and made choices to not support restaurants, theaters and retailers to save money. This should not be underestimated as we seek to uplift Vermonters and support the local economies those workers sustain.”

Rep. Mrowicki of Putney explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

For many Americans our economy is “upside-down.” Those on the bottom are working harder without getting ahead and the middle class, the Foundation of America, continues to shrink.

Economic justice demands we level the playing field and this bill makes a start.”

Rep. Read of Fayston explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

If I’m fortunate enough to be re-elected, I’ll have some Economics textbooks in my desk and encourage the members of the body to read through them when they get an opportunity. You may well be enlightened.”

Rep. Stevens of Waterbury explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted yes for S.40 because I know that if it is signed into law, Vermonters who work will get a raise. Anytime I have the opportunity to vote to give more money to Vermonters, I’ll do it.”

Rep. Stuart of Brattleboro explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

As long as I live, I shall never forget a 10-year-old boy I met some years ago in the cafeteria. He was with an advocate. He was poor. And he was homeless.

At one point early in our conversation, he squirmed, looked around and whispered to his advocate he didn’t want to talk in the cafeteria anymore. He didn’t want to talk anymore because he thought people would know he was poor and he was homeless.

Madam Speaker, No one in Vermont or in the United States of America should be poor or homeless, let alone suffer the stigma our society casts on our fellow human beings plagued by poverty.

Madam Speaker, We are a wealthy country, and we should pay our people a decent wage so they can care for themselves and their families. I am proud to support the minimum wage increase, which will help Vermont’s working poor lift themselves out of poverty.”

Rep. Sullivan of Dorset explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

In principle I support raising the minimum wage. However, I think there will always be unknowns with a move like this. I think it is important to keep in mind that VT already has a minimum wage well above what most other states have and ours is indexed to inflation. So we start from a better place than many other states. The proposed headline of \$15 minimum wage actually just means that the increases will be well higher than inflation for the next number of years.

If the economy goes swimmingly, that will mean just a bit of a bump from what would have been the case anyway. If the economy goes into the tank then these increases may start to look like they might exacerbate a tough economy in terms of availability of employment.

A no recommendation from House Appropriations signals to me that the Committee that is responsible for considering the fiscal impact has grave concerns about the practicability of an increase to minimum wage in Vermont at this time. I concur.

I have been charged with being my constituents’ voice. Hence my yes vote.”

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

Rising tide sinks boats that are moored to heavy burdens of increased minimum wages, government regulation and expanding tort process.

I support the increase in the minimum wage as it exists in current law and that's why I voted no on S.40. I believe we need to work to improve the economy so our small businesses can thrive. This proposal does the opposite."

Rep. Van Wyck of Ferrisburgh explained his vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

I voted No. The minimum wage is zero or less for many dairy farmers working over sixty hours per week. This bill ensures hundreds more current or would-be workers will have no job and a wage of zero."

Rep. Wood of Waterbury explained her vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

Today I wish I could have supported raising the minimum wage. But with many decisions there are consequences. I could not live with the consequences of this bill. I voted no because this bill will have a detrimental impact on older Vermonters, individuals with disabilities and their families who rely on state and federal funding for help with basic activities of daily living like dressing, bathing and eating. Their services are funded by state and federal dollars. An increase in the minimum wage without a comparable increase in the funding to support those who cannot work, is an automatic decrease in the very services that these individuals rely on just to live every day. This bill does not raise the water for everyone. Today I stand for those individuals who voice needs to be heard."

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

I voted no. This bill will cost jobs, reduce hours and benefits. In addition, the bill is an anti-small business bill that in this case will create a rising tide that may drown anything in its path. Ready to row, Governor."

Rep. Yantachka of Charlotte explained his vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

I vote yes to raise the minimum wage not because it's good politics, but because it reflects my values, specifically that everyone deserves to be paid a fair wage for the work they do. The majority of Vermonters will tell us that Vermont is unaffordable, regardless of the amount of wealth they have. Those who are most affected by the lack of affordability are those at the bottom of the wage ladder and they are the ones this bill will help."

Page 95

H. 196 Shall the House concur in the Senate proposal of amendment?

Rep. Browning of Arlington explained her vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

I vote no. Instead of creating a new complex mandatory tax financial entitlement program that many Vermonters will pay into and never benefit from, we should be creating a voluntary paid leave insurance program for those Vermonters that want it.”

