Joint Resolution Adopted

J.R.H. 13

Joint resolution urging Congress to support the International Violence Against Women Act

<u>Whereas</u>, since 1996, the eastern region of the Democratic Republic of the Congo has been the epicenter of the deadliest war since World War II, leading to the deaths of nearly six million people, and

<u>Whereas</u>, combatants on all sides routinely use rape and sexual violence as a weapon to destroy women, families, and communities, and over 200,000 women have been raped in the course of combat, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Vermont is home to 175 new families from the Democratic Republic of the Congo, many of them from areas that remain embattled in conflict, and

<u>Whereas</u>, rape is unfortunately a not-uncommon event here in Vermont, and Congolese women share the grief Vermont women experience, but rape in a war situation forces additional levels of trauma upon women, including being gang raped, enduring the violence in a family situation with their children and husbands serving as forced onlookers, and the lack of any medical care, and

<u>Whereas</u>, however, the international community has failed to sanction the looting of the Democratic Republic of the Congo's spectacular wealth, and consequently, poverty in this nation is extremely high, and 80 percent of the population lives on 30 cents or less per day, and

<u>Whereas</u>, the International Violence Against Women Act that Vice President Biden introduced while in the U.S. Senate, and that Representative Howard Berman of California introduced in the U.S. House of Representatives, will be reintroduced in Congress during the coming weeks, and it would establish in the Department of State an Advisory Commission on International Violence Against Women, and

<u>Whereas</u>, the bill would among other directives provide that foreign assistance programs, as well as U.S. training of foreign military and police forces, include measures designed to prevent violence against women, and

<u>Whereas</u>, assistance to reduce violence against women would be beneficial for many countries but it is desperately needed in the Democratic Republic of the Congo, and

<u>Whereas</u>, enactment of the International Violence Against Women Act would provide both political support and tangible assistance to the struggling women of the Democratic Republic of the Congo, and

<u>Whereas</u>, U.S. Senator Leahy has also included funding in appropriations legislation to assist women and girls who are victims of sexual violence in the Democratic Republic of the Congo, and to train and support prosecutors and judges who handle these cases, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Congokazi Vermont is an organization of women in Vermont who came from the Democratic Republic of the Congo, and who are fighting to end sexual violence being perpetrated against women and children in their native country, now therefore be it

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives:

That the General Assembly urges Congress to support the International Violence Against Women Act and to include the Democratic Republic of the Congo among those nations specifically targeted to be assisted in the effort to stop this egregious violence, and be it further

<u>Resolved</u>: That the secretary of state be directed to send a copy of this resolution to the Vermont Congressional Delegation and Congokazi Vermont.

Was taken up and adopted on the part of the House.

Committee Relieved of Consideration and Bill Committee to Other Committee

H. 161

Rep. Sweaney of Windsor moved that the committee on Government Operations be relieved of House bill, entitled

An act relating to clean energy assessment districts

And that the bill be committed to the committee on Commerce and Economic Development, which was agreed to.

Bill Amended, Read Third Time and Passed

H. 83

House bill, entitled

An act relating to underground storage tanks and the petroleum cleanup fund

Was taken up and pending third reading of the bill, **Rep. Marcotte of Coventry** moved to amend the bill as follows:

By striking Sec. 8 in its entirety and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

Sec. 8. PETROLEUM CLEANUP FUND ADVISORY COMMITTEE STUDY

(a) The petroleum cleanup fund advisory committee, in consultation with the Vermont departments of taxes and of motor vehicles, shall determine whether the fees assessed pursuant to subsections 1942(a) and (b) of Title 10 should be collected by the department of motor vehicles or the department of taxes, develop a plan for implementing a single-agency collection, and present the plan to the general assembly on or before October 10, 2009.

(b) The petroleum cleanup fund advisory committee shall examine how disbursements from the petroleum cleanup fund are authorized when an owner or operator of an underground storage tank removes a tank for inspection,

replacement, or remediation. The committee shall review whether an owner or operator of an underground storage tank should be compensated the maximum eligible amount for expenses related to remediation when contamination is identified and such contamination was caused by a prior spill or leaking underground storage tank that previous remediation failed to address. A summary of the advisory committee's discussion and its recommendations under this subsection shall be included in the 2010 annual report submitted to the general assembly.

