7	Statement of purpose: This bill proposes to amend the charter of the Windham
8	solid waste district.
9	An act relating to amendment to the Windham solid waste district charter
10	It is hereby enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Vermont:
11	Sec. 1. CHARTER AMENDMENTS
12	The charter of the Windham Solid Waste Management District is amended
13	as set forth in this act. Proposals of amendment were approved by the district
14	board of supervisors on December 8, 2011.
15	Sec. 2. 24 App. V.S.A. chapter 417 is amended to read:
16	CHAPTER 417. WINDHAM SOLID WASTE
17	MANAGEMENT DISTRICT
18	Subchapter 1. Creation and Powers

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Upon approval of this chapter by the participating municipalities
(Brattleboro, Brookline, Dover, Dummerston, Guilford, Halifax, Jamaica,
Marlboro, Newfane, Putney, Readsboro, Townshend, Vernon, Whitingham,
and Wilmington) as required in chapter 121, subchapter 3 of Title 24, there is
created a union municipal district which shall be known as the Windham Solid
Waste Management District (the district) and which shall be a body politic and
eorporate The creation of the union municipal district known as the Windham
Solid Waste Management District under Number M-22 of the Acts of 1988 is
hereby continued. The member towns of the District are those identified on
Attachment A.
§ 2. PURPOSE
The district is created and shall exist for the purpose of providing for
integrated solid waste management for both solid and unregulated hazardous
waste generated by member municipalities and their residents, but nothing
herein shall constitute a limit on acceptance of waste from outside the district,
herein shall constitute a limit on acceptance of waste from outside the district, provided such outside acceptance is approved by majority vote of the board of

reuse activities and programs, recycling, composting, collection,

transportation, unregulated hazardous waste collection and transportation,

resource recovery, land disposal, or any combination thereof. The District is created, as a body politic and corporate, and shall exist for the purpose of providing a comprehensive system for managing solid waste, recyclable materials, organic waste and exempt hazardous waste generated within member municipalities. The principal elements of the management system may include, but are not limited to the following: collection, transportation, processing, citizen information and education, land disposal, recycling centers, intermediate processing facilities, composting facilities, or resource recovery facilities, or any combination thereof, within and outside the District, as well as any other methods allowed by law. The District may accept solid waste and other materials from outside the District.

§ 3. COMPOSITION

The district District shall be composed of and shall include all of the lands and residents within those municipalities which vote to approve and enter into this chapter at the time of its creation, and any other municipalities subsequently admitted to the district District, except for those municipalities which may withdraw as provided in this chapter.

§ 4. DURATION

The <u>district</u> <u>District</u> shall continue as a body politic and corporate unless and until dissolved according to the procedures set forth in this chapter.

§ 5. POWERS

Except as otherwise provided or limited by this chapter, the district The
District shall be a body politic and corporate with the powers incident to a municipal
corporation under the laws of the State of Vermont consistent with the purpose of the
District and in addition shall have the following powers:

- (1) To operate, cause to be operated or contracted, or both, for the operation of any and all facilities for the collection, transportation, resource recovery, recycling, composting, and disposal of solid waste, contract for, and otherwise provide for the collection and transportation of solid waste, and for the operation and maintenance of solid waste facilities, programs, and services of every kind, including but not limited to, sanitary landfills, recycling centers, intermediate processing facilities, composting facilities, or resource recovery facilities, or any combination thereof, and to determine and make proper charges for the cost of such services.
- (2) To purchase, sell, lease, own, acquire, convey, mortgage, improve, and use real and personal property in connection with the purpose of the district District, and to construct, develop, and maintain solid waste facilities in accordance with federal and state law.
 - (3) To hire and fix the compensation of employees.

 - (5) To enter into contracts for any term or duration.

1	(6) To contract with architects, engineers, financial and legal
2	consultants, and other experts for services.
3	(7) To contract with individuals, corporations, associations, authorities,
4	and agencies for services.
5	(8) To provide solid waste disposal services for the member
6	municipalities, the inhabitants thereof, and the businesses therein, and for such
7	others as its facilities and obligations may allow.
8	(9) To contract to pay for solid waste disposal services on the basis of
9	guaranteed amounts, whether delivered for disposal and accepted for disposal
10	or not, of solid waste, with payments based on such guaranteed amounts,
11	whether actually disposed or not, which payments may be variable and may be
12	determined by formulae expressed in such contract with the state of Vermont,
13	the United States of America, or any subdivision or agency thereof for
14	services.
15	(10) To contract with the state of Vermont, the United States of
16	America, or any subdivision or agency thereof for services.
17	(11)(10) To contract with any member municipality for the services of
18	any officers or employees of that municipality useful to it.

(12)(11) To promote cooperative arrangements and coordinated action

1	(13)(12) To make recommendations for review and action to its member
2	municipalities and other public agencies which perform functions within the
3	region in which its member municipalities are located.
4	(14)(13) To exercise any other powers which are necessary or desirable
5	for dealing with solid waste or environmental problems of mutual concern and
6	which are exercised or are capable of exercise by any of its member
7	municipalities.
8	(15)(14) To exercise the power of eminent domain within the District or
9	within any municipality which has withdrawn from the District, provided such
10	property or site to be taken by eminent domain must have been considered, by
11	official action of the Board of Supervisors, as a potential site or sites for a solid
12	waste management facility during the 12-month period immediately preceding
13	the date of withdrawal.
14	(16)(15) To borrow money and issue evidence of indebtedness as
15	provided by chapter Chapters 53 and 119 of Title 24 or other provisions of law
16	authorizing general obligations or revenue debt, including Chapter 12 of
17	<u>Title 10</u> .
18	(17)(16) To establish a budget and assess member municipalities in
19	accordance therewith.
20	(18)(17) To appropriate and expend monies.