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

A short term benefit that – for some people – can result in ultimately losing their job and not even being eligible for unemployment is no benefit at all. Yet all must pay in, even those who cannot use it because of this risk to their family’s economic survival.”

Rep. Gage of Rutland City explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

We as a body continually ignore the lost jobs we have created through over regulation, tax increases, and the many burdens we place on businesses, although paid family leave in itself is a good idea. Many businesses cannot afford the disruption to the work environment and potential increases in this tax. As a former seatmate of ours said, “This is the death of business in Vermont by a 1000 paper cuts.”

Rep. Higley of Lowell explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

Vermont employers don’t need another mandate coming from Montpelier.”

Rep. Howard of Rutland City explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

This is a wonderful benefit for families. I couldn’t use family leave for my husband when he was ill. Outside of having a baby, you never know when you may need to take time to care for a loved one. I fully support this bill.”

Rep. Krowinski of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

A paid family leave program is necessary to ensure working families can balance work and family needs while maintaining economic security. Family leave insurance is an investment in a healthy Vermont economy and that’s why I voted yes.”

Rep. Lucke of Hartford explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I vote yes; caring for family takes sacrifice. This legislation makes sure family income is not a sacrifice working Vermonters will have to make to be present for their family members in need of care.”

Rep. Morris of Bennington explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I pay unemployment insurance as do many others. I pay health insurance premiums as do many others. I pay auto, home and other insurance premiums so that the protections are there for me when I need them. This is the social contract that a democracy ensures. The people have long asked for this and need this – and will cover the costs to make it happen.”

Rep. Norris of Shoreham explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted no, not because I disagree with the idea of helping families deal with issues that keep them from their work. If companies wanted to offer this benefit to attract employees I think that would be a great benefit but I can't vote to tax every wage earner in Vermont whether they want this insurance or not.”

Rep. Till of Jericho explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I vote yes. H.196 is a huge step forward in making Vermont a more family friendly state. The ability to take time off after arrival of a new baby in the family is profoundly valuable, in many ways.

Not having to choose between employment and caring for a new or ailing family member is a huge relief for Vermonters.”

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

This bill imposes a \$16,300,000 new tax on hardworking Vermonters. Yet another example of this legislature driving up the cost of living in Vermont. When will it stop? I vote ‘NO.’”

Rep. Van Wyck of Ferrisburgh explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted No. I do not support the further expansion of the Nanny State, further burdensome regulations on businesses, or further payroll taxes.”

Page 96

H. 928 Shall the House concur in the Senate proposal of amendment with further proposal of amendment thereto as offered by Rep. Turner of Milton?

Rep. McCullough of Williston explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I vote no to the senior representative from Milton's amendment. This would have given the Governor a pass to veto our budget with impunity.”

Rep. Toll of Danville explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

As chair of House Appropriations I feel it is my duty to firmly state the importance of preserving our governing process. Departing from this process and not adhering to our Vermont values of working together and getting our work done is a path not to go down. We cannot jeopardize the financial health of our state in the name of politics.”

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

This amendment ensures that if a budget agreement isn't reached by July 1 2018, spending levels continue until a new budget is reached. This is simply an insurance policy."

Page 97

H. 696 Shall the House adopt the report of the Committee of Conference?

Rep. Cina of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

People should not be mandated by law to buy a product from a corporation. However, until we have a unified, universal, publicly-funded health care system, we must support a stable health care marketplace to keep health care from becoming more unaffordable. To maintain stability, we need an individual mandate at this time."

Rep. Van Wyck of Ferrisburgh explained his vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

I voted no. I thought we were trying to attract young people to the state."

Page. 98

H. 911 Shall the House adopt the report of the Committee of Conference?

Rep. Young of Glover explained his vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

This bill represents a responsible approach to funding the school budgets that our constituents voted for. School budgets put together by our volunteer boards at a level 1% less than the Governor asked for. Funding our schools is not a bailout as it is being characterized these days."

