Whereas, the large crowd of approximately 1,500 spectators witnessed a glorious afternoon of competition, and the Burlington Free Press described the Hornets' contributions as a combination of "intricate dance moves, high-flying acrobatics and synchronized cheers," and

Whereas, as always, the musical accompaniment and coordination devised for the Essex team reflected months of careful preparation and rehearsal, and

Whereas, in the various elements of competition, Hornet contingents earned first or second place in the top gun stunts and second-place finishes for both top gun tumbling and top gun jumps, and

Whereas, the Essex Hornets won the 2012 Division I cheerleading title 181 to 177 over second-place Rutland, and

Whereas, this victory marked a special occasion for the Hornets as it was their 20th Division I state cheerleading championship and also earned them entry into the New England Championships in Lawrence, Massachusetts, and

Whereas, these thrilled Hornet cheerleaders, including Lisa Ashley, Maureen Besade, Sianay Chase, Emily Dowman, Paige Dunbar, Stephanie Fuchs, Jenna Lasko, Mikayla Leblanc, Michala Rigoli, Caitria Sands,

Francesca Sands, Haley Sullivan, Kallysta Tanguay, Katherine Weed, Kasandra Wiggett, and Amy Yandow added further glory to the team's success when they subsequently won the Northern Vermont Athletic Conference multi-division championship held in South Burlington, and

Whereas, without the amazing work and continuing effort of head coach Maria Ung and assistant coach Brittany Picard, this historic 20th state championship would not have occurred, now therefore be it

Whereas, the fifth-seeded Essex High School girls' ice hockey Hornets faced off against the third-seeded South Burlington High School Rebels for the 2012 Division I championship, and

<u>Whereas</u>, as play at UVM's Gutterson Fieldhouse began, it quickly became evident that the teams were nearly evenly matched, and

<u>Whereas</u>, each team needed to stay alert for its advantageous moment to move offensively, especially if a power play scenario developed, and

Whereas, the Hornets were the first to avail themselves of this special opportunity when an Essex player sent a rebounding puck into the South Burlington net at 7:37 of the first period, giving the Hornets a 1–0 lead, and

Whereas, South Burlington did not allow this scoring deficit to remain for long as at 11:23 of the same period, a Rebel scored while the Hornets also lacked their full quorum of players on the ice, and

Whereas, from that moment, the game became a defensive dual between two fine goalies, one of whom, a Hornet freshman, executed a glove snatch off a Rebel, and that player's great saves nullified a total of 15 possible Rebel goals, and

Whereas, as the two teams entered the third and final regulation period, they each sought the ideal opportunity to score the winning goal, and

Whereas, a Hornet strategically stationed herself in what the team calls the "sweet spot" on the ice—namely, an ideal location for a forward to take command of loose pucks near the opponent's goal, and

Whereas, with four minutes of the third period remaining and mere seconds before a South Burlington penalty-evicted player placed her skates back on the ice, the strategically placed Hornet scored the winning goal, sealing a 2–1 Essex game victory and giving her team the 2012 Division I title, and

Whereas, each ice hockey Hornet, including Victoria Gibson, Taylor Hallowell, Erin Murray, Alexandra Celia, Haley Drury, Kathleen Young, Rachel Elliott, Melanie Theriault, Mackenzie Burnett, Nicole Beaudoin, Melissa Moldovan, Kim Dvorak, Jasmine Powell, Kayleigh Daniels, Charlotte Adams, Taylor Drake, Tiffany Barnes, Julie Pearce, and Lauren Cray, played her best, and Head Coach John Maddalena deserves much of the credit for the Hornets' success, now therefore be it

Whereas, Alan Overton was one of the University of Vermont's most illustrious alumni, a leading citizen in the town of Essex, and a much-respected lawyer who practiced his profession for nearly 50 years, and

Whereas, as a UVM student, he demonstrated the initiative and leadership that would carry forward into his future alumni roles, including serving as vice president of his graduating class of 1959, president of the Newman Society and the Phi Delta Theta fraternity, and vice president of the Boulder Society, and he even found time to play on the varsity football team, and

