<u>Whereas</u>, journalism and athletics have been the twin pillars of St. Albans native and 1971 UVM graduate Wally Johnson's distinguished career, and

<u>Whereas</u>, his first professional journalism position was at the *St. Albans Messenger* and the former *Vermont Sunday News*, and

<u>Whereas</u>, his craftsmanship as a chronicler of athletic competition earned him the 1971 Vermont Sportswriter of the Year award, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Wally Johnson moved on to the *Burlington Free Press* as an education reporter and then assistant sports editor, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in 1975, a new career path emerged, as Wally Johnson left the excitement of newspaper reporting for the different pace of college sports information, and

<u>Whereas</u>, he traveled across Lake Champlain to the friendly confines of St. Lawrence University in Canton, New York, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Wally Johnson's primary role was to write interesting stories relating the exploits of the St. Lawrence Saints teams, but his myriad duties were far more extensive, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in his first winter on campus, Wally Johnson launched a broadcasting career as the color commentator for St. Lawrence men's hockey radio play-by-play, and, years later, he created the university's first sports information website, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Wally Johnson has served as the host Sports Information Director for a number of National Collegiate Athletic Association events, and

<u>Whereas</u>, he was instrumental in establishing and selecting candidates for the St. Lawrence University Athletic Hall of Fame, and

<u>Whereas</u>, for a quarter of a century, Wally Johnson served on the Eastern College Athletic Conference-Sports Information Directors Association's board of directors, and

<u>Whereas</u>, he is the recipient of several prestigious professional honors and is a 2013 College Sports Information Directors of America Hall of Fame inductee, and

<u>Whereas</u>, after 41 years of superb oversight of sports information services at St. Lawrence University, Wally Johnson has announced that the 2015–2016 academic year will be his last as the university's Director of Athletic Media Relations, now therefore be it

<u>Whereas</u>, Ed Lewis has served on the board of the Horace Greeley Foundation for the past 13 years and is currently the vice president of this institution that honors Poultney's most famous resident with commemorative and scholarly programs, and

<u>Whereas</u>, through his membership in the Poultney Historical Society, Ed Lewis has participated in celebrating and preserving his hometown's history, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Ed Lewis is a man of faith and serves as the record keeper for St. John's Episcopal Church in East Poultney, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in 2002, Ed Lewis was the worthy recipient of the Poultney Citizen of the Year Award, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Ed Lewis was married to his wife, Joan, for 42 years, until her death, and he is the father of Sharon, David, Rebecca, and Sarah and the grandfather of Travis, Megan, David, Macaela, Jordan, and Jacob, and

<u>Whereas</u>, among the other institutions for which Patrick Scheidel has provided outstanding volunteer service are the board of directors of the then Fanny Allen Hospital and the Governor's Rail Council, and

<u>Whereas</u>, he joined Essex Rotary soon after his arrival in 1990, served as its president in 1999, and remains an active member, and

<u>Whereas</u>, recently Patrick Sheidel also served as Essex Junction Village Manager and is now the community's municipal manager, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Patrick Scheidel is the recipient of many awards honoring his dynamic municipal leadership, including the 2015 Vermont League of Cities and Towns Municipal Service Award, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in recognition of his superb job performance and in appreciation of his devotion to serving the municipality's citizenry, the Town of Essex's 2015 annual report is dedicated to Patrick Scheidel, now therefore be it

<u>Whereas</u>, Robert McWaters was born in 1925 in the Bronx, New York, and he served proudly in the U.S. Navy Seabees during World War II, and

<u>Whereas</u>, after military service, he attended the Rochester Institute of Technology, earning a degree in printing management, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in 1956, Robert McWaters moved his family to the village of North Bennington, where he worked in the printing industry and became a civic leader, and

<u>Whereas</u>, a strong concern for the quality of public education motivated him to serve two terms on the Mt. Anthony School Board, and

<u>Whereas</u>, he served as a village trustee for 13 years, and his tenure as a planning commissioner continued for almost three decades, and

<u>Whereas</u>, during the years 1989–1992, Robert McWaters played a major role in revising the village's master plan and zoning bylaws, and more recently, he was engaged in a new project updating these documents and codifying the village's ordinances, and

<u>Whereas</u>, as a member of the Bennington Regional Commission, he served terms as secretary and chair, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Robert McWaters' work was essential in the implementation of the E-911 emergency address system in North Bennington, and

<u>Whereas</u>, the set of monographs he created on aspects of the village's government and citizens is a valuable historical resource, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in 2001, Robert McWaters was the recipient of the Ferdinand "Nundy" Bongartz Award for Community Planning and Service, and

