2 The Committee on Human Services to which was referred Senate Bill No.  
3 243 entitled “An act relating to combating opioid abuse in Vermont”  
4 respectfully reports that it has considered the same and recommends that the  
5 House propose to the Senate that the bill be amended by striking out all after  
6 the enacting clause and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

15 prescribers and dispensers are using VPMS appropriately.

18 opportunity for input from stakeholders, the Department shall develop a policy

4           (a) Each professional licensing authority for health care providers shall  
5       develop evidence-based standards to guide health care providers in the  
6       appropriate prescription of Schedules II, III, and IV controlled substances for  
7       treatment of acute pain, chronic pain, and for other medical conditions to be  
8       determined by the licensing authority. The standards developed by the  
9       licensing authorities shall be consistent with rules adopted by the Department  
10      of Health. The licensing authorities shall submit their standards to the  
11      Commissioner of Health, who shall review for consistency across health care  
12      providers and notify the applicable licensing authority of any inconsistencies  
13      identified.

15      controlled substances shall register with the VPMS by November 15, 2013.

5        Prescription Monitoring System, which shall include:

3           (a) The Department of Health, in consultation with the Board of Pharmacy,  
4           pharmacists, prescribing health care practitioners, health insurers, pharmacy  
5           benefit managers, and other interested stakeholders shall consider the role of  
6           pharmacies in preventing opioid misuse, abuse, and diversion. The  
7           Department's evaluation shall include a consideration of whether, under what  
8           circumstances, and in what amount pharmacists should be reimbursed for  
9           counting or otherwise evaluating the quantity of pills, films, patches, and  
10           solutions of opioid controlled substances prescribed by a health care provider  
11           to his or her patients.

12           (b) On or before January 15, 2017, the Department shall report to the  
13           House Committees on Health Care and on Human Services and the Senate  
14           Committee on Health and Welfare its findings and recommendations with  
15           respect to the appropriate role of pharmacies in preventing opioid misuse,

18       Sec. 9. CONTINUING EDUCATION

19           (a) All physicians, osteopathic physicians, dentists, pharmacists, advanced  
20           practice registered nurses, optometrists, and naturopathic physicians with a  
21           registration number from the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA),

1 who have a pending application for a DEA number, or who dispense controlled  
2 substances shall complete a total of at least two hours of continuing education  
3 for each licensing period beginning on or after July 1, 2016 on the topics of the  
4 abuse and diversion, safe use, and appropriate storage and disposal of  
5 controlled substances; the appropriate use of the Vermont Prescription  
6 Monitoring System; risk assessment for abuse or addiction; pharmacological  
7 and nonpharmacological alternatives to opioids for managing pain; medication  
8 tapering; and relevant State and federal laws and regulations concerning the  
9 prescription of opioid controlled substances.

10 (b) The Department of Health shall consult with the Board of Veterinary  
11 Medicine and the Agency of Agriculture, Food and Markets to develop  
12 recommendations regarding appropriate safe prescribing and disposal of  
13 controlled substances prescribed by veterinarians for animals and dispensed to  
14 their owners, as well as appropriate continuing education for veterinarians on  
15 the topics described in subsection (a) of this section. On or before January 15,  
16 2017, the Department shall report its findings and recommendations to the  
17 House Committees on Agriculture and Forest Products and on Human Services  
18 and the Senate Committees on Agriculture and on Health and Welfare.

3                   PREVENTION AND MANAGEMENT OF PRESCRIPTION

4                   DRUG MISUSE

5           The Commissioner of Health shall convene medical educators and other  
6           stakeholders to develop appropriate curricular interventions and innovations to  
7           ensure that students in medical education programs have access to certain core  
8           competencies related to safe prescribing practices and to screening, prevention,  
9           and intervention for cases of prescription drug misuse and abuse. The goal of  
10           the core competencies shall be to support future health care professionals over  
11           the course of their medical education to develop skills and a foundational  
12           knowledge in the prevention of prescription drug misuse. These competencies  
13           should be clear baseline standards for preventing prescription drug misuse,  
14           treating patients at risk for substance use disorders, and managing substance  
15           use disorders as a chronic disease, as well as developing knowledge in the  
16           areas of screening, evaluation, treatment planning, and supportive recovery.

18           Sec. 11. REGIONAL PREVENTION PARTNERSHIPS

19           The Department of Health shall establish a community grant program for  
20           the purpose of supporting local opioid prevention strategies. This program  
21           shall support evidence-based approaches and shall be based on a

1 comprehensive community plan, including community education and  
2 initiatives designed to increase awareness or implement local programs, or  
3 both. Partnerships involving schools, local government, and hospitals shall  
4 receive priority.

8 (a) Annually, each pharmaceutical manufacturer or labeler of prescription

11 to the Agency of Human Services. The fee shall be ~~0.5~~ 1.5 percent of the  
12 previous calendar year's prescription drug spending by the Department and  
13 shall be assessed based on manufacturer labeler codes as used in the Medicaid  
14 rebate program.

18 (a) There is hereby created a Controlled Substances and Pain Management  
19 Advisory Council for the purpose of advising the Commissioner of Health on  
20 matters related to the Vermont Prescription Monitoring System and to the

1 appropriate use of controlled substances in treating acute and chronic pain and  
2 in preventing prescription drug abuse, misuse, and diversion.

