House concurrent resolution recognizing the efforts of Community Health Services of Lamoille Valley to create a seamless and more effective health care environment

Whereas, in 2011, the state of Vermont's Blueprint for Health continued to transform, improve, and better coordinate the delivery of health care services, and

Whereas, federally qualified health centers (FQHC) are ideally situated to provide seamless, effective, and preventive medical, behavioral, and oral health care as called for in the Blueprint, and

Whereas, Community Health Services of Lamoille Valley (CHSLV), an FQHC serving the Lamoille Valley, was awarded the Blueprint for Health grant for that area, and

Whereas, CHSLV assembled a community health care team to fulfill the mission of its Blueprint for Health grant, and this team of health care professionals included Elise McKenna, Blueprint director; Lorrie Dupuis, community health team manager; Lisa Whipple, Morrisville Family Health Care clinical supervisor; Mary Donati, Stowe Family Practice clinical supervisor; Jean Audet, Morrisville Family Health Care panel manager; and Corey Perpall and Courtney Berry, chronic care coordinators, and

Whereas, within a few short months, this community health care team prepared the Morrisville Family Health Care and the Stowe Family Practice for certification by the National Committee for Quality Assurance (NCQA), and

Whereas, this NCQA certification enabled the community health team to expand the Blueprint for Health services in the Lamoille Valley, and

Whereas, this community health care model reduces the health and economic impacts of the most common chronic conditions and focuses on their prevention, and

Whereas, the CHSLV community health care team has worked collaboratively with the Cambridge Regional Health Center, other private Lamoille Valley primary care physicians, neighboring community health centers, and Copley Hospital to prepare these practitioners for NCQA certification in order to better utilize Copley's emergency department and to create a more seamless health care delivery system, now therefore be it

Whereas, he became civically engaged in his hometown, assuming an active role in the community, and

Whereas, Donald Prouty managed the local transfer station, where his knowledge of military order and process was a useful resource, and

Whereas, for a number of years, Donald Prouty served as a respected member of the Pownal selectboard, and he played a constructive role in contributing to the determination of town governance matters, and

Whereas, his service as clerk of the works for the town of Pownal's implementation of a major new wastewater project was critical in completing this important municipal endeavor, and

Whereas, he was a champion and friend of the hard-working and less fortunate members of the community and a man of great personal integrity, and

<u>Whereas</u>, aside from his official municipal duties, Donald Prouty enjoyed camping, restoring cars, and spending a quiet evening with his family watching the sunset, and

Whereas, on September 6, 2011, Donald Prouty died at the far too young age of 56, leaving his wife, Jean, to whom he was married for nearly 36 years, three children, Shaun, Kristy, and Nicole, three grandchildren, Kylie, Colin, and Joseph, and a sister, Cheryl, and

Whereas, the death of Donald Prouty marked the passing of a well-known community leader in the town of Pownal, now therefore be it

Whereas, Susan Howard was one of two identical twins born in Burlington on August 18, 1908, and she graduated from the University of Vermont and earned a graduate degree in classics from Radcliffe College, and

Whereas, in 1933, she married Kenneth Beals Webb who was her life and professional partner until his death in 1984, and

Whereas, combining her experience as a teacher, along with the belief she held with her husband in the Quaker educational system and the importance of teaching values such as "simplicity, equality, tolerance and peace, and seeing that of God in every person," in 1939, they established the Farm & Wilderness Camps in Plymouth, Vermont, and

Whereas, the camps, including Camp Indian Brook which she directed from 1941–1972, taught the values the Webbs so fervently believed in, and her work in experiential education resulted in their writing magazine articles and books, including *Summer Magic* and *Beyond our Wildest Dreams*, and

Whereas, upon retiring from her camp leadership role, Susan Webb was elected to represent her Plymouth area neighbors in the house of representatives, and

Whereas, during her four terms in the house (1973–1980), her colleagues recognized the member from Plymouth's leadership experience and skills as she was appointed to chair both the committees on education and on health and welfare, and

Whereas, the esteem and respect that Susan Webb had in Vermont and New England resulted in her serving on the boards of many organizations, including the Baird Children's Center, Vermont Churchwomen United, Adelphi/Vermont, and the Vermont Council on Social Concerns, and

Whereas, Susan Webb was a member of the Executive Committee of the New England Regional Office of the American Friends Service Committee and the Vermont State Committee of the U.S. Civil Rights Commission, and

<u>Whereas</u>, she was honored to serve as president of the board of the Calvin Coolidge Memorial Foundation in Plymouth, and

