House resolution declaring the inalienable right of all Vermonters to save and grow seeds;

Reported in favor of its passage when amended by striking all after the title and inserting in lieu thereof the following: <u>Whereas</u>, the Vermont Constitution declares that all persons are born equally free and independent, and have certain natural, inherent, and unalienable rights, amongst which are the enjoying and defending of life and liberty, and acquiring, possessing, and protecting property, and

<u>Whereas</u>, the Vermont Constitution declares that the foregoing rights ought not to be violated on any pretence whatsoever, and

<u>Whereas</u>, the basis of human sustenance rests on the Constitutional right of every person to acquire, possess, save, grow, and protect seeds, and

<u>Whereas</u>, the Vermont House of Representatives, the people's house, has an obligation to protect and advance these rights, and

<u>Whereas</u>, the state of Vermont has a proud agricultural heritage of its citizens' acquiring, possessing, growing, saving, and protecting seeds essential for their food security, and

<u>Whereas</u>, protection and advancement of these rights are essential to the liberties and independence of our citizens and the welfare and integrity of our nation, state, and society, now therefore be it

Resolved by the House of Representatives:

That this legislative body declares seed acquiring, possessing, saving, growing, and protecting are the inherent and inalienable rights of each Vermonter, and that these rights shall not be violated on any pretense whatsoever.

Rep. Consejo of Sheldon explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

Today we made history and we made it all together. This is a true measure of the quality of members of this body, and a road map for the rest of the country on how this can be done."

Rep. Devereux of Mount Holly explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

My yes vote reflects the hard work of our committee. I hope many of you will understand why I am not completely happy with the final result. I am also losing the birthplace of Calvin Coolidge."

Rep. Ellis of Waterbury explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

Waterbury and Duxbury share a school district, water services, sewer services and fire services. The chair of the Waterbury Development Review Board lives in Duxbury, and the Executive Director of Revitalizing Waterbury lives in Duxbury. Waterbury is the social and commercial hub of Duxbury, and together the two communities responded to tropical storm Irene. Our social and political ties are strong. There is a simple fix. Waterbury and Duxbury should therefore remain together in the same legislative district." Rep. French of Shrewsbury explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

Voting on this plan created a dilemma for me. By voting yes, am I telling my hometown and my many friends in Wallingford and Tinmouth that I'm in favor of a change that Shrewsbury doesn't necessarily like and that I'm okay with leaving my other towns. On the other hand, by voting no, am I sending a message to my possible new towns of Mt. Holly and Ludlow that I'm not happy about the prospect of serving them. My yes vote reflects the reality that it isn't about me. It's about the citizens of Vermont getting the opportunity for fair and equal; representation. The system works, and the manner in which it was conducted should make Vermonter's proud."

Rep. Martin of Wolcott explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I am voting for this bill to support the good work of the committee, even though I am disappointed that the town of Eden could not remain in Lamoille County. The numbers were just too high. We needed to avoid litigation against equal representation."

Rep. Olsen of Jamaica explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

This is a puzzle for which there is no perfect solution."

Rep. Stevens of Waterbury explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

This process presented the committee, at times, a series of Hobson's choices – difficult choices no one wanted to make. I voted no because to lose Duxbury from our district at this time is painful. I am from Waterbury, but I am also from Duxbury, from Huntington, from Buels Gore. Having a perfectly sized district did not protect us from the growth around us and the need to legally accommodate that change.

I respect the work of the committee and appreciate that they heard the concerns of my district. I simply cannot support the difficult choice at this time."

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

We appreciate the effort of the majority leadership to work with us to obtain a reasonable resolution to the redistricting puzzle that, although not perfect, meets many of the objectives our caucus set forth prior to the beginning of this

process. This plan was developed for the most part in an nonpartisan manner, keeps towns whole, is fair and provides most Vermonters an opportunity for fair representation in the Vermont House of Representatives for the next decade."

At three o'clock and fifteen minutes in the afternoon, on motion of **Rep. Turner of Milton**, the House adjourned until tomorrow at nine o'clock and thirty minutes in the forenoon.
