There seem to be two main concepts in opposition to each other in the work to date. If we can strike a balance between these two components:

We need to maintain a sense of community through our community schools.

We need to scale up to find efficiencies, while improving educational quality.

To address these issues, we need a differentiated approach, but we recommend that there are some non-negotiable that remain.

Differentiated:

1. Develop a study of merger and governance as a part of the education quality reviews.

- 2. Allow proposals that create opportunity to show how change would increase efficiency and effectiveness.
- 3. Provide incentive and give areas of flexibility around governance models.
- 4. Develop supports for districts that want to merge in order to hold them harmless from districts within boarders that do not want to merge.

Non-Negotiable:

- 1. Fund studies where systems want to change.
- 2. Recognize that the cost of transitioning through sizable change is significant. Provide support for these costs through tax rate decreases that taper off to avoid a cliff, yet assist with up front costs.
- 3. Continue with Act 153 regarding the centralization of Support Services. Use this data to consider benefits of centralizing across the state in other areas.
- 4. Reduce the financial responsibility to systems moving forward to hold them harmless from those systems that do not want to change.
- 5. Develop expected process that verifies negative impact to students or increased efficiency of status quo for those systems that do not move forward.
