- so in 2014, GIV launched the Governor's Special Topics Institute on Entrepreneurship! Lead expert Laurel Butler assembled a crackerjack team to host GIV's first weeklong intensive on starting and running a business at Vermont Technical College. Twenty-two young Vermonters enjoyed in-depth seminars covering idea generation, marketing,

finance, skills self-assessment, human resources and more. Developing an original business idea throughout the week, student teams then pitched some amazingly creative and wellthought-out concepts to business experts and college reps in a Rocket Pitch session.

Said one participant: "It made me realize that being a successful entrepreneur demands constant focus and passion. I know going into college I will take what I have learned from this Institute and apply it to not only my education, but my everyday life. Because of my experiences at GIV I now have a new perspective on what it means to achieve success."

Leading the Way for Teen Girls' Achievement – And Boys'!

Many people know GIV is a leader in STEM education for young women in Vermont. GIV works tirelessly to locate young women with a spark of interest in science, technology, engineering or math, and to partner with EPSCoR to fan that interest into a flame. Each year more than 1/3 of our STEM Institute participants are girls, and we continue to make progress toward equal representation.

What is less widely recognized is the declining school achievement of Vermont boys – and the key role GIV is playing in addressing that troubling inequity as well. Two years ago we initiated a partnership with the Agency of Education, the Lake

Champlain Regional Chamber of Commerce, and the School for International Training that sparked the first regional dialogue and prompted Governor Shumlin to publicly spotlight the problem.

Now a new Vermont Community Foundation grant will help us take it a step further, extending the dialogue and galvanizing more concerned people to take action. To get involved, call or email GIV.

Arts

Castleton State College came alive this summer as 129 young artists flocked together to explore their creative potential. Young people sang, danced, sculpted, drew, painted, beaded, wrote, and created their hearts out! New this year, young artists wrote and recorded their own songs in songwriting class, built larger-than-life illuminated sculptures (including a 10 foot octopus!) in Lighting Structures, and participated in an Art & Politics roundtable with professional artists-cum-legislators Dick McCormack, Diane Snelling, and Bill Botzow. Budding sculptors visited the working studio of sculptor Kerry Furlani and the Taran Brothers Quarry to learn about Vermont's slate carving history. The beloved evening performance series brought poetry slams, student cabaret, and professional artists like Justin Lander and Rose Friedman's Modern Times Theater and nationally touring band Locos Por Juana.

Through it all wove the strong sense of community that is the unique hallmark of GIA. Explained one aspiring artist, "Never had I felt more of a sense of belonging or community. I'd never been surrounded by people so passionate about not only art, but about living and interacting with others. The people there showed me the true meaning of what it's like to be inspired... I couldn't help but feel comfortable with taking risks and trying new things with my art."

Engineering

Led by new Program Director Andrea Pearce and her extraordinary team, 78 young Vermonters converged at UVM this July to devote their energies to engineering. Would-be engineers, inventors, and creative problem-solvers chose between five areas of focus: robotics, sustainability, biomedical engineering, electrical engineering, or GIV's first-ever chemical engineering track.

A passionate flock of Knowles Science Teaching Foundation fellows, led by longtime GIV veteran Anne Watson, continued the Institute's traditional values of blending ingenuity with ethics while adding powerful young role models and mentorship. Determined student teams built a working robotic hand, designed a bicycle-powered cell phone charger, and conceived and tested technologies to anchor a fractured femur. New mini-challenges galvanized the students to venture into structural, material and mechanical engineering territory, while guest speakers like Vermont Microstrain innovator Steve Arms and Carrie McLaughlin from Engineers without Borders showcased the power of engineering to change the world. Said one participant, "The engineers that came to speak to us every afternoon inspired me to work even harder toward my future."

Current Issues & Youth Activism

This year the 25th annual Governor's Institute on Current Issues and Youth Activism played host to forty-six passionate young Vermonters eager to grapple with the world's pressing social and environmental challenges at the School for International Training.

Brimming with hope, motivation, and dedication, participants followed their interests to focus areas such as leadership, social justice, or global children's issues, participating in discussions with a wide variety of experts and exploring potential solutions. Plumbing international and local issues in depth with experts like former US Ambassador Don Steinberg, father and son Pakistani research team Aqeel and Hadi Tirmizi, and Anna Mulaney of the Women's Freedom Center, students crafted policy during a Congressional legislation simulation and then discussed real-life policy challenges with Vermont legislators. Graduates then showcased their learning for parents and staff by creating final presentations addressing current issues through songwriting, photography, dance, poetry, theater, and art.