Whereas, her long life of service as an educator, public servant, and civic and religious leader concluded with her death on September 9, 2011 at age 103, and her survivors include her daughters, Susan (Sukie) and Martha (Miki), her son, Robert (Rob), eight grandchildren, and seven great-grandchildren who miss her presence in their lives, now therefore be it

<u>Whereas</u>, osteoporosis, the thinning and weakening of the bone with age, is a major public health threat to thousands of Vermonters, and

Whereas, the major consequence of osteoporosis is fractures, most often of the hip, vertebrae, and wrist, which lead to chronic pain, disfigurement, and increased overall mortality, and

Whereas, hip fractures are the most serious and costly of fractures, and

Whereas, the National Osteoporosis Foundation estimates that by the year 2025, osteoporosis fractures will result in a net cost of \$25 billion, and

Whereas, it also estimates that 10 million Americans experience this condition and that 34 million have low bone mass, and

Whereas, although osteoporosis is often associated primarily with women, 20 percent of those afflicted are men, and

Whereas, 24 percent of hip fracture patients age 50 and older die in the year following the fracture, and

Whereas, osteoporosis is a silent disease, as it often goes unrecognized for years, until one or more fractures have occurred, and is not an inevitable part of aging, and

Whereas, while everyone loses bone with age, bone mass can be maximized and bone loss can be minimized so that osteoporosis does not occur, and

Whereas, the battle against osteoporosis is being fought through the work of RSVP's Bone Builders, which in local projects across the country has engaged older Americans in exercise programs intended to address the problems associated with osteoporosis, and physicians and other health care professionals refer patients to the program in recognition that its weight-training exercises help prevent and reverse osteoporosis, and

Whereas, the RSVP Bone Builders in Rutland is raising awareness of osteoporosis through its participation in National Osteoporosis Month which occurs in May, and

Whereas, these special awareness activities are intended to reach the 15,000 women in Vermont who could benefit from learning about osteoporosis and will include workshops and printed and broadcast publicity about osteoporosis, and

<u>Whereas</u>, the General Assembly seeks to encourage greater awareness of osteoporosis and ways of lessening the likelihood of its occurrence, now therefore be it

That the General Assembly designates May 2012 as Osteoporosis Awareness Month in Vermont, and be it further

Whereas, the federal Retired Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP) was the outgrowth of various local programs aimed at promoting "engagement, activity, acquaintanceship, and growth for older Americans" and was formally established in 1969 as part of the Older Americans Act, and

<u>Whereas</u>, the mission of RSVP is "to reinvest the talents and skills of a lifetime into our communities through volunteer service," and

Whereas, on September 21, 1993, the Corporation for National and Community Service was established in Public Law 101-610, and within its organizational structure Congress included the new National Senior Service Corps (also referred to as Senior Corps), which comprises RSVP as well as the Foster Grandparent and Senior Companion Programs, and

<u>Whereas</u>, RSVP in Bennington County began in 1972 on Pleasant Street in the town of Bennington in a joint office serving both Bennington and Rutland Counties, and

Whereas, this talent reinvestment mission was met through the recruitment of individuals aged 60 (now aged 55) and older to give back to their communities by working voluntarily in meaningful capacities, and

Whereas, RSVP in Bennington soon became a single county office, and

Whereas, in 2006, when the American Red Cross was sponsoring RSVP in Bennington, the Windsor and Windham counterparts were on the verge of closing, and the three offices were merged under American Red Cross sponsorship to form the new Green Mountain RSVP & Volunteer Center, which has continued to provide RSVP services in all three jurisdictions, and

Whereas, RSVP's most popular initiative is Bone Builders, a free exercise program taught by trained volunteers in 12 classes throughout the county that helps over 200 Bennington County residents fight the effects of osteoporosis, and

Whereas, Green Mountain RSVP volunteers, who number close to 1,000 including nearly 350 in Bennington County, assist "children learning to read, hospital patients, museum goers, elders living alone, veterans, children in the court systems, state park visitors, cancer patients, animal shelter pets," and volunteer in many other situations, now therefore be it

House concurrent resolution congratulating the H.W. Putnam Hose Company # 3 of the Bennington Fire Department on its 125th anniversary

Whereas, on June 20, 1887, the H.W. Putnam Hose Company #3 was established on River Street near North Street in Bennington in order to douse the flames of locally occurring fires, and

Whereas, the original hose was brought to fires in a hand-drawn hose cart as motorized transportation for this purpose was not yet available, and

Whereas, after 16 years of community service, on April 21, 1903, the Putnam Hose House was destroyed in a terrible fire that engulfed both the building and all of the company's furnishings and equipment, and

Whereas, the fire was so severe that the wires serving the village fire alarm system were burned, and with the system inoperative, the request for assistance to combat the fire had to be transmitted to other towns by messenger, and