<u>Whereas</u>, after a long life of community service, Robert McWaters died at the Vermont Veterans' Home on July 19, 2015, and his survivors include his wife, Jeanne, his children, Alan, Bruce, and Kathy, his Fresh Air daughter, Diane, and four grandchildren, now therefore be it

<u>Whereas</u>, his professional background and experience in the nonprofit sector were soon called upon in his new community, and

<u>Whereas</u>, David Green's financial knowledge was a great resource for the town during his service as a Barnard lister, and

<u>Whereas</u>, his familiarity with academic governance matters resulted in his membership on the board of Barnard Academy, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in the town of Barnard, David Green has generously, tirelessly, and painstakingly worked to negotiate contract agreements and budgets that serve the best interests of the town's students, school employees, and taxpayers, and

<u>Whereas</u>, David Green also brought both his passion for public education and his financial acumen to his service on the boards of the Woodstock Union and the Windsor Central Supervisory Union school districts, and

<u>Whereas</u>, his interest in the arts and their public availability motivated him to serve on the boards of Woodstock's Norman Williams Public Library and Pentangle Arts Council, and

<u>Whereas</u>, his longstanding musical involvement is the source of a chamber music series that continues to delight listeners at its Woodstock concerts, and

<u>Whereas</u>, on Town Meeting Day 2016, the town of Barnard is honoring David Green for his laudable community service, now therefore be it

Whereas, in 1977, Tom Morse arrived in Barnard, and upon acquiring land for a home, his first task was to locate a water source and construct a well, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in 1985, Tom Morse's reputation for hard work and integrity resulted in the Town of Barnard appointing him to serve on the Board of Adjustment, and

<u>Whereas</u>, this initial role in town government provided a foundation for Tom Morse's election to the Barnard Selectboard in 1988, and

<u>Whereas</u>, during Tom Morse's 28 years as a selectboard member, including while he was serving in his present role as chair, the town of Barnard has implemented a number of important projects, and

<u>Whereas</u>, these included the construction of a new town garage, the renovation of the town hall, the formal closing of the landfill, and the associated establishment of a recycle center and transfer station, and

<u>Whereas</u>, the Barnard Selectboard identified the community's ancient roads, bringing greater historical accuracy to the town's highway mapping, and

<u>Whereas</u>, a major responsibility for Tom Morse, and the entire selectboard, was supervising the town's cleanup in the wake of Tropical Storm Irene that left considerable damage, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Tom Morse has presided at numerous selectboard meetings and participated in numerous community social events, and

<u>Whereas</u>, for many years, Tom Morse has written the selectboard news column for the Barnard Bulletin, employing both his wit and, when needed, a mild scolding, and

<u>Whereas</u>, after almost three decades of representing the citizens of Barnard on the selectboard, Tom Morse will not stand for reelection in 2016, and he hopes to devote his attention to recreational pursuits, especially bass fishing, bow hunting, and growing the perfect tomato, now therefore be it

<u>Whereas</u>, Hollis Squier's father instilled in him a duty to assist those in need, and, at 15 years of age, Hollis Squier joined the Tinmouth Volunteer Fire Department, and

<u>Whereas</u>, for the past 45 years, he has served with pride as a department member, assistant chief, or chief, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Hollis Squier has served Tinmouth as a member of the planning commission and of the board of zoning adjustment and as town agent, and

<u>Whereas</u>, his tenure as Tinmouth Road Commissioner was certainly among the longest for any road commissioner in the State, and his accomplishments in this post were both immediate and of enduring importance, and

<u>Whereas</u>, the voters of Tinmouth first elected Hollis Squier as road commissioner in 1979, when he was 23 years of age, and his selection prompted comments that he was too young for the job, and

<u>Whereas</u>, despite the skepticism, he proved more than capable of meeting the job's challenges, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in 1979, Tinmouth's road-clearing vehicles consisted of the City of Montpelier's discarded 1948 trucks, and

<u>Whereas</u>, under Hollis Squier's leadership, the town modernized the fleet, established a regular vehicle replacement schedule, and created an equipment fund, and

<u>Whereas</u>, on inclement winter days, he would awaken at 3:00 a.m. to check the weather and determine whether road plowing was required, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in 1988, Hollis Squier was awarded statewide recognition when he was named Municipal Highway Person of the Year, and

<u>Whereas</u>, by December 31, 2015, when he retired as Tinmouth Road Commissioner, the condition of the town's highways had improved immensely, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Hollis Squier continues to serve enthusiastically in the unique municipal office of "Town Hugger," having gained international notoriety for his exceptional job performance, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Hollis Squier, deservedly, has been honored with a special dedication in the 2015 Tinmouth Annual Report, now therefore be it

