Response Definitions

- 1. Warning: A verbal admonition given to the parolee advising him of the Boards concern that he has violated his parole. The warning shall contain an explanation to the parolee of why his conduct is a violation of parole and any clarifications and interpretations needed as to any of the conditions of supervision. The warning shall include, if appropriate, a statement as to the behavior that the Board expects from the parolee.
- 2. Reprimand: A written admonition given to the parolee advising him of the Boards concern that he has violated his parole. The reprimand shall contain an explanation to the parolee of why his conduct is a violation of parole and any clarifications and interpretations needed as to any of the conditions of supervision. The reprimand shall include, if appropriate, a statement as to the behavior that the Board expects from the parolee and a statement as to the period of time that this reprimand will remain effective..
- **3. Increased contacts:** This response shall include a change in the conditions of supervision applicable to the parolee to require more frequent contact between the parolee and his supervising officer. This response shall only be used after conferring with the supervising officer to determine the availability and advisability of this response. This response shall include a statement as to the duration of the increased contacts, assuming clear conduct.
- **4. Additional conditions:** This response shall include the imposition of additional conditions to the supervision of the parolee to specifically address the crininogenic needs of parolee relative to the violations committed. An example of such additional conditions would be increased attendance at substance abuse counseling (in patient or out patient), an evaluation for substance abuse problems, and increased attendance at self help groups, community service or a no contact order. This response shall only be used after conferring with the supervising officer to determine the availability and advisability of this response. This response shall include a statement as to the duration of the additional conditions and the Board's expectations concerning clear conduct and successful completion of the particular treatment mandated.
- **5. Revocation to DOC:** This response involves an order of revocation made pursuant to the applicable sections of Vermont statutes and VPB policy directing that the parolee be returned to the custody of the Vermont Department of Corrections.

Calendar Year 2014 Parole Board Statistics:

As part of the Parole Board's administrative functions, statistics are collected with respect to the hearings conducted by the board on a monthly basis. At monthly staff meetings the breakdown of the numbers are reviewed along with any unusual cases in order for the full board to weigh in and discuss outcomes. I thought it might be helpful to provide you with the 2013 summary of that information. The Parole Board staff consisting of Sue Blair - Director, Kristine Slattery - Office Manager, and Lisa Moody -Admin (Temp) have been able to catch up on the backlog of parole document processing, and the daily Parole Board activities since the hiring of Ms. Slattery earlier this year. Parole Board members continue to participate in training on various issues relating to parole consideration and are always willing to help out when the schedule requires additional hearing times. Later this month board members will be provided training on the new DOC risk assessment system, and later with an overview of the new treatment programs being implemented. I am pleased to report that the updated electronic parole summary report is now being used statewide, and has provided caseworkers with a report that is easier to prepare ahead of parole hearings, and includes the information needed for board members to review prior to the parole interview.
