7	Statement of purpose of bill as introduced: This bill proposes to (1) require
8	specified State agencies that regulate professions or occupations to provide the
9	Office of Professional Regulation (Office) with a comprehensive report on the
10	resources necessary for that regulation; and (2) completely transfer from the
11	Agency of Education to the Office the licensure of professions already
12	regulated by the Office.
13	An act relating to the State's organization of professional regulation
14	It is hereby enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Vermont:
15	* * * Professional Regulation Report * * *
16	Sec. 1. FINDINGS AND PURPOSE
17	(a) Findings.
18	(1) The General Assembly finds that multiple State agencies regulate a
19	variety of professions and occupations. This includes the Office of
20	Professional Regulation, which is focused primarily on licensing

1	administration and enforcement and which regulates approximately 60,0000
2	licensees across 46 professions. It also includes other State agencies that have
3	other functions as their primary focus, with professional regulation as an
4	ancillary aspect of their duties.
5	(2) The General Assembly further finds that the State should review the
6	organization of professional regulation in the State to determine whether the
7	regulation of certain professions and occupations should be transferred to the
8	Office of Professional Regulation in order to allow State government to
9	operate in a more effective and efficient manner.
10	(b) Purpose. The purpose of Sec. 2 of this act is to provide the General
11	Assembly and the Office of Professional Regulation with comprehensive
12	information regarding the organizational structures of and the resources that
13	are necessary for other State agencies in regulating the professions and
14	occupations under their jurisdiction. This information will help the General
15	Assembly determine whether the regulation of certain professions and
16	occupations should be transferred to the Office.
17	Sec. 2. PROFESSIONAL REGULATION REPORT
18	On or before October 15, 2016, each of the agencies and departments set
19	forth in subdivision (1) of this section shall provide a written report to the
20	Senate and House Committees on Government Operations, and provide a copy
21	of that report to the Office of Professional Regulation. The report shall contain

1	the information set forth in subdivision (2) of this section for each of the
2	professions or occupations listed in subdivision (1) that are regulated by that
3	agency or department.

6	(A) Agency of Agriculture, Food and Markets:
7	(i) pesticide applicators;

13	(iii) consumers or clients;
14	(iv) employers;
15	(v) the public; and
16	(vi) any other applicable persons.
17	(G) A description of the governance structure, such as:
18	(i) a board or commission;
19	(ii) an agency or division head;
20	(iii) a panel; or
21	(iv) a hearing officer.

1	(H) A description of the decision makers who:
2	(i) set application requirements and practice standards; and
3	(ii) make decisions on applicants, enforcement, and discipline.
4	(I) Qualifications for regulation, including:
5	(i) examination;
6	(ii) education; and
7	(iii) experience.
8	(J) A description of the application process, including:
9	(i) receiving applications;
10	(ii) reviewing applications;
11	(iii) rejecting applications;
12	(iv) appealing application rejections; and
13	(v) issuing licenses, certifications, or registrations.
14	(K) The duration of the license, certification, or registration.
15	(L) A description of the renewal process and requirements.
16	(M) Citation of the standards of practice or codes of conduct for
17	persons regulated set forth in:
18	(i) statute;
19	(ii) rule;
20	(iii) policy; or
21	(iv) another location.

1	(N) A description of the enforcement process, including:
2	(i) complaints;
3	(ii) investigations;
4	(iii) prosecutions;
5	(iv) hearings;
6	(v) discipline; and
7	(vi) follow-up or monitoring.
8	(O) A description of any inspection process.
9	(P) A description of any systems, such as information technology
10	systems, that are used to enable licensing, certification, or registration,
11	renewal, enforcement, and inspection.
12	(Q) Staff members:
13	(i) number of full-time staff;
14	(ii) number of part-time staff;
15	(iii) job titles; and
16	(iv) duties.
17	(R) Budget:
18	(i) annual expenses;
19	(ii) annual revenues;
20	(iii) fees charged;

1	(iv) General Fund or special fund deposits; and
2	(v) appropriations from the General Fund.
3	(S) Any other information the agency or department believes is
4	relevant for the purpose of this report.

4	students and schools, it is necessary to modify or supplement a license issued
5	under Title 26 or to develop a subcategory of such a license specific to
6	school-based practice, the Standards Board shall notify the Director of the
7	Office of Professional Regulation in the case of an advisor profession or the
8	board having jurisdiction over the profession.