Institute founder John Ungerleider and co-director Simon Norton have a lot to be proud of as they graduate a 25th generation of young activists, all of whom say things like "It made me feel like I could do something... that I shouldn't be afraid to be me, and to believe and work towards my goals, and change the things I want changed."

Asian Cultures

"GIV was the best educational experience I've ever had," reported one young scholar from this year's Asian Cultures Institute, where 20 internationally-minded young Vermonters fully immersed themselves in Asian history, culture, art, and anthropology at UVM for a week. Participants learned Chinese language and history, studied Asian art at the Fleming museum, encountered Japanese pop music, connected with Chinese students on the UVM campus, and experimented with simulations of the Chinese economy. One Asian Cultures graduate describes the variety and depth of her learning, "I learned how to speak Chinese, ate amazing Asian food, learned Tai Chi, and much more. I was opened up to a whole different culture I was not fully aware of. I became more open to the world..."

Their new cultural competency skills and social awareness will become invaluable as these graduates travel to China next summer with the Freeman Foundation and UVM Asian Studies Outreach Program – all for UVM credit. In the words of one participant, "The Institute made me realize how much I want to go out and learn about other countries, their politics, their history, their culture, their language, and be able to interact and communicate with them as a profession."









Environmental Science and Technology

Do you care about soil and water quality in your surroundings? 27 young GIVers do, so they used the cutting-edge equipment at the Environmental Science and Technology Institute this summer to investigate and develop an interactive map of microcontaminants in the area around the UVM campus.

With the guidance of professional experts, these driven young scientists began by formulating their own plan of study, then gained training in professional research techniques before fanning out into the field to collect samples, test them in UVM's state-of-the-art lab, interpret the data and then prepare it for presentation. Institute Director Christine Massey also tied in exposure to additional fields of science, with presentations on water systems, bee health and climate change, and a science careers evening with frank discussions with visiting professionals such as a pathologist, chemical engineer, chemist, cyber specialist, and epidemiologist. One budding scientist confided, "Career night really changed my life and pointed me to the medical [field] and I'm so grateful for that."

All of this extreme learning was balanced with sports breaks, swimming parties, and picnics, leading one student to report "It was the most interesting and rewarding week I have ever spent."

Information Technology and Digital Media

Do you know your Beaglebones from your Raspberry Pi? You probably do if you attended the Information Technology Institute, where this summer 53 young talents blossomed into tech savants.

All week, aspiring tech gurus focused in one of three areas. Digital Media scholars dove into digital video and web design. Game Design gurus took game production from narrative arc through 3D digital modeling. Information Technology learners deepened their coding skills and learned cyber security by competing against each other to secure or hack a website.

Institute Directors Coby Brownell and Shannon Walters wove in cutting-edge technology like Google Glass, tech trends like Story Hack VT and the Maker movement, and presentations from gaming entrepreneur Marguerite Dibble and the professionals from Leahy Center for Digital Forensics. The traditional pizza nights and murder mystery dinner at Champlain College gave students time to socialize and strategize about collaborative final projects - developing a tech product from idea to marketplace.

Recently one 2014 graduate shared: "GIV gave me the opportunity to start thinking about my career and where I want to go in life... Since GIV I have been hired for a social media position at a local business. The skills I learned at GIV are helping immensely and I wouldn't be in the spot I am now if it wasn't for the amazing staff who taught me so much."

Special Topics: Farms, Food and Your Future

Where does our food come from? Fifteen young Vermonters learned just how complex and fascinating Vermont's food system can be during the Farms, Food, and Your Future Institute at Vermont Technical College in Randolph. Students gleaned excess food at Pete's Greens, learned how to plow a field using draft horses at Sterling College, participated in Oxfam's Hunger Banquet, and processed food at the Vermont Food Venture Center. They learned about innovative growing techniques, soil science, the local food network, and the carbon cycle. Just a few of many guest speakers included Judith Schwartz, author of *How Cows Save the Planet*, Michelle Wallace of the Vermont Food Bank, and Agronomist Sosten Lungu. Throughout the week groups of motivated students produced projects on genetically modified organisms, historical and present use of animal breeds, carbon sequestration and soil, and food security. Impressed parents and faculty enjoyed these presentations on the final day of the Institute.