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1	(19)(18) To establish sinking funds for the retirement of bonded or other
2	indebtedness.
3	(20)(19) To establish capital reserve funds for public improvements in
4	furtherance of its purpose.
5	(21)(20) To regulate by rule, regulation, or ordinance the collection,
6	transportation, processing, resource recovery, recycling, and disposal of solid
7	waste within the district District, and to require that acceptable solid wastes
8	generated within the district District and any member municipality therein
9	shall be disposed of only in and upon facilities owned by the District whether
10	operated by or on behalf of the district District.
11	(22)(21) To enact and enforce any and all necessary or desirable
12	regulations for the orderly conduct of the government governance and for
13	carrying out the purpose of the district District.
14	(23)(22) To accept and administer gifts, grants, and bequests in trust or
15	otherwise for the purpose of the district District.
16	(24)(23) To exercise all powers incident to a public corporation.
17	(25)(24) To require that solid waste from commercial activities,
18	agricultural, or from industrial activities and sludge be tested by an entity
19	specified by the district District, and to require that the costs of testing be
20	borne by the generator of the solid waste.

1	(26)(25) To enter into contract services with individual nonmember
2	municipalities or other entities to provide services otherwise in the scope of the
3	district's District's powers and purposes.
4	(26) To appoint law enforcement officers or other agents for the
5	enforcement of ordinances, rules, and regulations of the District.
6	(27) To enter into siting agreements with municipalities within
7	which a District facility is to be located, which agreements may specify the
8	terms, conditions, and provisions under which a District facility shall be
9	constructed, operated, and maintained. In the event it is impractical or
10	impossible to determine whether damage to the environment is caused by
11	the District facility or from an adjacent property, the District may
12	indemnify and hold harmless the municipality from any such damage,
13	costs, and liabilities.
14	(28) To enter into cooperative or interlocal agreements with other
15	municipalities or persons, within or outside the District, providing for the
16	management of solid waste, recyclable materials, organic waste, or a
17	combination of solid waste, recyclable materials, and organic waste.

(29) To enact policies defining and regulating conflicts of interest of

members of the Board of Supervisors, and employees and officers of the

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1	(30) To enact policies and regulations with respect to procurement of goods
2	and services.
3	§ 6. TRANSPORTATION AND COLLECTION SITE
4	Each member municipality, either directly or through independent parties,
5	shall be responsible for providing one or more collection sites for the solid
6	waste and recyclables generated within such member municipality, and for the
7	transportation of such solid waste to the district District facility, together with
8	all costs incident thereto. In the event that any member municipality does not
9	wish to institute its own collection system for delivery of the solid waste and
10	recyclables to the facility designated by the district District, the board of
11	supervisors Board of Supervisors may provide for collection and transportation
12	as provided in subsection subdivision $5(a)(1)$ of this chapter.
13	§ 7. RESPONSIBILITY TO ACCEPT SOLID WASTE
14	(a) The district becomes District may become responsible for providing a
15	system for solid waste disposal, as delineated in subsection (b) of this section
16	when the board of supervisors Board of Supervisors declares the disposal
17	system operational.
18	(b) The district shall District may provide a system for disposal or
19	recycling of all solid waste generated by residential and commercial activities,

tires, and metal goods generated within the member municipalities. The

district District may provide for the disposal of solid waste from industrial

activities within a member municipality. The district District may provide for
the disposal of sludge through contract with a member municipality, provided
the sludge is disposed of at no cost to the other member municipalities. The
district may provide for the disposal of any demolition and construction waste
and yard wastes, or both, from any member municipality. Finally, the district
District may contract with a nonmember municipality or a private entity for the
disposal of solid waste generated outside the boundaries of the district District,
provided the contract will not increase the cost of solid waste disposal to the
member municipalities.

(c) Each member municipality agrees to act as a host community in the event the district District decides to establish a solid waste disposal or resource recovery facility, or both, transfer, treatment, or disposal facility within that member municipality.

Subchapter 2. Board of Supervisors

§ 8. AUTHORITY

The legislative power and authority of the district District and the administration and the general supervision of all fiscal, prudential, and governmental affairs thereof shall be vested in a governing body known as the board of supervisors Board of Supervisors, except as specifically provided otherwise in this chapter.

§ 9. COMPOSITION

The board of supervisors Board of Supervisors shall be composed of one primary representative and one alternate from each member municipality.

§ 10. APPOINTMENT

Annually, on or before the last Monday in March, the legislative branch of each member municipality shall appoint its representative and an alternate representative to the board of supervisors Board of Supervisors. Appointments shall be in writing, signed by the chair of the legislative branch, and presented to the clerk of the district District. The legislative branch, by majority vote, may remove their appointed representative during the one-year term for stated reasons. The alternate representative shall represent the municipality at all meetings of the board of supervisors Board of Supervisors that the regular representative is unable to attend and shall have all the rights and privileges of a regular representative.