Page 99

H. 924 Shall the House adopt the report of the Committee of Conference?

Rep. Van Wyck of Ferrisburgh explained his vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

I voted No. I have voted against every budget. Why? To quote President Reagan: A government bureau is the nearest thing to eternal life we'll ever see on this earth. A bloated state government requires a bloated state budget. It's time to go on a diet."

Page 100

Special Session

H. 13 Shall the House suspend the rules to take up the bill for immediate consideration?

Rep. Chesnut-Tangerman of Middletown Springs explained his vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

Moving forward with this legislation is important for so many reasons. It tells Vermonters clearly that we do not want to play chicken with the services and surety that the state government provides. It tells the financial markets that we take our responsibilities and our credit rating seriously. And it tells the governor that continues to be serious about advancing a responsible, tri-partisan budget rather than being held hostage to a campaign slogan.”

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

Take the time to vote on a budget that allows property taxes to go up by 5.5 cents for all but primary residences, knowing that we are in the middle of negotiations because of a veto of bills that raised taxes, is not only pointless, it risks extending our special session and creating more disarray in the potential paths forward, and accomplishes nothing that is needed today to protect government functions.”

Rep. Krowinski of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

We need a Vermont that works for all of us, not just a select few. The Governor's veto of the budget puts Vermonters in an unnecessarily risky position and works against hard working families. That's why we need to take the lead and not allow a government shutdown, it's important we create stability, keep our schools open and protect our bond rating. That's why I vote 'yes.'”

Rep. Lucke of Hartford explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

This bill includes many elements the legislature (both House & Senate) and the administration has supported multiple times in multiple versions. This is our work. I vote yes to get to work today.”

Rep. Miller of Shaftsbury explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

This budget fully supports the Veterans' Home in Bennington where there are over 200 employees and over 150 veterans. A 'No' vote on this resolution puts the economy of Bennington in jeopardy, the care of our veterans in jeopardy, as well as the families who work at the Home.”

Rep. Murphy of Fairfax explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

The original bill voted by the General Assembly had my support as being the responsible path toward maintaining a fiscally stable Vermont. In the current impasse, moving H. 13 as presented today with its clarifying amendment forward, allows the body to support that fiscally responsible action while leaving the one item of dissention to be resolved. Vermonters would benefit from the reduced income tax brackets and the exemption of low income earners social security pensions, while the property tax portion supported by local notes is resolved.”

Rep. Poirier of Barre City explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted no. This process used by the majority party is no way to run this legislature, Madam Speaker, watching this political football between the Democrats and the Governor. The threat of a shutdown of the state is ridiculous. Let's do our work and keep the committee process free from threats and counter threats. I believe this legislature has become a smaller version of power politics just like we see from Washington."

Rep. Rachelson of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

I voted yes to suspend the rules to take up voting for this budget. This is why we came back here at an additional cost today. It is important we do right by Vermonters by having a responsible budget in place in time for the new fiscal year. There has been tri-partisan work putting together this very responsible budget. Vermonters rely on the state for vital services. We also have a duty to pass a balanced budget that is within our means and does not rely on one time money, which we had the chance to do today. Further, this one time money can provide debt reduction that will ultimately make Vermont more fiscally responsible. Not having a budget can negatively affect Vermont's bond rating, and ultimately be more expensive for Vermonters. Coming back will also rack up more expense. This is Vermont, not Washington DC. Let's not let politics get in the way. We all want the same thing for Vermont."

Rep. Sharpe of Bristol explained his vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

This vote delays action on an important piece of legislation. Apparently keeping us here for extra days is good for some but not for me. I vote yes to move forward."

Rep. Stevens of Waterbury explained his vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

When I serve on a board of directors for a nonprofit organization, I know the most important thing I do is knowing that my actions are in line with the fiduciary responsibilities of that board, to keep that organization in good health. And so, applying that same thinking to a budget for the State of Vermont, I vote Yes. This budget represents an over 99% agreement among us all. Passing this today would go a long way to signaling that we want to keep our government going smartly, with preparation and rational goals. Delaying this vote casts doubt that we take it seriously."

Rep. Toll of Danville explained her vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

It is critical we join together to support suspending the rules in order to take up H.13 – the 2019 State Budget.

Every day we fail to work together erodes the faith Vermonters have in our ability to work together to pass critical legislation.

Every day we fail to work together jeopardizes the fiscal health of the State and sends negative signals to Wall Street.

