Vermont

- Act 164 of 2020 outlined the regulated cannabis retail market
- Further changes with Act 62 of 2021 and Act 158 of 2022
- Retail market officially opened on Oct 1, 2022, with 3 stores
- As of 11/17/2022, 69 towns have approved retail cannabis, 9 have rejected retail cannabis



Three sources of cannabis revenues

Revenues from cannabis:

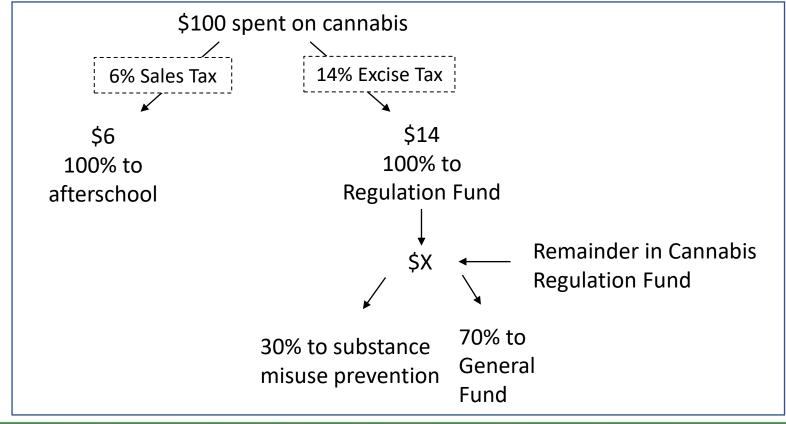
- 6% sales tax
 - Dedicated to afterschool programming by Acts and Resolves 2020 No. 164 Sec. 17c
- 14% excise tax
 - 30% in separate fund for substance misuse prevention programming
 - 70% to General Fund
 - Notwithstood in FY22 Budget, dedicated to Cannabis Regulation Fund in FY24 and FY25
- Fees
 - Set by Legislature, with recommendations from Cannabis Control Board.
 - Raised \$1.05 million in FY22



Example of Allocation of Cannabis Revenues – FY24 and FY25

• If \$100 were spent on cannabis, cannabis revenues would be allocated accordingly:

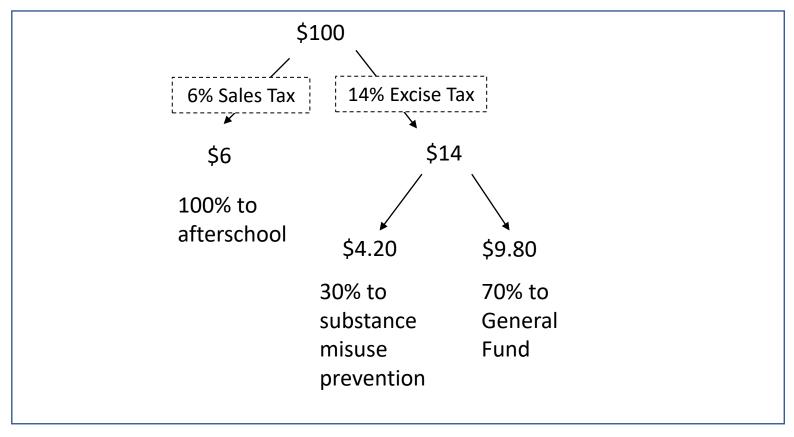
Figure 1: Example allocation of revenues – FY24 and FY25

Revenue Forecasts

- Excise and sales tax estimates included in the January Consensus Revenue Forecast adopted by the Emergency Board
- Market opening FY23 results in only a partial year of excise and sales tax revenue
- Assumes continued market growth in FY24 and FY25.

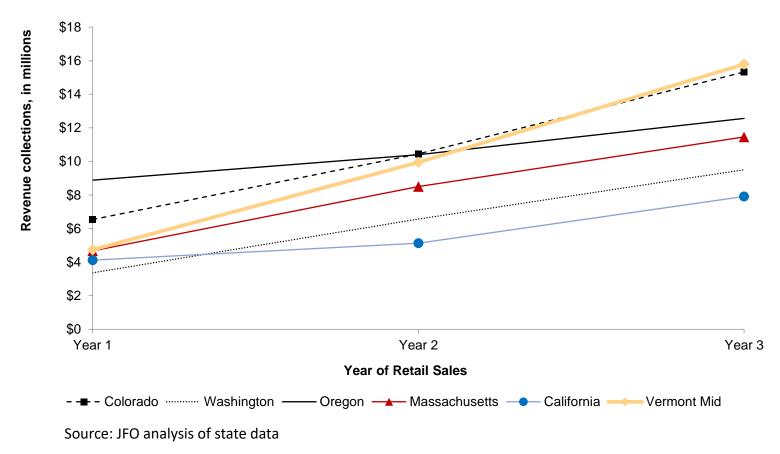

FY23 Revenue to Date

- 6 more months of FY23 to collect taxes
- 25 dispensaries open, more to open soon