§ 11. ORGANIZATION MEETING

Annually, during its first meeting in April, the board of supervisors Board of Supervisors shall hold its organizational meeting. At the meeting, the board of supervisors Board of Supervisors shall elect from among its membership, a chair and a vice chair, each of whom shall hold office for one year and until his or her successor is duly elected and qualified. The chair and vice chair are eligible to be elected to successive terms without limit. For this election, each

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1	member of the board of supervisors member municipality's representative shall
2	cast one vote.
3	§ 12. REGULAR <u>BOARD</u> MEETINGS
4	A schedule of regular meetings of the board of supervisors Board of
5	<u>Supervisors</u> shall be established at the organizational meeting.
6	§ 13. SPECIAL <u>BOARD</u> MEETINGS
7	Special meetings of the board of supervisors Board of Supervisors may be
8	called at any time by the chair or shall be called by the clerk upon written
9	request of a majority of the members of the board of supervisors Board of
10	<u>Supervisors</u> . Except in case of emergency, each member of the board of
11	supervisors Board of Supervisors shall be given at least 24 hours' notice of any
12	special meeting of the board of supervisors Board of Supervisors by notice in
13	person, by telephone, or by written notice delivered personally, mailed
14	electronically, mailed, or left at such member's usual place of residence.
15	§ 14. QUORUM
16	For the purpose of transacting business, the presence of members who
17	represent more than 50 percent of the member towns of the board of
18	supervisors with an appointed representative shall constitute a quorum.
19	However, a smaller number may adjourn to another date. Any action

supported by a minimum of three communities and adopted by a majority of

the votes cast at a meeting of the board of supervisors at which a quorum is

present shall be the action of the board, except as otherwise provided in this
 chapter.

§ 15. VOTING

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Except as otherwise provided in this chapter, each member of the board of supervisors Board of Supervisors shall be entitled to cast one vote for every 3,000 population, or part thereof, in the municipality which he or she represents. In addition, the representative of the host community shall have an additional two votes. As former host community, the town of Brattleboro shall be entitled to retain one of its two host community votes. A host community shall be defined as one that has the district's active landfill. The determination of population shall be made based upon the latest census provided by the State of Vermont. Any member town which is the site of a major District facility shall be entitled to one additional vote. A member or an alternate of the board of supervisors Board of Supervisors may not split his or her votes. The determination of population shall be made based upon the latest census provided by the Vermont state office of policy research and coordination. Any action supported by a minimum of three communities and adopted by a majority of the votes cast at a meeting of the Board of Supervisors at which a guorum is present shall be the action of the Board, except as otherwise provided in this chapter. Meetings of the Board of Supervisors or any committee thereof may be conducted by electronic or telephonic means,

1	provided that all participants are able to communicate with one another, that a
2	record of such proceedings is prepared and circulated among all members of
3	the Board of Supervisors within 72 hours of such meeting, and the meeting
4	complies with all requirements of the Vermont Open Meeting Law.
5	§ 16. TERM
6	All representatives to the board of supervisors Board of Supervisors shall
7	hold office for one year and until their successors are duly appointed and
8	qualified beginning April 1st. Any representative may be reappointed to
9	successive terms without limit.
10	§ 17. VACANCY
11	Any vacancy on the board of supervisors Board of Supervisors shall be
12	filled within 30 days after such vacancy occurs by appointment by the
13	authority which appointed the representative whose position has become
14	vacant. An appointee to a vacancy shall serve until the expiration of the term
15	of the representative to whose position the appointment was made and may
16	thereafter be reappointed.
17	§ 18. RULES OF PROCEDURES
18	Except as otherwise provided in this chapter, the most recent version of
19	Robert's Rules of Order shall govern at all meetings.

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1	§ 19. COMPENSATION OF MEMBERS OF BOARD OF SUPERVISORS
2	Each member municipality shall pay to its representatives to the board of
3	supervisors Board of Supervisors such reimbursement or expenses as it shall
4	determine reasonable.
5	Subchapter 3. Compensation of Members of Board of Supervisors
6	§ 20. OFFICERS
7	The officers of the district shall be the chair and the vice chair of the board
8	of supervisors, the clerk of the district, and the treasurer of the district. The
9	Board of Supervisors annually shall elect from among its members a chair,
10	vice chair, treasurer, and clerk and those other officers as it deems appropriate
11	for the conduct of its business. Upon majority vote of the Board of
12	Supervisors, the treasurer and clerk may be non-Board members. No person
13	may hold more than one office at one time. Any officer vacancy shall be filled
14	at the next regular or special meeting of the Board of Supervisors.
15	§ 21. BOND
16	Prior to assuming their offices, officers shall post bond the District shall
17	secure appropriate public official bonds in such amounts as may be determined
18	by resolution of the board of supervisors Board of Supervisors. The cost of
19	such bond shall be borne by the district District.

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The chair of the board of supervisors shall be the chief executive officer of
the district. The chair shall preside at all meetings of the board of supervisors
Board of Supervisors and shall make and sign all contracts on behalf of the
district District upon approval by the board of supervisors Board of
<u>Supervisors</u> . The chair shall perform all of the duties incident to the position
and office.
§ 23. VICE CHAIR
(a) During the absence of or inability of the chair to render or perform his
or her duties or exercise his or her powers, the same shall be performed and
exercised by the vice chair and when so acting, the vice chair shall have all the
powers and be subject to all the responsibilities hereby given to or imposed
upon the chair.
(b) During the absence or inability of the vice chair to render or perform his
or her duties or exercise his or her powers, the Board of Supervisors shall elect
from among its membership an acting vice chair who shall have the powers
and be subject to all the responsibilities hereby given or imposed upon the vice
chair.
§ 24. VACANCY
During the absence or inability of the vice chair to render or perform his or
her duties or exercise his or her powers, the board of supervisors shall elect

from among its membership an acting vice chair who shall have the powers

and be subject to all the responsibilities hereby given or imposed upon the vice

chair.

