# H.C.R. 286.

House concurrent resolution in memory of former Senator and Chittenden County Assistant Judge Thomas M. Crowley of South Burlington

Offered by: Representatives Pugh of South Burlington, Head of South Burlington, Kupersmith of South Burlington, and Townsend of South Burlington

<u>Whereas</u>, Burlington native Tom Crowley was educated in the city's public schools and graduated from St. Michael's College, and

Whereas, he served in both the U.S. Army and the Vermont Air National Guard, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Tom Crowley's professional career was in the insurance industry, in which he assumed leadership roles and was president of the Crowley Insurance Agency, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in 1966, Tom Crowley was elected to the Vermont Senate, beginning nearly a quarter-century of dedicated legislative service, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Senator Tom Crowley was a respected member of the General Assembly who, for many years, chaired either the Committee on Highways and Traffic or its successor, the Committee on Transportation, and

Whereas, in 1990, he concluded his legislative career as Dean of the Senate, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Governor Howard Dean appointed Tom Crowley to be a Chittenden County Assistant Judge, and Judge Crowley served with distinction, and

<u>Whereas</u>, over the years, Tom Crowley's civic service included membership on a number of panels, including the Fanny Allen Hospital Development Foundation, Inc., the Burlington Police Commission, and most recently, the Vermont State Police Advisory Commission, and Whereas, his hobbies included boating on Lake Champlain and driving antique cars in local parades, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Tom Crowley took great pride in his hometown of South Burlington, where he had many friends and was active in the community, and

<u>Whereas</u>, after an active life of public service, Tom Crowley died in the presence of his family on August 17, 2013, and

<u>Whereas</u>, his survivors include his daughters, Erin, Stephanie, Lynn, Allison, and Colleen, their mother, Susan, eight grandchildren, two great-grandchildren, his brother, Gerritt, and many members of his extended family, now therefore be it

<u>Whereas</u>, according to the National Institute of Neurological Disorders and Stroke, "autism spectrum disorder (autism) is a range of complex neurodevelopment disorders, characterized by social impairments, communication difficulties, and restricted, repetitive, and stereotyped patterns of behavior," and

Whereas, each person with autism is a unique individual, and

<u>Whereas</u>, the prevalence of autism is increasing and is the fastest-growing serious developmental disability in the United States, and

<u>Whereas</u>, autism receives less than five percent of the research funding of many less prevalent childhood diseases, and specifically receives only 0.55 percent of all National Institutes of Health funding, and

<u>Whereas</u>, autism occurs in one in 88 children, and boys are nearly five times more likely to be diagnosed with autism, and

<u>Whereas</u>, siblings of children and adults with autism face unique lifelong challenges and pressures, and need understanding and support, and

<u>Whereas</u>, children and adults with autism care and feel deeply about others but may lack the ability to spontaneously express their feelings in a social context, and <u>Whereas</u>, caring educators in Vermont are working very hard to support children with autism in order to prepare them for more independent lives, and

<u>Whereas</u>, providing social, educational, environmental, and living supports enable people with autism to lead full and productive lives, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in coming years, opportunities in the fields of science, technology, engineering, and math may provide important career paths for some children with autism, and

<u>Whereas</u>, this positive news is tempered with the high unemployment rates of adults with autism, and

<u>Whereas</u>, current students with autism will become adults in the next decade, and will need homes, jobs, friends, and a future, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Vermonters need to recognize the skills and the potential contributions of students with autism by developing the accommodations that will support them as they move from school to work, now therefore be it

<u>Whereas</u>, the holder of a master's degree in mechanical engineer from Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, he drew on his engineering training to develop the moldering privy in collaboration with the Green Mountain Club, the Appalachian Trail Conservancy, the National Park Service, and the Department of Forests, Parks and Recreation, and <u>Whereas</u>, privies are an essential waste management tool on long distance hiking trails, and

<u>Whereas</u>, according to a manual that Dick Andrews coauthored, a moldering privy has the dual advantages of the environmental benefits of composting combined with "less maintenance expense and risk" than earlier privy systems, and

<u>Whereas</u>, the first moldering privy on the Long Trail-Appalachian Trail was established at Little Rock Pond in 1997, and its use has spread beyond Vermont, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Dick Andrews has applied his sharp research and editorial skills to his advocacy and drafting roles for the 1984 Vermont Wilderness Act, as Forest Watch's Southern Vermont Outreach Coordinator, and as the Green Mountain Club's *Long Trail News*' copy editor, and

<u>Whereas</u>, as a 35-year member of the Green Mountain Club, Dick Andrews' field service roles as a trail maintainer on Peru Peak and site adopter for the Griffith Lake tenting area are a model for other volunteers to emulate, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Dick Andrews serves on numerous Green Mountain Club committees, including its executive committee, and as the club's treasurer, helping to ensure the club's financial soundness, and has worked in important editorial roles on guidebooks, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in recognition of his superb work, in 2013 Dick Andrews was presented the Green Mountain Club's President's Award, now therefore be it
