House concurrent resolution congratulating Lucinda Storz on winning the 2015 Vermont State Spelling Bee

<u>Whereas</u>, since she was a first-grader, Lucy Storz has developed a proficiency for spelling unusual and seldom-used words, and

Whereas, each year, Lucy Storz dedicates five to six months to practicing her spelling skills, and

<u>Whereas</u>, her motivation to master the correct letter order of seldom-recited English language gems is to advance in the State Spelling Bee's standings and ultimately to represent Vermont at the National Spelling Bee in Washington, D.C., and

<u>Whereas</u>, Lucy Storz represented the Lyndon Town School as its school spelling champion as a first- and second-grader, certainly an unusual distinction in which she can take great pride, and

<u>Whereas</u>, on transferring to the Thaddeus Stevens School in third grade, she continued her reign as her school's spelling champion and, as a fifth-grader, she won the runner-up placement at the State Spelling Bee, and

<u>Whereas</u>, with this impressive history of spelling mastery, Lucy Storz was more than ready to meet the challenges of the 2015 State Spelling Bee, and

<u>Whereas</u>, when Vermont's best young spellers met at St. Michael's College for the 2015 State Spelling Bee, they were asked to spell words that many adults have never encountered, and

<u>Whereas</u>, among the more unusual of the 43 words Lucy spelled correctly were caballero, gymkhana, ipecac, kibei, kuchen, panzer, poltergeist, raita, topeng, and virgule, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Lucy Storz outlasted all of the other contestants, and the judges declared her the 2015 Vermont State Spelling Bee champion, and

<u>Whereas</u>, after a half-dozen years of perseverance and keeping her mind set on a special goal, Lucy Storz took home her long-cherished prize, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Lucy Storz is now anticipating her participation in the 2015 National Spelling Bee in Washington, D.C., now therefore be it

House concurrent resolution commemorating the centennial anniversary of the legislative establishment of Vermont town forests

<u>Whereas</u>, in 1915, the General Assembly recognized that municipally owned forests (Vermont town forests) would both protect important natural resources and provide revenue for towns, and

Whereas, to meet these objectives, the General Assembly enacted 1915 Acts and Resolves No. 24, "An Act to Provide for School Endowment Forests," and

<u>Whereas</u>, Vermont town forests produce wood products, maintain wildlife habitat, protect water supplies, provide forest recreation, and are a resource for

conservation education, and

Whereas, in 2015, 168 municipalities own town forests constituting 68,000 acres of land, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Vermont town forests may also be designated as watershed forests, community forests, school forests, town conservation areas, and town parks, and

<u>Whereas</u>, these woodland acres greatly enhance our communities and quality of life through their provision of social, ecological, and economic benefits, and

Whereas, town forests can drive economic and community development, and

<u>Whereas</u>, the Department of Forests, Parks and Recreation, and especially its county foresters, as well as regional and municipal planners, other forestry specialists, and local volunteers are the stewards and champions of Vermont town forests, and

<u>Whereas</u>, during the past century, town forest stewardship has created a culture and opportunity for Vermont's communities to create, manage, and enjoy these municipally owned woodlands, now therefore, be it

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives:

That the General Assembly commemorates the centennial anniversary of the legislative establishment of Vermont town forests. and be it further

<u>Whereas</u>, prior to 2015, an American woman had never won a medal, as a solo skier, at a major international Nordic ski race, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Jessie Diggins was born in Minnesota, but, as a skier, she has trained at Stratton Mountain, and she is a member of the Stratton Mountain School's SMS T2 elite Nordic ski team, and

<u>Whereas</u>, as part of a duo-member team with Kikkan Randall, she won a gold medal at the FIS (International Ski Federation) Nordic World Ski Championships 2013, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Jessie Diggins was honored to be named to the 2014 U.S. Winter Olympics team and placed a respectable eighth in the 15-kilometer skiathlon, and

<u>Whereas</u>, at the FIS Nordic World Ski Championships 2015 held in Falun, Sweden, she wrote a new page in the history of American women's international Nordic skiing competition, and <u>Whereas</u>, Jessie Diggins won a silver medal in the 10-kilometer freestyle race, representing our nation and her sport with skill, speed, and grace, now therefore be it

Offered by: Representatives Troiano of Stannard, Batchelor of Derby, Beck of St. Johnsbury, Berry of Manchester, French of Randolph, Haas of Rochester, Lefebvre of Newark, Martel of Waterford, Strong of Albany, Toll of Danville, Walz of Barre City, Willhoit of St. Johnsbury, and Zagar of Barnard

<u>Whereas</u>, a sports reporter is typically an objective chronicler of athletic competition and not a boaster of the athletes the writer is covering, and

<u>Whereas</u>, for the late Dave Morse, the beloved sports editor of the *Hardwick Gazette*, this professional mantra was modified, and

<u>Whereas</u>, his printed and digital prose reflected the highest standards of sports journalism, but his caring, nurturing, and parental or, more accurately, grandfatherly concern for the Hazen Union students was endearing, and

<u>Whereas</u>, the young athletes returned the affection and admiration, and many enduring friendships ensued, some lasting many years after an athlete had graduated, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Dave Morse was born in Morrisville and decided as a camper at Camp Abnaki that he was a sports writer, a prescient decision, and

<u>Whereas</u>, he polished his reportorial skills covering athletic events at Waterbury High School and relaying scores to the local media, and

<u>Whereas</u>, after attending Burdett Business College in Boston, Dave Morse returned home, accepting a sportswriter's post at the Barre *Times-Argus*, and then serving as the sports editor first at the *Springfield Reporter* and then at the *Rutland Herald*, and