Which was agreed to to. Thereupon, the bill was read the third time and passed.

Third Reading; Bill Passed

H. 135

House bill, entitled

An act relating to wireless communication facilities and project approvals for municipal and cooperative utilities

Was taken up, read the third time and passed.

Bill Amended, Read Third Time and Passed

H. 145

House bill, entitled

An act relating to composting

Was taken up and pending third reading of the bill, **Rep. Turner of Milton** moved to amend the bill as follows:

By inserting a Sec. 6 to read as follows:

Sec. 6. NATURAL RESOURCES BOARD RULEMAKING

On or before July 1, 2009, the natural resources board shall initiate rulemaking to identify activities or categories of activities that should be exempt from the permitting requirement of 10 V.S.A. chapter 151 because such activities provide the same or similar environmental benefit and economic value as composting to the state of Vermont. Prior to filing a final proposal of rules under section 841 of Title 3, the natural resources board shall submit the rules to the house committee on fish, wildlife and water resources and the senate committee on natural resources and energy.

Thereupon, **Rep. Turner of Milton** asked and was granted leave of the House to withdraw his amendment.

Pending third reading of the bill, **Rep. Krawczyk of Bennington** moved to to amend the bill as follows:

In Sec. 5 by striking the second sentence of subsection (a) in its entirety and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

"The committee shall issue a final report of its findings to the house committee on fish, wildlife and water resources, the house and senate committees on natural resources and energy, and the house and senate committees on agriculture by January 15, 2010."

Which was agreed to.

Pending third reading of the bill, **Rep. Scheuermann of Stowe** moved to amend the bill as follows:

By inserting Sec. 2a to read as follows:

Sec 2a. 10 V.S.A. § 6086(a)(11) is added to read:

(11) In addition to all other applicable criteria, the commission, in evaluating a permit application, shall consider the economic, social, cultural, recreational, or other benefit from the development or subdivision.

Rep. Deen of Westminster raised a Point of Order in that the amendment was not germane to the bill, which point of order the Speaker ruled not well taken in that both the bill and the amendment deal with Act 250.

Pending the question, Shall the bill be amended as offered by Rep. Scheuermann of Stowe? **Rep. Winters of Williamstown** demanded the Yeas and Nays, which demand was sustained by the Constitutional number. The Clerk proceeded to call the roll and the question, Shall the bill be amended as offered by Rep. Scheuermann of Stowe? was decided in the negative. Yeas, 36. Nays, 98.

H. 427

Rep. Mook of Bennington spoke for the committee on Education.

House bill entitled

An act relating to making miscellaneous amendments to education law

Having appeared on the Calendar one day for notice, was taken up, and pending the question, Shall the bill be read the third time? **Rep. Donovan of Burlington** moved to amend the bill as follows:

In Sec. 22 by striking subsection (c) in its entirety and inserting in lieu thereof two new subsections to read:

(c) Sec. 13 of this act shall apply retroactively to proposed school district budgets for the 2009–2010 academic year and after.

(d) Sec. 14 of this act shall apply to proposed school district budgets for the 2010–2011 academic year and after.

Which was agreed to.

Pending the question, Shall the bill be read the third time? **Rep. Botzow of Pownal** moved to amend the bill as follows:

By adding a Sec. 2a to read:

Sec. 2a. 17 V.S.A. § 2647 is amended to read:

§ 2647. INCOMPATIBLE OFFICES

(a) An auditor shall not be town clerk, town treasurer, selectman, first constable, collector of current or delinquent taxes, trustee of public funds, town manager, road commissioner, water commissioner, sewage system commissioner, sewage disposal commissioner, or town district school director; nor shall a spouse of or any person assisting any of these officers in the discharge of their official duties be eligible to hold office as auditor. A selectman or school director shall not be first constable, collector of taxes, town treasurer, auditor, or town agent. A selectman shall not be lister. A town manager shall not hold any elective office in the town or town school district. Election officers at local elections shall be disqualified as provided in section 2456 of this title.

(b) Notwithstanding subsection (a) of this section, if a school district prepares and reports its budget independently from the budget of the town and the school district is audited by an independent public accountant, a person shall be eligible to hold office as auditor even if that person's spouse holds office as a school director.

Which was agreed to and third reading of the bill was ordered.
