3	Subject: Education; sports; injury; concussions
4	Statement of purpose: This bill proposes to ensure that a student suffering or
5	suspected to be suffering from a concussion does not participate in school
6	athletic activities until one day after (1) all symptoms disappear and (2)
7	receiving an examination by and written permission to participate from a
8	licensed medical professional.
9 10	An act relating to students with concussions participating in school athletic activities
11	It is hereby enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Vermont:
12	Sec. 1. FINDINGS
13	The general assembly finds:
14	(1) Concussions are a type of brain injury that can range from mild to
15	severe and can disrupt the way the brain normally works.
16	(2) A concussion is caused by a blow to or motion of the head or body
17	that causes the brain to move rapidly inside the skull.
18	(3) Most concussions occur without the loss of consciousness.
19	(4) The risks of catastrophic injuries or death are significant when a
20	concussion or other head injury is not properly evaluated and managed.

1	(5) Concussions can occur during any organized or unorganized athletic		
2	or recreational activity and can result from a fall or from two or more players		
3	colliding.		
4	(6) The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention estimate that as		
5	many as 3,900,000 athletic- and recreation-related concussions occur in the		
6	United States each year.		
7	(7) Concussions are one of the most commonly reported injuries in		
8	children and adolescents who participate in athletic and recreational activities.		
9	(8) Continuing to participate in athletic and recreational activities with a		
10	concussion or symptoms of a head injury causes an individual to be vulnerable		
11	to greater injury or to death.		
12	(9) Some children and adolescents with a concussion or symptoms of a		
13	head injury are prematurely permitted to participate in athletic and recreational		
14	activities.

16	Subchapter 3. Health and Safety Generally		
17	§ 1431. CONCUSSIONS AND OTHER HEAD INJURIES		
18	(a) In this section, "coach" means a person who instructs or trains		
19	elementary or secondary students on a school athletic team.		
20	(b) A coach shall not permit a student to participate or to continue		
21	participating in any athletic activity on the same day that the student:		

1	(1) exhibits symptoms or behaviors consistent with a concussion after
2	the student has had or is suspected to have had a blow to the head or body; or
3	(2) has been diagnosed with a concussion or other head injury.
4	(c) A coach may permit a student who was prohibited from participation
5	under subsection (b) of this section to participate in an athletic activity no
6	sooner than one day after the student:
7	(1) no longer exhibits symptoms or behaviors consistent with a
8	concussion or other head injury; and
9	(2) has been examined by and received written permission to participate
10	in athletic activities from a licensed health care professional trained in the
11	evaluation and management of concussions and other head injuries.
12	(d) The commissioner shall:
13	(1) ensure that all coaches receive annual training on how to recognize
14	the symptoms of a concussion or other head injuries and seek appropriate
15	medical evaluation of and treatment for a student suspected of having a
16	concussion or other head injury; and
17	(2) work with the Vermont principals association to develop guidelines,
18	model policies, protocols, and other materials to educate coaches, students, and
19	the parents and guardians of students regarding:
20	(A) the nature and risks of concussions and other head injuries;

1	(B) the risks of premature participation in athletic activities after
2	receiving a concussion or other head injury; and
3	(C) the importance of obtaining a medical evaluation of a suspected
4	concussion or other head injury and receiving treatment when necessary.
5	(e) The state board shall adopt any rules necessary to implement the
6	requirements of this section.
7	Sec. 3. EFFECTIVE DATE
8	This act shall take effect on passage and shall be implemented beginning no
9	later than the 2010–2011 academic year.
