5	Statement of purpose of bill as introduced: This bill proposes to provide that
6	certain forestry operations would not be subject to liability as a public or
7	private nuisance. The bill would also provide that a municipal bylaw may not
8	provide for the regulation of forestry operations.
9	An act relating to the conduct of forestry operations
10	It is hereby enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Vermont:
11	Sec. 1. 12 V.S.A. chapter 196 is added to read:
12	CHAPTER 196. VERMONT RIGHT TO CONDUCT FORESTRY
13	<u>OPERATIONS</u>
14	§ 5755. FINDINGS
15	The General Assembly finds that:
16	(1) Private and public forestlands:
17	(A) constitute unique and irreplaceable resources, benefits, and
18	values of statewide importance;
19	(B) contribute to the protection and conservation of wildlife habitat,
20	air, water, and soil resources of the State;

1	(C) militate against the effects of climate change; and
2	(D) result in general benefit to the health and welfare of the people of
3	the State.
4	(2) The forest products industry, including maple sap and syrup
5	production:
6	(A) is a major contributor to and is valuable to the State's economy
7	by providing jobs to its citizens;
8	(B) is essential to the manufacture of forest products that are used
9	and enjoyed by the people of the State; and
10	(C) benefits the general welfare of the people of the State.
11	(3) Private and public forestlands are critical for and contribute
12	significantly to the State's outdoor recreation and tourism economies.
13	(4) The economic management of public and private forestlands
14	contributes to sustaining long-term forest health, integrity, and productivity.
15	(5) Forestry operations are adversely impacted by the encroachment of
16	urban, commercial, and residential land uses throughout the State that result in
17	forest fragmentation and conversion and erode the health and sustainability of
18	remaining forests.
19	(6) As a result of encroachment on forests, conflicts have arisen between
20	traditional forestry land uses and urban, commercial, and residential land uses

1	that threaten to permanently convert forestland to other uses, resulting in an
2	adverse impact to the economy and natural environment of the State.
3	(7) The encouragement, development, improvement, and preservation of
4	forestry operations will result in a general benefit to the health and welfare of
5	the people of the State and the State's economy.
6	(8) The forest products industry, in order to survive, likely will need to
7	change, adopt new technologies, and diversify into new products.
8	(9) Forestry operations, including logging, transportation, and
9	processing of on-site-derived forest products may be subject to lawsuits based
10	on the theory of nuisance. Nuisance suits could encourage and result in the
11	conversion of forestland and loss of the forest products industry.
12	(10) It is in the public interest of the people of the State to ensure that
13	forestry operations that are conducted in accordance with the following are
14	protected and encouraged and are not subject to public and private nuisance
15	actions arising out of conflicts between forestry operations and urban,
16	commercial, and residential uses:
17	(A) the Acceptable Management Practices for Protecting Water
18	Quality on Logging Jobs in Vermont, as adopted by the Commissioner of
19	Forests, Parks and Recreation;
20	(B) accepted silvicultural practices as defined by the Commissioner
21	of Forests, Parks and Recreation; and

1	(C) the requirements of this subchapter.
2	§ 5756. DEFINITIONS
3	As used in this chapter:
4	(1) "Close out" means all activities conducted after cessation of
5	harvesting that are necessary to stabilize areas impacted by forestry operations.
6	Closeout includes the maintenance of landings, logging roads, skid trails, and
7	stream crossings and removal of logging slash and material from roads and
8	landings in compliance with the Acceptable Management Practices for
9	Maintaining Water Quality on Logging Jobs in Vermont as adopted by the
10	Commissioner.
11	(2) "Commissioner" means the Commissioner of Forests, Parks and
12	Recreation.
13	(3) "Forest product" means logs, pulpwood, wood chips, maple sap and
14	syrup, roots, or bark.
15	(4) "Forestry operation" means activities related to the management of
16	forests, including timber harvests; pruning; planting; reforestation; pest,
17	disease, and invasive species control; wildlife habitat management; and
18	fertilization. "Forestry operation" includes the primary processing of forest
19	products on a parcel where a timber harvest occurs.