Every day we continue to delay action is a day wasted in doing what is right and what is principled for the State of Vermont."

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted No. This suspension of rules does nothing to move us forward. What we need is to get into the appropriate committees and actually work on the Governor’s proposal and come up with legislation that avoids further vetoes. The bill as proposed does not hold the line on taxes. It does not avoid a government shutdown. It merely causes further delays and inaction. Vermonters deserve real, meaningful compromise that gets us out of town sooner, rather than later.”

H. 13 Shall the bill be amended as offered by Rep. Browning of Arlington and others?

Rep. Browning of Arlington explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I vote yes to avoid an autopilot increase in the nonresident property tax rates and to increase our chance of avoiding a shutdown of state government. Vermonters deserve a functioning state government and Vermont’s property tax payers do not deserve a tax increase when the state holds extra revenue.”

Rep. Sharpe of Bristol explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

This vote to use significantly more one time money from the General Fund to cut tax rates in the education fund is fiscally irresponsible, leaves a bigger problem in next year’s property tax rates and violates the principles of many conservatives to spend one time money on on-going expenses.

H. 13 Shall the bill be read a third time?

Rep. Ancel of Calais explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

This bill reduces Vermonters’ taxes by 30 million. It leaves the decision about FY 19 property tax rates for another day. And it takes the specter of a government shutdown off the table.”

Rep. Botzow of Pownal explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

My vote supports the work we have done and must do to resource workforce development. My vote also supports continuity of government. Financial markets consider risk and grant access to capital accordingly. Better work-force, lower risk. Our economy needs both.”

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:
What a waste of time. Who are we kidding?”

Rep. Gamache of Swanton explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

H. 13 results in an increase in non-residential property taxes, which the Browning amendment did not. H.13 does not address the education deficit, nor did the Browning amendment, but the major difference is that the Browning amendment would not have raised non-residential property taxes and H. 13 does. The defeat of the Browning amendment and passage of H. 13 defies logic.”

Rep. Giambatista of Essex explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

We must put in place this budget and keep our government open for business. By voting yes, we support a number of important investments, including a critical appropriation to create a National Guard tuition benefit program. My neighbors have asked that we invest in our guard personnel. I vote yes to create a program that is long overdue, and for Vermont's guard members who will soon be able to access postsecondary training and education because of this budget.”

Rep. Krowinski of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I vote yes. It is important that we move quickly to pass a budget that ensures we keep government open. Vermonters deserve stability, access to critical services, that we keep schools open and protect our bond rating. Let's not put an unnecessary risk on Vermonters and keep government open.”

Rep. Sharpe of Bristol explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I have learned as you have that this governor will only negotiate after bills are passed by the legislature. This bill represents a significant move on the legislature's part to compromise with the Governor. We will want to see if he is willing to compromise.”

Rep. Sibilio of Dover explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted no because we are not done. Our school districts are waiting.”

Rep. Smith of Derby explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

Voting to raise Vermonters' taxes is not why we are here! Of the nonresidential properties in Vermont, 57% are owned by Vermonters. This Assembly just raised those Vermonters' taxes when that could have been avoided! Shame on you and I hope your constituents remember what you did to them.”

Rep. Stuart of Brattleboro explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

By drawing a line in the sand, late in the game, the Scott Administration is wasting Vermont taxpayers' time and money. This a game of chicken and political brinkmanship waiting for the other side to blink. Madam Speaker, We need to honor the General Assembly's money committees' hard work on the budget that passed by a nearly tri-partisan majority several weeks ago. Vermont needs to maintain its triple bond rating on Wall Street. Vermonters deserve no less.”

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

Bills supporting the National Guard and Social Security will survive this Special Session, but after 2 weeks of a Special Session we have done nothing to work toward a compromise with the Governor. We have now passed a bill that does nothing to prevent a government shutdown. In fact passage of this bill continues the 2 week trend of spinning our wheels and accomplishing little other than an expected veto. When will we get down to the real business required of us in this Special Session that is costing Vermonters tens of thousands of dollars.”

This proposal continues to use fiscally irresponsible method of using one-time money to put Ed spending on the credit card.”