<u>§ 25.</u> CLERK

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The clerk of the district shall be appointed by the board of supervisors, shall not be a member of the board and shall serve at its pleasure. The clerk shall have the exclusive charge and custody of the public records of the district <u>District</u> and the seal of the <u>district</u> <u>District</u>. The clerk shall record all votes and proceedings of the district District, including meetings of the district District and meetings of the board of supervisors, and shall cause to be posted and published all warnings of meetings of the district. The clerk shall prepare all warnings of meetings of the district as required by subchapter 5 of this chapter. Following approval by the board of supervisors, the clerk shall cause the annual report to be distributed to the legislative branches of its member municipalities Board of Supervisors. The clerk shall prepare and warn all meetings of the District and Board of Supervisors in accordance with Vermont law and shall cause the annual report approved by the Board of Supervisors to be distributed to the legislative bodies of the member municipalities. The clerk shall prepare and distribute any other reports required by the laws of the state of Vermont and resolutions or regulations of the board of supervisors Board of

1 <u>Supervisors</u>. The clerk shall perform all of the duties and functions incident to

the office of secretary or clerk of a body corporate.

<u>§ 26.</u> § 25. TREASURER

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The treasurer of the district shall be appointed by the board of supervisors, shall not be a member of the board and shall serve at its pleasure. The treasurer shall have the exclusive charge and custody of the funds of the district and shall be the disbursing officer of the district. When authorized by the board of supervisors, the treasurer may sign, make or endorse in the name of the district all checks and orders for the payment of money, and pay out and disburse the same and receipt therefor. The treasurer shall keep a record of every note or bond issued by the district and of every payment thereon of principal and interest and, if coupons are taken up, shall cancel and preserve them. The treasurer shall keep correct books of account of all the business and transactions of the district and such other books and accounts as the board of supervisors may require. The treasurer shall render a statement of the condition of the finances of the district at each regular meeting of the board of supervisors and at such times as shall be required of the treasurer. The treasurer shall prepare the annual financial statement and the budget of the district for distribution, upon approval of the board of supervisors, the legislative bodies of the member municipalities. The treasurer shall do and perform all of the duties appertaining to the office of treasurer of a body politic

1	and corporate. The treasurer shall settle with the auditors within 60 days of the
2	end of the fiscal year, at such other items as the board of supervisors may
3	require, and upon retirement from office. Upon retirement from office, the
4	treasurer shall immediately pay over to the successor all of the funds belonging
5	to the district and at the same time deliver to the successor all official books
6	and papers. The treasurer shall have the custody of the funds of the District and
7	shall be the disbursing officer of the District. The treasurer may perform all of
8	the duties and functions incident to the office of treasurer of a municipal
9	corporation. Such duties and functions shall be determined annually by the
10	Board of Supervisors. During the absence or inability of the treasurer to render
11	or perform his or her duties or exercise his or her powers, the chair shall serve
12	as the disbursing officer of the District.
13	§ 26. ADMINISTRATIVE PERSONNEL
14	The Board of Supervisors may employ an Executive Director and such
15	other personnel as it deems necessary for the conduct of the business of the
16	District, and the Board of Supervisors shall have the power to prescribe duties,
17	set compensation, and delegate such responsibilities as it deems appropriate.
18	§ 27. RECORDS
19	The conduct of all meetings and public access thereto, and the maintaining

of all records, books, and accounts of the district District shall be governed by

1	the laws of this state relating to open meetings and accessibility of public
2	records.
3	§ 28. AUDIT
4	The board of supervisors Board of Supervisors shall cause an audit to be
5	performed annually by an independent professional accounting firm or a
6	certified public accountant. A copy of the completed audit shall be distributed
7	to each member municipality.
8	§ 29. EXECUTIVE BOARD
9	The board of supervisors Board of Supervisors shall have the authority to
10	establish an executive board and grant such powers as it may deem necessary.
11	The Board of Supervisors shall annually grant such powers as it may deem
12	necessary. Additionally, the Board of Supervisors may grant to or remove from
13	the Executive Board such powers as it deems necessary. The members of the
14	Executive Board shall consist of the chair, vice chair, and other members as
15	appointed by the Board of Supervisors.
16	§ 30. COMMITTEES
17	The board of supervisors Board of Supervisors shall have the authority to
18	establish any and all committees as it may deem necessary. Each committee
19	shall elect a chair by majority vote, at a minimum of annually. The Board of
20	Supervisors may appoint non-Board members to serve on a committee but such

non-Board members may not serve as chair of the committee.

