VSC Budget

Defining the Problem

- 1. Currently rank 49 out of 50 states for state support for higher education
 - a. Only NH ranks below us.
 - b. This results in one of the highest tuitions in the country for public higher education
 - c. This means our students on average graduate with more student debt than students from other states
 - d. The employees of the VSC on average have lower salaries than employees in comparable institutions elsewhere
- 2. Dwindling of state support:
 - a. Vermont has not always neglected higher education, but state support has consistently been reduced since 1980. In 1980, state appropriations covered 51% of the costs of the VSC. Currently they pay for 13% of the costs.
 - b. Since 1980, the burden of higher education costs has been transferred to tuition which has consistently gone up.
- 3. Facts about our students VSC:
 - a. 83% of our students are Vermonters
 - b. 84% of our students stay and work in Vermont after graduation
 - c. 57% of our students are first generation college students
- 4. An Investment in PUBLIC Higher Education is an Investment in Vermont:
 - a. Since the majority of our students stay and work in Vermont after graduation, and investment in their education truly is an investment in the future well-being of the state. They are our teachers, nurses, small business owners.

Reclaiming the Promise of Affordable Public Higher Education:

1. In the enacting legislation in 1962, the state Legislature promised to support the VSC "in whole or substantial part". It is time they live up to that promise.

- 2. We encourage the state to protect, invest, and build the Higher Education Trust fund.
- 3. Restrict VSAC portability to in-state accredited institutions or out of state institutions with reciprocity agreements.
- 4. We encourage the state to find alternative resources:
 - a. The Occupancy Fee Bill (would result in 12 million dollars)
 - b. If the state makes marijuana legal dedicate a portion of that revenue to higher education.
