J.R.H. 2. Joint resolution supporting a woman's right to decide her own reproductive choices, commemorating the 42nd anniversary of the U.S. Supreme Court decision in <u>Roe v. Wade</u>, and the 50th anniversary of Planned Parenthood of Northern New England.
