6	Statement of purpose of bill as introduced: This bill proposes to:
7	(1) eliminate the requirement for a municipality to conduct a traffic and
8	engineering investigation in order to establish a speed limit on a town highway
9	or portions thereof that abut residential property; and
10	(2) authorize municipalities to restrict and regulate cut-through traffic on
11	town highways.
12	An act relating to the authority of municipalities to regulate town highways
13	It is hereby enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Vermont:
14	Sec. 1. 23 V.S.A. § 1007 is amended to read:
15	§ 1007. LOCAL SPEED LIMITS
16	(a)(1) The legislative body of a municipality may establish, on the basis of
17	an engineering and traffic investigation, a speed limit on all or a part of any
18	city, town, or village highway (town highway) within its jurisdiction, which:
19	(A) is not more than 50 miles per hour; however, after considering
20	neighborhood character, abutting land use, bicycle and pedestrian use, and

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1	physical characteristics of the highways, the legislative body of a municipality
2	may vote to set the maximum speed limit, without an engineering and traffic
3	investigation, at not more than 50 miles per hour nor less than 35 miles per
4	hour, on all or a portion of unpaved town highways within its boundaries,
5	unless otherwise posted in accordance with the provisions of this
6	section; or; and
7	(B) is not less than 25 miles per hour.
8	(2) The legislative body shall establish speed limits under this
9	subsection on the basis of an engineering and traffic investigation, except that
10	such investigation is not required if:
11	(A) The speed limit applies to a town highway or a portion thereof
12	that abuts residential property. As used in this subdivision (a)(2)(A),
13	"residential property" means property zoned residential or property on which is
14	located a structure designed primarily to provide principal dwelling
15	accommodations.
16	(B) After considering neighborhood character, abutting land use,
17	bicycle and pedestrian use, and physical characteristics of the highways, the
18	legislative body votes to set the maximum speed limit at not more than
19	50 miles per hour nor less than 35 miles per hour on all or a portion of unpaved
20	town highways within its boundaries, unless otherwise posted. If the

legislative body of a municipality so votes to set the speed limit on all unpaved

1	town highways in its boundaries at no more than 50 miles per hour nor less
2	than 35 miles per hour as provided for in subdivision (a)(1) of this section,
3	signs shall be located at points of change from one speed limit to another.

8	(c)(1) As used in this subsection, "cut-through traffic" means vehicular
9	traffic passing through an area without an origin or destination within the area.
10	(2) The legislative body of a municipality may make special regulations
11	to restrict, prevent, or otherwise regulate cut-through traffic on town highways
12	within the municipality. The legislative body may authorize that barriers be
13	erected pursuant to such regulations.
14	(d) Municipal motor vehicle regulations shall not duplicate or contradict
15	any provision of this title.
