3 **ASSESSMENT; REPORT**

4 (a) Creation. There is created a Correctional Facility Planning Committee
5 to develop a 20-year capital plan for, and assess the population needs at, State
6 correctional facilities.

7 (b) Membership. The Committee shall be composed of the following:

8 (1) the Commissioner of Corrections or designee, who shall serve as
9 chair;

10 (2) the Commissioner of Finance and Management or designee;

11 (3) the Commissioner of Buildings and General Services or designee;

12 (4) the Commissioner for Children and Families or designee;

13 (5) the Commissioner of Mental Health or designee;

14 (6) the Commissioner of Disabilities, Aging, and Independent Living or
15 designee; and

2 the most recent facilities assessment as of June 30, 2016:

3 (A) each facility's replacement value;

4 (B) each facility's deferred maintenance schedule; and

5 (C) the cost of each facility's five, ten, and 15 year scheduled
6 maintenance.

7 (2) an analysis of the historic population trends of State correctional
8 facilities, and anticipated future population trends, including age, gender, and
9 medical, mental health, and substance abuse conditions;

10 (3) an evaluation of whether the design and use of existing facilities
11 adequately serve the current population and anticipated future populations,
12 including whether the Out-of-State inmate program may be eliminated and the
13 feasibility of constructing new infrastructure more suitable for current and
14 future populations;

15 (4) an investigation into the options for cost-savings, including
16 public-private partnerships; and

17 (5) an evaluation on potential site locations for a replacement State
18 correctional facility.

19 (d) Report and recommendations. On or before February 1, 2017, the
20 Committee shall submit a report based on the assessment described in
21 subsection (c) of this section, and any recommendations for legislative action,

6 (a) On or before October 1 each year, any county requesting capital funds
7 for its courthouse, or court operations, shall submit a request to the Court
8 Administrator.

9 (b) The Court Administrator shall evaluate requests based on the following
10 criteria:

11 (1) whether the funding request relates to an emergency that will affect
12 the court operations and the administration of justice;

13 (2) whether there is a State-owned courthouse in the county that could
14 absorb court activities in lieu of this capital investment;

15 (3) whether the county consistently invested in major maintenance in the

12 (1) Grants shall be awarded competitively to schools for fees and
13 equipment necessary to comply with and implement the Enhanced 911