<u>Whereas</u>, although high school sports was a primary beat, he traveled to the 1968 Winter Olympics in Grenoble, France, for the *Rutland Herald*, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Dave Morse had a big-city experience as a public relations specialist in New York before the *Hardwick Gazette* lured him home in 1994 to become its sports editor, a match that was ideal, and

<u>Whereas</u>, aside from covering the high school sports scene, Dave Morse regularly reported on Thunder Road and the Vermont Mountaineers, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Dave Morse won numerous local and regional honors, but no recognition was more important to him than the dedication of the 2006 Hazen Union yearbook in his honor and the school's 2014 Dave Morse night, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in a memorial remembrance, the *Hardwick Gazette* featured a sports page filled with tributes from former Hazen Union students and veteran Vermont journalist Mike Donoghue, now therefore be it

That the General Assembly extends it sincere condolences to the family and many friends of Dave Morse, and be it further

<u>Whereas</u>, the New England Food and Drug Officials Association (NEFDOA) was established in 1911, and

<u>Whereas</u>, NEFDOA's mission is "To protect and provide for the public health through education, training, promotion of current public health principles, and through uniformity in the promulgation and enforcement of food and drug laws and regulations," and

<u>Whereas</u>, the original New England states membership was expanded in 1991 to include the Canadian provinces of New Brunswick, Newfoundland, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, and Quebec, resulting in the substitution of North East for New England in the organization's name, and, more recently, New York and Ontario were added to the organization's membership, and <u>Whereas</u>, NEFDOA is one of six regional affiliates of the Association of Food and Drug Officials, a national organization with a similar public health mission, and

Whereas, in 2011, NEFDOA celebrated its centennial anniversary, and

Whereas, in 2015, NEFDOA will convene its 104th annual meeting in Burlington on May 6–8, 2015, at the Sheraton Burlington Hotel and Conference Center, and

<u>Whereas</u>, NEFDOA's current officers are Lisa Roy of Maine (president), Elisabeth Wirsing of Vermont (president-elect), Michael Moore of Massachusetts (vice president), Joyce Welch of New Hampshire (past president), and Mary Yebba of Massachusetts (secretary), and

<u>Whereas</u>, in addition to the organization's officers, NEFDOA's board of directors includes Ron Rose of Connecticut and Gene Blake of New Hampshire (as representatives-at-large); the directors of state and provincial drug programs in the member jurisdictions; the heads of federal departments charged with enforcement of food, drug, cosmetic devices, or product safety laws; Darby Greco of New York (regional affiliate director); and Nicole Bouchard-Steeves (representing the Canadian Food Inspection Agency) and Darren Leyte (representing Health Canada), and

<u>Whereas</u>, Patricia Kaczynski of Connecticut is NEFDOA's executive director, having succeeded Gene Blake, now therefore be it

House concurrent resolution honoring retired Winooski Police Chief Stephen J. McQueen for his exemplary law enforcement leadership

Offered by: Representatives Bissonnette of Winooski, Gonzalez of Winooski, Evans of Essex, Jerman of Essex, Lippert of Hinesburg, and Myers of Essex

<u>Whereas</u>, Stephen McQueen's first law enforcement employment was as a St. Johnsbury police officer, and

<u>Whereas</u>, after completing an associate's degree at Lyndon State College, he attended a police personnel management course at Iona College and, in 2006, earned a bachelor's degree from Champlain College, and

<u>Whereas</u>, for several years, Stephen McQueen served at the Lamoille County Sheriff's Department, rising to the rank of Chief Deputy Sheriff, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in January 1984, Stephen McQueen began a 30-year association with the City of Winooski's police department and, while a sergeant, served as acting chief, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in January 1992, he was promoted to the position of lieutenant, making him the number two police officer in the department, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in February 1996, the City of Winooski recognized Stephen McQueen's proven professional record and history of effective leadership and selected him for the combined posts of Police Chief and Director of Public Safety, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Stephen McQueen has been a leader in the Vermont law enforcement community, serving as president of the Vermont Association of Chiefs of Police, a trustee of the Vermont Police Association, and a member of the Vermont Criminal Justice Training Council, and

<u>Whereas</u>, among his innovations in Winooski were the establishment of the State's first school resource officer and the creation of the first police-based community justice center, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Stephen McQueen was associated as an expert with Project Harmony, as a Vermont host and as a traveler to the Republic of Georgia, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in his hometown of Essex, Stephen McQueen held civic leadership positions, including town moderator and justice of the peace, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Stephen McQueen retired as Winooski City Police Chief in September of 2014, but he has remained associated with the city as a special revisor of the city's municipal code of ordinances, now therefore be it

<u>Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives:</u>

That the General Assembly honors retired Winooski Police Chief Stephen J. McQueen for his exemplary law enforcement leadership, and be it further

Whereas, Three Tomatoes Trattoria arrived in downtown Rutland at the start of the commercial hub's revitalization in the late 1990s, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Allen Frey has purchased food from local farmers and producers whenever possible, and

<u>Whereas</u>, he has demonstrated a special concern for needy Rutlanders, raising \$750,000 for the Rutland Community Cupboard food shelf, a worthy and impressive accomplishment, and

<u>Whereas</u>, after 18 successful years, Three Tomatoes Trattoria will serve its final meals on April 30, 2015, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in a published advertisement announcing the restaurant's closing, the ownership expressed sincere appreciation for the loyalty of its many customers and to the community of Rutland, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Rutlanders will miss the high quality food and warm hospitality of Three Tomatoes Trattoria, but will have fond memories of wonderful dining experiences, now therefore be it
