THE CASE FOR A MEDICAID 2.5% RATE INCREASE Vermont Council of Developmental and Mental Health Services February 2015

Designated and Specialized Service Agencies need a 2.5% Medicaid rate increase

- o Community services and hospitals are strained due to closure of VT State Hospital
- o Substance abuse services to address Vermont's opiate crisis require adequately paid staff
- o Our services are essential to address child abuse and neglect
- o Our services reduce costs in the criminal justice system and higher cost medical care
- o We urgently need ongoing reliable COLAs

• Over the Last 4 years Designated Agency rates were cut by 1.5%

- o Over the last 10 years our rates have trailed the Consumer Price Index by nearly 15%
- o Meanwhile our costs for employee health benefits, fuels and IT have risen substantially

• Low Medicaid rates lead to inadequate staff compensation & reduced care quality

- Recruitment and retention of skilled and trained staff is a challenge because of low pay
- o Salary levels of our staff are \$9,000 to 1\$6,000 below comparable state employees
- o State Employees continue to receive COLAs, step increases and good health benefits
- Our staff are being asked to do more and work with people with more complex needs
- o Quality of care requires lasting, trusting relationships that get disrupted by staff turnover

Unlike other health providers we can't cost shift to commercial insurance

Designated Agencies depend on Medicaid and state funding for 90% of our revenues

Health Reform will be impeded by starving low cost providers of high needs people

- o The social determinants of health play a larger role than genetics, environment and medical care all combined on health outcomes and costs
- We effectively serve Vermonters with complex and costly health conditions at low costs
- o RBA data shows avoidance of costly emergency room, inpatient & institutional care

• There is increasing demand for our services

- o Growth in the Developmental Services budget is due to new people and services
- o More babies now survive with life-long disabilities and complex health conditions
- o More people with disabilities & health conditions live longer and have multiple needs
- o Autism, early on-set Alzheimer's disease, addictive disorders, and mental health challenges for children and families are all increasing

• Investment in Designated Agencies has proven outcomes

- O Vermont has no state school, fewer psychiatric inpatient beds and low incarceration rates
- O Data* shows high employment placements, successful recovery from addictive disorders, successful interventions with school children and other great outcomes
- Let's build on our success
