6	Statement of purpose: This bill proposes to: 1) require a genuine progress		
7	indicator committee to develop an economic indicator, to be named "the		
8	genuine progress indicator," to replace the gross domestic product as a		
9	measure of Vermont's economic health; and 2) require the governor to use the		
10	genuine progress indicator developed by the committee as a factor in preparing		
11	the state budget.

13	It is hereby enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Vermont:		
14	See 1. GENUINE PROGRESS INDICATOR		
15	(a) Creation of committee. There is created a genuine progress indicator		
16	committee to develop an economic indicator which shall be named "the		
17	genuine progress indicator."		
18	(b) Membership. The genuine progress indicator committee shall be		
19	composed of:		
20	(1) the secretary of administration:		

1	(2) the secretary of agriculture, food and markets or his or her designee;
2	(3) the commissioner or banking, insurance, securities, and health care
3	administration or his or her designee;
4	(4) the secretary of commerce and community development or his or her
5	designee;
6	(5) the commissioner of fish and wildlife or his or her designee;
7	(6) the commissioner of forest, parks and recreation or his or her
8	designee;
9	(7) the commissioner of health or his or her designee
10	(8) the commissioner of labor or his or her designee;
11	(9) the commissioner of public safety or his or her designee;
12	(10) the commissioner or public service or his or her designee;
13	(11) the commissioner for children and families or his or her designee;
14	(12) the commissioner of environmental conservation or his or her
15	designee;
16	(13) the secretary of natural resources or his or her designee;

1	(c) Powers and duties of committee; purpose of indicator.
2	(1) By November 1, 2012, the committee shall develop a genuine
3	progress indicator to replace the gross domestic product as a measure of
4	Vermont's economic health.
5	(2) The genuine progress indicator shall be one that adds in positive
6	factors and subtracts negative factors which are not counted by standard gross
7	domestic product accounting practices.
8	(3) The genuine progress indicator shall be based upon and be at least as
9	comprehensive as the framework designed by the Gund Institute for Ecological
10	Economics of the University of Vermont; shall incorporate basic human rights
11	principles; and shall include at least the following measures:
12	(A) access to livable wages;
13	(B) access to affordable housing;
14	(C) access to health care;
15	(D) personal consumption expenditures;
16	(E) income distribution;
17	(F) personal consumption adjusted for income inequality;
18	(G) value of household labor;
19	(H) value of volunteer work;
20	(I) services of household capital;
21	(J) services of highways and streets;

2	(L) cost of family breakdown;
3	(M) loss of leisure time;
4	(N) cost of underemployment;

2	implementation as set forth in subsection (d) of this section, the committee

Sec. 1. PURPOSE AND INTENT

- (a) Establishment; maintenance.
- (1) The secretary of administration shall accept the offer of the Gund Institute for Ecological Economics of the University of Vermont (the "Gund Institute") to work in cooperation to establish, and shall thereafter make use of and maintain, the genuine progress indicator (GPI). In establishing the GPI, the secretary of administration, in cooperation with the Gund Institute, shall create a Vermont data committee to inventory existing datasets and to make recommendations that may be useful to all data users in Vermont's state government, nonprofits, and businesses.
- (2) The GPI shall add positive factors and subtract negative factors that are not counted by standard gross state product accounting practices.
- (3) The GPI shall use standard genuine progress indicator methodology and additional factors to enhance the indicator, including basic human rights principles.
- (b) Accessibility. Once established, the GPI and its underlying datasets that are submitted by the Gund Institute to the secretary of administration shall be posted on the state of Vermont website.
- (c) Updating data. The secretary of administration shall cooperate in providing data to the Gund Institute as necessary in order to update and maintain the GPI.

Sec. 3. REPORT

By January 1, 2019, the secretary of administration shall report to the house and senate committees on government operations regarding the usefulness of the genuine progress indicator.

Sec. 3a. PROGRESS REPORT

By January 15, 2015, the secretary of administration shall submit to the house and senate committees on government operations a progress report regarding the GPI.

Sec. 4. DATASETS

Any datasets submitted by the Gund Institute to the secretary of administration pursuant to this act shall be considered a public record under chapter 5 of Title 1.

Sec. 5. EFFECTIVE DATE

This act shall take effect on passage

Sec. 1. PURPOSE, DEFINITION, AND INTENT

- (a) Purpose. The purpose of the genuine progress indicator ("GPI") is to measure the state of Vermont's economic, environmental, and societal well-being as a supplement to the measurement derived from the gross state product and other existing statistical measurements.
- (b) Definition. The GPI is an estimate of the net contributions of economic activity to the well-being and long-term prosperity of our state's citizens, calculated through adjustments to gross state product that account for positive and negative economic, environmental, and social attributes of economic development.
- (c) Intent. It is the intent of the general assembly that once established and tested, the GPI will assist state government in decision-making by providing an additional basis for budgetary decisions, including outcomes-based budgeting; by measuring progress in the application of policy and programs; and by serving as a tool to identify public policy priorities, including other measures such as human rights.

Sec. 2. GENUINE PROGRESS INDICATOR

(a) Establishment; maintenance.

(1) The secretary of administration shall negotiate and enter into a memorandum of understanding with the Gund Institute for Ecological Economics of the University of Vermont (the "Gund Institute") to work in collaboration to establish and test a genuine progress indicator (GPI). The memorandum shall provide the process by which the GPI is established and, once tested, how and by whom the GPI shall be maintained and updated. The memorandum shall further provide that in the establishment of the GPI, the secretary of administration, in collaboration with the Gund Institute, shall create a Vermont data committee made up of individuals with relevant expertise to inventory existing datasets and to make recommendations that may be useful to all data users in Vermont's state government, nonprofit organizations, and businesses.

- (2) The GPI shall use standard genuine progress indicator methodology and additional factors to enhance the indicator, which shall be adjusted periodically as relevant and necessary.
- (b) Accessibility. Once established, the GPI and its underlying datasets that are submitted by the Gund Institute to the secretary of administration shall be posted on the state of Vermont website.
- (c) Updating data. The secretary of administration shall cooperate in providing data as necessary in order to update and maintain the GPI.

Sec. 3. PROGRESS REPORTS

By January 15, 2013 and once every other year thereafter, the secretary of administration shall report to the house committees on government operations and on commerce and economic development and the senate committees on government operations and on economic development, housing, and general affairs a progress report regarding the maintenance, including the cost of maintenance, and usefulness of the GPI.

Sec. 4. DATASETS

Any datasets submitted to the secretary of administration pursuant to this act shall be considered a public record under chapter 5 of Title 1.

Sec. 5. EFFECTIVE DATE

This act shall take effect on passage.