<u>Whereas</u>, in 1999, the voters of West Rutland elected Peter Bianchi to serve on the selectboard, believing he possessed the right combination of skills and temperament to be entrusted with this important civic duty, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Peter Bianchi proved to be a superb selectboard member, who performed his duties conscientiously and responsibly, and

<u>Whereas</u>, although he expressed personal opinions on issues of the day, Peter Bianchi was an attentive and enthusiastic listener, who regularly solicited and considered the viewpoints of his constituents, and

Whereas, when it came time to cast a vote, he always remembered the comments he had heard and was known as the voice of West Rutland, and

<u>Whereas</u>, since the 1990s, his accurate shooting has garnered him numerous state championships at bowhunting tournaments throughout the Northeastern United States, and

Whereas, Brian Kasten's long-term goal was to win the International Bowhunting Organization 3D Indoor World Championship (IBO3DIWC), and

<u>Whereas</u>, to achieve this special objective, he has worked intensively to improve his accuracy at hitting targets, and

<u>Whereas</u>, this additional training resulted in Brian Kasten raising his final ranking at the IBO3DIWC from 25th place in 2014 to 17th place in 2015, and

Whereas, while this improved placement was encouraging, his goal remained unmet, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in the months preceding the 2016 IBO3DIWC that took place in Cleveland, Ohio, on January 16, Brian Kasten further refined his bowmanship in preparation for this critical test of his skills, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in Cleveland, 22 of Brian Kasten's 40 shots were pinpoint on the target for a top score of 11 points per shot, and another nine shots earned him a near perfect score of 10, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Brian Kasten, who has served as the Vermont IBO state representative since 2004, was thrilled that his hard work had produced a great victory, and

<u>Whereas</u>, when not occupied with matters involving bows and arrows, Brian Kasten is the proprietor of the Supper Solution, a cooking business, and he is well acquainted with the culinary arts, now therefore be it

<u>Whereas</u>, two mid-20th century institutional advancements were Sylvia Lawry's establishment of the Society in 1946 and the 1950 federal legislation creating what today is known as the National Institute for Neurological Disorders and Stroke, and

<u>Whereas</u>, laboratory advances in the 1970s, treatment trials in the 1980s, and, more recently, the increasing sophistication of magnetic resonance imaging technology and the advancement of gene research have all expanded scientists' understanding of MS, and

<u>Whereas</u>, new treatment options, along with improved health care and lifestyle changes, have extended the life expectancy for persons with MS, and

<u>Whereas</u>, despite these positive developments, MS continues to result in consequential and unwelcomed impacts on people's lives, and more research is required to eradicate the disease, and

Whereas, representatives of the Greater New England Chapter of the National Multiple Sclerosis Society are visiting the State House today to inform members of the General Assembly about the challenges that MS poses for individuals and society at large, now therefore be it

<u>Whereas</u>, on May 28, 1946, the Burlington Board of Alderman voted to deed to the State of Vermont the needed land for the construction of two hangars and the rights of way to use the runways, and

Whereas, on July 1, 1946, the U.S. Army Air Force announced the establishment of the Vermont Air National Guard (VTANG), and

<u>Whereas</u>, the VTANG's first commanding officer was Lt. Colonel William Bowden, and the original contingent of veteran World War II pilots numbered 25, and

<u>Whereas</u>, on August 14, 1946, the U.S. Army Air Force designated the VTANG as the 134th Fighter Squadron, and the VTANG's dual mission included assisting in State disasters and emergencies and supporting federal aviation defense efforts, and

<u>Whereas</u>, the U.S. Army Air Force sent AT-6 and L-5 trainers, and a C-47 "Gooney bird" transport plane, but a fleet of far superior Thunderbolt aircraft arrived soon thereafter as replacements for the original airplanes, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in 1948, the Burlington electorate approved a \$150,000.00 bond as the city's contribution towards airport improvements, including needed runway extensions to meet the needs of military aircraft, and

<u>Whereas</u>, during the Korean War, the VTANG was federalized, the first of many foreign deployments for the Vermont-based pilots, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in 1956, the 134th Fighter Squadron was designated as the 158th Fighter Group (Air Defense), and in 1992, it was redesignated as the 158th Fighter Wing, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in 2016, as it observes its 70th anniversary, the VTANG, now flying F-16 aircraft, has evolved into a modern and sophisticated airborne military force that has served our State and country well in times of war and peace, now therefore be it