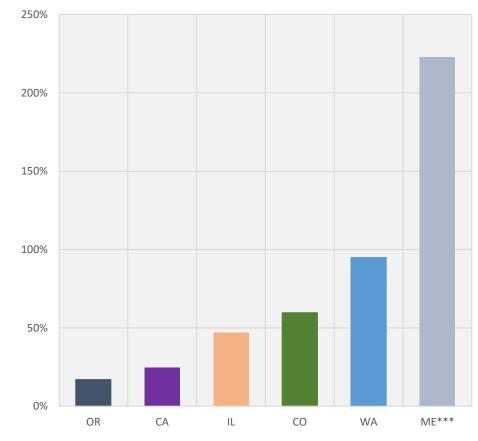
Forecast considerations

- Market trajectory
 - Most states show initial quick growth that eventually levels off
- Legal consumption
 - It remains unclear how much overall consumption will be captured by the retail market
- Regional competition
 - More available nearby markets may drive down price and decrease crossborder purchases
- Price
 - Most retail markets start with a high initial price that eventually fades

Market Trajectory - Ramp up

- Most states show quick initial growth
- Vermont has rampup period as well
 - Vermont started with 3 but now has 25 open dispensaries
 - Those 25 are a part of the 54 overall retailers in the licensing process

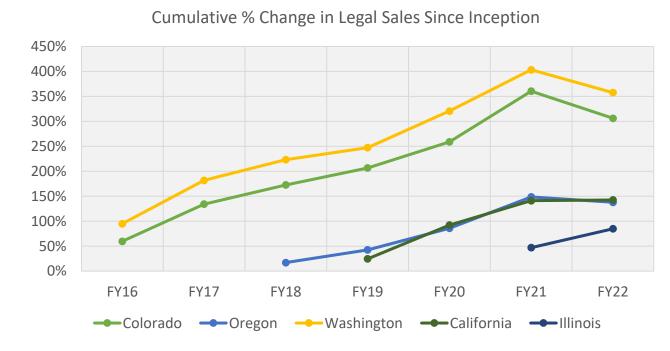
% Change in Revenue Between First Two Fiscal Years

Market Trajectory – Long term leveling off

Cannabis market growth in other states has leveled off over time

Consumption Capture by Retail Market

- Vermont has relatively high consumption of cannabis
 - According to Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMSHA) survey of marijuana use in past month
 - In VT, 17.11% answered yes to consuming cannabis, 9.78% in Northeast overall
- High prices in retail market and allowing people to grow their own cannabis may depress retail purchases
- Key question for model: How much overall consumption will be captured by the retail market?



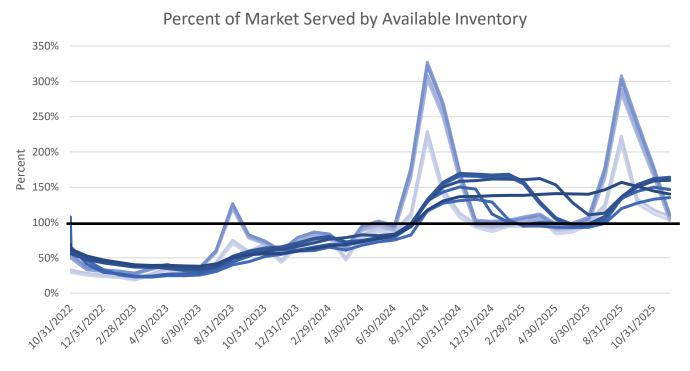
Regional Competition

- All New England states, except NH, allow for retail sales of cannabis
- NY and CT started retail sales within the past couple of months
- Tourism drives about 5.5% of forecasted sales in Vermont's market but could decrease as a result



Price – Vermont's experience

- Like any other good, supply and demand drive price
- CCB shows supply well above demand starting with harvest in 2024

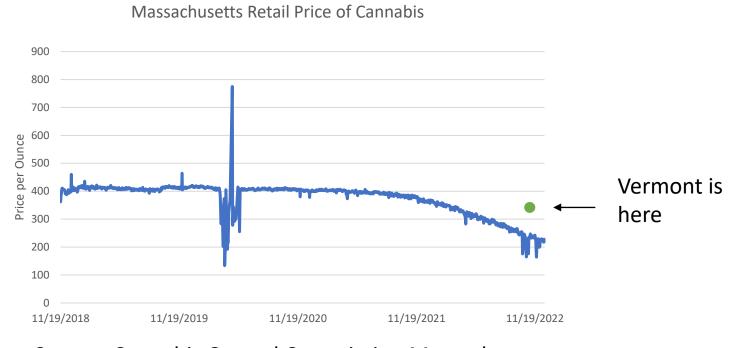