Whereas, after the ashes were cleared, Henry W. Putnam built a far better two-story brick firehouse which the village rented until purchasing the structure in 1936 for \$3,600.00, and

Whereas, as the years progressed, the firefighting fleet improved, and in 1917, a motorized hose and chemical truck was acquired, and then in 1924, a new American LaFrance fire pumper found a home in the Putnam firehouse, and *Hemmings Motor News* now owns this vintage firefighting truck which still appears in parades and community events, and

Whereas, the fleet's progression to more modern equipment continued with the purchase of a Buffalo 750-gallon per-minute pumper in 1946, and this pumper served the community well until 1966 when the company purchased a 1,000-gallon per-minute pumper, and

Whereas, a 1983 Mack/Ranger brought the fleet further up to date, and this acquisition was outscored by a 1993 International KME pumper tank which has a 1,250-gallon per-minute water flow, and

Whereas, the newest firefighting equipment in the company's inventory is a 2004 International Smeal, and

Whereas, although the buildings and equipment have evolved over the decades, this venerable firefighting company remains a vigorous and vital

element of firefighting in Bennington as it proudly celebrates its 125th anniversary, now therefore be it

Whereas, Alzheimer's is a disease that deprives individuals of their life's memories, and medical scientists continue to conduct research in hope of discovering preventative measures and a cure for those already afflicted, and

Whereas, one of the leading experts in this country on aging-related memory loss is Dr. William Pendlebury, a cofounder in 1991 of The Memory Center at Fletcher Allen Health Care, and

Whereas, the original staff at the center included Janis Peyser, PhD, Dr. Antonio Gomez, Dr. Paul Newhouse, Dr. William Tisdale, Dr. Richard Tonino, and Nancy Resi, R.N., and

Whereas, the Memory Center with its current staff of one physician, two neuropsychologists, two nurse practitioners, one social worker, one psychometrist, and an office manager offers comprehensive care, including initial diagnosis of Alzheimer's or other memory-related illness, longitudinal care with treatment plans, patient monitoring, and patient participation in research studies that may lead to new drug therapies, and

Whereas, Dr. William Pendlebury jokingly refers to his own age as past the 22nd anniversary of his 39th birthday in deference to the fact that age-related memory loss begins at 40, and

Whereas, he graduated from Brown University, earned his medical degree at the University of Vermont (UVM), interned and served in the public health service in Colorado, and then returned to UVM where he completed a residency in neurology and a fellowship in neuropathology, and

Whereas, Dr. William Pendlebury joined the UVM faculty in 1984, was granted tenure in 1990, and was named full professor in 1995, and

Whereas, aside from his work at The Memory Center, Dr. William Pendlebury serves as director of the UVM Center on Aging and as medical director of elder care services at Fletcher Allen Health Care, and

Whereas, Dr. William Pendlebury is one of the nation's most respected authorities on aging and memory loss, and he regularly serves as an external reviewer of academic work in his field and as an ad hoc consultant for the National Institute on Aging, now therefore be it

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives:

That the General Assembly honors Dr. William Pendlebury, cofounder of The Memory Center at Fletcher Allen Health Care, for his pioneering work to advance the understanding and treatment of Alzheimer's and other aging-related memory loss diseases, and be it further

Whereas, Rev. Eddy was instrumental in the creation of the Randolph Emergency Ecumenical Committee on Housing and the Randolph Food Shelf, which Bethany Church housed until 2010, and

Whereas, she encouraged her congregation to debate and adopt an open and affirming policy, ensuring that people of all ages, incomes, sexual orientations, races, and religious backgrounds are welcome at the church, and

Whereas, Rev. Kathy Eddy's sabbatical trip to serve in Ecuador led to the creation of a sister community relationship with San Cristobal, Ecuador, and

Whereas, the Bethany community which Rev. Eddy has shepherded has nurtured no fewer than ten individuals who have entered full-time ministries, and

Whereas, Rev. Eddy has actively encouraged the individual spiritual development of church members, and her leadership inspired Bethany members to hire a full-time youth pastor whose programs now attract well over 50 individuals, many of whom are not church members, and

Whereas, she has encouraged church members to recognize their individual potential to serve and has empowered people to travel to Ukraine, Ecuador, and Kenya, and to strengthen the fibers within the greater Randolph community, and

Whereas, Rev. Kathy Eddy has helped many to realize that our differences make us richer, and after 36 years of outstanding spiritual and civic leadership in Randolph, the Rev. Kathy Eddy is retiring, now therefore be it

Whereas, during much of the first three decades of its operation, the Pepin Granite Company specialized in the manufacturing of slant markers produced in large quantities, and

