Vermont Foodbank Mission

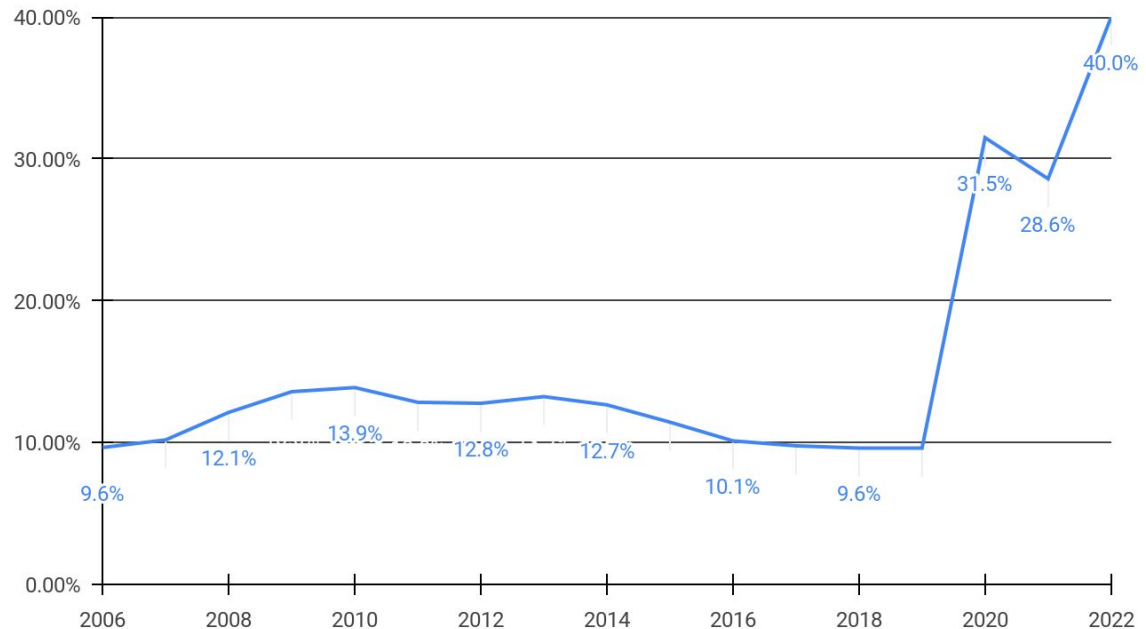
- **Mission:** to gather and share quality food and nurture partnerships so that no one in Vermont will go hungry

- **Provide nutritious food to people in need** through a network of more than 300 network and community partners – food shelves, meal sites, senior centers, after-school programs, schools, and hospitals – in communities serving all 14 counties in Vermont.

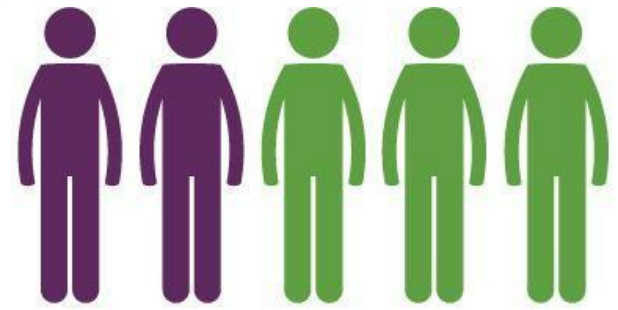
Hunger in Vermont



Hunger before & throughout the pandemic

- Food insecurity had been declining steadily since spiking during the Great Recession and had been holding steady at 1 in 10 Vermonters for several years
- It took 10 years to return to pre-recession levels of hunger
- The Vermont Foodbank was serving 1 in 4 people annually
- 1 in 10 is an unacceptable level of hunger to return to as the status quo

Hunger Inequities in Vermont

Due to the pandemic and current economic crisis, **food insecurity rates** are **higher** for certain groups of people:

1.8X People identifying as women were **1.8x** more likely to experience food insecurity than men.

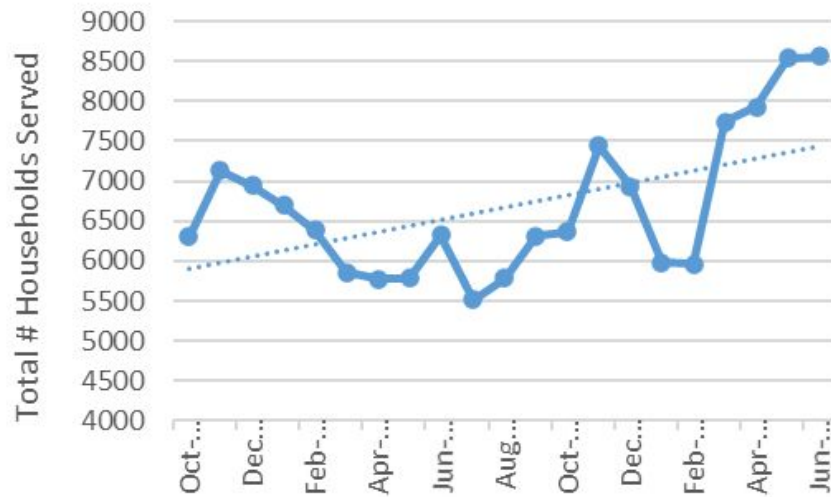
3.1X Households experiencing a job disruption during the pandemic were **3.1x** more likely to be food insecure than households without a job disruption.

