18	Statement of purpose: This bill proposes to honor a decedent's wishes
19	regarding organ and tissue donation, to provide an opportunity for applicants
20	for drivers' licenses to become organ and tissue donors, and to require the

7	§ 5238. DEFINITIONS
8	As used in this chapter:
9	(1) "Anatomical gift" means a donation of all or part of a human body to
10	take effect upon or after death.
11	(2) "Anatomical gift registry" means an electronic database, as
12	established in section 5248 of this title, of persons who have consented to an
13	anatomical gift upon death.
14	(2)(3) "Decedent" means a deceased individual and includes a stillborn
15	infant or fetus.
16	(3)(4) "Document of gift" means an organ donor card, a will, or other
17	writing used to make an anatomical gift.
18	(4)(5) "Donee" means a hospital, physician, procurement organization
19	or an accredited medical or dental school, college or university authorized to

7	§ 5239. MAKING, AMENDING, REVOKING, AND REFUSING TO
8	MAKE ANATOMICAL GIFTS BY AN INDIVIDUAL
9	(a) An individual who is at least 18 years of age may:
10	(1) Make an anatomical gift for any of the purposes stated in section
11	5242 of this title.
12	(2) Limit an anatomical gift to one or more of those purposes.
13	(3) Refuse to make an anatomical gift.
14	(b) An anatomical gift may be made only by a document of gift signed by
15	the donor. If the donor cannot sign, the document of gift must be signed by
16	another individual and by two witnesses, all of whom have signed at the
17	direction and in the presence of the donor and of each other, and state that it
18	has been so signed.
19	An anatomical gift with intent to donate may be made by a document of
20	gift. In the absence of a revocation or amendment of any document of gift

showing an intent to donate, health care providers licensed in this state and

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1	federally designated organ procurement organizations shall act in accordance
2	with the donor's intention and may take appropriate actions to effect the
3	anatomical gift.
4	(c) If a document of gift is on file with the department of motor vehicles
5	and a corresponding symbol appears on a donor's motor vehicle operator's
6	license, revocation, suspension, expiration, or cancellation of the license does
7	not invalidate the anatomical gift.
8	(d) An anatomical gift by will takes effect upon death of the testator,
9	whether or not the will is probated. If, after death, the will is declared invalid
10	for testamentary purposes, the validity of the anatomical gift is unaffected.
11	(d)(e) A donor may amend or revoke an anatomical gift, not made by will
12	only by one of the following methods:
13	(1) A signed statement.
14	(2) An oral statement made in the presence of two individuals.
15	(3) Any form of communication during a terminal illness or injury
16	addressed to a physician.
17	(4) The delivery of a signed statement to a specified donee to whom a
18	document of gift had been delivered.
19	(e)(f) The donor of an anatomical gift made by will may amend or revoke
20	the gift in the manner provided for amendment or revocation of wills or as
21	provided in subsection (d)(e) of this section.

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- (f)(g) An anatomical gift that is not revoked by the donor before death is irrevocable and does not require the consent or concurrence of any person after the donor's death.
- (g)(h) An individual may refuse to make an anatomical gift of the individual's body or part by either of the following:
  - (1) A writing signed in the same manner as a document of gift.
- (2) Any other writing used to identify the individual as refusing to make an anatomical gift. During a terminal illness or injury, the refusal may be an oral statement or other form of communication <u>addressed to a physician</u>.

  § 5241. REQUIRED REQUESTS; SEARCH AND NOTIFICATION

(a) If, at or near the time of death of a patient, there is no medical record that the patient has made expressed an intent to make or refused to make an anatomical gift, the hospital administrator or a representative designated by the administrator shall discuss with those persons specified in section 5240 of this title the option to make or refuse to make an anatomical gift and request the making of an anatomical gift pursuant to section 5240. The request shall be made with reasonable discretion and sensitivity to the circumstances of the family. A request is not required if the gift is not suitable, based upon accepted medical standards, for a purpose specified in section 5242 of this title. An entry shall be made in the medical record of the patient, stating the name and affiliation of the individual making the request, and of the name, response and

