

MONEY IS NOT THE ANSWER

- But it could really help with some things
 - Basic physical plant security
 - The only courthouse that I am aware of in this state that has adequate entry-point security is Costello in Burlington-the physical entrance is generally adequate (though the doors and entry windows should be at least pistol resistant).
 - Security is only as good as what you pay for, and expect
 - Sometimes, you have to make a show. But don't fool yourselves by thinking the show means something.