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

Rep. Young of Glover explained his vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

This is the budget we already passed setting the controversial boots to the side, so that we can fund the government while we deal with that seemingly intractable issue of funding the school budgets that our communities voted for."

H. 13 Shall the bill pass the failure of the Governor to sign notwithstanding?

Rep. Ancel of Calais explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

H.13 reduces Vermonters taxes by almost \$30 million. It increases the social security exemption, it increases the Earned Income Tax Credit and it reduces tax rates for everyone. H13 does not, and I emphasize not, address the non-residential property tax rate in any way. In fact, there is nothing in this bill that the Governor has said he opposes. I am proud to support it.”

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

Yelling fire in a crowded theater is not protected speech if there is no fire because people can get trampled and hurt. There is no fire here if we address the underlying tax dispute, instead of diverting the focus into a new debate on what the default tax rate should be if there is no compromise reached by July 1. If we truly believe there is a fire – and now, having wasted two weeks, we are closer to it becoming identical bill but removing a non-residential tax rate altogether. It is that easy to resolve in a completely neutral way. Either way, we need to get past this red herring so that the leadership of our state – on all sides – can get down to the real business at hand to resolve the actual areas in dispute.”

Rep. Krowinski of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted yes to keep government open. It’s extremely frustrating to know we could have resolved this today. I will keep fighting to ensure Vermonters get the critical services they deserve.”

Rep Sibilia of Dover explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

Vermont is undergoing massive education transformation through Act 46. Last year and this year we have pushed forward additional MAJOR reforms in special ed, weighting and considerations for teachers healthcare being negotiated at the state level. These are significant, difficult and cost containing state policy changes being implemented at the local level. I cannot and will not willingly vote to undermine the work going on by communities and school districts by supporting a built in tax increase next year that will have absolutely nothing to do with educating Vermont’s students as the Governor has proposed. This is what is holding up passing a state budget.”

Rep. Sullivan of Dorset explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted today to override Governor Scott’s veto of our budget. I am not moved to so vote because it is a good bill. I do not think it to be a good bill in its current form. I am moved only to avoid a Government shutdown – one that I fear will erode public confidence in our government and our Legislature. A shutdown that will unnecessarily hurt Vermonters. A shutdown that would occur without

anyone coming forward with a solid explanation that identifies the plan that would be in place should such a monumental feat as a shutdown occur. I underscore the word ‘unnecessarily.’ I know compromise could have been achieved. In my opinion, a compromise was not vigorously pursued. I thank both the Governor and the Speaker for their meetings with me and other Representatives individually to weigh in on recommended proposals that moved closer to compromise. I am, however, constrained in the best interests of my constituents to vote reluctantly to override Governor’s Scott’s veto.”

Rep. Till of Jericho explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted yes. H.13 incorporates a budget that passed this body with tri-partisan support. A budget which increased less than the budgetary increase proposed by the Governor. H.13 holds homestead property taxes unchanged. It reflects the good work of our school boards holding statewide school budget increases to 1.7%, well below what the Governor had requested. H.13 prevents a shutdown of state government with all the negative effects on Vermonters and Vermont’s finances. The disagreement is about whether to use \$39 million of one time revenue to artificially hold down non-residential property tax. If we do that, the projection is that next year we will need over \$49 million for the same thing. That is terrible and foolish fiscal policy, putting us right back here next year with a bigger fiscal hole to fill.”

Rep. Toll of Danville explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

It is with great disappointment to see that the FY2019 budget has not been passed by this Chamber today. There has been tri-partisan support for the underlying budget and it is irresponsible to use a one state budget as a pawn. Partisan politics should never come before the needs of our constituents. Vermonters rely on government for many aspects of their lives and we have let them all down today.”

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

My vote prevents a default property tax increase on hardworking Vermonters. My entire tenure in the legislature, Vermonters have been telling me that they can’t afford to pay higher property taxes. Today I vote ‘No’ on a proposed property tax increase. I stand with the Governor and hardworking Vermonters to oppose this unnecessary increase in property taxes. Thank you!”

Rep. Willhoit of St. Johnsbury explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

A no vote does not cause a government shutdown. It simply prevents an unnecessary tax increase . . . or no corn dog. My children on Father’s Day took me to brunch after church. One son, however, wanted a corn dog for lunch. The menu included many options, but not a corn dog. At first, he complained he couldn’t eat then (i.e. shutdown). However, after careful deliberation, he chose mac and cheese.