6.9X Households with an annual income below \$50K were **6.9x** more likely to be food insecure than households making \$50k per year or more.

VT Foodbank Food Distribution Programs

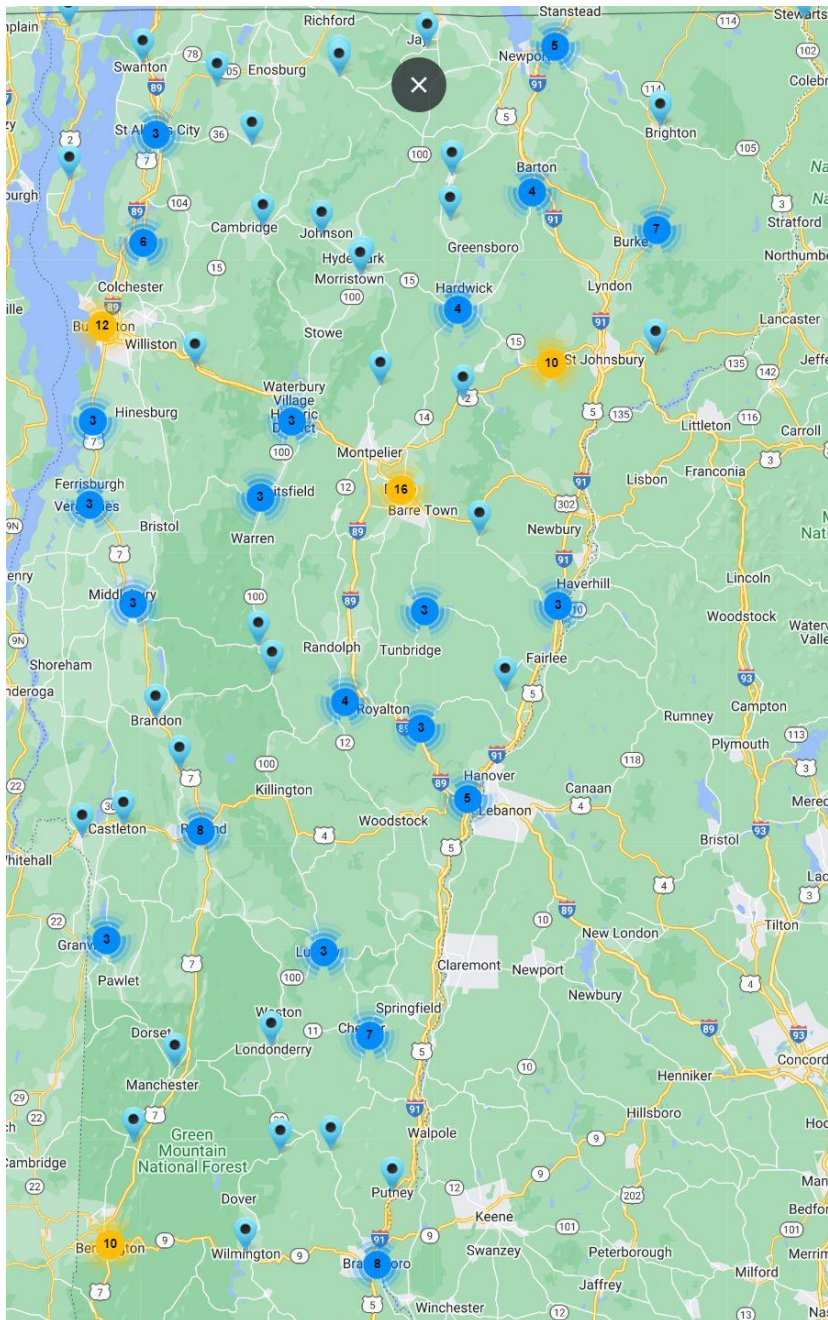

- The Vermont Foodbank Distributed:
 - 11.7 million lbs of food in 2019 (pre-pandemic)
 - From 2020-2022, 49.7 million lbs of food were distributed across Vermont
- **VeggieVanGo saw a 127% increase in participation from 2019 to 2022**
- **60% of the Foodbank's network reports an increase in usage in the past year**
