1	Statement of purpose of bill as introduced: This bill proposes to impose
2	criminal penalties on health care providers who prescribe regulated drugs in an
3	inappropriate manner. It would require all pharmacies that dispense regulated
4	drugs to accept and dispose of unused and unwanted drugs. It would require
5	veterinarians to participate in the Vermont Prescription Monitoring System and
6	authorize investigators and detectives with the Vermont State Police Drug
7	Diversion Unit to obtain information from the Vermont Prescription
8	Monitoring System regarding health care professionals' prescribing practices.
9	The bill would also allow partial filling of a prescription for a regulated drug
10	and require creation of a curriculum to educate health care providers regarding
11	the appropriate numbers of an opioid controlled substance to prescribe to a
12	patient following different types of surgeries and procedures.

- (a) It shall be unlawful for any person to manufacture, possess, have under
   his or her control, sell, prescribe, administer, dispense, or compound any
   regulated drug, except as authorized in this chapter.

1	(b)(1) A practitioner shall not issue a prescription for a regulated drug:
2	(A) without having conducted a physical examination of the patient
3	within the preceding 12 months;
4	(B) knowing that the patient plans to deliver the drug to others;
5	(C) that bears no logical relationship to treatment of the condition
6	from which the patient allegedly suffers; or
7	(D) in exchange for sexual favors or money.
8	(2) A practitioner who violates the provisions of subdivision (1) of this
9	subsection shall be subject to disciplinary action by the appropriate licensing
10	board and shall be imprisoned for not more than one year or fined not more
11	than \$2,000.00, or both.

The total amount dispensed shall not exceed the amount written on the original prescription. If the patient, animal owner, or bona fide representative does collect the remainder of a partially filled prescription within four calendar days, the pharmacist shall consider the prescription to be fully satisfied and shall not