Whereas, Alan Overton graduated from the University of Michigan Law School and served in the United States Air Force Judge Advocate Corps before returning to Vermont and eventually settling in Essex Junction, and

Whereas, in the town of Essex, he was a founder of the Essex Rotary and was named a Paul Harris Award recipient, served on the Brownell Library Board of Trustees and the Holy Family Parish Council, was active in coaching Little League and Babe Ruth baseball, and was a founder of the Essex Flag Football program, and

Whereas, in over a half century as a proud UVM alumnus, Alan Overton held important positions in the university community including founding and cochairing the Catamount Club, acting as cotrustee of the Phi Delta Theta Alumni Association for over 30 years, serving as president of the alumni association, serving on the university board of trustees, and serving as national chair of the UVM development fund, and

Whereas, with respect to the university's medical organizations, Alan Overton sat on the boards of the University Health Center, the Fanny Allen Hospital, and the Medical Center Hospital of Vermont, and

Whereas, in recognition of his multifaceted and numerous contributions to the governance and prosperity of UVM, he was presented the Distinguished Alumni Award, and Whereas, on February 22, 2012 Alan Overton died, leaving a legacy of accomplishment in the town of Essex and at UVM, and his survivors include his wife of 52 years, Ann, who he met during his first week at UVM, his children Alan, Daniel, and Jennifer, five grandchildren, and brothers Mark and Edward, now therefore be it

Whereas, the current and projected impact from climate change on the state of Vermont's citizens and communities from severe weather, rising temperatures, and shifting ecosystems poses a serious risk to Vermont's economic viability, natural resources, public and private infrastructure, and public health and safety, and

Whereas, the state of Vermont has set important greenhouse gas reduction goals codified at 10 V.S.A. § 578 for avoiding the worst consequences of climate change and helping the state reduce its dependence on nonrenewable energy supplies, including: reducing the state's greenhouse gas emissions by 25 percent by 2012, 50 percent by 2028; and 75 percent by 2050; substantially improving the thermal efficiency in 25 percent of the state's older housing stock by 2020; and meeting, over time, a progressively larger portion of our state's electricity needs from in-state renewable supplies, and

Whereas, Vermont energy independence reflects a goal of clean, safe, and dependable energy made by and for the citizens of Vermont, and

Whereas, greater energy independence is achievable through both improved energy efficiency and the substitution of renewable for nonrenewable energy resources, and

Whereas, strategies for energy independence will benefit Vermont's economy, communities, and the environment by reducing reliance on diminishing fossil fuels, increasing local capacity for energy self-reliance, and reducing our emissions of greenhouse gases and other air pollutants, and

Whereas, there is a growing grassroots consensus, reflected in the formation of over 100 community energy committees, that Vermont must take real and meaningful action to address both the peak oil and climate crises, and move Vermonters toward more affordable, efficient, and renewable energy strategies, and

Whereas, Vermont has been a leader on renewable energy issues such as enacting the nation's first-ever statewide standard offer program to encourage the development of more community-scale renewable energy generation, and

Whereas, the urgency of the climate and energy challenges will be a critical issue before all Vermonters for many years to come, and many citizens concerned about energy challenges will be gathering at the State House and around the state on March 21, now therefore be it

<u>Whereas</u>, for over four decades, Alice Hafner was an important participant in the implementation of probation and parole services in Vermont, and

Whereas, in 1970, she began her career as a probation officer, a position she effectively continued for nine years and, as such, gained firsthand experience for her future oversight roles, and

Whereas, in 1979, Alice Hafner was promoted to an assistant district manager's position, supervising other parole officers based in Barre, and

Whereas, she performed her duties in Barre most satisfactorily, and in 1982 was designated district manager of Northeast Probation and Parole in St. Johnsbury, and

Whereas, after a successful directorship, in 1987, she retired, supposedly, from working on probation and parole matters, and the New England Conference on Crime and Delinquency awarded Alice Hafner the John R. Manson–Carl Robinson Award in recognition of her outstanding contribution to the field of criminal justice, and