1	(5) "Timber" means trees, saplings, bushes, seedlings, shrubs, and
2	sprouts from which trees, of every size, nature, kind, and description, may
3	grow.
4	(6) "Timber harvest" means a forestry operation involving the harvest of
5	timber.
6	§ 5757. FORESTRY OPERATIONS; PROTECTION FROM NUISANCE
7	<u>LAWSUITS</u>
8	(a) The following activities shall be entitled to a rebuttable presumption
9	that the activity does not constitute a public or private nuisance if the activities
10	are conducted in accordance with the Acceptable Management Practices for
11	Maintaining Water Quality on Logging Jobs in Vermont as adopted by the
12	Commissioner, accepted silvicultural practices as defined by the
13	Commissioner, and other applicable law:
14	(1) a forestry operation;
15	(2) a change in ownership or size of a parcel on which a forestry
16	operation is being conducted;
17	(3) cessation or interruption of a forestry operation;
18	(4) enrollment in governmental forestry or conservation programs;
19	(5) adoption of new forestry technology;
20	(6) a change in a forestry operation, including a change in the type of a
21	forestry operation;

1	(7) construction, maintenance, and repair of log landings, logging roads.
2	and skid trails;
3	(8) removal, storage, or stockpiling of vegetation or timber;
4	(9) visual changes due to the removal, storage, or stockpiling of
5	vegetation or forest products;
6	(10) noise from forestry equipment used in normal, generally accepted
7	forestry operations; or
8	(11) the use of chemicals normally utilized in forestry operations and
9	applied in accordance with all State and federal requirements.
10	(b) The presumption under subsection (a) of this section that a listed
11	forestry operation or other activity does not constitute a nuisance may be
12	rebutted by a showing that the forestry operation or other activity has a
13	substantial adverse effect on health, safety, or welfare, or has a noxious and
14	significant interference with the use and enjoyment of the neighboring
15	property.
16	(c) Nothing in this section shall be construed to limit the authority of State
17	or local boards of health to abate nuisances affecting the public health.
18	§ 5758. RECOVERY OF COSTS AND ATTORNEY'S FEES
19	If a court determines that a nuisance action brought against a person
20	conducting a forestry operation or other activity listed under subsection
21	5757(a) of this title must be dismissed because the forestry operation or other

1	activity does not constitute a public or private nuisance under section 5757 of
2	this title, the person conducting the forestry operation or other activity shall be
3	awarded the actual amount of costs and expenses reasonably incurred in
4	connection with the defense of the action, including reasonable attorney's fees.
5	No costs or attorney's fees shall be assessed or awarded against the State.

7	(d)(1) A bylaw under this chapter shall not regulate:
8	(A) required agricultural practices, including the construction of farm
9	structures, as those practices are defined by the Secretary of Agriculture, Food
10	and Markets or :
11	(B) accepted silvicultural practices, as defined by the Commissioner
12	of Forests, Parks and Recreation, including practices which are in compliance
13	with the Acceptable Management Practices for Maintaining Water Quality on
14	Logging Jobs in Vermont, as adopted by the Commissioner of Forests, Parks
15	and Recreation; or
16	(C) forestry operations.
17	(1)(2) For purposes of As used in this section;
18	(A) "farm Farm structure" means a building, enclosure, or fence for
19	housing livestock, raising horticultural or agronomic plants, or carrying out
20	other practices associated with accepted agricultural or farming practices,

1	including a silo, as "farming" is defined in 10 V.S.A. § 6001(22), but excludes
2	a dwelling for human habitation.
3	(B) "Forestry operations" has the same meaning as in 10 V.S.A.
4	<u>§ 2602.</u>
5	(2)(3) A person shall notify a municipality of the intent to build a farm
6	structure and shall abide by setbacks approved by the Secretary of Agriculture,
7	Food and Markets. No municipal permit for a farm structure shall be required.
8	(3) A municipality may enact a bylaw that imposes forest management
9	practices resulting in a change in a forest management plan for land enrolled in
10	the use value appraisal program pursuant to 32 V.S.A. chapter 124 only to the
11	extent that those changes are silviculturally sound, as determined by the
12	Commissioner of Forests, Parks and Recreation, and protect specific natural,
13	conservation, aesthetic, or wildlife features in properly designated zoning
14	districts. These changes also must be compatible with 32 V.S.A. § 3755.
15	(4) This subsection does not prevent an appropriate municipal panel,
16	when issuing a decision on an application for land development over which the
17	panel otherwise has jurisdiction under this chapter, from imposing reasonable
18	conditions under subsection 4464(b) of this title to protect wildlife habitat,
19	threatened or endangered species, or other natural, historic, or scenic resources
20	and does not prevent the municipality from enforcing such conditions,

- provided that the reasonable conditions do not restrict or regulate forestry
