§ 131. DEFINITIONS

For the purposes of this subchapter, "comprehensive health education" means a systematic and extensive elementary and secondary educational program designed to provide a variety of learning experiences based upon knowledge of the human organism as it functions within its environment. The term includes the study of:

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(10) Nutrition and the importance of physical activity; and

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§ 135. PROGRAM DEVELOPMENT

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(b) Any school district board or supervisory union board may establish a comprehensive health education community advisory council to assist the school board in developing and implementing comprehensive health education. The school board shall provide public notice to the community to allow all interested parties to apply for appointment. The school board shall endeavor to appoint members that represent various points of view within the community regarding comprehensive health education and that represent different sectors of the community, such as students, parents, educators, administrators, and
