I) <u>What it is</u>

- Help for people with disabilities and the elderly to live safely at home: ramps, bathrooms, grab bars, railings
- "Help" in the form of tax credit (not tax deduction) for portion of the cost of home modifications
- Amount of credit based on cost of modifications, and income of home owner
- 17 states either have an operation program or are actively considering legislation (source: MSS Issue Brief)

II) <u>Why it's needed</u>

- Promotes "age in place" and avoids institutionalization
- People on fixed incomes often can't afforded needed modifications
- VT's Aging population
 - VT second oldest state median age
 - Overall state population growth of 5.9% between 2010-2020; +55 population growth of 26% (source: census data)
- Widely recognized lack of affordable, accessible housing
 - Housing stock is relatively old: in 2009 44% of housing built before 1950 (source: 2010 VHFA Housing Needs Assessment)
 - Age 18-64 non-disabled in poverty = 10.1%
 - Age 18-64 disabled in poverty = 28.4 % (source: Annual Disability Statistics Compendium, UNH)

- VCIL Home Access Program: 60-80 projects/year, but waiting list typically 60-100 or so with a waiting list of 2 years
- Needs data from VCIL/NMSS Survey in January 2016
 - 198 people responded to survey
 - 87 people responded that they would use a tax credit to help pay for home modifications
 - 74% currently do not live in an accessible dwelling
 - 69% desire to improve the access of their current dwelling
 - 72% of respondents would require financial assistance to make home modification
- VCIL income eligibility criteria only serves people up to 80% of HUD Median income
- Other programs such as Home Ownership Centers, the federal ABLE program and Opportunities Credit Union do not fully meet need
- Long list of supporting partner organizations, including:
 - AARP, Triple As, VCIL, VCDR, VT Falls Prevention Coalition,
 VT Affordable Housing Coalition and 9 others
- Report of the Council on Pathways from Poverty recommends more funding for housing for elders and people with disabilities

III) <u>Consequences of lack of modifications</u>

- Deaths and injuries from falls: falls are the leading cause of accidental deaths for elders
- more people over age 65 die from falls than in auto accidents; in 2009 there were 118 deaths in VT related to falls
- VT falls death rate increased 439% between 2000 and 2009
- In 2009, 1656 hospitalizations related to falls, costing \$39,400,000 (source: Falls Free VT Coalition)
- 50% of people with MS fall within a 3-6 month period: (source NMSS Issue Brief)

IV) <u>What it might "cost" in lost tax revenue</u>

- VCIL Home Access Program average costs
 - \$8,000. for ramp
 - \$12,000. For bathroom
- # of modifications X cost of modifications
- Factored by income . . .
- Example of John Pierce
 - o \$8,000 ramp
 - \circ \$64,000 income
 - 40% of cost is eligible = \$3,200 tax credit