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1	§ 31. COMPENSATION OF OFFICERS
2	Officers of the district District shall be paid such compensation or
3	reimbursement, or both, of expenses as shall be determined by the board of
4	supervisors Board of Supervisors.
5	§ 32. RECALL OF OFFICERS
6	An officer may be removed by a two-thirds' vote of the board of
7	supervisors Board of Supervisors whenever, in its judgment, the best interest of
8	the district District will be served. For this action, each member of the board
9	of supervisors Board of Supervisors shall cast one vote.
10	Subchapter 4. Fiscal Affairs
11	§ 33. FISCAL YEAR
12	The fiscal year of the district District shall commence on July 1 and end on
13	June 30 of each year.
14	§ 34. BUDGET APPROPRIATION AND ASSESSMENT
15	PREPARATION OF BUDGET
16	(a) Proposed budget. Annually, on or before December 1 15th, the board
17	of supervisors Board of Supervisors shall approve and cause to be distributed
18	to the legislative branch of each member municipality for review and comment
19	an annual report of its activities, including a financial statement, and a
20	proposed budget of the district District for the next fiscal year. Included with

the proposed budget sent to each member municipality shall be the previous

1	fiscal year's financial statement. This proposed budget shall include
2	reasonably detailed estimates of:
3	(1) Deficits or surpluses, or both, from prior fiscal years.
4	(2) Anticipated expenditures for the administration of the district
5	<u>District</u> .
6	(3) Anticipated expenditures for the operation and maintenance of any
7	district solid waste District facilities.
8	(4) Costs of debt service.
9	(5) Payments due on long-term contracts.
10	(6) Payments due to any sinking funds for the retirement of debts.
11	(7) Payments due to any capital reserve funds.
12	(8) Anticipated revenues from tipping fees and other sources, not
13	including assessments levied on the member municipalities.
14	(9) The necessary appropriations to operate and carry out the district's
15	<u>District's</u> functions for the next fiscal year.
16	(10) The proposed assessment, if any, to each member municipality.
17	(11) Such other estimates as the board of supervisors Board of
18	Supervisors shall deem necessary to propose.
19	(b) Budget hearing. The board of supervisors shall hold a public hearing
20	on or before December 31 of each year to receive comments from the
21	legislative bodies of member municipalities and hear all other interested

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persons regarding the proposed budget. Notice of the hearing shall be the same as that specified under section 43 of this chapter, public hearings. The board of supervisors shall give consideration to all comments received and make such changes to the proposed budget as it deems advisable. (c) Budget adoption, tipping fees, and appropriations. Annually on or before January 15, the board of supervisors shall adopt the budget, appropriate the sums which it deems necessary to operate and carry out the district's functions for the next ensuing fiscal year, set the tipping fee for the next ensuing fiscal year, and assess each member municipality, if necessary, for its proportionate share of the sums so appropriated, and adopt a schedule designating when such assessments, if any, are due and payable by the member municipalities. It is anticipated that the tipping fees will provide an adequate source of revenue for the district and that assessments will be levied only in the case of unanticipated or unusual expenses incurred in the prior fiscal year or major expenses anticipated for the coming year that cannot be funded without a significant increase in the tipping fees. (d) Apportionment of assessments. In the event it becomes necessary to levy assessments on the member municipalities, the assessments shall be apportioned among the member municipalities on the basis of trash generation (relative to the tonnage or volume of solid waste generated by or within each

of the member municipalities), population or other basis voted by the board of

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supervisors. If, after the first year of operation of any district facility, the board of supervisors determines that prior assessments were substantially inequitable, it shall retroactively adjust prior year assessments such that municipalities overcharged are given a proportionate credit against future assessments and municipalities undercharged are assessed a proportionate surcharge payable over such period as the board of supervisors determines will be reasonable. Thereafter, the board of supervisors may from time to time (but not more often than once every three years) change the basis of the assessment. The board may adjust the assessments accordingly, but no retroactive adjustments shall be made. Similar estimates and adjustments shall be made for new member municipalities and for the first time use of a new or different disposal facility. In the event of a change in the method of assessment, the board of supervisors shall hold a public hearing on or before the last day of November of each year to receive comments from the legislative bodies of member municipalities and hear all other interested persons regarding the proposed method of assessment. Supervisors shall cast one vote.

(a) Short-term borrowing. The board of supervisors Board of Supervisors may borrow money through the issuance of notes of the district District for the purpose of paying current expenses of the district District. Such notes must mature within one year. The board of supervisors Board of Supervisors may also borrow money in anticipation of grants-in-aid from any source and any revenues other than assessments through the issuance of notes of the district <u>District</u>. Such notes must mature within one year, but may be renewed as provided by general law. The board of supervisors Board of Supervisors may establish and provide for a sinking fund, however denominated, for the retirement of bond issue or other debt, or to provide security for the payment thereof. When so established, it shall be kept intact and separate from other monies at the disposal of the district District, and shall be accounted for as a pledged asset for the purpose of retiring or securing such obligations. The cost of payments to any sinking fund shall be included in the annual budget of the district District.

The board of supervisors Board of Supervisors shall establish and provide

The board of supervisors Board of Supervisors shall establish and provide for a capital reserve fund to pay for public improvements, replacement of worn-out buildings and equipment, and planned and unplanned major repairs of a disposal facility, in furtherance of the purpose for which the district District was created. Any such capital reserve fund shall be kept in a separate account and invested as are other public funds, and shall be expended for such purposes for which established. The cost of payments to any capital reserve fund shall be included in the annual budget of the district District.