3 (b)(1) The Controlled Substances and Pain Management Advisory Council  
4 shall consist of the following members:

5 (A) the Commissioner of Health or designee, who shall serve as  
6 chair;

7 (B) the Deputy Commissioner of Health for Alcohol and Drug Abuse  
8 Programs or designee;

9 (C) the Commissioner of Mental Health or designee;

1       (c) Advisory Council members who are not employed by the State or  
2       whose participation is not supported through their employment or association  
3       shall be entitled to a per diem and expenses as provided by 32 V.S.A. § 1010.

4       (d)(1) The Advisory Council shall provide advice to the Commissioner  
5       concerning rules for the appropriate use of controlled substances in treating  
6       acute pain and chronic noncancer pain; the appropriate use of the Vermont  
7       Prescription Monitoring System; and the prevention of prescription drug abuse,  
8       misuse, and diversion.

9       (2) The Advisory Council shall evaluate the use of nonpharmacological  
10       approaches to treatment for pain, including the appropriateness, efficacy, and  
11       cost-effectiveness of using complementary and alternative therapies such as  
12       chiropractic, acupuncture, and massage.

3           § 4224. UNUSED PRESCRIPTION DRUG DISPOSAL PROGRAM

4           The Department of Health shall establish and maintain a statewide unused  
5           prescription drug disposal program to provide for the safe disposal of Vermont  
6           residents' unused and unwanted prescription drugs. The program may include  
7           establishing secure collection and disposal sites and providing **unused**  
8           medication envelopes **to send for sending unused** prescription drugs to an  
9           authorized collection facility for destruction.

11           Sec. 15. INSURANCE COVERAGE FOR ACUPUNCTURE; REPORT

12           Each nonprofit hospital and medical service corporation licensed to do  
13           business in this State pursuant to both 8 V.S.A. chapters 123 and 125 and  
14           providing coverage for pain management shall evaluate the evidence  
15           supporting the use of acupuncture as a modality for treating and managing pain  
16           in its enrollees, including the experience of other states in which covered by  
17           health insurance plans. On or before January 15, 2017, each such corporation  
18           shall report to the House Committees on Health Care and on Human Services  
19           and the Senate Committee on Health and Welfare its assessment of whether its  
20           insurance plans should provide coverage for acupuncture when used to treat or

1       Sec. 15a. ACUPUNCTURE; MEDICAID PILOT PROJECT

2           (a) The Department of Vermont Health Access shall develop a pilot project  
3           to offer acupuncture services to Medicaid-eligible Vermonters with a diagnosis  
4           of chronic pain. The project would provide acupuncture services for a defined  
5           period of time to determine if acupuncture treatment as an alternative or  
6           adjunctive to prescribing opioids is as effective or more effective than opioids  
7           alone for returning individuals to social, occupational, and psychological  
8           function. The project shall include:

9                   (1) an advisory group of pain management specialists and acupuncture  
10                  providers familiar with the current science on evidence-based use of  
11                  acupuncture to treat or manage chronic pain;

12                   (2) specific patient eligibility requirements regarding the specific cause  
13                  or site of chronic pain for which the evidence indicates acupuncture may be an  
14                  appropriate treatment; and

15                   (3) input and involvement from the Department of Health to promote  
16                  consistency with other State policy initiatives designed to reduce the reliance  
17                  on opioid medications in treating or managing chronic pain.

18           (b) On or before January 15, 2017, the Department of Vermont Health  
19           Access, in consultation with the Department of Health, shall provide a progress  
20           report on the pilot project to the House Committees on Health Care and on  
21           Human Services and the Senate Committee on Health and Welfare that

1 includes an implementation plan for the pilot project described in this section.

2 In addition, the Departments shall consider any appropriate role for  
3 acupuncture in treating substance use disorder, including consulting with  
4 health care providers using acupuncture in this manner, and shall make

8 Sec. 16. HEALTH DEPARTMENT; POSITION

9 One new permanent classified position—a substance abuse program  
10 manager—is authorized in the Department of Health in order to coordinate a  
11 secure prescription drug collection and disposal program as part of the unused  
12 prescription drug disposal program established pursuant to Sec. 14a of this act.  
13 The position shall be transferred and converted from an existing vacant  
14 position in the Executive Branch of State government.

16 Sec. 17. APPROPRIATIONS

17 (a) The sum of \$250,000.00 is appropriated from the Evidence-Based  
18 Education and Advertising Fund to the Department of Health in fiscal year  
19 2017 for the purpose of funding the evidence-based education program  
20 established in 18 V.S.A. chapter 91, subchapter 2, including evidence-based

1 information about safe prescribing of controlled substances and alternatives to  
2 opioids for treating pain.

3 (b) The sum of \$625,000.00 is appropriated from the Evidence-Based  
4 Education and Advertising Fund to the Department of Health in fiscal year  
5 2017 for the purpose of funding statewide unused prescription drug disposal  
6 initiatives, of which \$100,000.00 shall be used for a secure prescription drug  
7 collection and disposal program and **the** program manager **established by Sec.**  
8 **16 of this act**, \$50,000.00 shall be used for unused medication envelopes for a  
9 mail-back program, \$225,000.00 shall be used for a public information  
10 campaign on the safe disposal of controlled substances, and \$250,000.00 shall  
11 be used for a public information campaign on the responsible use of

20 hospital-acquired infections.



1 (dispenser reporting to VPMS) shall take effect 30 days following notice and a

11 effect on passage and shall apply retroactive to January 1, 2016.
