14 15	An act relating to approval of amendments to the charter of the City of Burlington regarding the redistricting of City election areas
16	It is hereby enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Vermont:
17	Sec. 1. CHARTER AMENDMENT APPROVAL
18	The General Assembly approves the amendments to the charter of the City
19	of Burlington as set forth in this act. Proposals of amendment were approved
20	by the voters on March 4, 2014.

1	Sec. 2. 24 App. V.S.A. chapter 3 is amended to read:
2	CHAPTER 3. CITY OF BURLINGTON
3	Subchapter 1. Incorporation; City and Ward Boundaries

5	Article 2. Wards and Boundaries City Election Areas Defined
6	§ 2. WARDS DESCRIBED ELECTION BOUNDARIES
7	The City of Burlington is hereby divided into seven wards constituted as
8	follows:
9	Ward One
10	Ward One shall include all that part of said City lying easterly and northerly
11	of the following described line:
12	Beginning at the centerline of the Winooski River under the Central
13	Vermont Railway bridge below the Winooski Lower Falls; thence westerly in

3	(approximately -73.2139 longitude, 44.5077 latitude); thence southerly along
4	the common boundary between the City of Burlington and Town of Colchester
5	in the Winooski River to a point beneath the Central Vermont Railway bridge
6	downstream of the Lower Winooski Falls and Salmon Hole; thence southerly
7	along the East District eastern boundary to its intersection with the centerline

7	City south of the southern boundaries of the East and Central Districts.
8	(4) North District. The North District shall include all that part of the
9	City north of the northern boundary of the Central District.
10	(b) Wards Described. Each of the City of Burlington's four electoral
11	districts set forth in subsection (a) of this section hereby comprises two wards,
12	each of which is constituted as follows:
13	(1) East District - Ward 1 and Ward 8.
14	(A) The East District is divided into two wards by the following
15	boundary: Beginning at the center of the intersection of Pearl Street and South
16	Willard Street; thence southerly along the centerline of South Willard Street to
17	the intersection of the centerline of College Street; thence easterly along the
18	centerline of College Street extended to the intersection of the centerline of
19	University Place; thence southerly along the centerline of University Place to

16	§ 3. ELECTION OF MAYOR AND CITY COUNCILORS
17	(a) Election of Mayor. On the first Tuesday in March 2003, and triennially
18	thereafter, the legal voters of the City shall, from among the legal voters
19	thereof, elect a Mayor. Notwithstanding any provision of this Charter charter
20	or the general statutes, no person shall be eligible to have his or her name

printed on the ballot as a candidate for the Office of Mayor who has not

submitted a nominating petition signed by at least 150 registered voters of the
City within the time limits specified in 17 V.S.A. chapter 55, as the same may
be amended from time to time. On the first Tuesday in March 1994, and
biennially thereafter, the legal voters of Wards One, Two, Three, Five, and Six
shall, from among the legal voters thereof, elect one City councilor and all

(1) On the first Tuesday in March 2015 and biennially thereafter, the
legal voters of each of the South, Central, East, and North City Districts shall,
from among the legal voters of their respective district, elect a City councilor
for a two-year term.
(2)(A) On the first Tuesday in March 2015, the legal voters from each of
Wards One, Two, Three, Four, Five, Six, Seven, and Eight shall, from among

10	held on the first Tuesday in March in the year in which the term of office of the
11	school commissioner therein shall expire.

14	§ 7. AGE AND RESIDENCE REQUIREMENTS
15	Every male or female citizen of this State not less than 18 years of age who
16	has taken the Freeman's (Voters Voter's) Oath, who resides in said City and
17	who has registered to vote with the Board for Registration of Voters no later
18	than the deadline established by Vermont law prior to any warned City or ward
19	or City district election or any annual or special City meeting shall be a legal
20	voter at said election or meeting, and no other person shall be allowed to vote

1	§ 8. PERSON TO VOTE IN WARD <u>OR CITY DISTRICT</u> IN WHICH THE
2	PERSON RESIDES; RESIDENCE REQUIREMENT

17	§ 14. LIST OF VOTERS TO BE PREPARED; POSTING
18	Preceding each annual or special City or ward or City district election to be
19	held in said City, it shall be the duty of the Board for Registration of Voters to
20	prepare full and complete lists of the voters in the respective wards or City

districts of said City, and to certify the same to the Chief Administrative