Annually, on or before January 15, the board of supervisors shall establish and adjust a disposal fee structure (tipping fee) for the purpose of generating

revenues for the district. The board of supervisors shall make every effort to set the tipping fee at a level sufficient to generate enough revenue to enable it to operate and carry out the district's functions for the next ensuing fiscal year without having to levy any assessments upon the member municipalities. Each member municipality agrees it shall protect, indemnify and hold harmless each other member municipality (except for any member municipality at fault) and its respective officials, officers, members, employees, and agents from and against all liabilities, damages, claims, demands, judgments, losses, costs, expenses, suits, actions or proceedings and attorney's fees, and further agrees to defend the indemnified party in any suit, action or proceeding, with respect to any act by or fault of a member municipality arising out of the possible location and operation of a district facility within the boundaries of that member municipality.

(a) The District agrees it shall protect, indemnify and hold harmless each member municipality (except a member municipality found by a court of

competent jurisdiction to be at fault) and its respective officials, officers,
members, employees, and agents from and against all liabilities, damages,
claims, demands, judgments, losses, costs, expenses, suits, actions, or
proceedings, and attorneys' fees and further agrees to defend the indemnified
party in any suit, action, or proceeding with respect to any act by or default of
the District arising out of the location and operation of a District waste disposal
facility or the negligent conduct arising from any District activities.
(b) Any member municipality which operates or maintains or has operated
or maintained a facility or facilities for the disposal of solid or hazardous waste
(except a facility the operation or maintenance of which is, pursuant to express
written authorization of the Board of Supervisors, conducted for the District)
agrees that it shall protect, indemnify, and hold harmless the District and each
other member municipality (except a member municipality found to be at fault)
and their respective officials, officers, members, employees, and agents from
and against all liabilities, damages, claims, demands, judgments, losses, costs,
expenses, suits, actions, or proceedings, and attorney's fees and further agrees
to defend the indemnified parties in any suit, action, or other proceeding with

Representatives of the member municipalities shall be given an opportunity to be heard at such meeting, together with any other interested persons. After such a meeting, the board of supervisors may declare the district dissolved immediately or as soon thereafter as the financial obligations of the district and of each member municipality on account thereof have been satisfied, or it may declare that the district shall continue to exist despite the withdrawal of such member municipality. The membership of the withdrawing municipality shall terminate as soon after such vote to withdraw as the financial obligations of said withdrawing municipality have been paid to the district.

(2) Withdrawal after the district has incurred bonded indebtedness or

entered into a long-term contract. After the district has incurred bonded

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indebtedness or entered into a long-term contract, a member municipality may vote to withdraw in the same manner as the vote for adoption of this chapter by such member municipality. It shall be a condition that the withdrawing municipality shall enter into a written agreement with the district whereby such withdrawing municipality shall be obligated to continue to pay its share of the debt incurred by the district for the remaining bonding term or contract term. In addition, the withdrawing municipality shall obligate itself to pay the cost of redesigning and rebuilding any facility of the district occasioned because of the reduced volume of solid waste. The cost shall be determined by an independent engineering firm hired by the board of supervisors. These additional costs shall be paid either in a lump sum or in installments at such times and in such amounts as required by the board of supervisors. In addition, in the event there is a resource recovery facility, if the withdrawal of a municipality will reduce the minimum volume of solid waste required to meet the district's long term contractual commitments, no withdrawal of a member municipality shall be permitted during the period of such commitments. A member municipality may terminate its membership in the District by a majority vote of its voters present and voting at a duly warned annual or special meeting voting for such a termination. At such annual or special meeting, a majority of the municipality's voters present and voting must also approve the terms and conditions of this chapter for withdrawal required

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(C) Any direct, incidental, and consequential costs resulting from its
withdrawal, including without limitation fixed operational costs and costs of
redesigning, relocating, or rebuilding a facility.

§ 55. § 58. ADMISSION OF NEW MEMBER MUNICIPALITIES

The board of supervisors Board of Supervisors may authorize the inclusion of additional member municipalities in the district District upon such terms and conditions as it in its sole discretion shall deem to be fair, reasonable and in the best interest of the district District. The legislative branch of any nonmember municipality which desires to be admitted to the district District shall make application for admission to the board of supervisors Board of Supervisors of the district District. The board shall determine the effects and impacts which are likely to occur if such municipality is admitted and shall thereafter either grant or deny authority for admission of the petitioning municipality. If the board grants such authority, it shall also specify any terms and conditions, including but not limited to financial obligations upon which such admission is predicated. The petitioning municipality shall thereafter comply with the approval procedures specified in chapter 121 of Title 24. If a majority of the voters of the petitioning municipality present and voting at a meeting of such municipality duly warned for such purpose shall vote to approve this chapter and the terms and conditions for admission, the vote shall be certified by the clerk of that municipality to the board of supervisors Board of Supervisors.

1 Thereafter, upon satisfactory performance of the terms and conditions of

admission, said municipality shall, by resolution of the board of supervisors

Board of Supervisors, become and thereafter be a member municipality of the

district.