Whereas, her departure from criminal justice oversight proved temporary as in September 1988, Governor Kunin appointed Alice Hafner to the parole board which decides questions of parole from throughout the state, and

Whereas, in 1991, Governor Snelling appointed Alice Hafner as chair of the board, and she wisely presided over this panel for the next two years, and

Whereas, in 1994, the Middle Atlantic States Correctional Association Conference presented Alice Hafner a Vermont Achievement Award in recognition of her contributions to the field of corrections in the state of Vermont and particularly as a role model for Department of Corrections staff, and

Whereas, Vermont governors continued to reappoint Alice Hafner to an alternate's position on the parole board, and, in 2012, she is truly concluding her remarkable board service, now therefore be it

Whereas, promoting the academic success of students who come from families with minimal economic resources and who aspire to be the first member of their family to attend college is the laudable goal of the federal TRIO programs, and, in Vermont, these important academic preparatory programs serve students at seven colleges and through the Vermont Student Assistance Corporation, and

Whereas, Upward Bound, the original federally financed college incentive program for disadvantaged students, was established in 1965 under the auspices of the federal Office of Economic Opportunity, and, in coordination with the later-established Upward Bound Math Science, helps secondary school students from financially disadvantaged families prepare for college, and

Whereas, the Talent Search Program, initially authorized in the Higher Education Act of 1965, assists students early in the college admissions and financial aid process, and

Whereas, the federal Education Amendments of 1968 reauthorized these two original programs, established Special Services for Disadvantaged Students, and united all three under the umbrella of the federal Office (now Department) of Education, and

Whereas, this threesome of special programs for students from low-income backgrounds became known informally as TRIO, and

<u>Whereas</u>, over the ensuing decades, additional programs such as Veterans Upward Bound, Student Support Services, Educational Opportunity Centers, and the Ronald E. McNair Post-Baccalaureate Achievement Program have all been added to the TRIO mix, and

Whereas, in 1992, Congress renamed and combined all of the programs as the federal TRIO programs, and

Whereas, the federal TRIO programs continue to be a gateway for financially disadvantaged students to attend college, and

Whereas, students and administrators representing the federal TRIO programs in Vermont are visiting the state house today, Thursday, March 22, 2012, now therefore be it

Whereas, shortline railroads serve a vital economic role hauling freight in the most efficient and cost-effective manner over distances that larger haulers would not favor, and

Whereas, Railway Age, the transportation industry's oldest trade publication, annually awards the special honor of Shortline of the Year to one deserving railroad with a limited track system, and

Whereas, after much consideration, the staff of *Railway Age* selected Vermont Railway (VTR) as the 2012 Shortline of the Year, and

Whereas, the company's founder, Jay Wulfson, established this first-in-the nation public-private rail partnership in 1964, and before the end of its first day of operation, VTR was ordering larger size locomotives to haul its increasing freight traffic, and

Whereas, in 1967, VTR began offering intermodal piggyback trailer-on-flatcar service for shipments into and out of Vermont, which proved popular, and

Whereas, over the years, VTR acquired other rail lines, including the Clarendon and Pittsford (1972), a portion of the D&H (1983), the Green Mountain Railroad (1997), and most recently the Washington County Railroad and the New York & Ogdensburg Railway, all now organized into the Vermont Rail System, a family-owned enterprise with 120 employees and over 230 miles of track supporting freight and passenger services, and

Whereas, in selecting the VTR for this special honor, *Railway Age* cited the weather of 2011, starting with the spring floods and then the historic damage left by Tropical Storm Irene, resulting in unprecedented rail bed washouts and other infrastructure damage, and

Whereas, VTR arranged detours and transloads for freight, largely restored the severely damaged rail infrastructure in three weeks, helped repair Route 107 by moving 130,000 tons of rock in 10 weeks, and with the agency of transportation implemented a project to enhance Amtrak's Ethan Allen service on the VTR right-of-way, and
