2	Representative Donahue of Northfield moves that the bill be amended by
3	striking out all after the enacting clause and inserting in lieu thereof the

5	Sec. 1. FINDINGS
6	The General Assembly finds that:
7	(1) The value of a day's work should merit enough pay to live above the
8	poverty line, and investing to achieve such wages is superior to providing State
9	subsidy programs for those who do not.
10	(2) The Joint Fiscal Office estimates that the cost in wages to achieve a
11	minimum wage rate of \$10.10 in January 2015 is \$30,000,000.00, and that
12	there can be negative consequences if a minimum wage is substantially higher
13	than in surrounding states.
14	(3) Vermont currently has the third highest minimum wage in the
15	country, and the highest in New England, with a rate that is at least \$0.75
16	higher than all but one of the other New England states.
17	(4) In January 2015, Connecticut and New York will increase their
18	minimum wage rates to \$9.00 and \$8.75, respectively. In January 2016, New
19	York will raise its minimum wage to \$9.00.

1	(5) Vermont should remain in the forefront of working toward a
2	minimum wage above the poverty line that protects business sustainability, but
3	that continues at a significant margin ahead of other New England states.
4	Sec. 2. 21 V.S.A. § 384 is amended to read:
5	§ 384. EMPLOYMENT; WAGES
6	(a) An employer shall not employ an any employee at a rate of less than
7	\$7.25, and, beginning \$9.25. Beginning on January 1, 2016, an employer shall
8	not employ any employee at a rate of less than \$9.75. Beginning on January 1,
9	2007, 2017 and on each subsequent January 1, the minimum wage rate shall be
10	increased by five percent or the percentage increase of the Consumer Price
11	Index, CPI-U, U.S. city average, not seasonally adjusted, or successor index, as
12	calculated by the U.S. Department of Labor or successor agency for the
13	12 months preceding the previous September 1, whichever is smaller, but in no
14	event shall the minimum wage be decreased. <u>If the federal minimum wage</u>
15	adjusts to at least \$10.10 on or before January 1, 2017, then beginning on
16	January 1, 2017, the minimum wage rate shall adjust to \$10.50. If, on or
17	before January 1, 2017, the federal minimum wage rate adjusts to a rate less
18	than \$10.10, then beginning on January 1, 2017, the minimum wage rate shall
19	adjust to the federal minimum wage rate plus \$0.75, but shall not be a rate
20	greater than \$10.50 or \$9.75 plus the percentage increase of the Consumer
21	Price Index, CPI-U, U.S. city average, not seasonally adjusted, or successor

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index, as calculated by the U.S. Department of Labor or successor agency for the 12 months preceding the previous September 1, whichever is higher. The minimum wage shall be rounded off to the nearest \$0.01. An employer in the hotel, motel, tourist place, and restaurant industry shall not employ a service or tipped employee at a basic wage rate less than \$3.65 an hour, and beginning January 1, 2008, and on each January 1 thereafter, this basic tip wage rate shall be increased at the same percentage rate as the minimum wage rate one-half the minimum wage. For the purposes of As used in this subsection, "a service or tipped employee" means an employee of a hotel, motel, tourist place, or restaurant who customarily and regularly receives more than \$120.00 per month in tips for direct and personal customer service.