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§ 56. § 59. DISSOLUTION OF DISTRICT

(a) Procedure. If the board of supervisors Board of Supervisors receives a dissolution petition from no less than five percent of voters in each member municipality in which votes are verified by the Town Clerk in each municipality, or if the Board of Supervisors, by resolution approved by two-thirds of all the votes entitled to be cast, determines that it is in the best interests of the public, the member municipalities and the district District that the district District be dissolved, and if the district District then has no outstanding debt or obligations under long-term contracts, or will have no such debt or obligation upon completion of the plan of dissolution, it shall prepare a plan of dissolution and thereafter adopt a resolution directing that the question of such dissolution and the plan of dissolution be submitted to the voters of the district District at a special meeting of the district District duly warned for such purpose. If two-thirds of the voters of the district District present and voting at such special meeting of the district District duly warned for such purpose shall vote to dissolve the district District and approve the plan of dissolution, the district District shall cease to conduct its affairs except insofar as may be

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necessary for the winding up thereof. The board of supervisors Board of
Supervisors shall cause a notice of the proposed dissolution to be mailed to
each known creditor of the district District and to the Vermont secretary of
state, and shall proceed to collect the assets of the district District and apply
and distribute them in accordance with the plan of dissolution.
(b) Plan of dissolution. The plan of dissolution shall:
(1) Identify and value all unencumbered assets of the district District.
(2) Identify and value all encumbered assets of the district District.
(3) Identify all creditors of the district and the nature or amount of all
liabilities and obligations of the district District.
(4) Identify all obligations under long-term contracts.
(5) Specify the means by which assets of the district District shall be
liquidated and all liabilities and obligations of the district District shall be paid
and discharged, or adequate provision shall be made for the satisfaction
thereof.
(6) Specify the amount of monies due from each member municipality,
if necessary, to extinguish the liabilities of the district District.
(7) Specify the nature and amount of any liabilities or obligations to be
assumed and paid by the member municipalities.
(8) Specify the means by which any assets remaining after discharge of

all liabilities shall be liquidated, if necessary.

- (9) Specify that any assets remaining after payment of all liabilities shall be apportioned and distributed among the member municipalities according to the same basic formula used in apportioning the annual assessments of the district District.
- (c) Termination. When the plan of dissolution has been implemented, the board of supervisors Board of Supervisors shall adopt a resolution certifying that fact to the member municipalities. Then, this chapter and the district District created hereby shall be terminated.

§ 57. § 60. AMENDMENT OF CHARTER

(a) This chapter may be amended by petition of five percent of the voters (certified by each Town Clerk) of the district District under subchapter 5 of this chapter or by the board of supervisors Board of Supervisors under this section. The board of supervisors Board of Supervisors at any regular or special meeting of the board of supervisors Board of Supervisors may, by a majority vote, adopt a resolution stating its intent to amend the chapter. A written copy of the resolution, stating the wording and purpose of the amendment and the date of the meeting scheduled to act on the amendment, shall be delivered to the legislative branches of each member municipality and mailed or left at the usual place of residence of each member of the board of supervisors Board of Supervisors, by the clerk of the district District at least ten business days prior to the meeting scheduled to adopt the amendment. The

amendment may be adopted by majority vote of the board of supervisors at the
meeting scheduled to adopt the amendment. The amendment may be adopted
by majority vote of the board of supervisors at the meeting scheduled to act on
the amendment a vote of members present and representing two-thirds of all
the votes entitled to be cast at a regular meeting or a special meeting called for
that purpose of the Board of Supervisors, unless a majority two-thirds of legal
voters of the legislative branches of the member municipalities request, in
writing, the board of supervisors Board of Supervisors hold a special district
meeting to vote on the amendment.
(b) If the amendment is adopted by the board of supervisors Board of
Supervisors or by the voters of the district District, the clerk of the district
District, within ten business days after the vote of adoption, shall certify to the
secretary of state each proposal of amendment showing the facts as to its origin
and the procedure followed. The secretary of state shall then proceed as with
municipal charter amendments under section 2645 of Title 17. The
amendment shall become effective upon affirmative enactment of the proposal,
either as proposed or as amended by the general assembly. Section $50 53$ of
this chapter, relating to reconsideration and rescission of vote, shall apply to an
amendment adopted by a vote of the board or the voters under this section.
(c) This chapter may be amended from time to time in the manner provided

in this chapter, but no such amendment shall be made which shall substantially

impair the rights of the holders of any bonds or other notes or other evidence of
indebtedness or substantially affect any obligations under long-term contracts
of the district then outstanding or in effect, or the rights of the district to
procure the means for payment, continuation, or termination thereof.

§ 58. § 61. SEVERABILITY

Should any court of competent jurisdiction judge any term, phrase, clause, sentence, or provision of this chapter to be invalid, illegal, or unenforceable in any respect, such judgment shall not affect the validity, legality, or enforceability of the chapter as a whole, or any part of this chapter.

§ 59. § 62. DEFINITIONS

As used in this chapter, all terms below shall have the following meanings:

- (1) "Solid waste" shall mean any discarded garbage, refuse, septage, sludge from a waste treatment plant, water supply plant, or pollution control facility and other discarded material, including solid, liquid, semi-solid, or contained gaseous materials resulting from industrial, commercial, mining, or agricultural operations and from community activities, but does not include animal manure and absorbent bedding used for soil enrichment or solid or dissolved materials in industrial discharges which are point sources subject to permits under the water pollution control act, chapter 47 of Title 10.
- (2) "Hazardous waste" shall mean any waste or combination of wastes of a solid, liquid, contained gaseous, or semi-solid form, including but not

1	limited to those which are toxic, corrosive, ignitable, reactive, strong
2	sensitizers, or which generate pressure through decomposition, heat or other
3	means, which in the judgment of the secretary of the agency of natural
4	resources, or his or her duly authorized representative may cause or contribute
5	to an increase in mortality or an increase in serious irreversible or
6	incapacitating reversible illness, taking into account the toxicity of such waste,
7	its persistence and degradability in nature, and its potential for assimilation or
8	concentration in tissue, and other factors that may otherwise cause or
9	contribute to adverse acute or chronic effects on the health of persons or other
10	living organisms, or any matter which may have an unusually destructive
11	effect on water quality if discharged to ground or surface waters of the state.
12	All special nuclear, source, or byproduct material, as defined by the Atomic
13	Energy Act of 1964 and amendments thereto, codified in section 2014 of Title
14	42 of the United States Code, is specifically excluded form this definition.
15	(3) Solid waste from "residential activities" shall include any solid
16	waste generated by a household or apartment, including, but not limited to,
17	food waste, packaging, newspaper and other paper products, glass, cans and
18	plastic.
19	(4) Solid waste from "commercial activities" shall include any solid
20	waste generated by retail and wholesale establishments, including but not

limited to food waste, corrugated container board, metals, and plastics.