Whereas, in 1982, Raymond's son, Scott, entered the business, and father and son started to broaden the company's product line to include large monuments and markers offered in Barre Gray and other colors, and

Whereas, in time, Scott's brother, John, joined the family business, and

Whereas, most recently, Scott's son, Tyler, has joined his father, uncle, and grandfather, continuing a three-generation family tradition in Barre City, and

Whereas, each Pepin family member who has joined the company begins his work life at the company by learning the business from the ground up; a way to appreciate all that is required to create a defect-free granite monument, and

Whereas, the company has followed a successful blueprint of steady growth, and

<u>Whereas</u>, the Pepin Granite Company is a small firm with modern machinery manufacturing industry-standard dies, bases, slants, bevels, and grass markers as well as custom-designed memorials, and

<u>Whereas</u>, requested monument designs include single, double, and offset hearts, Latin and Celtic crosses, and benches, and

<u>Whereas</u>, the Pepin Granite Company is a member of the Barre Granite Association and the American Monument Association, now therefore be it

Whereas, the Vermont Energy Investment Corporation (VEIC) was founded in 1986 by Beth Sachs and Blair Hamilton to promote and encourage the

conservation of natural resources, and to reduce energy costs for consumers, especially low income consumers, and

Whereas, VEIC has been actively involved in helping design energy efficiency programs in the United States and worldwide, and

Whereas, several Vermont energy businesses and organizations, including the Energy Co-Op of Vermont, Renewable Energy Vermont, and the Vermont Energy Education Program, were established under the aegis of VEIC, and

Whereas, in the year 2000, VEIC competed successfully for the right to establish and operate Efficiency Vermont, the first statewide energy efficiency utility in the nation, and

Whereas, under VEIC's leadership, Efficiency Vermont has become the most effective program of its kind nationally and has won awards for its innovative work, and

Whereas, in 2007, VEIC established a 20-year goal of offsetting twice the amount of greenhouse gases projected to be emitted in Vermont in the year 2027, and

Whereas, this offsetting process is to occur through VEIC's investing in energy projects promoting efficiency and relying on renewable resources, and

Whereas, by 2010, VEIC's work at Efficiency Vermont had helped reduce carbon emissions by 5.1 tons, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in 2011, VEIC commenced operation of two large-scale energy efficiency programs based on the successful Efficiency Vermont model: Efficiency Smart, based in the Midwest, and the Sustainable Energy Utility, based in Washington, D.C., and

Whereas, recognizing the increasing association between energy and transportation policy, VEIC established a transportation efficiency division, and

<u>Whereas</u>, VEIC was recognized as one of the "2011 Best Places to Work in Vermont," as well as one of Vermont's ten fastest-growing companies and now employs over 250 people in green jobs throughout Vermont and in New Jersey, Ohio, and Washington, D.C., now therefore be it

Whereas, during his tenure as executive director of the Associated General Contractors of Vermont, Bill Keogh was a member of a carpool of close friends whose members still head off to the races at Saratoga on Bennington Battle Day, and

Whereas, for eight years, he represented the city of Burlington in the house of representatives, serving on the health and welfare and health care committees, and he was proud of his work on the medical marijuana law, and

Whereas, he considered his chairing of the motor vehicle arbitration (lemon law) board to be of great importance, and

Whereas, for 16 years, Bill Keogh has been a member of the Burlington City Council and has served as president since 2009, and

Whereas, as chair of the council's license committee, Bill Keogh took a strict position on adherence to the city's alcohol sales ordinances, and

Whereas, Bill Keogh was not above fighting community traditions, such as when he convinced the council to declare the fourth Saturday in October as Halloween, although the mayor vetoed the change, and

Whereas, perhaps most importantly, Bill Keogh used his council presidency to implement new parliamentary procedures to bring greater deliberative efficiency, and

Whereas, on April 2, 2012, Bill Keogh retired from the Burlington City Council and its presidency, and this father of five and grandfather of ten deserves to be proud of the civic contributions he has made to his hometown, now therefore be it

Whereas, the Wild Branch Wildlife Management Area occupies the southeastern slope of the range, and,

<u>Whereas</u>, the headwaters of the Lamoille and Mississquoi rivers both flow from the ridgeline of these mountains, and

Whereas, for decades, adventurous backcountry skiers have been attracted to these rugged slopes, and

Whereas, residents of Craftsbury, Albany, and Glover are privileged to enjoy grand views of the magnificent Lowell Mountain Range, and

Whereas, local educational institutions have used the Lowell Mountain Range as an outdoor classroom, and

Whereas, the majestic glory of the Lowell Mountain Range is a Vermont treasure, now therefore be it
