The Department of Health shall, as funding allows, maintain a public web site providing information concerning the presence of cyanobacteria in areas known to be used for recreation, including swimming and boating. If such an areas is deemed to be a public health hazard, the Commissioner of Health shall undertake public outreach describing the area and the nature of the hazard.

(c) § 1285(c) Notice by the Secretary. Except for discharges posted pursuant to subdivisions (b)(1)-(3) of this section, the Secretary shall post notice of unpermitted discharges to waters of the State ~~that may pose a threat to human health or the environment and that are identified by the Secretary.~~ The Secretary's notice shall include the information required under subdivision (b)(4) of this section and shall be posted on the Secretary's online event reporting system no later than four hours from the detection of a discharge, except that if the discharge is detected between the hours of 9:00 p.m. and 3 5:00 a.m., the Secretary shall post the notice no later than 10:00 a.m. of that morning.

(d)(2)(A)(iv) other unpermitted discharges to waters of the state.

~~(d)(2)(B) The signs shall remain in place for 48 hours after the discharge has stopped. warn of the potential threat to public health that may be posed by recreating in the waters due to the discharge. The signs shall remain in place until the discharge has stopped and the local health officer has determined that the threat to public health has passed.~~
