JFO's Responsibilities

- As required by Act 54, Sec. 18
- Participate in the summer study
- Offer independent review of the draft cost estimates
 - Review submitted to AoA on Dec. 2, 2015
- Submit independent review of the final cost estimates
 - Review submitted to the legislature on Jan. 6,
 2016

Areas of Concern, part 1

- More clarity regarding additional amounts to be publicly financed and potential savings to the private sector
 - Public employers already pay for primary care
 - Decline in private insurance costs, uncompensated care
- Additional administrative costs arising from a new system of primary care
 - Creates a new administrative structure
 - Adds complexity around who pays for what

Areas of Concern, part 2

- Critical transition costs and timing issues
 - Timing of implementation
 - Reserves, IT
 - Providers, patients, employers, health insurance industry
 - Structure of public-private financing
- Base case should reflect updated Medicaid population number
 - Number used for 2017: 150,500
 - Consensus estimate for 2017: ~171,400
 - State would pay less for primary care but more for Medicaid overall
 - Assumes State continues to pay its share of the expanding Medicaid program

Areas of Concern, part 3

- Trends in future health care costs affect costs in years beyond 2017, requiring multi-year analysis
 - Growth in payment rates per year seems low
 - Report: 3% commercial, 1.7% Medicaid, 0.2% Medicare
 - Recent estimates 1½ to 2 percentage points higher
- More thought needed regarding integration with health care reform initiatives
 - All-payer model
 - Changes in statewide provider reimbursement rates
 - Expansion of accountable care organizations (ACOs)
 - Costs, access, quality of care

To Conclude

- JFO appreciates the work of the AoA in taking a careful look at the medical claims costs of universal primary care
- JFO urges further work and study before moving forward