- relationship to the patient of the person to whom the request was made. The secretary of human services shall establish guidelines to implement this subsection.
- (b) For the purpose of determining whether an individual is a donor or has refused to make an anatomical gift, the following persons shall make a reasonable effort to inspect an individual's <u>belongings to discover such items</u> as a motor vehicle operator's license <u>or donor card</u>, and to determine whether the individual has an organ donor card in his or her possession:
- (1) A law enforcement officer, fireman, paramedic or other emergency rescuer finding an individual who the rescuer believes is dead or near death.
- (2) A designated representative of the hospital, upon the admission of an individual at or near the time of death, if no other source of that information is immediately available.
- (c) If a document of gift or evidence of refusal to make an anatomical gift is located by the search required by subdivision (b)(1) of this section, and the individual or body to whom it relates is taken to a hospital, the hospital shall be notified of the contents and the document or other evidence shall be sent to the hospital.
- (d) If, at or near the time of death of a patient, a hospital knows that an anatomical gift has been made pursuant to section 5240 of this title, or that a patient or an individual identified as in transit to the hospital is a donor, the

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hospital shall notify the donee if one is named and known to the hospital; if not, it shall notify an appropriate procurement organization. The hospital shall cooperate in the implementation of the anatomical gift.

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## § 5248. ANATOMICAL GIFT REGISTRY

(a) The department of health, in coordination with the department of motor vehicles, shall develop and maintain a registry identifying persons who express the intention to make an anatomical gift or have otherwise authorized a document of an anatomical gift. The registry shall be maintained in a secured database that provides authorized organ procurement organizations, tissue banks, and eye banks immediate access to the registry at all times. All persons entered in the registry shall have the right to revoke or amend their intent to make an anatomical gift or document of gift as provided in this chapter. In no event shall the data be accessed or used for any purpose unrelated to the making of anatomical gifts.

## § 5249. MONTHLY DISTRIBUTION OF DATA

On the 15th day of each month, the commissioner of motor vehicles or designee shall distribute to the New England Organ Bank a current list of the

  - § 603. APPLICATION FOR AND ISSUANCE OF LICENSE
  - (a) The commissioner or his or her authorized agent may license operators and junior operators when an application, on a form prescribed by the commissioner, signed and sworn to by the applicant for the license, is filed with him or her, accompanied by the required license fee and any valid license from another state or Canadian jurisdiction is surrendered. The commissioner may, however, in his or her discretion, refuse to issue a license to any person whenever he or she is satisfied from information given him or her by credible persons, and upon investigation, that the person is mentally or physically unfit, or because of his or her habits, or record as to accidents or convictions, is unsafe to be trusted with the operation of motor vehicles. A person refused a license, under the provisions of this subsection or section 605 of this title, shall be entitled to hearing as provided in sections 105–107 of this title.
    - (b) Before issuing an operator license, junior operator license, or learner permit to an applicant, the commissioner shall obtain driving record information through the National Driver Register and from each state in which the person has been licensed or has been issued a learner permit.

(c) An operator license, junior operator license, or learner permit shall not
be issued to an applicant whose license or learner permit is suspended, revoked
or canceled in any jurisdiction.

- (d) In addition to any other requirement of law or rule, a citizen of a foreign country shall produce his or her passport and visa, alien registration receipt card (green card), or other proof of legal presence for inspection and copying as a part of the application process for an operator license, junior operator license, or learner permit. Notwithstanding any other law or rule to the contrary, an operator license, junior operator license, or learner permit issued to a citizen of a foreign country shall expire coincidentally with his or her authorized duration of stay. A license or permit issued under this section may not be issued to be valid for a period of less than 180 days.
- (e) The application form for an operator license shall include a separate form which, when executed by an applicant 18 years of age or older, shall serve as a document of anatomical gift by the holder of the license. The commissioner shall cause this document of anatomical gift to be recorded in the department's files and shall provide a monthly list of current donors to the New England Organ Bank pursuant to section 5249 of Title 18. The commissioner shall adopt, by rule, a form to be used as a document of anatomical gift, a symbol to appear on the operator license of each person with

- a completed document of anatomical gift on file with the department, and a