Students gained a great mix of practical skills and thorough academic study. Some plan to take these skills home to their own community farms. One told us, "I absolutely adored attending the Farms, Food and Your Future program. We learned about hydroponics - how to grow vegetables in water – how to cultivate between rows of crops using a draft horse, and we learned about how cows help replenish the carbon cycle. These ideas will help me in my process for when I help take care of my grandfather's small dairy farm and make it even better. Thank you so much!"

Mathematical Sciences

Math is everywhere - in nature, in our everyday technologies, in games and songs. At the Governor's Institute on Mathematics at UVM, 32 young math enthusiasts learned that first-hand. A Mathematics graduate describes it best, "I was expecting to solve math problems all day, but instead we got to see all kinds of interesting presenters who showed different ways that math can be applied in various settings, from synthetic biology to sundials and robots. This was super interesting for me because I wasn't sure really if math was necessarily something that was going to have a whole lot of meaning, depending on where I chose to go with my career. Seeing that it can be applied in so many ways, and the things that are math without being math, was amazing."

Chaos and fractals, the geometry of space, evolutionary robotics, unsolved math problems, and synthetic biology are just a few of the many classes offered throughout the week. Students explored the mathematics behind manufacturing at the Ben and Jerry's factory, competed in a Math Relay and Math Amazing race, and even made it to Oakledge Park for a barbeque after a long day of classes. For many the best part of the Institute was the discovering peers equally intrigued by the topics they were learning. In the words of one girl, "I felt a sense of community that I had never felt before, a feeling that my lifelong interest really does serve a purpose in the world. I was made quickly aware that I was not alone in my love for math."









GIV Celebrates 30 and Current Issues Institute Turns 25 with Flair

GIV's celebration of its 30th year continued into 2014 with a birthday-themed Outcomes Report Release at the Statehouse in February. Governor Shumlin led an assembled crowd of GIV students, staff, legislators and donors in a rousing round of "Happy Birthday to GIV," GIV Director Karen Taylor Mitchell described highlights of the report which brand new Education Secretary Rebecca Holcombe connected powerfully to Vermont's education priorities, and summer '13 alumna Kia Rae Hanron shared her personal experience.

Festivities continued with a birthday party for the Current Issues and Youth Activism Institute at SIT in Brattleboro. Institute founder John Ungerleider was heralded by GIV and SIT president Don Steinberg for his vision and quarter-century commitment, with co-director Simon Norton no less lauded for his integral leadership. GIV co-founder Ellen Lovell was on hand to receive a hearty Happy Birthday commendation too.

30th Campaign Welcomes New Generation of Scholars

In honor of our 30th anniversary, GIV launched a campaign to create scholarships for underprivileged students and make the Institutes even more accessible to Vermonters from all backgrounds. First we approached longtime GIV supporters to pledge \$5,000 over 5 years so students in financial need could attend the Institutes each year. Already pledges of more than \$60,000 have accrued - and the first deserving 30th Anniversary scholars attended in summer 2014.

GIV also launched an Anniversary Circle, where donors with long-term vision can make legacy gifts.

National Geographic Features Governor's Institute Happenings – Twice!

A project that started at a GIV Institute is garnering more international attention. In 2013, Tom Tailer encouraged a group of GIV Engineering participants to think about how discarded carpet and cement might become durable temporary shelters for use in large-scale disasters. Early models proved so promising, determined alumni tested and refined the idea over the following year, then began training international disaster relief professionals to provide low cost, sturdy shelters for displaced Haitians. National Geographic sent a film crew, and the most recent evolution of the model is described in Structure magazine at http://www.structuremag.org/?p=7568.

National Geographic also published a special guest post about GIV's Astronomy Winter Weekend on its invitation-only website blog. Josh Bongard, Governor's Institute on Mathematical Sciences

Can you teach robots to heal themselves? Some GIVers know how, thanks to the Math Institute's world-renowned Josh Bongard.

A UVM professor and Presidential Award winner, Josh has authored two groundbreaking books on artificial intelligence – and in 2007, was named one of MIT Technology Review's top 35 innovators in the world under the age of 35. Josh has taught at GIV's Mathematical Sciences Institute for years, giving weeklong courses or presentations as his schedule allows. Asked why he stays involved in GIV, he says "In my lab, we love robots. It's great fun to bring that enthusiasm to the GIV students, and have it reflected back tenfold."
