

### Post-pandemic, employers found job openings


harder to fill Nonfarm job openings and number of unemployed Vermonters looking for work, Jan 2019-Nov 2023




Supplemental Poverty Measure of overall poverty rate, New England states, 2017-2019 and 2020-2022

## Access to Vermont's tax credits broadened in the wake of Covid Number and type of filers claiming state EITC and CTC, 2019-2022




**2022** Total dollars received by type of filer claiming state EITC and CTC, 2019-2022


## Homelessness increased, but Covid aid provided temporary shelter Homeless Vermonters with and without shelter, Jan 2019-Jan 2023

## Fewer than half of single-adult households with or without kids could meet basic needs Share of households with sufficient income to meet basic needs, by family type, 2021-2022







Share of income going to the top 1 percent of Vermonters, 1920-2020



#### Income of top 1 percent is double the General Fund


**budget** Adjusted gross income (AGI) of top 1 percent of Vermont filers, 2022, General Fund budget, FY2022


