3	entitled "An act relating to stalking" respectfully reports that it has considered
4	the same and recommends that the bill be amended by striking out all after the
5	enacting clause and inserting in lieu thereof the following:
6	Sec. 1. FINDINGS
7	The General Assembly finds the following:
8	(1) Stalking is a serious problem in Vermont and nationwide.
9	(2) Stalking involves severe intrusions on the victim's personal privacy
10	and autonomy.
11	(3) Stalking causes a long-lasting impact on the victim's quality of life
12	and creates risks to the security and safety of the victim and others even in the
13	absence of express threats of physical harm.
14	(4) Stalking conduct often becomes increasingly violent over time.
15	(5) There is a strong connection between stalking and domestic violence
16	and sexual assault.

19	As used in this chapter:
20	(1)(A) "Course of conduct" means a pattern of conduct composed of

2	person follows, monitors, <mark>observes</mark> , surveils, threatens, or makes threats about		
3	another person, or interferes with another person's property. This definition

6	13 V.S.A. § 2602, sexual assault as defined in 13 V.S.A. § 3252, aggravated
7	sexual assault as defined in 13 V.S.A. § 3253, use of a child in a sexual
8	performance as defined in 13 V.S.A. § 2822, or consenting to a sexual
9	performance as defined in 13 V.S.A. § 2823 and that the plaintiff was the
10	victim of the offense.
11	(6) "Stalk" means to purposefully engage in a course of conduct which
12	consists of following or lying in wait for a person, or threatening behavior
13	directed at a specific person or a member of the person's family, and:
14	(A) serves no legitimate purpose; and
15	(B) that the person engaging in the conduct knows or should know
16	would cause a reasonable person to:
17	(A) fear for his or her safety or the safety of another a family member;
18	or
19	(B) would cause a reasonable person suffer substantial emotional
20	distress as a result of evidenced by:

1	(i) a reasonable fear of unlawful sexual conduct, unlawful restraint,			
2	bodily injury, or death; or			
3	(ii) significant modifications in the person's actions or routines,			
4	including moving from an established residence, changes to established daily			
5	routes to and from work that cause a serious disruption in the person's life,			
6	changes to the person's employment or work schedule, or the loss of a job or			
7	time from work.			
8	(7) "Stay away" means to refrain from knowingly:			
9	(A) initiating or maintaining a physical presence near the plaintiff;			
10	(B) engaging in nonphysical contact with the plaintiff directly or			
11	indirectly; or			
12	(C) engaging in nonphysical contact with the plaintiff through third			
13	parties who may or may not know of the order.			
14	(8) "Threatening behavior" means acts which would cause a reasonable			
15	person to fear unlawful sexual conduct, unlawful restraint, bodily injury, or			
16	death, including verbal threats,; written, telephonic, or other electronically			
17	communicated threats,: vandalism,; or physical contact without consent.			
18	"Threaten" shall not be construed to require an intent to threaten, whether			
19	established by an overt statement of intent to cause physical harm or by any			
20	other means.

1	§ 5133. REQUESTS FOR AN ORDER AGAINST STALKING OR		
2	SEXUAL ASSAULT		
3	(a) A person, other than a family or household member as defined in		
4	15 V.S.A. § 1101(2), may seek an order against stalking or sexual assault on		
5	behalf of him him- or herself or his or her children by filing a complaint under		
6	this chapter. A minor 16 years of age or older may file a complaint under this		
7	chapter seeking relief on his or her own behalf if the minor was previously		
8	engaged in a sexual or dating relationship with the defendant. The plaintiff		
9	shall submit an affidavit in support of the order.		
10	(b) Except as provided in section 5134 of this title, the court shall grant the		
11	order only after notice to the defendant and a hearing. The plaintiff shall have		
12	the burden of proving by a preponderance of the evidence that the defendant		
13	stalked or sexually assaulted the plaintiff.		
14	(c) In a hearing under this chapter, neither opinion evidence of nor		
15	evidence of the reputation of the plaintiff's sexual conduct shall be admitted.