My hope for all of us is that good compromise and not politics will prevail.”

Rep. Wood of Waterbury explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

My most conservative constituents have told me they believe the Governor has gone too far by vetoing the budget twice and I agree. They supported my vote to override the Governor’s veto.”

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted to sustain the veto. The legislature has had plenty of chances to signal a real willingness to compromise. Instead we have wasted a monumental amount of time and sent the Governor not only mixed signals, but bad signals in regard to compromise. The same day that legislative leadership sent the Governor a letter, Friday June 8th, asking him to sign H.13 and ‘we will negotiate in good faith’ Ways and Means was passing a bill that raised the residential rate by 2 cents and the non-homestead rate by 4 cents. Any chance of the Governor signing H.13 was gone. Now, let’s finally get to work at real compromise and avoid a government shutdown.”

Rep. Yantachka of Charlotte explained his vote as follows:

“Madame Speaker:

A government shutdown will be bad for Vermont and for Vermonters. It is disconcerting to see that using this threat in place of good faith negotiating and willingness to compromise reflects the same kind of strategies that are we are seeing used in Washington, DC. We have failed to stand up for Vermont values by putting party politics ahead of the interests of all Vermonters.”

J.R.H. 2 Shall the resolution be adopted?

Rep. Dunn of Essex explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I vote yes. This past week, Jeff Sessions said, ‘Persons who violate the laws of our nation are subject to prosecution. I would cite to you the Apostle Paul and his clear and wise command in Romans 13 to obey the laws of the government because God has ordained them for the purpose of order.’ This passage has historically been invoked in several contexts: by loyalists who opposed the American Revolution, by defenders of slavery in the 1840s and 1850s, and by the third Reich to rationalize the herding and killing of Jewish families. I cannot believe that President Trump, Attorney General Sessions, and our government agencies are actually using the Bible as a source to legitimize the separation of children from their families. What is this nation becoming? By voting for this resolution we show our united stand to resist this inhumane treatment of children and families. And as a Vermonter said to me,

‘Stop this grotesque abuse of power immediately.’”

Rep. Gonzalez of Winooski explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

My community is one of many where people live because they have fled violence and government unrest. Separating families who are requesting asylum, seeking the possibility of finding a safe place, is inhumane. Housing children in dog cages and taking nursing babies out of their mothers’ arms is inhumane. Vermont has a track record of being on the right side of history. I voted yes to be on that right side.”

Rep. McCoy of Poultney explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I would point out these practices took place during the Clinton and Obama administrations. I look forward to our U.S. Congress finally getting this right.”

Rep. Miller of Shaftsbury explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I vote ‘YES,’ on behalf of ‘we the people of Shaftsbury.’ This excruciating, horrific policy that forcible and needlessly tore children away from their parents abandons both our fundamental American principals and our historic position as the moral beacon for the world. Its only intent was to inflict pain and anguish on vulnerable people regardless of their claim for asylum. Congressman Peter Welch warns us to remain ‘vocal and vigilant.’ This atrocity is far from over.”

Rep. Morris of Bennington explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

The actions of our Federal government are inhumane and disgraceful. The cruelty that we are exacting tears at the very soul of our nation. This moment is one of many in which we have shown the world the depth of harm that a legacy of systemic racism, mass incarceration, and genocide can do when unmitigated in modern societies. But today, I am proud that members of this body chose to lend their voice and their actions towards ending these practices and calls to heal those whom we have harmed. This is how we move forward as a nation – together, as brothers, sisters, fathers, mothers, sons, and daughters.”

Rep. Mrowicki of Putney explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I vote yes and stand with those Americans of all political leanings who have been outraged at the taking of children from their parents at the US border. Given the level of mendacity from this

administration in DC, this resolution is a reminder that the whole world is watching – and yes, we do care!”

Rep. Rosenquist of Georgia explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I voted no because the resolved section is confusing as to what is being condemned, either the former policy or the president’s executive order.”

Rep. Viens of Newport City explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I wonder if we would have taken up this resolution if President Obama was still in the White House, as he was responsible for placing thousands of children in these detention centers also!”
