MOVE Program

 Last year 573 students working with local schools, senior homes, nonprofits and other organizations provided over 1,500 volunteer hours in a total of 18 programs; four of our 18 programs are within the Winooski School System.

Saint Michael's College Fire and Rescue Squads

- A student-run Fire Protection and Emergency Medical Service, available 365/24/7, serving Winooski, Colchester, Hinesburg, Essex and surrounding communities.
- The fire unit receives 650-700 calls per year while the rescue unit receives 1,900-2,000 calls per year.
- o There is no cost to municipalities for the service.

The student government annually awards \$40,000 from the student fee to local community organizations. Recipients have included Spectrum Youth Services, Community on Temporary Shelter, Burlington Boys and Girls Club, the Visiting Nurse Association Family Room.

Saint Michael's provides administrative leadership for the Lake Champlain Research Consortium.

Each year college employees devote a day of service in May in off-campus work at nonprofits in the community, such as Camp Ta-Kum-Ta, Catamount Family Center, Rock Point School, and others.

SIT

Union Institute and University

Union Institute & University is a member of the Chamber of Commerce, which uses some of its membership funds for scholarship. Within the past two years, Union offered three Women in Union scholarships to residents of Windham County enrolled in our Brattleboro weekend option Bachelor of Arts program.

Union students have donated food to the local homeless shelter and we have donated our own leased space to non-profits for youth education and a variety of non-profit meetings and gatherings. Staff have participated in United Way activities, including clean-up efforts after Hurricane Irene.

VCFA

- The College Green functions as a quasi-public park for the city of Montpelier. It is a 3+ acre flat parcel of land maintained by the College.
- Sponsor art events throughout the year. Last year the total was over \$15,000 of cash contributions. Staff time would amount to an additional \$13k-15k.
- The College campus buildings play host to community organizations and events such as memorial services, blood drive, not for profit meetings, religious services and in kind space donations amounting to over \$5k.
- Over 70 days of facility use is given to this community. On average, the usage consists of 2500 sq feet.

- Space is provided to a community newspaper, without which it could not exist.
- Local and regional media use and broadcast from our campus at no cost.
