2015 marks 24 years of Service to the community for SAPCC!

This September marked SAPCC's 24th year of service to the communities of South Windsor and North Windham counties. There has been much change and growth over these past 24 years, from a small 2 person agency offering limited services, to a full service community based Parent Child Center employing 34 people. Change has been the theme for us here over the past few years, and it's often been said that change is one of the only constants in life. A quote from Benjamin Franklin comes to mind that still holds true today: "When you are finished changing, you're finished" and here at SAPCC we are far from finished with the rewarding and challenging work we've been committed to doing so well for over 24 years.

Our new Executive Director, Jill Rapanotti is excited to take the helm and continue the tradition of providing quality wrap around services to young children and their families. Jill has been involved with SAPCC in several different capacities over the years, and she will tell you that this agency holds a special place in her heart. Jill began as a Developmental Educator and from there became the Director for Learning Partners Child Care. She also served a term on the governing Board of SAPCC, and finally became our Children's Integrated Services Coordinator before accepting the position of Executive Director a few months ago.

As SAPCC moves forward into its next 25 years of service, Jill sees the center continuing the work of building strong communities, one family at a time. Jill was born and raised in Springfield. She has always felt connected and committed to the well-being of Springfield and its surrounding towns. She states, "The communities gave me so much when I was growing up. Now it is my turn to give back."

"Parenting is the most challenging and rewarding job when the going is good. Stressors on families have increased, and many of the families in our area are struggling in a variety of ways. Along with the people of our communities and area agencies, the Parent Child Center has always had a big role to play. By recommitting to our mission, growing our staff, strengthening our community relations, and listening to the families of the communities that we serve, the SAPCC will continue to be a primary resource hub for families parenting young children."



2000 families reached through outreach/education activities such as newsletters, public events, welcome baby bag distribution, and generic information and referral.

From all of us at SAPCC, we look forward to continuing the important work of early childhood development and support for children and their families in our communities into the next quarter century. Thank you for your continued support!

As for our current impact on the community, we estimate that we've reached approximately 3200 families and providers from January through June of 2015. 400 families served through home visiting, childcare and the Learning Together on-site program; 600 families served through childcare subsidy, referral, play-groups, and parenting classes; 200 providers receiving training; and

We are so proud of our graduates!

This fall we have two more seniors currently enrolled, and we have more students joining the program in the coming months. Our current students are very motivated and dedicated to their immediate task of finishing high school, but they are also working on broader goals such as family wellness, parenting, and job skills for the future. Our LT participants are valuable helpers downstairs at PlayWorks!

We have some exciting developments underway with our current students: Michelle is enrolled in a math skills course at CCV, getting her feet wet in a new college setting. Felicia has begun the LNA completion course at RVTC, a twice-weekly evening program. As we prepare for college and exploring options beyond high school, we're also working on navigating the world of financial aid.

In our SAPCC classroom this semester, our high school credit courses include World Literature, U.S. History, Women's Studies, Mindfulness, and Nutrition. These offerings meet Vermont State high school requirements and align with our integrated and supportive approach to education and parent education, job skills and interpersonal skills. We are grateful for our strong partnerships with the area high schools that create the pathways for our students to earn diplomas through their work here at our center. My Time at SAPCC - A Learning Together Participant viewpoint

I have been at the Parent Child Center for a little over a year now and within that time I have met some amazing people and have learned new skills. For about 2 hours every day I work at PlayWorks assisting the teachers in the Four Square room. I play with the kids, I help them with their problem-solving skills, I help them with crafts and help the teachers prepare the crafts, and I also help children who have a harder time being quiet and sitting still to pay attention. Some of my favorite things to do with the kids are crafts, like making masks and drawing flowers that they can color in.

Some skills I have learned from working with the kids and watching the other teachers are how to effectively speak to the children. This skill has helped me at home with my daughter Serenity. For example, using words and phrases like, *no thank you, it's your choice, use your words, no hurting hands, make a different choice, talk it out and take a break*. One of the best things about working with the kids is getting greeted by them when I come into the classroom. They enjoy my company as much as I enjoy theirs.

The Parent Child Center has helped me accomplish so much and I am grateful to have the opportunity to come here. Since I have been here I have almost completed my high school diploma, and I recently got my driver's license -- now I just need a car! Also, with the support of staff here, I have gotten some work done on my teeth that was much needed, and I have started dual enrollment with CCV and am attending a math class there. Now I am looking forward to the future and completing more of my many goals in life.



Myrtle's Closet Closes - Community Internships Sought

In the early days of Springfield Area Parent Child Center, when the agency was still up on Myrtle Street, the idea came about to open up a Thrift Store. The thought behind this venture was to first and foremost provide a worksite for Learning Together, an intensive pre-vocational and educational program that was just being offered at SAPCC. The other benefits were a small income for the center and providing community service work as well as a venue for affordable, gently used quality clothing.

Over the years Myrtle's has moved and grown and transitioned along with us at SAPCC. From its beginning in 2002 at the Myrtle Street location, to the past 10 years here at 2 Main Street in North Springfield it's had a great run as a training facility and community thrift shop. After 13 years of providing job training and a community thrift shop experience, we have decided to close the doors on Friday August 21st for the last time. We find that we have more donations coming into the Thrift Store than sales of clothing going out of the store these days, so it's time to say goodbye to Myrtle's and look to different methods as we move forward. This does not mean that we will no longer provide worksite training experience for our Learning Together program – we are instead looking to enhance worksite experience with internship placement experience for our participants outside the center to take them to the next level of job preparedness.

Please consider this an invitation for businesses and Community Service organizations to reach out and to partner with us. Our goal will be to have our participants continue to get their level one training in soft skills here at the center in our clerical, culinary and child care worksites, and then be ready for a level two internship out in the community, before they graduate and leave the program.

Worksites that would fit with the skill sets of our participants would be as follows:

- Health Care and Service Organizations
- Retail outlets
- Hospitality & Tourism Venues
- Entry level Clerical positions
- Offsite Child Care/Early Education


Over \$3200.00 was raised for our Learning Together program through this event, and we are very grateful to Richard and Marilee for their community spirit and sincere efforts to give back
