15	Statement of purpose of bill as introduced: This bill proposes to increase the
16	smoking age from 18 to 21 years except for members of the U.S. Armed
17	Forces.

An act relating to increasing the smoking age from 18 to 21 years

It is hereby enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Vermont:

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1	Sec. 1. FINDINGS
2	(a) Every day more than 1,200 persons in the United States die due to
3	smoking. And every day at least two youths or young adults become regular
4	smokers.
5	(b) The younger an individual is when he or she begins using tobacco, the
6	more likely he or she will become addicted. Among youths who persist in
7	smoking, one-third will die prematurely due to smoking.
8	(c) Compared with adults, adolescents appear to display evidence of
9	addiction at much lower levels of cigarette consumption, and their attempts to
10	quit smoking thus may be less successful.
11	(d) Persons 18 through 20 years of age are responsible for 90 percent of the
12	cigarettes purchased on behalf of minors less than 18 years of age. If their
13	legal access is curtailed, the benefit will extend to much younger teens.
14	(e) Prevention efforts must focus on young adults 18 through 25 years of
15	age. Almost no one starts smoking after 25 years of age. Nearly nine out of
16	10 smokers began smoking by 18 years of age, and 99 percent started by
17	26 years of age. Progression from occasional to daily smoking almost always
18	occurs by 26 years of age.
19	(f) Of all young adults 18 to 25 years of age in Vermont who had never
20	smoked, 12.1 percent smoked a cigarette for the first time in 2008-2009.

1	Vermont ranked 49th in the nation, with a range of 4.2 percent to 14.7 percent
2	among the states.

or tobacco paraphernalia to the person. The sale or furnishing of tobacco

possesses tobacco products, tobacco substitutes, or tobacco paraphernalia in
violation of this subsection shall be subject to having the tobacco products,

shall be further subject to a civil penalty of \$25.00. In the case of failure to
pay a penalty, the Judicial Bureau shall mail a notice to the person at the
address in the complaint notifying the person that failure to pay the penalty
within 60 days of the notice will result in either the suspension of the person's
operator's license for a period of not more than 90 days or the delay of the
initial licensing of the person for a period of not more than one year. A copy
of the notice shall be sent to the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles, who, after
expiration of 60 days from the date of notice and unless notified by the Judicial
Bureau that the penalty has been paid shall either suspend the person's
operator's license or cause initial licensing of the person to be delayed for the
periods set forth in this subsection and the rules. An action under this
subsection shall be brought in the same manner as a traffic violation pursuant
to 23 V.S.A. chapter 24. The Commissioner of Motor Vehicles shall adopt
rules in accordance with the provisions of 3 V.S.A. chapter 25 to implement