1	(5) Solid waste from "industrial activities" shall include any solid, semi-
2	solid, or liquid waste generated by an industry as part of the production
3	process. Solid wastes generated by employees and similar in composition to
4	that generated by residential or commercial activities are excluded from this
5	definition.
6	(6) "Sludge" shall mean solids and semi-solids generated by a
7	wastewater treatment plant. Notwithstanding any provision of this chapter, the
8	district shall have the power to impose and collect a surcharge or special
9	assessment for the collection, storage, and disposal of sludge.
10	(7) "Tires" shall mean all rubber, belted, and nonbelted automobile and
11	truck tires.
12	(8) "Demolition and construction waste" shall mean all solid waste
13	generated in the demolition and construction of buildings, including stumps,
14	brush, plaster, sheetrock, boards, bricks, mortar, concrete, and roofing
15	materials.
16	(9) "Yard waste" shall mean grass clippings, leaves, and brush.
17	(10) "Metal goods" shall mean discarded appliances and junk
18	automobiles.
19	(11) "Resource recovery facility" shall mean a waste-to-energy plant.
20	"Composting" means the controlled biological decomposition of organic

matter through active management to produce a stable humus-rich material.

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1	(2) Conditionally exempt generator (CEG) means a generator of
2	hazardous waste which is conditionally exempted from certain provisions of
3	the Vermont Hazardous Waste Management Regulations.
4	(3) "Discrete disposal facilities" means all facilities other than diffuse
5	disposal facilities that are used for the disposal of solid wastes. A discrete
6	disposal facility may include one or more landfill units.
7	(4) "Hazardous waste" means any waste or combination of wastes of a
8	solid, liquid, contained gaseous, or semisolid form, including but not limited to
9	those which are toxic, corrosive, ignitable, reactive, strong sensitizers, or
10	which generate pressure through decomposition, heat, or other means which in
11	the judgment of the Secretary may cause or contribute to an increase in
12	mortality or an increase in serious irreversible or incapacitating reversible
13	illness, taking into account the toxicity of such waste, its persistence and
14	degradability in nature, its potential for assimilation or concentration in tissue,
15	and other factors that may otherwise cause or contribute to adverse acute or
16	chronic effects on the health of persons or other living organisms, or any
17	matter which may have an unusually destructive effect on water quality if
18	discharged to ground or surface waters of the state. All special nuclear, source,
19	or by-product material, as defined by the Atomic Energy Act of 1954, is

specifically excluded from this definition.

1	(5) "Recyclable materials" means solid waste which may be reclaimed
2	or processed so that it may be used in the production of materials or products.
3	(6) "Recycle" means the process of utilizing solid waste for the
4	production of materials or products, but shall not include processing solid
5	waste to produce energy or fuel products.
6	(7) "Recycling facility" means a facility that accepts, aggregates, stores,
7	or processes recyclable materials.
8	(8) "Resource recovery facility" means a waste-to-energy facility.
9	(9) "Sludge" means any solid, semisolid, or liquid generated from a
10	municipal, commercial, or industrial wastewater treatment plant or process,
11	water supply treatment plant, air pollution control facility, or any other such
12	waste having similar characteristics and effects.
13	(10) "Solid waste" means any discarded garbage, refuse, septage, or
14	sludge from a waste treatment plant, water supply plant, or pollution control
15	facility and other discarded material including solid, liquid, semisolid, or
16	contained gaseous materials resulting from industrial, commercial, mining, or
17	agricultural operations and from community activities but does not include
18	animal manure and absorbent bedding used for soil enrichment or solid or
19	dissolved materials in industrial discharges which are point sources subject to
20	permits under the Water Pollution Control Act, 10 V.S.A. chapter 47. For the

purposes of this chapter, solid waste that is also hazardous waste is subject to

1	further regulation under the Vermont Hazardous Waste Management
2	Regulations.
3	(11) "Solid waste management" means the activities that result in the
4	storage, transportation, transfer, or treatment of solid waste or recyclable
5	materials or in the disposal of solid waste.
6	(12) "Transfer station" means a solid waste management facility where
7	solid waste is collected, aggregated, sorted, stored, or processed for the
8	purpose of subsequent transfer to another solid waste management facility for
9	further processing, treatment, transfer, or disposal.
10	(13) "Treatment" means any method, technique, or process, including
11	neutralization, designed to change the physical, chemical, or biological
12	character or composition of any hazardous or solid waste so as to neutralize
13	such waste or so as to recover energy or material resources from the waste or
14	so as to render such waste safer for transport, amenable for recovery, amenable
15	for storage, or reduced in volume or, for hazardous wastes, so as to render such
16	waste nonhazardous.
