12	attitudes, and cultivating a culture of respect toward persons with disabilities,
13	the General Assembly seeks to replace offensive statutory terms with language
14	that recognizes persons as opposed to their disabilities.
15	(b) Notwithstanding Secs. 7, 10a, 222, and 223, nothing in this act shall be
16	construed to alter the substance or effect of existing law or judicial precedent.
17	Changes in terminology made in this act are merely meant to reflect evolving
18	attitudes toward persons with disabilities.
